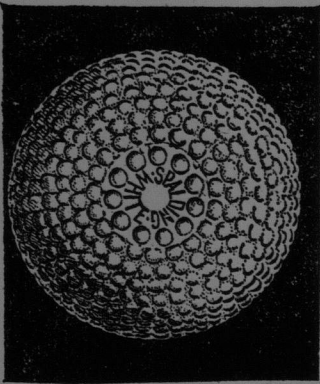

FORMER MILLIONAIRE SEEKS ADMISSION TO POOR HOUSE

C. J. L. Meyer Refused Assistance by Wealthy Daughters—Has a Son Too Poor to Help Him—Was an Active Politician.

CHICAGO, June 5.—A despatch to the Tribune from Milwaukee says: C. J. L. Meyer, first president of the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad former mayor of Fond Du Lac, at one time business partner of the late Senator Sawyer in the wholesale lumber business, a former millionaire and prominent politician and now a resident of Chicago, yesterday applied to Agent Gustav Frelson, agent for the Associated Charities, for admission to the Milwaukee county poor house. Two daughters, both married to wealthy men, fall to reply to his requests for aid, it is said. As one who lives in Chicago is too poor to care for his father. By his removal to Chicago two years ago Mr. Meyer has forfeited his right to admission to the Milwaukee county house, but Mr. Frelson will make an appeal in his behalf to his wealthy sons-in-law.

Mr. Meyer refused money aid. He was 77 years old and was once prominent in the councils of the Republican party, having twice been a delegate at large to National Convention.

MAGEDONIAN MATTERS

ROME, June 4.—During the discussion of the Foreign Office Budget in the Chamber of Deputies, yesterday, Signor Ricciole Foreign Minister, delivered a speech which was intended to remove the impression of a disagreement among the powers, especially between Great Britain and Italy, on the Macedonian question. He cited the fact that France had followed along the same line as Italy, without altering her friendship with England, except to make it stronger. He declared that the British proposals regarding Macedonia were humanitarian ideas, while the Russian proposals were of practical value.

FLORENCE MCCARTHY APPOINTED TO VACANCY ON BOARD OF LICENSE COMMISSIONERS

School Trustees Ask Authority to Issue \$40,000 Bonds --- Central Railway Commissioners Want \$12,000 for Work on the Line--- No Grant for Game Protective Association

The local government met this morning in their rooms on Church street, and transacted considerable business. Florence McCarthy was appointed a member of the Board of Liquor License Commissioners of St. John City in place of Dr. T. H. Lunney, whose term has expired.

A delegation from the Board of School Trustees, consisting of Chairman R. B. Emerson, M. Coll, J. V. Russell and Dr. Bridges appeared before the meeting and requested leave to issue bonds to the value of \$40,000 to cover the proposed extension of Winter street school. The premier intimated to the delegation that the views of the St. John common council would be heard before action was taken in the matter.

A report was received from the commissioners of the Central Railway to the effect that from twelve to twenty miles of the road between Chipman and Norton had not been ballasted either under Brown Bros' contract or under the day work done by the previous commissioners. Owing to this condition parts of the road during the past spring were covered with mud and water, and the trains were frequently off the track. They estimated that it would cost about \$12,000 to put the road in a safe condition. The premier intimated that in order to safeguard the passengers and traffic going over the road such arrangements would be made as would be necessary to improve the road.

A delegation from the Fish, Forest and Game Protective Association, consisting of President Frank Fierewelling, Frank Ellis and Douglas C. Clinch was heard by the government. They explained the objects of the association and asked for a grant to assist in carrying on their work. The premier intimated that although the government were in full sympathy with the aims of the association, they would not be able to make and grant at present, as the estimates for the coming year have been made up and closed.

The commission to investigate the past history of the Central Railway, which has been suggested, was not appointed by the government.

