

The principle is admitted that it is unjust to confound light stimulants like beer and wine with spirits such as whisky, gin and brandy, and they assert that this classification would more surely promote temperance and prohibition. It is recognized that if licenses be granted for the sale of practically non-intoxicating drinks, a blow will be struck at the consumption of liquors.




