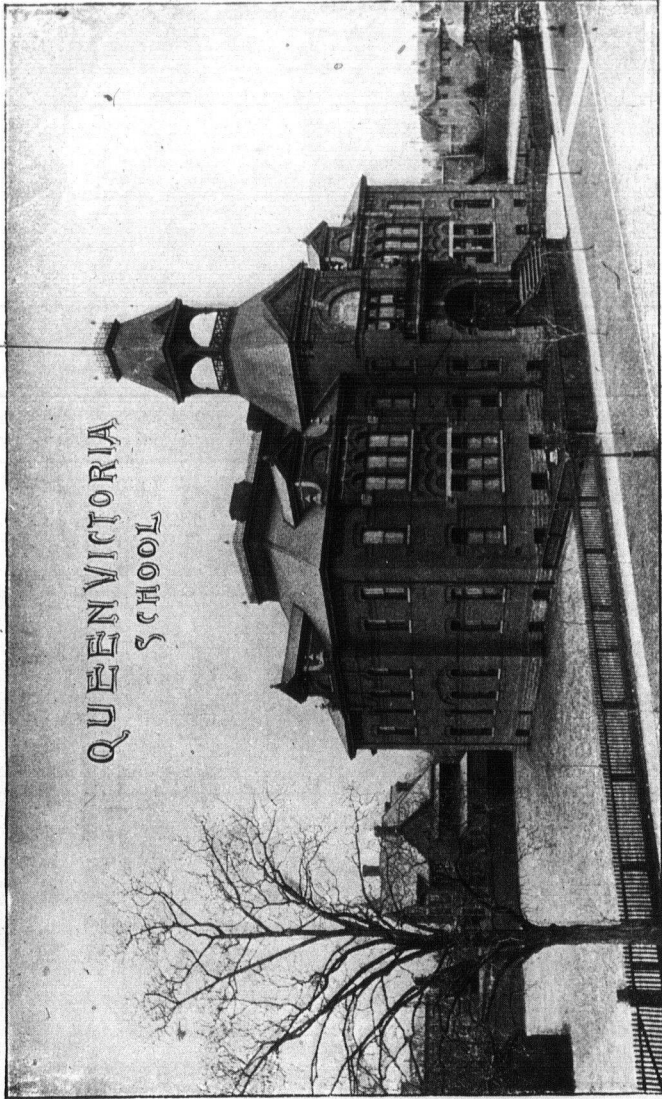

Annual Report

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Inspectors' Annual Report.

To the Toronto Public School Board:

We have the honor to present the following report regarding the Schools under your charge for the year 1896.

Appended to the report will be found Statistical Tables which give in detail all important particulars relating to Teachers, Pupils, Attendance, Absenteeism, Tardiness, Studies Pursued, Cost of Maintenance, etc.

ATTENDANCE.

The total number of pupils registered during the year was in the Kindergarten 4,581, in the other classes 28,988, of whom 1,194 were promoted from the Kindergarten.

The average daily attendance was in the Kindergarten 2,142, in the other classes 21,387.

835 pupils attended school less than twenty days.

The average monthly registered number was 26,571. This shows an increase compared with last year of 333. (See Table A).

The average of Monthly Average Numbers was 23,654. This shows an increase of 565, when compared with the corresponding number of last year. (See Table B).

The average of Monthly Averages was 89 per cent. of the Average Monthly Registered Numbers.

The best average for any month in the year was 91.9 per cent., the average for December.

The largest number, 27,289, was registered in October and the smallest number, 25,503, in June.

A Silver Clasp is given to each pupil who conforms to the above for each year over eight years.

TEACHERS.

There were 499 Teachers and 112 Kindergartners employed in the schools of Toronto, during the past year in addition to the special teachers.

There are two music teachers and one drill instructor engaged in special teaching.

The certificates of the teachers are as follows :—First Class, 77 ; Second Class, 422.

The certificates of the Kindergartners are as follows :—Directress, 70 ; Assistant, 42.

KINDERGARTENS.