CLAMORING FOR DEATH OF DREYFUS Paris Paper Prints a Sensational Article of a Revolutionary Nature

PARIS, June 5.—Whether yesterday's attempt upon the life of Major Alfred Dreyfus, at the time of the conclusion of Emile Zola in the Pantheon, was only the individual act of a man believing himself to be an outraged patriot, or had behind it an incipient national plot, the Republic press is unanimous in deploring the incident and believes it injured rather than aided the cause, even though the shooting of Major Dreyfus consolidated the Republican sentiment and they evidently desire to see the incident die out as quickly as possible. Any attempt to reopen the old Dreyfus issue at the trial of Louis Geogori, the man who shot the major yesterday, they point out, can easily be frustrated as being plainly extraneous. On the other hand the fury of the Nationalist papers is unbounded. L'Action Francaise fires a broadside which recalls the most exciting days of Dreyfus and Boulanger. At the head of its columns, this newspaper prints a statement by Charles Danet, and Lieut. Boleslawsky, which it is likely, the authorities will investigate. In this article the writer says that on Wednesday night "a resolute patriot" visited M. Danet, and Lieut. Boleslawsky, and himself offered to kill Dreyfus, but his proposal was rejected.

A leading editorial in this paper appeals to the country to turn to the Duke of Orleans for redress, and concludes with these words: "Do you desire that Zola's body be ejected from the Pantheon? Do you desire to march Dreyfus to this execution block? If so invoke your king." The paper also republishes a number of London reviews of the Dreyfus case, insisting that he is a traitor. The decision of the court of Cassation to cut off the time for an appeal, the paper says, is illegal, and it concludes its article as follows: "What we ask for Dreyfus is not six balls from a revolver, but the twelve bullets from the execution squad."

TURKISH GIRL'S ROMANCE. Escaping From Constantinople, She is Now Engaged to Polish Noble. PARIS, June 4.—Mlle. Nouriyeh, the daughter of the late Nouri Bey, the Turkish Foreign Minister, whose sensational escape from her father's house in Constantinople two years ago attracted universal attention, is engaged to marry Count Ladislaus de Rostoyinski. Mlle. Nouriyeh and her sister Red from Constantinople accompanied by their government, and although the Turkish authorities attempted to have them arrested at Bolzano and Vienna they succeeded in reaching Paris, where they have since lived unmolested. Their father, Nouri Bey, made them a small allowance, and the elder sister whose engagement is now announced, has supplemented her income by writing articles for the newspapers.

ARMY SERVICE CORPS WILL MEET FOR DRILL TONIGHT

CHATEAU FRONTEUAC WAS BADLY DAMAGED TODAY

In Fighting a Little Blaze, the Firemen Flooded the Building With Water.

QUEBEC, June 5.—Considerable excitement prevailed in the famous Chateau Frontenac Hotel this morning at 2:40 o'clock, when the night watchman discovered a fire between the second and third floors. The guests were awakened and transferred out without the least excitement or commotion in any part of the building. The upper part of the large building by this time was fast filling with smoke and the firemen were engaged in deluging the interior with water from as many hose nozzles as they could bring to play on it. They were taking no chances and the water simply poured through the walls and fell with the force of a small cataract to the halls below, in fact with such force that the plaster of the ceiling gave away and fell from the second floor. The scene of the fire was just above the stairway leading from the lobby to the upstairs portion and the water played havoc with the magnificent drawing-rooms situated on the second floor. Beyond the damage done by the water and the flames of the fire, no further damage was apprehended. Shortly after the fire started the electric light circuit was cut off and the hotel was in darkness, save for the flickering gleam of candles or the fire of the firemen's torches. The origin of the fire is not known, but it is supposed to have caught from a beer shop telephoned to the police. It is very heavy, and though not yet estimated, will amount up in the thousands.

