PROCEEDINGS

OF

Annual Meeting of the Society.

The TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING of the MISSIONARY SOCIETY of the W. M. CHURCH IN CANADA, was held in the Wesleyan Church, BROCKVILLE, on Tuesday Evening, the 11th day of June, 1850, Rev. MATTHEW RICHEY, D. D., in the Chair. The Meeting was opened with singing and prayer: an abstract of the Report having been read by the Rev. ENOCH WOOD, Superintendent of Missions, the following Resolutions were adopted:—

- I. Moved by Rev. WILLIAM POLLARD, seconded by Rev. C. BYRNE,—

That a Report of the operations of the Society for the past year, an abstract of which has now been read, be printed and circulated.

- II. Moved by Rev. J. CARROLL, seconded by Rev. Dr. BANGS,—

That this Meeting rejoices in the openings of usefulness which invite the labourers of this Society in the destitute settlements of the Province, and amongst the Indians of the West; and as success can alone be secured by the Great Head of the Church, the friends of this holy enterprise are invited to continued and earnest prayer for the enlargement and triumphs of Messiah's Kingdom.

- III. Moved by Rev. WM. CASE, seconded by Rev. H. WILKINSON,—

That this Meeting sympathizes with the Parent Society in England, on account of the difficulties which it has encountered during the past year; but rejoices in the noble and munificent income by which the work of God on their extensive Missions throughout the world has been sustained. Engaged in the diffusion of Christian knowledge amongst the destitute, this Meeting expresses its high gratification in the large increase which has been reported from the Branch Societies of this Institution, and pledges itself to continued offerings to this heavenly work.

- IV. Moved by Rev. T. BEVITT, seconded by Rev. R. JONES,—

That the very cordial thanks of this Meeting are presented to the Officers and Collectors of the different Branch Societies, and to the Subscribers and Donors, for the very liberal assistance they have afforded.

REPORT.

"MANY prophets and righteous men desired to see the days which we see, but died without the sight." Assisted by supernatural endowments, they looked forward to the time when the Messiah should appear, and Israel should be saved: they beheld through the medium of Divine Revelation the child born, and the son given. They marked the circumstances of his birth, his growth in years and knowledge, his successful ministry, his tragical end, and triumphant ascension to glory; but still, they witnessed not as we do with the eye of nature the actual organization of his kingdom, or the collisions which take place between light and darkness; nor were they permitted to share either in the dangers or honors of those, who, as the "sacramental hosts of God's elect," have been led on by Him from victory to victory.

In attending to the work assigned to this Society by the Great Head of the Church, however triumphant have been their feelings resulting from spiritual successes, the history of the past has been sufficiently varied and trying to test the practical reliance of religious principle upon the guidance and deliverance of Providence. God himself dwells amongst us; and his presence is our stay and defence. It is in days of darkness and embarrassment we need to be reminded of the Church as a "Vineyard," whose Keeper watches and waters it every moment: or to a "City," whose name is, "Jehovah Shammah,—the Lord is there." To the unenlightened eye, the gathering of formidable difficulties will be attended with the fears of him who panic-struck at such a sight cried out, "Alas! my Master, how shall we do!" But to the spiritual perception, God in his own Church is a sufficient pledge of her peace and safety. However dreary her way,—"At evening tide there shall be light." Having shared largely in the goodness of God in the year which is ending, it becomes the duty of the Society to be mindful of praise, which is comely in his sight.

UNITED CHURCH
ARCHIVES

It has been the aim of the Committee, in all the embarrassments by which they have been pressed, to maintain the ground where the Missionaries of the Wesleyan Church have succeeded in gathering souls to Christ; in this, with the Divine blessing, they have been successful. If our expansion has not been in accordance with our desires, we have not to grieve over scenes of moral desolation, once presenting scenes of fragrance and beauty, but now covered with the incipient evidences of a returning wilderness.

FINANCES.—Confidence in the righteousness of their cause, and in the sincerity with which it is voluntarily espoused by the Wesleyan community, originated the cheerful hope embodied in the concluding paragraph of the introduction of last year's Report; viz., that when the gatherings and offerings of another year were completed, the Society would either be free from the whole of its liabilities, or the debt greatly diminished. Our most sanguine expectations have been fully realized. The general prosperity of the country has been favourable to an enlarged income from the several branches organized throughout the Conference; and whilst amongst our lists of Donations and Subscriptions, it is our pleasing and grateful duty to record the name of the Governor-General of Canada, it will be equally gratifying to those who enquire into the sources from whence this augmentation arises, to know that it springs from the ordinary channels of income which constitute the legitimate strength of the Society. With a continued devotional spirit, unwearied and united effort, we anticipate a triumphant career of Christian usefulness to men perishing for the lack of knowledge. "Thy watchmen shall lift up the voice; with the voice together shall they sing: for they shall see eye to eye, when the Lord shall bring again Zion." Isa. lii. 8.

The Committee cannot but express their joy that, relieved from the financial pressure with regard to their past exertions, they are approaching a period, when, sustained by the growing liberality arising from the love of the Church to the Missionary cause, they will be justified in sending forth their Agents to the distant wandering Tribes, who in tens of thousands are still without hope, and without God. Aggressive movements must mark our projects and labours in the Indian, as these are our responsibility and glory in our Domestic work.

INDIAN MISSIONS.

A careful review of the Indian Work, whether in its religious, educational, or secular aspect, will show that during the past year it has been well sustained by the judicious and faithful labours of the brethren, whom the Conference appointed to teach the Sons of the Forest the way to the Cross. As many of the Stations have been long occupied, the work going on there does not present much that makes them differ from our ordinary Circuit ministrations. The limited number of those who live upon the Reserves, forbid any reasonable expectation of very large additions being made to the Church. Amongst the Pagan population we are to direct our efforts: and from this source, a few conversions have recently been made.

ST. CLAIR.

