JOHN L. TO THE RESCUE.

A GREAT FLOOD.

NINE FEET OF WATER IN THE CORN FIELDS. A Terrible Scene of Wreckage and Ruin.

By TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE. PORTIA, Ill. June 20th.—Additional particulars of the flood in Farm Creek and Copper Creek valleys, on Thursday night show that the farmers for 5 or 6 miles up the river and for 2 miles back to the west have lost all their crops.