There were two new Kindergartens opened in 1896, viz : one in Bathurst street, and one in the Childrens' Shelter. This makes 42 Kindergartens in all. The total number registered in the Kindergartens during the year was 4,581, the average of monthly registered numbers was 2,652, and the average of monthly average numbers was 2,142. The following table shows the registered and average attendance for each month :

The total amount paid to Kindergartners for salaries in 1896 was \$29,554.17.

The total amount paid for Kindergarten supplies, including permanent supplies for new Kindergartens, was \$2,534.73.

The total cost of Kindergartens for salaries and supplies was \$32,088.90.

The cost per pupil on the basis of total enrolment was for salaries and supplies \$7.00.

The cost per pupil on the basis of average monthly number was \$12.09 for salaries and supplies.

The salaries of caretakers amounted to \$25,011.23.

Fuel cost \$20,272.81 ; Total, \$45,284.04.

Percentage of caretakers' salaries and fuel say \$2,300.

The cost per pupil in the Kindergarten on the basis of total enrolment was \$7.74 for salaries, supplies, fuel and caretaking.

The cost per pupil in the Kindergarten on the basis of average monthly number was \$12.96 for salaries, supplies, fuel and caretaking.

FREE TEXT BOOKS.

The total cost of the Free Text Books issued in 1896 was \$5,225.35. Of this amount \$3,684.33 was paid for High School geographies, Public School geographies, spelling books and music books, which were supplied for the first time.

The total cost of supplies including work books, exercise books, book-keeping blanks, dictation books, business forms, drawing books, writing books, slates, paper, etc., was \$4,144.39.

The cost per pupil for text books on the basis of total enrolment, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was 18 cents. Omitting the supply of new books given out for the first time, the cost of text books was 5 cents per pupil.

The cost per pupil for text books on the basis of average monthly attendance, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was 22 cents.

The cost per pupil for supplies on the basis of total enrolment, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was 14 cents.

The cost per pupil for supplies on the basis of average monthly attendance, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was 17½ cents.

The cost per pupil for both text books and supplies on the basis of average monthly attendance, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was 43½ cents.

The cost per pupil for text books, supplies, and Kindergarten material on the basis of total enrolment, was 36½ cents.

In the above statements the text books and supplies for Night Schools are charged against the day school pupils.

NIGHT SCHOOL REPORT.

At the close of the session ending March, 1896, two silver medals, kindly donated by Noel Marshall, Esq., were given for general proficiency. A combined examination was held, at which three pupils from each class were allowed to compete. Twenty-one candidates presented themselves for examination, and their answer papers were creditable to themselves and to their teachers.

EXAMINATIONS.

The Collegiate Institute Board again gave thirty scholarships to those who stood highest at the Entrance Examination, held in June, 1896. The Board, however, decided that the scholarships should be limited to candidates coming from the fourth book classes of the Public and Separate schools. As a result of this all the scholarships were won by pupils from the senior fourth book classes of the Public Schools.

PUBLIC SCHOOL LEAVING EXAMINATION.

This examination is now of more value than when it was first instituted, inasmuch as those who pass it are entitled to admission to Form II., in a Collegiate Institution, while those who make 25 per cent. of each subject secure entrance standing, or admission to Form I.

194 pupils wrote at this examination in June, 1896, of whom 106 passed, and 55 secured entrance standing.

THE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

Two schools are in operation under the management of the Board, so far as the teaching is concerned. The Victoria Industrial School, Mimico, and the Alexandra Industrial School, at East Toronto. Both institutions are doing excellent work. The total number of days attended by boys in the Victoria School was 50,997. The total attendance of girls at the Alexandra School was 7350 days. The average attendance of boys was 140, and of girls 20.

SCHOOL LIBRARIES.

In every school of twelve or more rooms there is a professional and reference library for the teachers, to the use of which the teachers of the smaller schools adjoining have equal right.

MUSIC REPORT, 1896.

To Jas. L. Hughes, Esq., Inspector Public Schools, Toronto.

DEAR SIR,—As the results of the entire year's teaching are compared with those of the former year, there is little improvement to note. It is hard to think that in all cases the teachers have given the careful attention to this subject that could be wished for. To be sure, considerable advancement has been made in some few classes where the teachers have taken up the lessons systematically within the prescribed time, for in proportion to the influence the teacher wields, such will always be the measure of support received from the pupils.

