THE DECORATIONS.

(CONCLUDED.)

### RESIDENCES OF THE NOBILITY.

In front of Devonshire House, along the  
entire length of the wall between the two  
entrance gates, a range of seats was erect-  
ed, covered with scarlet cloth, and pro-  
tected from the weather. About 300 of  
the Duke's friends were here accommo-  
dated, among whom were Lord Carlisle,  
Lady Taunton, and the Duke and Duch-  
ess of Argyll. The balconies of Miss  
Burdett Coutts's house, at the corner of  
Stratton-street, were tastefully draped  
with red and white. Bath House, the  
seat of Lord Ashburton, had a staging  
covered with crimson cloth, fluted with  
white and purple ribbon, and decorated  
with choice plants. Among the visitors  
were Lord Devon and Sir Roderick Mur-  
chison. The mansions of the Duke of  
Grafton, at the corner of Clarges-street,  
and of the Marquis of Hertford, were  
almost the only two houses along the line  
taken by the procession which exhibited  
no sign of rejoicing. Coventry House,  
occupied by the Comte de Flahault, the  
late French Ambassador, was ornamented  
after the Italian fashion by a brilliant  
display of costly carpets and shawls. The  
Duchess Dowager of Sutherland, Lord  
Russell, the Marquis and Marchioness de  
Cadore, the Speaker of the House of  
Commons, and many others were upon  
the balcony. The house of Baron Meyer  
de Rothschild, M.P., was neatly decorat-  
ed. The blinds of the mansion of the  
late Mr. Henry Hope were closely drawn—  
the hatchment, with its inscription, "*At  
spes non fracta*," being still over the por-  
tico. Gloucester House, occupied by the  
Duke of Cambridge, at the corner of  
Park-lane, exhibited a superb Prince of  
Wales's plume in glass drops, and the  
pillars of the balcony were wreathed with  
evergreens. Sir Edward Kerrison's man-  
sion, at the corner of Hamilton-place,  
was most gaily decorated. Mauve, yel-  
low, and crimson draperies, looped up  
with white and red roses, extended from  
the drawing-room windows to the ground  
floor, and flags of all colours floated from  
the windows. The Duke of Marlborough,  
Lord and Lady Stanhope, and Lord and  
Lady Castlereagh, found a place on this  
balcony. But the most beautifully decorat-  
ed mansion in Piccadilly, was that of  
Lord Willoughby d'Eresby, joint Heredi-  
tary Great Chamberlain of England, in  
Hamilton-place. A line of flags of all  
nations, like a ship's bunting on a gala  
day, flew from the roof to the outer pal-  
lades. A flag waved from each window,  
and the balcony pillars were tastefully  
wreathed with holly and laurel. The  
front of the house was hung with drapery  
divided into three compartments. The  
centre of white satin and gold contained  
the Star and the Order of the Garter;  
the two side compartments were of blue  
satin studded with gold stars. The effect  
was very gay and cheerful. A scaffold-  
ing, covered with red drapery, was erect-  
ed in front of the unfinished mansion of  
Baron Rothschild, and provided accom-  
modation for a large party of visitors.

### LONDON BRIDGE.

The eye was first attracted by tall  
standard poles, placed at short intervals  
along the parapets of the bridge from  
south to north, each being surmounted  
by a golden elephant with a castle on its  
back, or by a raven, the popular Danish  
emblems. From the tops of these stand-  
ards floated red banners with a white  
cross, the colours of Denmark, while at

