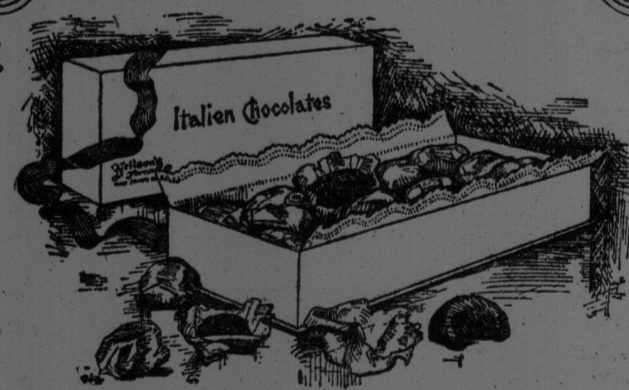

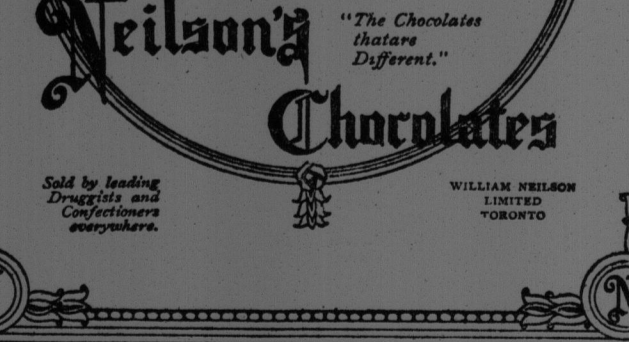

Daily Hints For the Cook

Mock Mince Pie. One cup sugar, 1 cup molasses, 2 cups water, 1/2 cup butter, 1 cup chopped raisins, 2 eggs, 2 lemons (juice and grated rind) 5 soft crackers, rolled fine, boil up for a minute, butter, sugar, water and molasses, then add the other ingredients. Bake in two crusts. Will make two or three small pies.

Chocolate Pie. Two squares chocolate with 1 cup of boiling water, butter size of an egg, the yolks of two eggs well beaten, 1 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons cornstarch dissolved in 2 tablespoons of water. Cook until thick. When cool add 1 teaspoon vanilla and turn into pie shell. Take the whites of 2 eggs beaten stiff and 2 tablespoons sugar; spread on pie and brown in oven. To be eaten cold.

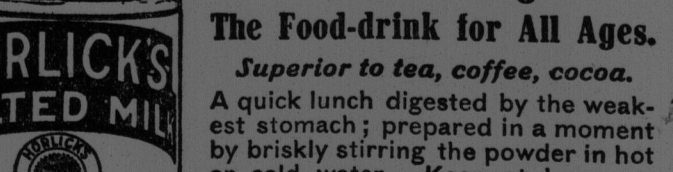

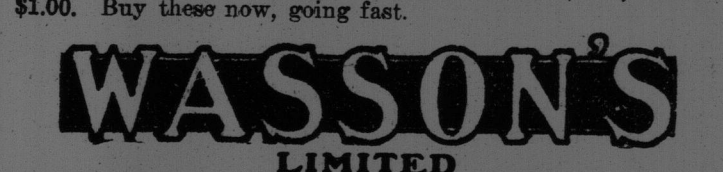

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has thrown down the gauntlet and declared the unwavering purpose of the Liberal party to champion the cause of the people of Canada at a time when the burdens upon them are pressing ever more heavily, while their power to sustain the burdens is steadily declining because of conditions which have arisen, and with which the Borden government either has not the ability or the inclination to cope.

the people everywhere; and if in the past, and even at the present time there are vested interests which are constantly urging increased expenditure, and manufacturing war scares if necessary, there will be hereafter another and steadily growing body of public opinion protesting in the most vigorous fashion against the waste of the fruits of human intelligence and industry.

Has the Borden-Bourassa alliance made you rich? Borden and thirty-cent beefsteak—there's a rallying cry for the Borden Club.

Hon. Robert Rogers is campaigning in Manitoba. He is hinting at free wheat as a bait for the farmers.

In the death of H. H. Fickett and W. F. Barnhill, the city and county of St. John have lost two good citizens.

Montreal business men want more mail matter sent via New York. Why not give the Canadian route via St. John a fair trial?

St. John's contention in regard to the mails is not purely selfish. It wants a faster mail service, and that concerns the whole of Canada.