The change of teachers, the absence of some, and the appointment of others, seriously interferes with the progression of the work, some of the teachers being at first quite unable to carry on the work.

Time, as usual, has been devoted to the recognition by the pupil of the different notes of the key, both when hearing and seeing them on the stave.

The exercises most favoring a rapid knowledge of the reading of the notes, both as regards time and tune, are frequently under practise, and have taken up the greater part of the time set apart for the teaching of this subject.

Other interesting exercises in two and three parts for the improvement of the voice are often introduced, and occasionally, along with others, copied by the pupils in their work-books. Although the time at their disposal for this excellent practice is limited, still it has the advantage of giving them a more familiar knowledge of the notes.

The songs have been selected and their harmonies arranged expressly with a view to cultivate in the pupils an appreciation of the same, and to plant within them the germ of a correct judgment.

Some few of the teachers have met with much encouragement in the practice of individual singing on the part of the pupils. Commendable results have been reached and have yet to flow from its continuance.

In ten of the schools, notably Queen Victoria, Parkdale and Dufferin, the standing of the classes is somewhat improved, though the general average for marks obtained by all the schools has fallen below that of last year.

MR. CRINGAN'S REPORT.

In presenting the annual report on the teaching of music in the departments assigned to me, I have much pleasure in stating that the proportion of classes in which satisfactory results are accomplished has been much larger than in former years. The average results attained show a steady improvement, and a desire on the part of the regular teachers to do more finished work. Few, if any, would now be satisfied with such results as were, a few years ago, considered excellent. There is still much to be accomplished, however, if our pupils are to be trained to sing intelligently and with some degree of artistic finish after leaving school. It must be steadily borne in mind that a large proportion of public school pupils receive their sole instruction in music during their public school course

and, for various reasons, are not brought under the influence of professional teaching when this has been completed. I have endeavoured during the past year to ensure such instruction as will enable pupils to take an intelligent part in chorus singing in the church and in the home circle. For those who are studying music, vocal or instrumental, apart from the school course a practical foundation has been laid upon which a more advanced musical education may be built. Increased attention has been given to the teaching of the staff notation in the upper classes as the increased ability to read from the more simple, and easily learned Tonic Solfa, has rendered this more easy of attainment than formerly. Sir John Stainer who is probably the greatest authority on school music in the educational world, and who is Inspector of Music in Training Colleges in Great Britain and has examined *individually* about fifteen thousand students in training during the past decade, recently made the following statement:—"It will be found that the majority of those having real musical taste use the Tonic-Solfa as a stepping-stone to the ordinary staff; and no more scientific method can possibly be found for unravelling the acknowledged difficulties of the staff as a vocal notation. The ordinary notation will be infinitely better mastered and understood by those who have passed into it through the gates of the more scientific Tonic-Solfa, and it is important to note that *all* that is learnt by the Tonic-Solfaist is of value when studying the staff; *nothing has to be unlearned.*" The italics are his. The truth of this statement has been amply verified by the results obtained in our schools as pupils in the Junior Fourth book classes frequently sing at sight, from the staff, an ordinary hymn-tune at the close of an introductory lesson of only twenty minutes duration.

Special attention continues to be given to the correct use of the singing-voice with satisfactory results. Pupils do not yet fully realize that relaxation of unnecessary muscular tension is the first requisite of voice control, but this important fact should be presented and reiterated in its various aspects until they do.

The Teachers' Class which was commenced in the fall of last year was continued by the request of the teachers in attendance until May. The attendance was the most satisfactory of any class in my experience there being one hundred and fifty teachers and probationers on the roll, the majority of whom were regularly present at the weekly meetings.

I learn with much satisfaction that the School Trustees have decided to supply music-books for use in a number of classes, and am confident that the results will be such as to justify their action in this important respect.

This report marks the close of the tenth year of my work as teacher of music in your schools. During that time I have been made the recipient of many expressions of confidence, and kind words of encouragement from members of the Board of Trustees, for which I am exceedingly grateful. Your Inspectors have ever given me their ready support and advice, many of the best methods which I have introduced having been developed from hints and suggestions which they have offered. Your teachers have been most hearty in their co-operation, and have faithfully endeavoured to put into practice any suggestions which I have been able to make. The many kindnesses which I

have received from all of these have filled those ten years of work and effort in the cause of education with pleasure and profit beyond my highest expectations.