Of this Mission, Brother T. FAWCETT reports:—

“Our Indians are improving. Our excellent Interpreter, H. P. Chase, says that they have cleared more land during the last year, than in the five years previous. The members generally are very regular in their attendance on the means of grace. Many of them enjoy much of the love of God and have bright prospects of heaven. Our last Quarterly Meeting was a time of great spiritual joy and gladness. Four of our members have died during the year; three of whom departed in great peace; the other died suddenly, so that we had not an opportunity of ascertaining her state of mind. Two have renounced paganism in the course of the year; one we baptized Abraham last September, who immediately sickened and died in the Lord. We have had to prune a little; twelve have been expelled or dropt; but it leaves the society in a more healthy state than before.

"Our day school is in a more encouraging state at present than it was at the commencement of the year. Scholars 37 in number; over 20 of whom attend regularly."

MUNCEY MISSION.

This locality, whether viewed as to its natural advantages of climate and soil, favourable to the prosecution of the enterprise now commencing with the active operations of the Industrial School, or estimated by the number of Indians on the reserve and its immediate neighbourhood, occupies a prominent place in the Society's Missionary Stations. Of its religious state the following report from the Rev. S. D. Rice is sufficiently explicit:—

"In reporting the work of God on this Mission, we have to record the usual facts of removals, deaths, backslidings, and conversions. The work among the Oneidas is in an improved state. Several during the year have been restored to the Church, and to the favour of God, and there is a pleasing stability in religious professors. The congregations are large and attentive. In Lower Muncey the work is pleasing. Holy influences are very generally manifest in the public worship, and the members stedfastly pursue their course towards the mark for the prize of their high calling.

"Among the Ojebways, we have some devoted, faithful members. The year has been one of agitation, and many who were led into the opposing counsels have fallen through drunkenness, the great bane of religion among us. Of those who are reported as members there are very few in whose religious integrity we have not confidence. The congregations are large. The influences of Divine Grace are very manifest at times. Temporally our people here are improving. They have been diligently employed during the Spring in sowing and planting. Much requires to be done, and a more energetic system in the missionary enterprise will have to be adopted before greater results can be expected.

"Two members have died during the year.

"We have two Sabbath Schools not in a very efficient state for want of Teachers. They number 50 children in the whole."

MOUNT ELGIN INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

In the erection of these buildings and the opening of the school, the Society have experienced some disappointment in the esteemed agencies by whom the work was expected to be conducted. The

health of the Rev. PETER JONES failing shortly after the plans were commenced, rendered it necessary that his wishes to be relieved from the onerous and responsible duties connected with the position of Superintendent of the Circuit, &c., should be conceded. Br. JONES' qualifications for the Indian work, in which for so many years he has laboured with pre-eminent success, rendered it more grievous that the Society should be deprived of his valuable labours just at a period when new fields of usefulness invited the united energies of all interested in the elevation of the Indian mind. Yet, to Providential chastisements the committee must reverently submit. The institution for the past year has had the benefit of the intelligence, piety, and zealous labours of the Rev. S. D. RICE, who being called by his brethren to an important position in the regular work, has also been succeeded by the Rev. S. ROSE, in whose admirable qualifications for this important charge every confidence is placed, and from whose judicious plans much success may be ultimately expected. Such a transformation as an Industrial School is designed to effect in the mental and social habits of a degraded people must be a work of years; and yet, with all the formidable discouragements which bid defiance to rapid change, practical proof has already been adduced that the alterations desired will reward patient and persevering efforts, accompanied by devotional duties and spiritual influences. Brother Rice reports of this school:—

"This establishment of which the corner stone was laid in July last, was completed in December, at a cost of about £1,500 Cy. Its location on the banks of the Thames; its beautiful and commanding prospect, and the interests it is designed to subservise, present it as an object of pleasing contemplation to those who are desirous of advancing the civilization of the Indian tribes. Means have been taken to provide as far as possible for the children who are residing, and expected to become residents in the Institution. The farm now presents an aspect of hope for a harvest, which if realized, will go far towards securing this end. The farm which comprises 200 acres has been put under fence, and of eighty acres, which are partly cleared, we have 29 acres Wheat, 10 acres Oats, 2 acres Beans, 4½ acres Corn, and 1 acre Potatoes, and the ground is being prepared for Turnips and Buckwheat, so as to make up 50 acres in crop, the present season.

"We have now 13 children as boarders, and 10 are expected immediately from the New Credit, which, with the scholars attending, from the Village, will form an interesting school, and enable the manager of the Institution to give efficiency to any plans he may adopt for the future. The recent period of the commencement of the school precludes the reference to internal arrangements which as yet are immature."

SAUGEENG.

We give at large the following Report from the Rev. J. K. WIL-
LISON, who has laboured on this distant station the last four years
with great fidelity. The friends of Missions will perceive how
much these brethren need the prayers and sympathies of the Church.
By the appointment of the Rev. WM. HERKIMER to this place, ac-
companied by an experienced Teacher for the Day-School, the
inconveniences referred to in relation to an interpreter are
obviated :—

“ I exceedingly regret that I cannot present a more cheering report of
the progress of the Work of God on this mission. Never have we labour-
ed more faithfully and zealously to promote the welfare of the Indians
connected with this place, than during the past year, yet after all we have
been able to do, we are obliged to return a decrease of nineteen members.
This decrease is accounted for as follows :—We have been compelled to
expel for immoral conduct the unusually large number of thirteen, two
of whom have again returned as probationers, six have removed from the
mission, and five have died. Five have been received during the year as
probationers. Of those who died several were enabled to bear a good
testimony of the power of grace to bear them up in a dying hour, and
to give them a sweet prospect of Heaven.