St. John Conservatives who attempt to defend the government's treatment of this city have a heavy task and are making progress backward.

It seems that when correct information about the mail service is required the office of the postmaster-general is a good place not to apply.

Sir William Mackenzie would like to purchase the Intercolonial. Thanks, Sir William, but the C. P. R. appears to have the option.

Who will be the next member of the Borden government to attend a New York banquet and fill his waistcoat with Yankee truck?

Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., has retired to a judgeship and there will be a by-election in York county. It should be a lively one.

St. John people, in view of the affair of the Empress, the increase in inter-colonial railway rates, and the uncertainty about the mail service, are wondering where the lightning will next strike.

The Borden government has achieved something. It has helped the American consumer at the expense of the Canadian. The latter gets no compensation for the higher price he has to pay for his food supply.

The rumor that Hon. J. D. Hazen will retire from the government within the next year to accept a judgeship may very well be true. There is no doubt Mr. Hazen could get the judgeship if he desired it, and he would be very reluctant to face another election in this constituency.

The Moncton Transcript wants to know who pays for hauling the empty cars back from Halifax for the C. P. R. At last accounts it was charged up to the people of Canada, and especially to the local patrons of the people's railway.

Sir William MacKenzie says that the financial outlook is improving, and he believes money will be more plentiful in the spring. This confirms what has been said by some other financiers who have lately returned from the old country.

Mr. Bryan believes that much is being done to bring the nations into harmony and prevent war, and he hopes soon to see the United States linked up with all other nations by treaties which will practically prevent war. One way to promote peace would be to secure a general acceptance of Mr. Churchill's plan for a holiday in armament construction.

Toronto is now the dearest market in America in which to purchase live cattle for the meat trade. The lowering of the American tariff has hit the consumers of Canada rather hard. Unhappily there is no reduction in the Canadian tariff in any direction for their benefit. If Mr. Borden and his friends can help it there will probably not be any reduction.

Mr. Bonar Law says that if Home Rule is imposed upon Ulster it will result in civil war. When such an assertion is made by the leader of the Unionist party in the United Kingdom, it has a tendency to encourage the people of North East Ulster to rebel. And yet, Mr. Bonar Law knows perfectly well that Ulster cannot be excluded from the scheme of Home Rule. If he desires to prove his patriotism he will accept the suggestion of Premier Asquith, and join in a conference to consider the question of Ulster's position under the Home Rule which must come.

PEACE AND ARBITRATION

Mr. W. Evans Derby, secretary of the Peace Society, does not agree with the views of some English statesmen that Britain is helpless in this matter of the race for armaments. He declares that if Britain and France would agree, as Germany has expressed a willingness to agree, that the commerce of the nations shall not be preyed upon in war, the demand for increased armaments, except on the part of the armament makers, would cease. In the course of his address before the Canadian Club Wednesday Mr. Derby pointed out how largely the Emperor of Germany is financially interested in the Kapp concern, and how large is the interest many German and British politicians have in companies manufacturing armaments and munitions of war. He declares that this is a very powerful influence, not alone in Germany, but in Britain, and that while Mr. Churchill has declared that the armament-makers are the servants of the government and the people, they appear to be really the masters.

Of course in this matter of the effect of a change in British and French policy with regard to the treatment of vessels engaged in commerce in time of war, there is difference of opinion in the mother country as well as in other places, but it is an open question if the statements of Britain, Germany, France and the United States have given as much thought to the solution of the armament question as to some others which are really of very much less importance.

Mr. Derby is convinced that a change in policy which might be made without injury to any cause would put an end to the rapid increase of expenditure for armaments. He also believes that if the United States would agree to submit all questions arising between that country and the United Kingdom to arbitration, the principle would quickly be adopted by all the nations, and the usefulness of this instrument of world peace would be enormously increased.

