





GOVERNMENT SYSTEM

Ottawa, Mar. 25—Notice of important legislation affecting the expan sion of the system of Government Railways has been given by the Hon Frank Cochrant There are, in all three resolutions, the first providing that the Minister of Railways, subject to the authority of the Governor in-Council, may construct, purchase or otherwise acquire in whole, or in part any railway, railway bridge, railway station, terminal, ferry or other rail way work in the provinces of Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island. "It is provided ment, and no railway of more than 200 miles in length is to be acquired, and no railway may connect directly with the Government Railways Sys tem. No railway of more than twent after a sum of money for the purch ines so constructed, or acquired, to become part of the Government

the ratification of an agreement da-ed March 18 last, for the sale to the Government of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Railway including the main line of thirty-si miles from Sackville to C. Tormen tine. The purchase price is \$270,000 and until it is paid the government to pay interest at four per cent.