“ One good Sister by the name of Ogemah Ekegedooqua, which means
the chief speaking woman, could say “ all her fears were gone, she loved
not this world, she was ready to go at the bidding of her Lord, and take
her place above.” Another, a Brother and an Assistant Leader, John
Omawwah, could speak as clearly, and rejoice as fully in redeeming grace
when near his end as any person I ever saw ; he attended the Quarterly
Meeting the same day on which he died, and spoke freely of the love of
Christ in his soul. A few moments before his death, he called his friends
around him, and gave them his dying charge and exhorted them to be
faithful unto death, and they would meet him in Heaven. How cheer-
ing these things are to the mind of the Missionary who is anxiously
watching over the poor Indian for his good. We hear and see these
things and take courage.

“ Our week day and Sabbath schools are doing but little : they have
been kept up the principal part of the year. There are seasons when the
Indians are fishing and sugar making in which we cannot have schools on
this mission.

“ I have had two Interpreters during the year, both of whom have been
unfaithful ; and have betrayed the cause of God among the people. They
have exerted an influence in opposition to our exertions for the promotion
of the welfare of the Indians ; and to which influence I attribute princi-
pally the backslidings of nearly all those who have been expelled from
the Church. One of these John Beatty is now residing at Colpoy's Bay,

at the Indian Settlement there. The other is the son of one of our Chiefs here, who has been for two years at College in Toronto city, and has learned but little more than to serve the wicked one more efficiently than he was before capable of doing. I cannot say that drinking, swearing, dancing, breaking the Sabbath, and looseness of conduct were taught him in the College at Toronto, but these things he has learned and practices at the mission. With such an example before them, it is hardly to be wondered at that some should fall away from the faith. I know not where an Interpreter can be obtained for this mission. If obtained he must come from a distance, and I think he cannot be obtained for £10, the allowance of the Missionary Society. No, nor for £20. This mission has been somewhat expensive, and if a white man is continued upon it, it must continue so, at least for a time yet. Remote and isolated as it is, the work must be prosecuted under many disadvantages. It bears a near resemblance to a Foreign Mission. A man might almost as good go to China as to come here. Those only who have resided here, or have been in the habit of visiting this mission can know of those difficulties. If the interpreter proves unfaithful, as in the above mentioned cases, the Missionary must get along as well as he can. He can have no one at hand to help him to meet the case, on the spot or at the time. If he is in want of anything he can only obtain it from Goderich, 60 miles distant, and his only conveyance perhaps a bark canoe, accompanied by Indians to whom he must pay two prices for their services. Or from Owen's Sound, 25 miles distant, brought on the back, for which he pays very dear there, and then nearly the worth of the thing for carriage. If sickness should attack himself or family—if he cannot meet the case himself, he must be at great expense, and perhaps die before help could reach him. Perhaps you say he must trust in God; so we do, and I hope every Missionary does—were it not for this I am sure we should have fainted here—surrounded by sickness and death as we have been during the past year. It has been a sickly year among the Indians; yet the Great God has preserved us from any severe attack of disease, for which we desire to praise him, and to dedicate our souls and bodies afresh to his service with increasing zeal for his glory and the good of our fellow men."

GRAND RIVER.

Of the religious state of this Mission the Rev. R. Heyland forwards the following report:—

"To trace the operations of divine grace in the formation of the christian character, is a very delightful and profitable employment; in them we have ocular demonstrations of the divinity of our holy religion, in the illumination of the understanding, the subjugation of unholy tempers, and the giving of a new and heavenly direction to the powers and passions of the soul. This is eminently the case with respect to the Indians who have been converted from the error of their ways and made partakers of

the saving grace of God. Prior to their conversion, they were sunk in the most deplorable ignorance, guilt, and depravity; but when brought under the influence of divine truth, it enlightened, purified, and raised them up to sit with Christ in heavenly places. The principles of Christianity have been at work for many years among the Indians of the Grand River, during which time, many of them have passed from the shores of mortality to the regions of eternal day, and many are now travelling to those fair and bright realms. We have on this Mission 7 classes among the Indians, containing 136 members, and one class among the Whites, which numbers 13. In the course of the year, we have admitted 20 Indians and 4 Whites. We have lost by death, removal, and expulsion, 21 Indians and 18 Whites; hence our schedule exhibits a decrease in the number of Indians of one, and in the number of our Whites of 14. Our School is doing well; it is in a prosperous state. In the past year, 4 have died, 1 White and 3 Indian women. The white man who died was the memorable William Outhred, a Local Preacher. He was born on the 18th day of August, 1776, in the Parish of Guisborough, in Yorkshire, England. He was favoured with a religious education, his parents being Methodists. But he lived a stranger to regenerating grace until he was 24 years of age. About that time he was convinced of sin, under the ministry of the Rev. Thomas Wood. For several months he sought the Lord, bitterly bewailing his guilt and wretchedness, which was soon discovered by his pious friends and neighbours; they sympathized with him in his afflictions; and while engaged in prayer in the vestry of the Methodist Chapel at Guisborough, it pleased the Lord to say unto him, "Arise, shine, for thy light is come!" He then could understandingly and emphatically exclaim,—

"Thou art my soul's bright morning star,
And thou my rising sun."

From that time he was enabled to serve the Lord with gladness, and to rejoice in the Rock of his salvation. He took great delight in the means of grace, and his profiting appeared to his brethren. Hence he was authorised to improve his gifts on the Guisborough Circuit as a Local Preacher. He continued to discharge the duties of this important office with acceptance and success until April 16, 1832, when he left England for Canada. He settled near the River Credit, in the township of Toronto. Here he laboured as a Local Preacher, and was useful for the space of 8 years; at the end of which time, he removed with his family to the township of Onondaga, within the limits of the Grand River Mission. Here, on September the 5th, 1849, terminated his pious and useful toils, together with his privations and sufferings. He died in great peace. His absence from the Mission is severely felt; but our loss is his infinite gain. It may be said of him—he was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost, and of faith. His remains were committed to the tomb amidst the sighs and tears of his friends and family. The mournful occasion was improved by a discourse founded upon Matthew xxiv. 44. A text which he had chosen for the purpose, long before his death.