There is behind the peace movement a powerful, and it may be added a growing force of public sentiment in all countries. The intolerable burden of armaments has pressed the economic side of the question strongly home to

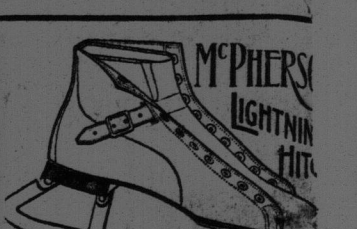

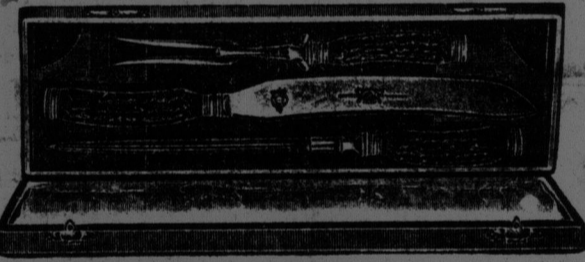

POISONED HUSBAND AND CHILDREN SO THAT SHE MIGHT MARRY AGAIN

Woman and Young Farm Hand Arraigned on Murder Charge—An Alleged Confession

Little Valley, N. Y., Dec. 12.—Mrs. Cynthia Buffum and Ernest Frain, a young farm hand were arraigned yesterday afternoon on charges of murder in the first degree. District Attorney Cole said Mrs. Buffum had made a confession in which she admitted administering poison to her husband, Willis Buffum and her four children, so that she might be free to marry young Frain. Buffum died on August 27. One of the children, Laura, ten years old is still critically ill. The others are slowly recovering. Frain and Mrs. Buffum pleaded not guilty and were remanded to the county jail. The alleged confession covers thirty typewritten pages and in it Mrs. Cole says, Mrs. Buffum says the poison was placed in the food prepared for the family covering a period more than a month. It was in the form of horse medicine containing poison.

Mrs. Barlow Cannot Play Winter Golf. Philadelphia, Dec. 12.—Mrs. Ronald H. Barlow, Eastern golf champion, and holder of many golf titles, who twisted her shoulder at the Women's Amateur Championship Tournament, at Wilmington, on October 18, met with another similar accident recently, and her physician advised that she rest until spring. Mrs. Barlow was too plucky to admit that the injury to her shoulder affected her game at Wilmington. When she withdrew from the tourney she merely said "My friends say I am playing execrable golf, and I agree with them."

"I have just been to see my physician," she said, "he assures me positively that in time I will be able to resume the game. He told me, however, that I could not think of playing before spring, if then."

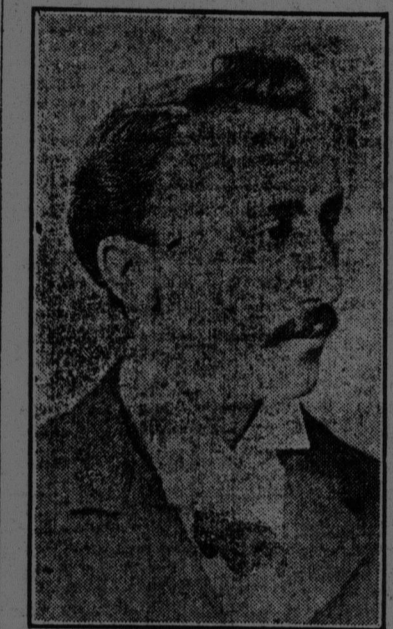

Mr. Barnhill was born December 14, 1841, at Pleasant Point, and has lived in Lancaster all his life. He is survived by his wife, who was formerly Miss Bertha Ferris, daughter of the late Albert W. Ferris, of Lancaster, two sons, Charles and Frederick, and a daughter, Mrs. A. P. Barnhill, K.C. of the legal profession, and a brother, Mr. A. P. BALFOUR PUBLISHES VIEWS ON HOME RULE

Arthur J. Balfour, formerly premier, who held also at one time the chief secretaryship of Ireland, has just published a political pamphlet entitled "Nationality and Home Rule" in which he expresses his personal views on the Irish problem.

The pamphlet is largely a reiteration of the opinions expressed for years by Mr. Balfour in the days when he took an active part in politics. He says that "they may maintain the union," he says, "and keep Ireland in full political communion with England and Scotland, or give Ireland, with or without Ulster, complete autonomy, requiring her to manage her own finances, pay her own bills, borrow on her own credit, control and remain or not, just as she pleases, and settle her own constitution within the limits of the empire."

Mr. Balfour describes the latter policy as "anarchy, anarchy, anarchy," and contends that home rule will not satisfy the sentiment behind the nationalistic propaganda. The Irish, he continues, demand that their constitution and independence be restored to them. The view is a complete delusion based on imaginary history, Ireland never having been deprived of a national organization because the never had one.

He asserts that all Irish grievances relating to religion, land or finance have been removed.