the foot were affixed the portraits, in  
sepia, of the Danish Kings from the  
earliest period down to the reign of his  
present Majesty, Frederick VII. Be-  
tween the standards were 136 tripods,  
from which a powerful incense arose dur-  
ing a great part of the day, and impreg-  
nated the air around with an agreeable  
odour. On both sides of the north and  
south approaches to the bridge were  
erected bronze figures of a Danish warrior  
holding the Danebrog, the national flag of  
Denmark, while below were placed three  
colossal statues of Fame, with wings ex-  
tended and bearing a wreath. The upper  
portion of these pedestals was surrounded  
with small lamps, which were lighted up  
at night. In the different recesses along  
the parapets appeared smaller pedestals,  
in a similar style of ornamentation, but,  
instead of each having three statues of  
Fame, it contained only one. The main  
feature, however, of the whole scene was  
a grand triumphal arch, sixty feet high,  
nearly opposite Fishmongers' Hall, which  
spanned the entire thoroughfare. The  
south or principal side of this arch bore  
in the centre, immediately over the car-  
riage way, the united arms of England  
and Denmark, and medallions in relief of  
the Prince of Wales and the Princess  
Alexandra. Appended above the arches  
over the footways, on the columns were  
placed, in honour of Denmark, the statues  
of Saxo-Grammaticus; Holberg, the  
poet; Thorvaldsen, the sculptor; and  
Juel, the painter. In the pediment was  
the following quotation, slightly altered,  
from the Masque in Shakespeare's *Tem-  
pest*—

"Honour, riches, marriage, blessing,  
Long continuance and increasing  
Hourly joys be still upon you:  
England showers her blessings on you."

Under this inscription there was a large  
and richly coloured painting, represent-  
ing Britannia escorting the Princess Alex-  
andra to the shores of England, accompa-  
nied by sea gods and goddesses. The  
Princess stood in the boat in her bridal  
dress, holding the hand of Britannia, a  
full sail, and a numerous body of nymphs,  
as rowers, promising a quick voyage.  
The good wishes of the City were further  
expressed at night by replacing this  
painting with a transparency, which, of  
course, the royal party did not see, de-  
picting the riches of earth, air, and water,  
in offerings to the Princess Alexandra.  
On the top of the arch or pediment ap-  
peared a very effective and imposing piece  
of sculpture—Britannia in a car, drawn  
by four prancing horses, welcoming the  
Princess to our shores, with, on either  
side, recumbent figures of Fame, herald-  
ing her happy approach. In the centre  
of the northern side of the arch was  
placed a portrait of Queen Victoria in a  
widow's dress, within a wreath of laurel,  
and the crown above, supported by figures  
of Wisdom and Strength. The eight  
Corinthian columns on this side of the  
arch supported four statues of Fame,  
and the arms of England and Denmark  
were emblazoned above the footways.

ETON.

At Eton, prominent among the devices  
was the "Boys' Arch," designed by Mr.  
Nash—the author of *The Mansions of  
England*. The idea which this erection  
developed was that of a baronial gate-  
house of the Tudor period, corresponding  
in general style with the architecture of  
the college. At the corners, octagonal  
turrets, crowned with cupolas, rose to the  
height of nearly fifty feet. A battlement-  
ed front, forming a lofty gable, adorned  
with the Royal arms of England, con-  
nected the turrets, the arms of the Prin-  
cipality of Wales and the Kingdom of  
Denmark being suspended on either side,  
where were inscribed the initials "A. E."



and "A. C.," both connected with a "V. R." in the centre, by a cord twisted in a "true lovers' knot." A label extending across its whole front bore the inscription, "Gratulatur Etona." In each spandril was displayed a shield, that on the one side blazoned with the arms of Eton College, that on the other with those of King's College, Cambridge. At the point of the arch were the arms of the founder of the college, with the motto, "Esto perpetua." On the faces of the turrets on either side were medallions, painted in imitation of marble bas-reliefs, of the Prince of Wales and his bride, and beneath these, supporting gilded staves, crowned and vaned "ramp"—as the Laureate has it—two of the reddest and most irreproachable of heraldic lions. Flags and garlands adorned the whole, while the designs were traced out with blue and yellow lamps—decorations which very desirably lessened the unavoidably cold effect of the architectural representation. Between this and a second arch, distinguished as the "Town Arch," the handsome collegiate buildings—the school on the left and the boarding-houses on the right—were agreeably relieved by garlands suspended between posts, adorned with sheaves of flags, and shields, with armorial bearings.