"The three Indian women referred to above, were Mary Crawford, Mary John, and Margaret Adams. The two first mentioned I was not intimately

acquainted with—they lived at the extremity of the Mission; but upon enquiry, I learned they made a good finish. The latter, M. Adams, I knew; she was truly an exemplary character—regular in her attendance on the means of grace, industrious, and tidy in her habits and person, and according to her means, a liberal supporter of our Church. She lived religiously and usefully, and she died in the Lord."

NEW CREDIT.

Considering the disadvantages of the Missionary not residing amongst this interesting band of the Ojebway race, since their removal to this new settlement, there is much reason for gratitude that the work of the Lord presents so favourable an aspect. The maintenance of religious ordinances in consequence of this deficiency has been attended with labour and inconvenience: through the generosity of the people there this will not endure long, for a good mission-house is in course of erection to be finished by next October, the cost of which is to be defrayed out of the funds of the Indian community. From this band many glorious instances of the power of gospel grace have been added both to the Church militant and triumphant: it is pleasing to give such a practical proof of their continued love to the ministry which has been the instrument of their change and elevation.

SNAKE ISLAND.

The number of Church members continues the same as last year, viz., 50. The School is still taught by the Indians' old friend, Mr. Wm. Law, who has during the past year experienced deep affliction; Mrs. Law being removed from him by the ruthless hand of death. This painful event occurred at a season of the year when, for several days together, there was no probability of crossing from the main land to the Island. The Indians were from home, and he was nearly alone with two little children, both before and after her departure. The grace of God remarkably sustained his mind during this severe trial.

SCHOOGOG.

Although advancing years might suggest to the venerable minister who has charge of this important station, a desire for a more quiet and less responsible position, yet are we thankful to announce the continuance of his health and zeal in the effective management of the Mission. The following statement from the venerable and reverend WILLIAM CASE will be read with interest :—

“The *Alderville Mission*, so prosperous from its commencement on Grape Island, as well as its progress in Alnwick, has been especially favoured during the two years past. During the past season, the work of religious revival has prevailed both among the Indians of the village, and the neighbouring White settlements. The children of several English and Irish families are among the converts, and its delightful influence is felt on the minds of the teachers and children of three Sabbath Schools.

“The Indian society consists of 6 classes, with their 6 native leaders, numbering 70 members. In the White settlements are 3 societies, numbering 45 members—total, 115 members.

“In the three Sabbath Schools are 15 teachers, 115 scholars, and 200 vols. and tracts in the libraries.

“In connexion with the Indian work are several White settlements, consisting principally of European emigrants, whose dependance is mostly on this Mission for the instructions and ordinances of the Gospel.

“Another evidence of an encouraging character is the advance of funds the past year. The amount raised for the support of Missions is £20, which is an advance of about five pounds on those of the preceding year.

“To this state of encouragement in the Mission we may add, the prosperity of the Indian School on the Industrial plan, of 54 Indian youths, which is in full and successful operation. For this purpose, two brick buildings have been erected—one for a boarding establishment ; the other for the residence of the teachers, for school rooms, and for dormitories for the pupils of the School. The former building is 59 ft. by 34, two stories, with basement, at the cost of £700. The latter building, 63 ft. by 44, two stories, with a basement, and attic stories, at the expense of about £900. The building contains, beside the hall, 22 rooms, having room for all the teachers, and 100 children.

“On the 18th October, 1849, the first brick of the new building was laid. In the month of March, 1850, the building was completed, with

its necessary appendages for the reception of the teachers and children of the School.

"For two years after the arrangement for the education of the Indian children, the Indians of the northern bands of Lake Huron and Simeco neglected to send in their children to the school; but soon after the last Conference, those tribes sent forward to the school 35 of their youths; which, added to the former pupils, make up the number to 54. These are all boarded and clothed in the Institution.

"The expenses of the buildings, about £1,600; and the clothing and board of these children is now defrayed from the Indians funds alone,—no charge being made on the Missionary Society hereafter, except for the Missionaries and the teachers of the school.

"This addition to the number of Indian youths in the Industrial School was made through the Government, in accordance with the views of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, adapting the plan of education to the wants of a wild and wandering people, combining domestic improvement and industrious labour with the ordinary common school instruction. On this Institution we have been favoured with the Divine blessing—a number of the Indian youths being brought under religious influence.

"In this as in others of our Indian Missions, we prove the verity of the divine word—that godliness is profitable unto all things, having the promise that now is and of that which is to come. Previous to the conversion of the Indians, their annuities would be expended and wasted in drunken revels in a few weeks. Through the influence of the Gospel, one-fourth of their annuity is applied for educational purposes, and one-fourth only for the erection of those buildings, and the board and clothing of their children."

RICE AND MUD LAKES.

RICE LAKE.—The Rev. R. Brooking writes from this Mission,—

"On looking back upon the past year, although we have had a few things which may occasion deep regret, yet upon the whole we have had a great deal which will cheer our hearts and enable us to be thankful to our Heavenly Father for what has been accomplished.

"We have been under the painful necessity of either dropping or expelling five: six have removed to other places, and two have died and have left a glorious testimony behind that they are gone to heaven.