I have the honor to submit the following report of the instruction in Drill and Physical Exercise in connection with the Public Schools of the City of Toronto for the year 1896.

The drill and physical exercise in the several schools have been very satisfactory.

This year the annual review and inspection of the School Brigade was held on the 2nd of June, at which there were present 29 companies, of a total strength 1537, this being the largest parade ever held.

The parade this year took the form of a march through the streets and a March Past, afterwards assisting at the usual commemorative decoration of the monument erected to the memory of the volunteers who fell at Ridgeway.

The School Brigade was reviewed by Major-General Gascoigne, Lieut.-Col. Otter, D.O.C., and staff. The Major-General was pleased to compliment the boys on the creditable way in which they marched past and on the very large parade.

CARE OF ARMS.

The care taken of the arms supplied to the several companies is very good ; a steady improvement each year.

SENIOR CLASSES (GIRLS).

I am pleased to report a very marked improvement in the physical exercise in connection with the senior classes (girls). During the year I have trained a number of classes for work at school concerts, and this work I am pleased to say has been satisfactory.

There has also been a great improvement in the Junior classes, both boys and girls.

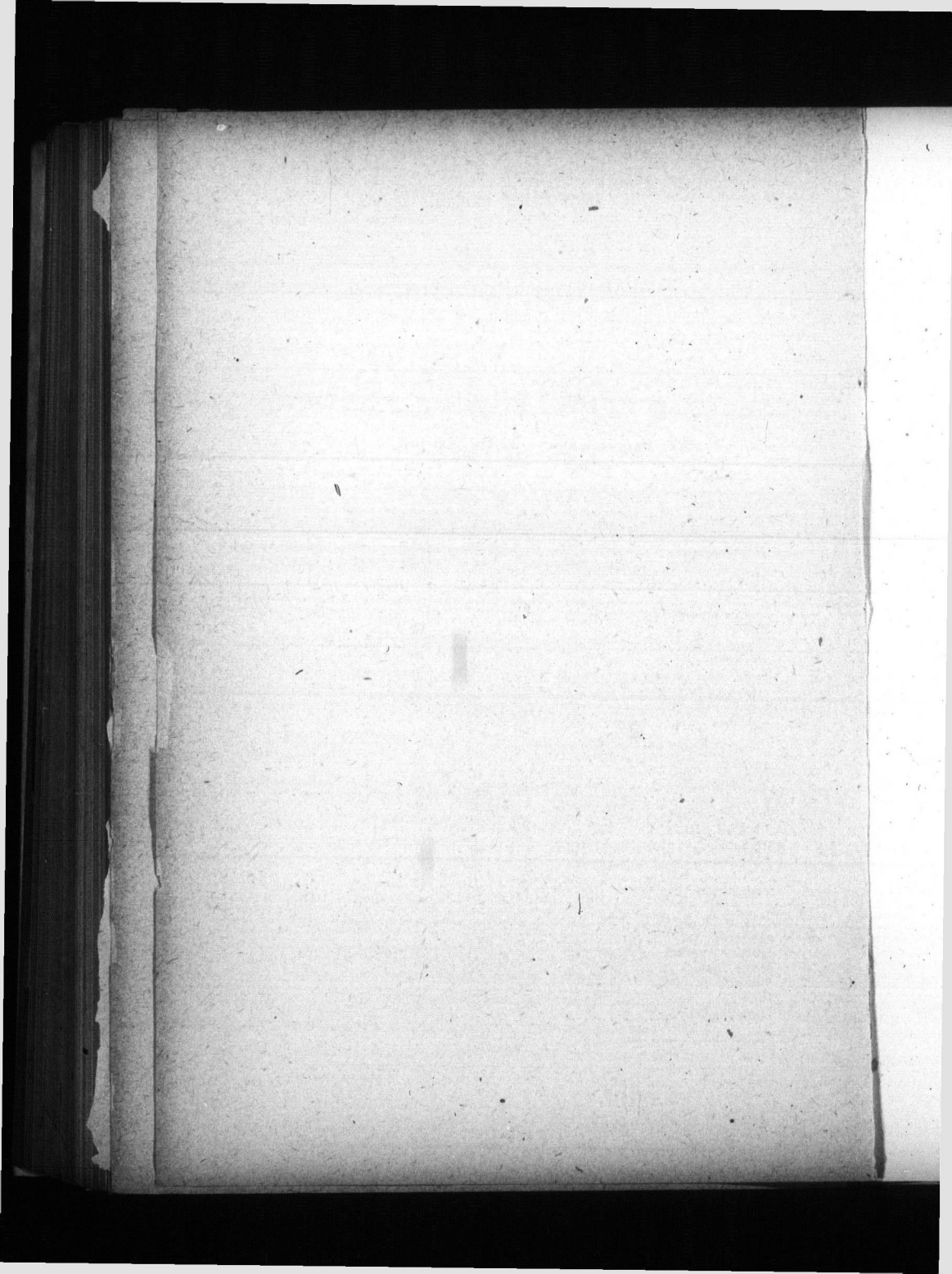
During the year I gave instruction to a very large class of Model School students, and have to report that at the end of the term they all passed a satisfactory examination.