BRAZIL PLANNING TO FIGHT CONSUMPTION Most Advanced Campaign Will be Followed

WASHINGTON, June 5.—As a means of checking tuberculosis in the principal cities of Brazil, the sanitary authorities of that country have instituted a campaign involving the expenditure of \$1,250,000. According to a report from Consul General Geo. E. Anderson, who is stationed in Brazil, the authorities of the republic are preparing a campaign especially in Rio Janeiro as drastic as that against yellow fever. The Brazilian project includes as its principal features: The compulsory report of every case of tuberculosis to the sanitary authorities; the complete assumption of the charge of all cases of tuberculosis by public authorities; infectious cases separated from the public and patients supported by the public; the establishment of hospitals, with complete isolation, for tuberculosis infected invalids; and hotels and boarding houses, agricultural colleges, sanitariums for those not invalids; the absolute refusal of admission into Brazil of any person or animal having tuberculosis; the inspection of all foods and materials likely to carry bacilli; the destruction, with power to destroy anything infected; and the betterment of food, housing and other conditions of life for the large masses of the population in which tuberculosis is razing; for the prevention of disease by fortifying the people against it by improving the general health.

MAUD LESTER GETS A YEAR IN JAIL Disreputable Woman Was Heavily Sentenced

Her Companions Held for Further Evidence—The White Co. Again up for Dumping Coal.

Six prisoners were before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning. Two common drunks were fined four dollars each or ten days jail. A quartette of disorderly persons consisting of Walter Moore, John Dolan and Charles Mullin, and last but not least Maud Lester, were given a scolding by the magistrate. The quartette had been drunk and were acting very badly on the Westmorland Road, and so disgraced were the actions that the proprietor of a beer shop telephoned to the police. The men went to prison quietly, but the Lester woman put up a hard fight and had to be carted to the central station on a sledge. This morning Moore admitted being drunk but knew nothing of assaulting Dolan. Dolan and Mullin pleaded guilty to drunkenness and were fined \$3 or two months jail on the drunk charge and benighted on the charge of disorderly conduct.

DR. DANIEL WAS AGAIN TALKING THROUGH HIS HAT More Obstruction In This Morning's Session of Commons.

OTTAWA, June 5.—There was a fight on obstruction in the House of Commons this morning. Dr. Daniel resented observations made by Mr. Fielding yesterday with reference to waste of time involved in the discussion of the question of representation of the Maritime Provinces. Dr. Daniel thought the remarks of the Finance Minister were uncalled for and explained that the only opportunity open to him of bringing up the subject was on motion to go into supply. Hon. Mr. Fielding thought the record of yesterday's proceedings would speak for itself. Hon. Mr. Pugsley took exception to a remark by a member of the opposition that the Minister of Public Works had not taken a part in the debate. There were thousands of men from the Atlantic to the Pacific who were looking for their pay and he had resolved not to be a party in wasting one minute of the time of the house.

ITALIAN FILLY WINS AGAIN LONDON, June 5.—The Oaks was won by the Italian filly Smeralda, the winner of the Derby. Courtney was second and Santeve was third. Thirteen horses ran.

SEATTLE, June 5.—The active movement to suppress the insurrection in now general throughout Korea. Japanese troops have been distributed in all disaffected provinces and an aggressive campaign has been carried out with a view of quickly capturing the various semi-organized bands of insurgents and suppressing the insurrectionary element. The Associated Press representative has been officially informed that during the nine days ending June 4, sixty nine engagements took place between the Japanese and Korean troops and the insurgents in which 322 of the latter were killed and 65 taken prisoners. The Japanese casualties have not been given out, but are believed to be considerable. All information regarding the movement of troops is refused at the Japanese military headquarters. A considerable number of Korean police under Japanese officers are participating in the campaign against the insurgents.

TEN THOUSAND OF PICTURES. Fifteen Thousand on View Represent Three Acres of Canvas. PARIS, June 4.—The National Salon des Arts is now open, and in a fortnight the Salon des Artistes Francais will open its doors to the public. In these two salons, both of which are in the Grand Palais in the Champs Elysees, there will, at the end of this month, be 15,000 pictures. These represent about three acres of canvas. The total length of the pictures without their frames would be nearly ten miles. Reckoning one minute to look at every picture, and without taking any rest by day or night, it would take ten days and ten hours to see every picture in the two salons.