"Our means of grace have been well attended, and have proved to be times of refreshing coming down from the presence of the Lord; and there is evidently a deeper work of grace going on in the hearts of our older members. During the year, a Temperance Society has been formed, and most of our people have become members of it, so that the use of intoxicating drink is *nearly banished from the community*. Fewer of our people have been away hunting this year, and the time that they have been absent is greatly shortened; so that we have not so much upon this ground to complain of as formerly; indeed there seems to be a grow-

ing disposition among them to love their comfortable homes, and to be absent from them as little as possible. Our young men have not gone with the rafts this year, as they were wont to do heretofore. To improve their minds, they have instituted a *Debating Society*, and meet at regular intervals for discussing certain subjects which may have been previously agreed on. To show the alteration for the better which has taken place in their views, it will be only necessary to mention one subject which was discussed by them when a number of the older men were present; viz., as to whether *hunting* or *agriculture* was the most beneficial to the Indian; and it was, after the matter was fully canvassed, decided by a large majority in favour of *agriculture*. Thus, hunting, which scarcely a missionary who has laboured among them has not complained of, seems to be growing into disrepute.

"We have been unfortunately deprived of the services of a Schoolmaster for the greater part of the year, and consequently cannot present a favourable report in this department; but I am thankful to state that the school has been re-organized, with every prospect of success. The children are very regular in their attendance, and are making some progress in the various branches of learning which they are taught. It is also pleasing for me to be able to state, that there is an increasing anxiety on the part of the Indians of this community for the education of their children; in proof of this, I only need mention that they have agreed in council to build, free of expense to the Society, a house for the schoolmaster, as soon as an eligible spot shall be obtained, and this in addition to the yearly sum which is appropriated by them to the Alderville Industrial School.

"We have just had a family of eight persons come to reside here from Mud Lake, and I think that others are disposed to follow, in consequence of the superior advantages to be enjoyed. If proper measures be adopted to render it attractive, there is no doubt but that it would be one of the *most prosperous* of the Indian villages, as it is certainly one of the most beautiful, both by natural advantages and by the improvements which are being made.

MUD LAKE.

"It is greatly to be regretted that the Indians of this village cannot be persuaded to forsake this place. The only reason, I believe, why they continue here is, because it affords them superior hunting grounds, and while this is the case, it can scarcely be expected that they will turn their attention to agriculture, and more especially since the greater part of the land belonging to the settlement is far from being adapted to that purpose. I am inclined to think, however, that it must be ultimately abandoned by them, especially when the present generation shall pass away.

"Their spiritual state is similar to last year. Our Quarterly Meetings have proved to be seasons of the manifestation of the Holy Spirit in an eminent degree, and our members for the most part are walking in the fear of the Lord, and enjoying the comforts of the Holy Ghost. Deep impressions are made upon the minds of others; thus the word of the Lord seems to have free course, and is glorified."

R A M A.

From this Mission the Rev. H. DEAN writes,—

“The lapse of another Conference year reminds your Missionary of the duty of drawing up and transmitting to you a report of the state of this Mission.

“Through the mercy of the Great Head of the Church, we are spared from having to record the death of any of our members during the past year.

“Our Indians have been compelled, from various causes, to leave their homes and go to the different neighbourhoods to work, and vend their wares. It is gratifying to your Missionary to be able to state, that not one case of drunkenness among our members has come to his knowledge.

“Their attendance on the means of grace is praiseworthy, not only coming themselves, but bringing their children also.

“Since the Camp-Meeting that was held among them last September, (which was rendered a great blessing to them,) they have become more spiritual.

“Our last Quarterly Meeting (May 26) was a season of refreshing. A goodly number spoke in the Love-feast, whilst the big tears chasing each other down their sable faces, testified the deep feelings of their hearts; and at the celebration of the Holy Sacrament, the scene was quite overpowering.

“The school has been better attended this than on any former year of my residence with them; still it is irregular, as it always must and will be until the Indians give up their roving habits.

“In reviewing the four years of labour on this isolated mission, I see many things that cause me to mourn and to weep before the Lord, and many mercies to be grateful for.”

BEAUSOLIEL AND FRENCH RIVER.

At Beausoliel Island the members have maintained their consistency: the mind of the Missionary has been much encouraged by the constancy of his flock, and their obvious improvement in spiritual knowledge. Their industry and labour have been rewarded with general health; during the whole year death has not been permitted to invade the community. On the north shore of the Georgian Bay, which is connected with Lake Huron, we have for some time had a few of the Ojebways, who, being truly converted to God, have exercised a most salutary influence over those who

still remain out of the Church, and amongst themselves give evidence of the care with which they cherish the life of godliness, and according to their knowledge and privileges, practice the precepts of godliness. Shut out from many of the allurements of civilized life to commit evil, they really sustain a more uniform Christian conversation than many of their brethren whose reserves and habitations approximate to the white settlements. Since the Conference, the Superintendent of Missions directed the Missionary at Beausoliel to pay a visit to this remote land, and administer to them the rites and privileges of Church membership : of this visit he writes, —

“ In compliance with your request, I left home with two Indians in a bark canoe, on Wednesday, the 24th July, and after paddling a few hours we entered on the waters of the great Huron, or as it is marked on the maps, the Georgian Bay. The northern shores of this great lake are dotted with ten thousand islands, with as great a variety in size and shape as multiplicity in numbers, yet one general feature pervades the whole.

“ The main shore, as well as the islands, with very few exceptions, is one entire field of granite ; the rocks are mostly bare ; a few scrubby pines are seen here and there, struggling for existence in the crevices of the rocks. For a hundred and forty miles I did not see enough of mother earth to have buried a dead man in.

“ On our passage we saw several heathen gods. They are stones of different shapes, as they have been formed by nature, or broken by some convulsion of nature into some fantastical shape, and placed in some prominent place ; they have become objects of worship. As the untutored Indian has passed by, he has presented his offering of tobacco, or something else, as circumstances or inclination might dictate. The most noted of these gods is what is called the Turtle god, from its resemblance to that animal. It is a great rock, and has received large portions of offerings ; but has been neglected of late, or has become more voracious in its old age ; for, when I examined it, the offerings which are deposited in a cavity on the top of the head were all gone, save an old broken pipe ; and as we had neither pipe nor tobacco with us, it would have to continue its fast until some more devoted or fortunate visitors should come that way.

