

110 BODIES FOUND

Crowds, Gathered About Pit Mouth, Threaten Lives Of Directors

The entire industrial region around. Dortmund was plunged into gloom by the tragedy and crowds gathered at the mine entrance, in an ugly mood, threatening to lynch directors, who were making every effort to keep news of the disaster from gaining circulation. The government sent its condolences to the community. Pitiful scenes were entired.

Some Blown to Pieces. Rescue workers with torches and oxygen tanks, had to cut their way through rocks to the rear of the death chamber where the explosion buried most of the victims. A series of explosions had blown a score of miners to pieces and blocked entrance to the second and third levels of the mine. 

About five years ago the Government changed the basis of payment for the transmission of mails from that of weight to that of space with the stipulation that if the New England carriers were unable to show a reasonable profit under the new plan they could come back for a readjustment.

Col. George E. Fogg, of the legal department of the Maine Central, argued the case before the commission at the original hearing in February, 1921, when the change of basis was the subject. 'The rates were advanced about 35 per cent. under date of Dec. 18, 1923, so far as the New England lines were concerned, and in March of last year Col. Fogg again appeared before the commission for a rehearing, asking that the new rate be made retroactive to Feb. 21, 1921, the date of the filing of the petition. the filing of the petition.

NEW YORK, Feb. 12-More than \$1,000,000 worth of furs were sold yesterday at the annual winter auction terday at the annual winter auction here. It was the first time that figure had been reached in a single day's selling since the days of the post-war boom. Judge Sisk directed the jury to return its verdict after Assistant District Attorney Robert T. Bushnell had announced that five alienists had found the accused man insane, and the alienists themselves had testified that Dr. Thiery suffered from "constitutional psychopathic inferiority."

The physicians said that Thiery had confessed to killing his brother-in-law and had said he had been urged by a higher power to commit the crime.