The whole line of route from Eton College to Windsor Castle was one mass of leaves, evergreens, and decorations on the ho-ses. Eton and Windsor never saw such a spectacle. Not one house but had a device for illumination; scarcely one but had a flag flying and a wreath of flowers in the windows. From Eton to Windsor there was little to be seen but a mass of festoons and banners. The crowd cheered lustily all along Eton-street. At the bridge the illustrious guests passed into a new jurisdiction—from Bucks to Berks, to the borders of the royal borough, where fresh honours awaited them. The royal cortege halted once more on the Windsor side of the bridge. There was a splendid arch, erected by subscription, spanning the space from the Bridge-house Hotel to the turnpike-gate. It was decorated with festoons of evergreens, and was illuminated. The effect of the main street, with its illuminations lit up, and with the glittering arms and accoutrements of the Life Guards flashing back the light, was very striking. At one point red fire was lighted and flung a splendid glow over the scene.

At the top of Castle-hill was the chief decoration of the town, a magnificent triumphal arch in the Italian style, painted in imitation of various coloured Siena marbles. The centre arch was 18 feet by 30 feet, the two side arches 7 feet by 15 feet, in the Corinthian order, carried out complete to the top of the balustrading, and surmounted by canopies of a chaste and peculiar character. In the eight niches back and front were transparent figures painted in bas-relief—Peace, Plenty, Wisdom, and Justice. The top of the arch was embellished with the Prince of Wales's feathers and festoons of flowers. The canopy above the centre arch was carried up to the height of fifty-four feet, and the centre panels were filled with the shields of the Prince and Princess, surmounted with the arms of England, gracefully terminating with the Prince of Wales's feathers, with the motto "Ich Dien." The outline of the whole was relieved with vases of flowers and numerous banners and crosses, of St. George, St. Andrew, St. Patrick, and Danish standards.

### DISGRACEFUL CONDUCT IN A CANADIAN MAYOR.

A few weeks ago a ball was given in the town of London, Canada West, at which Major Bowles, of the 63rd Regiment, for what cause we are not informed, was assaulted by the Mayor of that city. The citizens of London immediately gave expression to their opinion of the conduct of their Mayor in the following address, which was presented to the commandant and officers of the garrison:—

"To Lieut. Col. Carter and Officers of the London Garrison:—Gentlemen.—We the undersigned, citizens of London, C. W., consider it right and necessary now to address you for the purpose of expressing our deep regret at the unprovoked assault committed at the ball at the Teumseh House on the 10th inst., on Major Bowles and Capt. Lockhart, by the person who, unfortunately for the good name of the city, holds the office of Mayor. We have feared that, from the high civic position of Cornish, and from no action having been taken by the representatives of the people in the Council, condemnatory of the Mayor's improper conduct, it might be thought that indifference was felt in the matter. We, however, consider it necessary for the credit of our city, now to address you with the hope that you will not suppose that the Mayor's unjustifiable conduct can for a moment meet with our countenance, or that of the great majority of our fellow citizens. We would, therefore, beg leave to convey to you our expression as citizens of London, of the respect in which the present Garrison of London is deservedly held, and of our sense of the courtesy which the military have shewn to the citizens on all occasions."

**SHOCKING SUICIDE.**—A wealthy citizen of Fountain County, in the state of Indiana, committed suicide a few days ago in dread of being murdered for divulging the secrets of the order called the "K. C. G." to which he belonged.

THE wife of Jackson, the Confederate who killed the lamented Ellsworth, came within the Federal lines in Virginia a few days since. She said she was destitute, and asked relief to sustain life.

**BRIDGE OVER THE PETICODIAC.**—We are glad to find the *Westmorland Times* in the course of some admirable suggestions relative to the proposed new bridge over the Peticodiac below the town of Moncton, advocating the engagement of a "thoroughly scientific bridge-builder" to superintend the work.

The evil effects of the government permitting bridges to be built under incapable management, and too often under none at all, have been manifested over and over again. Loss of property and imminent danger to life and limb may be traced to some of the improperly designed and badly constructed bridges in this province.

A SHORT time since the accounts from the Canadian Oil Wells gave promise of a decided improvement in their prospects; but the last news from them is discouraging.