“ On Friday we reached the Shawanahog Bay, and found a small band of Indians who have promised to give up their wanderings and receive the gospel. They intend, this season or next at farthest, to build houses to live in. They have promised to build one for a school teacher, and a school-house, and then they expect a teacher.

“ On Saturday we overtook the French River Indians, twenty miles beyond their village, (this band has a small village of nine or ten houses, with a school-house, at the mouth of French River,) on their way to the Manitoulin, to get their presents. With this band we stopped till Monday. Among this people we have a small but faithful class. The chief and his family are members. His son is the leader. I examined his class-book,

and it would not compare unfavourably with many of those who are more highly blessed with the means of grace. The Love-feast, the preaching, and the Lord's Supper, were all seasons of refreshing coming down from the presence of the Lord. In connection with the Sabbath services, I married one couple, baptized one child, and received one adult into class.

"They are very anxious for a school-teacher. The chief said they were like children to whom a mother has given sugar, until they learn to love it, and then take it away; that their children has got a taste of learning, but as soon as they loved it, the teacher was taken away. They have promised, if a teacher is sent this fall, that each family will give him a bushel of corn and two bushels of potatoes, and find him a house to live in, and next spring give him ground to plant his corn and potatoes. I think, if a suitable man can be found, one should be sent as soon as possible.

"On Wednesday, the 30th, I got home sufficiently tired, after eight days incessant toil, seven of them in paddling from early dawn till dark night, and seven nights sleeping on the hard rock. I was thankful to find myself at home again, and all well, and felt to praise God for his preserving care and tender mercy towards me."

A promising teacher, who is also authorized to conduct religious exercises, is now resident at this lonely station. We anticipate much good from this arrangement, as the resident Missionary on Beausoleil Island will occasionally visit Shawanahog Bay, and French River. Nothing can be more dreary than the condition of these outcasts, for such is their proper designation: until the Society took cognizance of them, they might literally say, "No man careth for our souls." Their living is abstracted from the deep and crystal waters of Huron, and the wild beasts of the dismal forests which skirt the shores of these vast inland seas. One of the first questions asked our voyagers was, if they had "salt and tobacco?" They had fled from the tormenting mosquitoes on shore to the barren rock, there to wait the changing season when they might again venture to their accustomed haunts. Let the friends of Missions look at this picture of man,—without a home, and without God!

DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

At no former period in the history of the Wesleyan Church in Canada did the work of God in the destitute settlements present a more encouraging aspect, than at the present time. Forty-two labourers have the past year covered a vast tract of country, in many places but recently and thinly populated, enduring many privations, subsisting on very economical allowances, and toiling with unwavering fidelity to supply the spiritual wants of thousands who would otherwise have but few, if any, advantages from the ministry of the word, and the administration of the holy sacraments. As far as practicable, both the discipline and usages of our Church are observed in these remote places; so that as they advance in secular prosperity, the adherents to our ecclesiastical polity will raise upon a sound foundation a superstructure both harmonious and useful; not many years will pass away before some of these Domestic Missions will be self-supporting; and in their turn will join the older Circuits of our Connexion, in swelling up the Missionary income to extend the Kingdom of Christ into the "regions beyond." If attentive assemblies, powerful awakenings, converting grace, and believers being comforted and edified, are evidences of prosperity, then have the friends of the Missionary Society ample occasion for gratitude, that these "fruits of righteousness" have followed the labours of these "Messengers of the Churches."

Extracts are given from the Brethren's reports, showing the nature of the Society's operations:—

MONO.

"During the past year, we had a few conversions to God, and general peace through our borders.

"At one or two of our appointments, we have felt the lack of efficient Class-Leaders. I am more than ever convinced of the importance of spiritually-minded and duly qualified Leaders, both in reference to the temporal and moral aspect of our Zion. They are a class of men, essential to our being as a Church, and exercise a large influence on our entire membership.

"There are 150 members on this Mission; 26 appointments in the month,

extending more or less through six townships; three chapels, and several dwelling-houses, where the Gospel of Christ is proclaimed; our hearers ranging from 250 to 350 each fortnight.

"With a few additional appointments, and the requisite means, there would be ample labour for two Ministers, while their united strength and pastoral care would greatly promote the work of God in this part of his vineyard."

BARRIE.

"It will be expected that I should say something in regard to the work of God within the bounds of this Mission. I would just observe:— During the past year we have admitted on trial for membership, 72; removals, 4; deaths, 2; expelled or dropped, 17; remaining on trial, 50; number in full membership, 159; total number in society, 209. The net increase, after deducting removals, deaths, &c., is 50.

"We have in connection with our Societies on this Mission, four Sabbath Schools, all of which are in a most flourishing state. These are truly nurseries out of which the Church has, and still continues to receive, some of her brightest ornaments. During the past quarter, we have had the unspeakable satisfaction of receiving into society some fifteen or twenty young persons, who are either scholars or teachers in one of these schools, some of whom are indeed young men of great promise, and bid fair for future usefulness. We have employed in these schools 18 teachers, 116 children taught, and 650 volumes in the libraries.

"The congregations at all our Sabbath appointments are large and respectable, and I believe there is a growing attachment to the interests and institutions of Wesleyan Methodism among both our members and hearers."

ful in his work. Scores of souls have been hopefully converted from the error of their ways, and translated from the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of God's dear Son. There is a nett increase of 108 members. The Mission embraces the Townships of 'Collingwood,' 'Euphrasia,' 'St. Vincent,' and a part of 'Sydenham,' forming a four weeks' circuit, so that Mr. Reid is four weeks in visiting all the appointments, and but for the assistance of a number of excellent Local-Preachers, he would be unable to work the Mission to any advantage. I have attended three regular Quarterly Meetings on this Mission, and have held three extra sacramental services, as there is no house on the Mission sufficiently large to hold the congregations, should our members and hearers all assemble at one place. One of the largest school-houses we have, was filled to overflowing during the sermon, with women—the men had to remain out of doors; and the members at the Love-feast filled the same house uncomfortably full. It would be well if we could spare a little from our Chapel Relief Fund to help in the building of a commodious house in a central position on this Mission. The most of the people are poor, as to the things of this world, "but rich in faith, and heirs of the kingdom."

