ALLEGED INSURANCE FRAUD AT MONROE.—A Montreal despatch to the St. John Telegraph states that the officers of the Prudential Mutual Insurance Association, which the life of Wortman Triles, who died recently there, was insured for \$2,500, decided not to pay the claim on the ground that fraud had been committed. They take the position that Mr. Triles died of consumption, and not (as alleged and certified) of inflammation of the brain, and they allege that he was suffering from consumption when he was certified to as in good health. The policy was made payable to a brother of the deceased. The talk in Montreal is that the company would not only contest the matter but prosecute certain parties for fraud. The further talk Thursday was that the claim for \$2,500 had been abandoned and the policy surrendered.