I herewith forward a return of comparative efficiency of the several battalions.

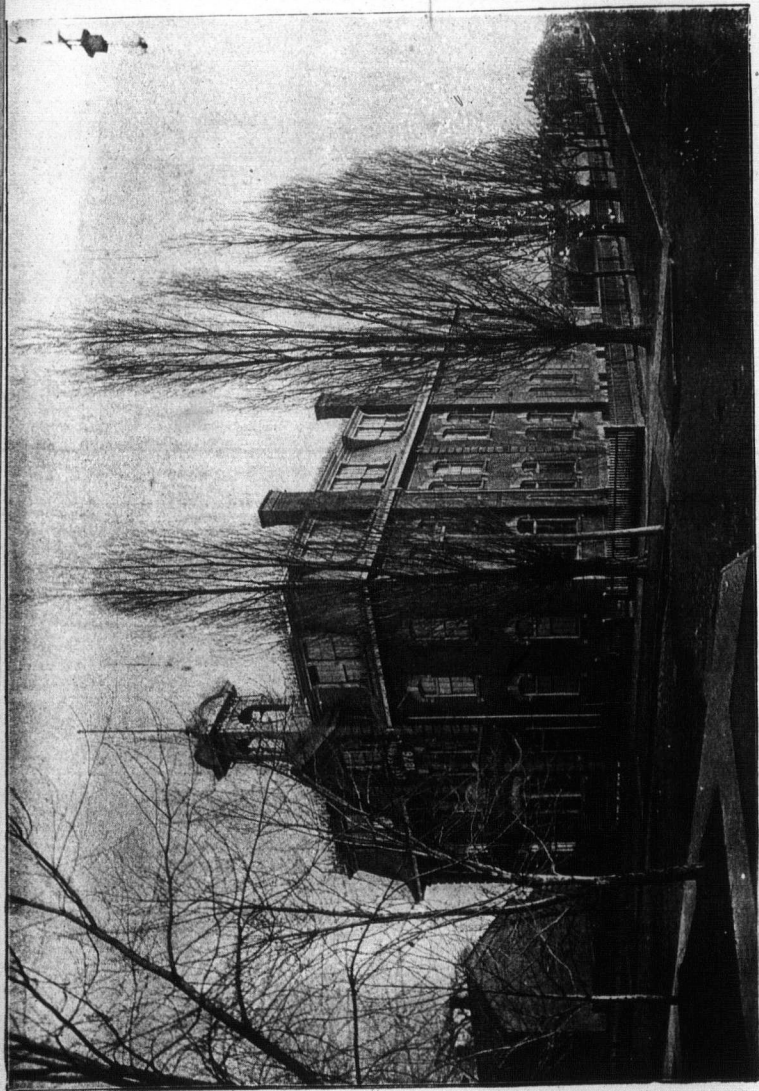