"1st. The labours of the Mission do not now extend to the township of Nissouri, that appointment has been given up to the London Circuit, while our labours have been extended to the west and north, into the township of Osborne, and the village of Mitchell and neighbourhood.

"2. There has been no special religious interest prevailing during the year. We have had peace and some interesting conversions under the influence of the ordinary means. Our Quarterly Meetings and extra sacramental services have universally been times of refreshing, seasons of great spiritual delight and profit; and in the outermost classes, there have been seen marks of pleasing progress in depth of piety, love of the means, and zeal in support of the cause; the number of hearers has considerably increased.

"But while writing about this Mission, I may be permitted to make some observations which apply not only to this Mission, but to every portion of our work lying within the bounds of the Huron District—the territories of the 'Canada Company.' The country is truly fine; fertile in soil; rich in natural advantages; salubrious and healthful in climate; and it is very easy to obtain possession of land here. These things present great attractions to immigrants who throng in here from the Old Country, and from the eastern and less favoured portions of the Province. Among them there is a good portion of our own people, and those who are attached to Wesleyan doctrines and institutions. These are worthy objects of our solicitude—they form the nucleus of churches and societies, wherever they settle, and never fail to give the Missionary a warm welcome into their settlement. But the best of the story is now told. Some of these have a little capital—some have none; but one year generally reduces all to a common level. One instalment is paid on the land; the family must be supported—the land cleared and planted; and by the time the first crop comes off, the money is gone. The poor man has made out to support his family by working part of his time for his more favoured neighbour; his crops have also grown; and now he stands on equal terms with the rest. They then may labour on for years, and find quite enough to do to sustain the family and extend the farm; and, in the greatest number of instances, more than they can do to meet the annual instalments; and the least failure in crops spreads depression over the whole country, and forces many to leave their homes in quest of labour. Every dollar which gets into circulation is caught up eagerly by some one, and carried to the 'Company's Office.' And thus many of our people, the appearance of whose places indicate prosperity, with twenty, forty or fifty acres cleared, are for the present, in unenviable circumstances. The demand from 'the office' becoming larger and more urgent—the prospect more gloomy in regard to raising from the soil—the fearful apprehension of being dispossessed, pressing more and more heavily. And these things apply not merely to isolated instances, but to the mass of the population of the Huron District. And could we expect otherwise than that those things should operate injuriously on the moral and religious enterprise of the people? Many of those who have been accustomed to give liberally, find themselves now destitute of the ability. if he was able he would often 'rather give than receive.' The first two or three years of a new settlement exhibits the best paying ability. With these observations I know that all my brethren who labour in this District will concur; we have all felt it—deeply felt it; nor do we alone feel it—all Ministers and Churches who labour and try to exist here, are made experimentally sensible of it. Of this the writer is convinced from intercourse and conversation. On asking a very worthy and respectable Minister of the 'United Presbyterian Church' the other day, whether he considered himself permanently located here? he answered, 'I cannot tell; the prospect is rather gloomy here in pecuniary matters; I may be forced away. For five or six years in this Huron District is sufficient to impoverish any Minister be his talents what they may, unless his stipends are well supplimented from other sources'—and adding, 'don't you find it so?' From this the Committee may see that rough roads, 'oceans of mud,' rough lodgings and hard fare are not the only things which a Missionary in the Huron has to contend with. He could bear with these without complaining, but with poverty—poverty seen and felt—surely these things entitle him and his people to the sympathy and prayers of all who love Zion.

"I have not written this to appear in the Missionary Report. I leave that with confidence to those who compile that report. I have written it under the impression that it was my duty to lay before the Committee every important fact connected with the circumstances of those who for whom they are called upon to 'devise liberal things.'"

Among the Whites we have received 20 on trial during the year; removed to other Circuits, 7; dropt, 6; and received from other Circuits, 4."

WARDSVILLE.

"This field of labour being so extensive it is impossible to give that due attention which the work necessarily requires, notwithstanding we have reason to adore the Giver of all Good for encouraging prospects. A few persons have been brought to God and added to the Church. In some appointments where it was difficult to get congregations or places to worship in, through the blessing of Divine Providence multitudes assemble in comfortable buildings to hear the word of life. Our last Quarterly Meeting held in the Moorhouse neighbourhood, was a time of refreshing from the presence of the Lord. The Love-feast and sacrament were so exceedingly profitable that it was difficult to bring them to a close; great was the power of the Lord among his people. The Indian work continues interesting. One of the sisters have died in the faith, and left a satisfactory evidence that she is gone to be with Christ, which is far better. It was profitable to visit her dying pillow, although evidently deprived of the comforts of life and racked with pain, she was calm and peaceful, waiting patiently the coming of her Lord, enjoying a blessed hope of heaven dwelling richly in her soul.

"The Indians in the midst of severe trials have succeeded in erecting a substantial frame for a Chapel, and in so doing they have exceeded their means. They are worthy of assistance from the Missionary Fund, and white settlers around them.

"The Sabbath Schools are making some little progress. The children are attentive and quite ambitious to excel each other in committing portions of Holy Scriptures to memory; and there is no doubt that if pious, suitable teachers could be obtained, these institutions would be rendered a blessing to the world."

"Amherstburg in one respect, at least, resembles Jerusalem—'beautiful for situation.' Nature with her thrilling voice is ever and anon admonishing the devoted Missionary, as he passes up and down the banks of the mighty river rolling by his side. And as he gazes on its last struggle while breathing out its last sigh in the bosom of the wide-spreading lake, he is reminded of the solemn language of Scripture, 'Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might,' &c. Dr. Bangs, the venerable Case and others, are often spoken of with affectionate regard.