CLARK-CHAPMAN. The wedding of Robt. J. Clark and Miss Sarah B. Chapman, both of Chipman, N. B., took place last night at eight o'clock at the residence of Rev. B. H. Nobles, who performed the ceremony. The bridal couple were accompanied by a large party of friends who witnessed the ceremony. Mr. and Mrs. Clark will leave this afternoon for Bingham, Maine, where they will reside in future.

TORONTO, June 4.—A sheriff's officer seized the town of Dundas this morning, posting up notices on all the public buildings. Some time ago a man named Sutton was killed by the trailing electric light wire, and his widow secured \$2,000 judgment against the town. The officials took no notice of the judgment, expecting the electric light company would be held liable.

**CHINAMEN TAKE TWELVE DAYS TRIP BY FREIGHT**

Sixteen of them found nearly starved when Box Car Was Opened in San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 4.—When a sealed box car which apparently had come intact from Galveston was opened in the Southern Pacific yards today, 16 Chinese were found squatted on a half load of steel. The car was ten days on the road and had been in the yards for 48 hours. The Chinese had a little water and a few crackers left, but were weak and hungry. It is supposed that the men were smuggled across the Mexican border and placed in the car at El Paso, the seat of the car being replaced later. There evidently was an arrangement for their release here but in some way it miscarried.

**200 LIVES LOST IN CLOUDBURST**

MEXICO CITY, Mex., June 4.—Word has just reached the city that 200 lives were lost and property damaged to the extent of \$2,000 by a cloud-burst in Juchitlan.

A well known local firm was badly scorched a few days ago by a sharper. A customer entered the store and purchased a small quantity of goods, tendering a bill of large denomination in payment. The boy in charge gave the change and when the proprietor appeared he noticed that the cash register was minus many dollars. An investigation showed that by some mysterious process, the customer managed to retain the large bill and get the change as well. As there was no direct proof as to the transaction the storekeeper is out a good many nimble dollars.—Sussex Record.

**CONTROL OF THE HUMAN MACHINE**

In this business of daily living, of ordinary usage of the machine in hourly intercourse, there occurs sometimes a phenomenon which is the cause of a great deal of trouble, and the result of a very ill-used machine. This is a phenomenon impossible to ignore, and yet, so shameful it is, so degrading, so shocking, so miserable, that I hesitate to mention it. For one class of reader is certain to ridicule me loftily, saying, "One really doesn't expect to read a sort of thing in a paper nowadays!" And another class of reader is certain to get angry. Nevertheless, as one of my objects in the present series is to discuss matters which "people don't talk about," I shall discuss this matter. But my diffidence in doing so is such that I must approach it deviously describing it by means of a figure. Imagine that, looking at a man's house, you suddenly perceive it to be on fire. The flames are scarcely perceptible. He may or may not know that his house is burning. But you are aware by experience that if you direct his attention to the flames, he will turn on his heels and run. Your warning would be exceedingly singular, almost incredible. For the effect would be that he would begin to strike matches, pour on petroleum, and fan the flames, violently resenting interference. When alone he curses himself for his carelessness.

**THE CAT OUT.**

The foregoing is meant to be a description of what happens when a man passes through the incendiary experience known as "losing his temper." (There the cat of my article is out of the bag.) A man who has lost his temper is usually "out of his mind." He constitutes one of the most curious and (for everybody) humiliating spectacles that can be seen in the streets. He is a boiling over, a sweeping storm. Dignity common sense, "tact" are shrivelled up and destroyed. Some of the fiercest devils has broken his chain. Instinct is stampeding on the face of reason. And in that mad display of rage, he has already receded millions of years. Of course these things amount to a nervous disease, and I think it is almost universal.