**THE INTER-COLONIAL RAILWAY.**—There can be no doubt that when the vote is taken the friends of provincial progress and improvement will be found rejoicing in the large majority in the Legislature in favor of the Railway bill. Already have 15 members spoke in its favor and but 9 against it. Those for the bill are,—Messrs. Tilley, Steadman, Johnston, Fisher, Gray, W. J. Gilbert, Skinner, Munro, Stevens, Lindsay, Costigan, McClellan, Dow, McPhelim, and Landry.

Against it are,—Messrs. Smith, Cudlip, Grimmer, Gilmour, Boyd, Anglin, Stiles, and DesBrisay.

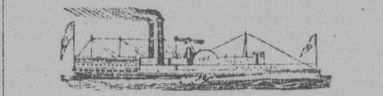

# THE AMERICAN WAR.

## By Telegraph.

BANGOR, April 9.

Majority of Senatorial Committee report charges of bribery made out against Gen. Cameron, in his endeavor to get elected Senator from Pennsylvania.

Gen. Foster's position at Washington, N. C. very critical: he has 2000 troops entrenched; ten thousand Confederates under Hill and Pettigrew, were on North side of town and seven regiments on South bank of Pamlico River.

Enemy has planted batteries along Tar River by which reinforcements must come, rendering it almost impossible to pass. Two transports unsuccessfully attempted it. Gunboats subsequently arrived, and hopes entertained of relieving the beleaguered troops.

Confederates captured and burned two Steamers near Clarksville, Tenn.

Order for Consolidation of the Regiments of the Federal army issued.

## BY SPECIAL TELEGRAPH TO THE Evening Despatch.

FRIDAY, April 10.

The Richmond *Whig* of the 8th learns, officially, that the Federal fleet crossed Charleston bar, anchoring inside. The Confederate iron-clads were lying between the forts, awaiting the attack.

The Richmond papers are not very hopeful, but regard the destruction of the city more probable than its surrender.

The same paper says, New Orleans reports of the 1st mention that Gen. Banks, with 10,000 men, had crossed at Donaldsonville, and gone down Bayou Plaquemine to reinforce Weitzel, and attack the Bayou Teche country.

There is no prospect of active operations at Vicksburg. A new canal is being cut from above Young's Point to Warrenton, 8 miles long.

Farragut holds the river between Vicksburg and Port Hudson.

The Federal gunboats were preparing to run by the batteries on Pamlico River, and relieve Gen. Foster.

## BY TELEGRAPH. THE LEGISLATURE

FREDERICTON, April 9.

AFTERNOON.

Dow spoke for Railroad Bill. Referred to effect of railroads in other countries and how they paid directly and indirectly, contending that they would pay here.

Mr. McPhelim was glad the question of route was left open; he believed the road would go North, and would go for the Bill.

Allan compared different routes and probable paying qualities, and cost. He said neither would pay. The cheapest cost would be three and a half millions. It would be to the interest of Canada and Nova Scotia and Imperial government to have Northern route.

Desbrisay was opposed to the Bill without further and more definite information. He would go for the Northern route.

Landry expressed himself briefly in favor. Tilley making general reply.

FREDERICTON, April 10th.

A bill to alter the Division Line between Springfield and Studholm was agreed to.

A long discussion took place on Cudip's Bankrupt Bill,—progress was reported. This is the bill prepared by the Commissioners.

Tilley resumed his speech on the Railway, arguing that, as Canadian roads, with water competition and free canals paid working expenses, the proposed road would also pay. All trade between here and Nova Scotia would pass over the line. The Windsor steamer would not then be subsidized. The traffic by that route would be \$80,000 annually. The mail subsidy would be \$1900 a year. For our portion of the line, the passengers over the road to Canada, estimated at 6000 at \$6, making \$36,000. Importation from the States and Canada, one million barrels of flour—one quarter of this reasonable estimate to come over the railway at 40 cents, making \$100,000. Tilley still speaking.

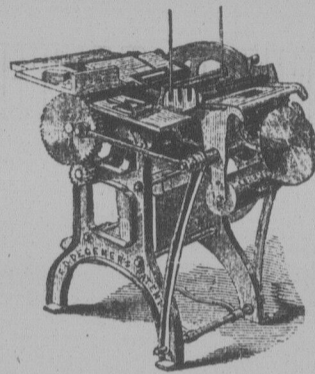