"A year ago Gosfield, with its wealth and membership of about 200, was put on the list of Circuits. Amherstburgh embracing six Townships, with a scattered flock of 96 (Whites 91, Indians 5), very justly retained its Missionary character. During the year we have had a net increase of 21 members, numbering at present 117. We have 3 Churches and a Parsonage, 13 fortnight appointments, and 2 destitute settlements saying, 'Come over and help us.' We have peace within our borders. The fields in some places whiten unto the harvest. The funds are in advance of any former year, and Mission ground as it is, to the honour of our friends be it spoken, they give more to the Missionary Fund than they receive from it.

"The prayer of our last Quarterly Meeting was, that the Lord of the harvest may send us an additional labourer. May their prayer be answered, and should we be spared to report at the end of another year, we hope by the blessing of the Most High, to tell you greater things than these."

GUELPH.

"We have just held our fourth Quarterly Meeting, and in closing up affairs for the year, we have abundant cause of thankfulness to the Great Head of the Church for the peace and prosperity with which we have been favoured. Great harmony has prevailed, and by united co-operation in the use of the divinely appointed means for the salvation of souls, a considerable number have been brought to a saving knowledge of the truth, and are now united with us in the fellowship of the Saints. We have received into the Church, during the year, about 100, and after deducting the losses from deaths, removals, and other causes, the increase in our numbers will be about 70. The number of members in the Town has nearly doubled.

"The financial matters are also on the advance. The amount collected for the support of the Preachers is more than double that of last year; while in Missionary and other collections, a very favourable improvement will appear in our annual report. During the year our Chapel and premises in the Town have been materially improved at a cost of more than fifty pounds."

"It was not without some reluctance I resumed the labours of this field last year; nor was it the dangers and hardships I feared so much as my own incompetence to do justice to the charge three years in succession. I thank the Lord of Hosts the year has been a good one to myself and family, and I hope to the Church in the wilderness.

"Great numbers of members must be lost to the Church, who have come from the lower districts to seek a home for themselves and families in the 'Queen's Bush,' if a Mission was not sustained in those regions of forest and fen. Here you may see daily arrivals of families enquiring for 'vacant land' and 'school and preaching,' and to hear of the latter is one great inducement to cast anchor. Indeed, few of the older Townships but contribute largely to the peopling of these new ones, and this winter's arrivals has exceeded any of the former. Let not the wealthier Townships forget they have friends, neighbours, and children here. Let not the 'Father and Mother Land' forget that for years past their surplus population has been pushing West-ward. Let them not forget the gospel is the greatest boon to any place, and the greatest blessing to any people.

"There was a Brother Gordon from Yonge Street, made a business tour to this place, and made a business of preaching Christ while he stayed, and quite an increase has been the result; in one place where there was little of the kind, there are now nearly 50 connected to the Church.

"The congregations are much larger, and all the funds quite upon the increase, and taking markets and matters into account, of them it may be said. 'they have done what they could.'

"We all feel truly thankful that 3 years show to the religious public, 3 houses of worship on this Mission, now occupied by good congregations. The last Sabbath's labours in Stratford was to take possession of a new frame, lately erected by the extraordinary efforts of friends of Wesleyan-Methodism in that place, and very little debt will remain when completely finished. If all concerned with this field could see its present aspect, I believe they would thank God and take courage."

"We have taken on trial about 50 members during the year; but find, according to the last schedule, an increase of only 14 above last year, 8 of whom are still on trial: so that we have an increase of only 6 who are in full membership. This is accounted for in part by the removal of a goodly number to other Circuits, and partly by the death of a number of the members of our Church; all of whom, we have reason to believe, have made a happy and glorious exchange. We are sometimes discouraged, or nearly so; and though we cannot but mourn for departed

friends, still it does one's soul good to stand by the dying bed of the pious, and witness their triumph in a dying hour. It strengthens one's faith in the efficiency of the Christian religion.

"Our Sabbath Schools have received as much of our attention as consistent with other duties; and we rejoice in being able, as we think, to report some progress. We have 5 schools, 27 teachers, 154 children, and 433 volumes in library. Beside the above, there are several large Sabbath Schools, partly composed of the children of Methodist parents, and partly conducted by the members of our Church."

"This Mission is composed principally of ground formerly occupied by the Preachers labouring on the Sidney Circuit, and at present bids fair soon to make one of our most pleasant and valuable two week Circuits. The labours connected with this Mission are confined chiefly to the Township of Hungerford, from which it derives its name. The land here is mostly arable and fertile, and the inhabitants generally sober and industrious. We have here 124 church members, among whom are to be found many of the most respectable, intelligent, and influential persons in the Township, and considering their circumstances, some of the most liberal contributors to the several funds of our Connexion. A neat and substantial frame Church, 30 x 42, has also been erected, and will, without foreign aid, be completed this summer or early next autumn. We have on the Mission two Sabbath Schools, under our own superintendence, and it is now in contemplation soon to form two or three more. Three new places for preaching have been occupied during the year, at one of which there is an encouraging prospect of soon forming a good society. We have peace in all our borders; our congregations are generally large and attentive, and a disposition to "receive the truth in the love of it" is becoming more and more apparent among the people. Our class-meetings and love-feasts are mostly—

"The good Lord has owned his word though sown in much weakness. He has raised it in power to the happy conversion of upwards of 20 precious souls during the past year. There is but one small Chapel on the Mission. The place has become too strait: a few spirited friends have put up a frame, 44 x 30, this spring, and expect to get it covered in this summer.

"The people on this Mission are mostly poor. The most of those who are able appear willing to do all they can. We have raised upwards of £11, missionary money, and our prospects on the whole are brightening. The Mission requires an additional preacher, to have preaching once in two weeks at all the appointments."