Mr. Balfour holds that if remedial measures were employed to end the Ireland hostilities would eventually disappear and Irish patriotism would be replaced by British patriotism as such a Scottish patriotism does at present.

ROCK WILL ADD TO COST OF TERMINALS

A difficulty, hitherto unsuspected, has arisen in connection with the plans of the city commissioners for the construction of new ferry terminals at the foot of King street, West St. John. This is the existence of a large amount of solid rock on the proposed sites which would make the construction of a new terminal a more costly project than had been anticipated.

The attention of the city commissioners was drawn to this matter yesterday when they had an opportunity to inspect the report of the government engineers who took soundings and made drawings in the district in connection with the preparations for the construction of the marine department wharf.

Their survey showed a sudden outcropping of solid rock on the spot where it was proposed to establish the new ferry terminals.

In order to bring the floats up to the line of Union street, as had been intended, it would be necessary to remove about 50 feet of rock and this would be an expense on which the city had not figured. If the rock were not removed it would be necessary to have an approach to the floats nearly as long as that over Rodney wharf at present, a condition which was to be done away with on the new site.

It is possible that this new light on the situation may cause some further delay in carrying out the scheme for new floats. In the meantime, however, the city may have to face the problem of keeping Rodney wharf in repair and, as the condition of the wharf is said to be fairly bad, the commissioners may find that the cost of removing the rock from the new site might not be very much greater than the expense incurred in rebuilding Rodney wharf.

NEW YORK RACES RACE SUICIDE SPECTRE

Notable Decrease in the Number of Births in Manhattan

New York, Dec. 12.—Manhattan Borough is facing at last, the spectre of race suicide. With only three weeks of 1914 left, the bureau of Vital Statistics of the Health Department indicates a falling off for the year in this borough of about 1,500 births as compared with 1913 when the total was 69,246.

Figures gathered by the bureau of vital statistics in the four other boroughs of the city show that Manhattan's absolute decrease in births will be offset, perhaps slightly more than offset, by the increase in those boroughs, especially in Brooklyn and the Bronx.

Had these outlying districts of the borough, according to a statement made by Dr. William H. Guilfoyle, in charge of the gathering of the city's vital statistics, are not at all likely to prevent 1914 showing a relative decrease in births and an absolute decline in the whole city's birth rate.

MORE SPEED TO FIRES IN CITY

Motor Apparatus to Be Bought For Department

COAL POCKET PROPOSAL

Council Declines Company's Offer and What City Will Agree To is Set Out—Matter of Tracks in Charlotte Street

Permit for the extension of the I. C. R. tracks in Charlotte street to the northern side of Broad street was given, but permission to cross Charlotte street to the Vulcan Foundry was refused. The Dominion Coal Company was given permission to erect a shelter over the West Side ferry floats at their own expense to eliminate the dust nuisance as a condition of securing a renewal of their lease of the North Rodney wharf.

The meeting was called to order at eleven o'clock Mayor Frink, president and Commissioners Wigmore, Agar and McLellan and the common clerk were present.

The mayor announced that the meeting was called to deal with the application of I. C. R. to give permission to lay a spur track from the I. C. R. extension in Charlotte street across the street to the Vulcan Foundry. A plan was presented showing its location.

Mayor Frink raised the question of the city's liability in case of accidents on this spur, but the common clerk said that the city would be relieved of legal responsibility by the arrangement which authority for such spurs can be granted.

After further consideration it was decided that the application could not be complied with.

Commissioner Agar announced that R. G. Haley & Co. and the Consumers Coal Company wanted to have the I. C. R. spur extended in a straight line, to bring it opposite their premises. This would be bringing it above the southern side of the street.

Commissioner McLellan said that at some future time the city probably would be filled in and Broad street could be extended and the railway would be in the way.

On motion permission was granted. Commissioner Wigmore suggested that the only satisfactory way of meeting the demands for railway connection on the eastern side of the street would be to bring the street along the middle of the street, thus keeping the middle of the street clear.

It was decided that, if Messrs. McAvily were not satisfied with the city's refusal to allow them to cross the street and an audience could be arranged, the matter would be gone into more thoroughly.

Motor Fire Apparatus

Commissioner McLellan reported on his inquiries regarding motor fire apparatus. The aerial ladder trucks offered were an Allis-Chalmers, International Motor Co.—Traction drawn truck, hand elevation for aerial ladder, \$11,000.

Waters Company—Same apparatus, \$12,000.