You at once protest that you never lose your temper—haven't lost your temper for ages. You do not mean that you haven't smashed furniture for ages? These fits are of varying intensity. Some of them are very bad. They burn. One man loses his temper, another is merely "ruffled." But the event is the same in kind. When you are "ruffled" you are conscious of a resentful vibration that rattles through your system. You are a change in the demeanor of your companion, and that he has touched your "point" you may not go to the length of smashing furniture, but you have had a fire and your dignity damaged. You admit it to yourself afterwards. I am sure you know what I mean. And I am sure you know that you, with your courage and will admit that from time to time you suffer from these mysterious "fits."

**USELESS AND USEFUL.**

It is useless for a man in the habit of losing or mislaying his temper to argue with himself that such a proceeding is folly, that it serves no end, and does nothing but harm. It is useless for him to argue that in allowing his temper to stray he is probably guilty of cruelty, and certainly guilty of injustice to those persons who are forced to witness the loss. It is useless for him to argue that a man of uncertain temper in a house is like a man who goes about a house with a loaded revolver sticking from his pocket, and that all considerations of fairness and reason have to be subordinated in that house to the fear of the revolver, and that such peace as is maintained in the house is often a shameful and an unjust peace. These arguments will not be strong enough to prevail against one of the most powerful and capricious of all habits. This habit must be met and conquered. It can be met by an even more powerful quality in the human mind; I mean the universal human horror of looking ridiculous. The man who loses his temper often thinks he is doing something rather fine and majestic. On the contrary, so far is this from being the fact, he is merely making an ass of himself. He is merely parading himself as an undignified fool, as that supremely contemptible figure—a grown-up baby. He may indulge a feeble compassion by his regret, or by the dark suspicion of a more subdued flame, but in the heart of even the weakest companion is a bedrock feeling of contempt for him.

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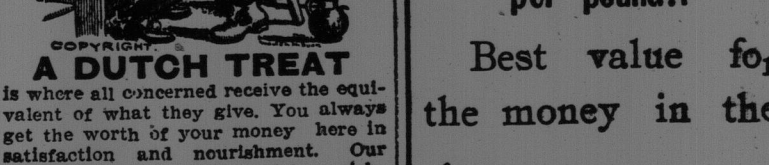

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### MR. & MRS. WM. SHAW HAD NARROW ESCAPE

Mr. Thomson stopped his car on the side of the road, but even this did not apparently quiet Mr. Shaw's horse for the animal stopped in the middle of a small bridge, and before anything could be done, backed the buggy and occupants over the side. All went crashing down fifteen feet into the ditch.

As quickly as possible Mr. and Mrs. Shaw were extricated from the wreckage and although quite seriously injured were able to get on board the car. They were quickly conveyed to their home on Waterloo street where a physician attended them. Mr. Shaw had his hand and head injured but not very badly. Mrs. Shaw did not fare so well, for besides having her face severely injured her body was badly bruised and she suffered considerably from shock. Despite her injuries she is reported today as being quite recovered and her hurts will have no serious results. Those who witnessed the accident say that it is a miracle that Mr. and Mrs. Shaw were not killed for when the horse backed the carriage over the bridge, it fell over after it, but fortunately fell to one side. Had the animal gone backwards, undoubtedly he had been badly crushed. The carriage was completely wrecked.

The bridge had no railing to prevent teams from going over the side and is thus very dangerous.

Mr. Thomson did all he could to avert the accident and is not held in any way to blame.

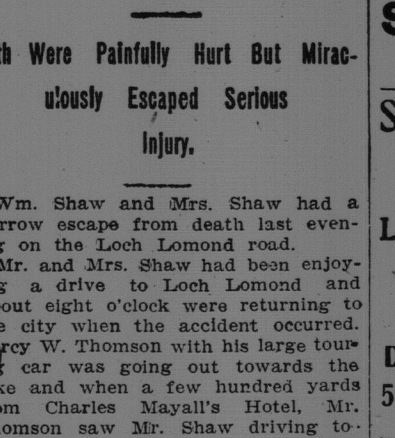
