

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 16-The war of terrorism which the fighting declared immediately after parliament was dissolved, seems now to have be gun in earnest. From all parts of the empire the telegraph brings the same story of attacks on police officials of all classes, accompanied in the major-ity of cases by plunder. The Polish rev-olutionists are especially active. There is a veritable reign of terror from the Vistula to the German frontier. Almost fifty cases of assassinations were reported early last night. 