Seagrove Company—Four wheel truck, elevation by springs, four wheel truck, \$15,000; fore-wheel drive, \$14,700.

La France—Same description, \$15,000; same except only fore-wheel drive, \$14,000.

Descriptions of combined chemical hose wagon and pump apparatus were also submitted; the prices were—Waters, \$14,850; La France, \$18,650; and Seagrove, \$12,350.

Commissioner McLellan gave detailed technical explanations of the various machines and the reasons why they are required.

Mayor Frink said that changing conditions must be met and the use of horses means a serious delay. The city needs not only more rapid means of getting the apparatus to a fire but apparatus which will be more powerful when it gets there. The purchase of a truck means a bond issue, however, and he thought in view of the condition of the financial market, that it might be advisable to restrict this year's purchase to aerial ladder truck. Regarding the combination truck, he would prefer to see the city buy a water tower. He would like to see Canadian built apparatus purchased but he thought it would be necessary to purchase where they could get the best value.

Commissioners Agar and Wigmore agreed that the purchase of the combination machine would be as much as should be attempted.

Commissioner McLellan—"You have to have ladders and you have to get them to the fires and the present truck cannot get down the Sydney street hill without danger of an accident." He added that the apparatus could not be delivered within four to six months.

Speaking of conditions on the hills the mayor said that last night the rain freezing made King street absolutely unsafe for horse vehicles. "There was nothing in the morning papers about it, however, because it was Providence and not the commissioner of public works that wet the streets before the frost came."

Continuing the discussion of the purchase of apparatus Commissioner McLellan said that, in fairness to the department, he felt he should move for the purchase of both pieces of apparatus. Accordingly he moved that he be authorized to purchase an 800 gallon combination pump chemical and hose wagon and also a sixty-five foot aerial ladder truck, fully equipped at a maximum of \$20,000, subject to the apparatus being delivered in St. John duty and freight paid and reinstated to the satisfaction of the city, and the demonstrators be obliged to remain in the city to operate the machines for a period not exceeding thirty days.

Commissioner Wigmore said that he felt one piece of apparatus was as necessary as the other and he seconded the motion.

After some hesitation and with the understanding that there would be an opportunity for reconsideration, Commissioner Agar voted yes and the mayor voted yes. The motion was adopted.

The Coal Pocket

The proposal of the Dominion Coal Company regarding their coal pocket at West St. John was taken up. Mayor Frink said the company's proposal was

A special train from the west passed through the city this morning for Halifax, carrying a large number of passengers for the steamer Empress of Ireland, to spend Christmas in their homes in the old country. A special train for the American passed through the city this morning, the first of a series of special trains today, the first an hour and a half late, the second three hours. The Boston train was on time today.

FALL IN PORK

The provision market is decidedly firm just now, but locally, or at least in Fairville, pork took a drop this morning. It will hardly effect the market quotations, however. It was a little after six o'clock when the engine for the Boston train was coming to the Union Depot from the round-house that it collided with a freight car loaded with pork. The car was damaged considerably. The Boston train outgoing was delayed for more than an hour, not getting away until 8:15.

that the city should spend \$7,500 to build a roof over the ferry floats and the company should repay this amount in ten annual payments. This did not provide for interest on the bonds, a matter of several hundred dollars a year. He did not see why the city should shoulder the obligation.

Commissioner McLellan said that the arrangement would practically guarantee possession to the company for at least ten years. He thought the company should meet the whole cost.

Commissioner Agar suggested that the city might increase the rent of the wharf to \$1000 a year give a five years' lease and allow the company to do what is necessary to prevent the dust, with its claim on the city for improvements.

It was made clear that if this arrangement was adopted the city would be under no obligation to renew the lease until the company had demonstrated the effectiveness of the dust prevention measures.

The smoke trouble was also mentioned and Mayor Frink said that by burning about the same amount of coal in a power house enough electricity could be generated to operate the plant.

It was decided that the city could not entertain the company's proposal but that the company would be given permission to proceed with the construction of the dust shelter over the ferry floats and the passenger enclosure, at their own expense with the prospect of a five years' lease if the nuisance is eliminated and at an annual rental of \$1000 a year.

Commissioner McLellan reported regarding the conduct of a band of gypsies around the city and the mayor said that if the statements were supported he would cancel their licenses.

The meeting adjourned to resume in council at eleven o'clock on Saturday morning.
