Church Society.

At a meeting of the Saint Andrews Local Committee of the above Society, held in all Saints Church, on Wednesday the 10th inst.

The Rev. Dr. Alley in the Chair.—Prayers having been read and James W. Street Esq. chosen Secy.—The Rev. the Rector delivered the following address.

AN ADDRESS TO THE ST ANDREWS LOCAL COMMITTEE OF THE CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK

BRETHREN,—

At a meeting like the present, we are naturally led to consider how we can best perform our duty towards the holy Catholic (or Universal) Apostolic Church, unto which we have been at our baptism admitted, by being made members of a regular branch thereof. Into that holy and blessed Church, Christ himself hath gathered us, having paid the price of his most precious blood; and in that Church, he has appointed us to several stations, and has assigned several duties to these stations, and has afforded, and does still afford various opportunities of doing good, appropriate to the several conditions occupied by each of us individually. It becomes us, then, not only to be humbly and heartily thankful for the great goodness of God, in extending to us, the many blessings, both spiritual and temporal, which we enjoy, but to show forth our gratitude, by being vigilant in seeking, and embracing all the opportunities, (which, under God's good providence occur) of performing our respective duties, and which if duly attended to, will abound more, and more, in our several spheres of action. On this point, I can appeal to our own experience, which if it fail to teach, the warning of others who have neglected, or misused the means mercifully put into their power, of benefiting their fellow-men, will teach us, that no retrospect can be so miserable, than that of opportunities neglected, of sharing with others, the blessings of a kind and good God, and of proclaiming the name of Jesus for Salvation unto all them that believe.

Another revolution of time, has brought us, brethren, and kind friends, together, and I trust, that, while years encrease, while time lessens, and brings us daily nearer to eternity, our zeal in God's service will encrease; our eyes be more steadily fixed on heaven, and heaven's glory, and that we shall feel an increased desire, to be humble and willing instruments of extending the inestimable benefits of Church communion to the remotest corner of the Country.—That, as years roll on, we may look back, on those which have passed, with joy and not with grief, in having endeavoured, under the aid of the holy spirit, to perform the duties of good and faithful Stewards of the manifold gifts of God.

The members of our Church, are particularly called upon at the present moment, not only to exhibit in their own life and conversation, that seriousness and piety, and that gospel knowledge which she requires, and communicates, but as far as they have the power, to participate with others, (who, with themselves, but with less spiritual advantages, are travelling through time to eternity,) those blessings which they enjoy. Many at this time, as well as in times past, while they assume the form of godliness, in apparent sanctity, are, in place of being zealously affected in a good cause, industrious in misrepresenting, and vilifying our holy Church, and in their proselyting spirit, accusing her, of in a manner proscribing piety. But, more our Church is known, the more will falsehood, and want of Christian charity in her enemies appear manifest—and, the beauty of holiness be found in all her services,—in her morning and evening prayer,—in the Christian celebration of her festivals—in her opening the book of holy Scripture to her people—in requiring from all her members, the frequent use of them—and in her prayers that they may "so read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that with patience and comfort of God's holy word, they may embrace, and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which he has given" them "in their Saviour Jesus Christ.—That her people may "cast away the works of darkness, and put upon them the armour of light"—that "the Ministers and Stewards" of God's "mysteries, may so prepare and make ready" Christ's "way, by turning the hearts of the disobedient to the wisdom of the just," that at his "second coming to judge the world, we may be found an acceptable people in his sight"—that, as we are "so let and hindered in running the race that is set before us," "grace and mercy may speedily help and deliver us"—that, God would "send his holy Ghost, and pour into our hearts that most excellent gift of charity the very bond of peace, and of all virtues, without which, whosoever liveth, is counted dead before" him—and that God would be pleased, "to Create and make in us, new and contrite hearts, that we worthily lamenting our sins, and acknowledging our wretched-

ness, may obtain of" him "perfect remission and forgiveness."

Oh! that our book of common prayer, were put into the hands of every person throughout the land, and that God would so influence the hearts of all, that, in comparing it with the book of holy Scripture, they might not have their understandings darkened, by the mist of prejudice and error—thus, might it be seen, that, in search after real piety, their course need not deviate far from the Church's fold.

The Church detests any Semblance of Pharisaical pride—no matter on what pretence such pride may rest.—Farther than actions proclaim, the real Son of the Church, will not judge of the spiritual state of others—but rather does he direct his attention homeward, to the state of his own heart; and, his own life and principles, from the great subject of examination, and judgement, while the religious welfare of others, call forth his prayers. On mysterious points he is modest in judgement; subjects propounded as matters of faith; he will not presumptuously bring before the bar of human reason.—He will be rather a learner and hearer, than an expounder of the word; praying, that he may be clothed with humility, submitting himself to his "spiritual pastors and masters," and not cavilling at, or endeavouring to injure the utility of those who "watch over him in the Lord."

As amongst other means, designedly made use of, to draw Members off from the Church of England, she is represented as holding and countenancing opinions in accordance with the Church of Rome, I feel it a duty, briefly to oppose such statements, not that the quarter from which such misrepresentations come, give them any importance, but because the unwary and unstable may be misled by the insinuations of art, or even by the ravings of ignorance and folly; Let it then be remarked in few words that while our reformers were careful to preserve unhurt the Apostolic foundation of the Church, and consequently retained, both in doctrine and discipline all that was in perfect accordance with Scripture truth, so were they careful to reject all those doctrines which had been made articles of faith, necessary to Salvation and which had no ground, or warrant from Holy Scripture—and also, those ceremonies, which had the least turning to vanity or superstition, such as had crept in, by indiscreet devotion, or such a zeal, as was without knowledge—retaining I say, only such doctrines, as were to be found in the revealed word of God, and such ceremonies, as were of use in keeping up order and decency in the Church; and which served to edification.—Holding in their view, that Apostolic injunction which, had it never been lost sight of had been well for the Christian world, "let all things be done to edifying; let all things be done decently, and in order." No alteration has been made in religion, with rashness or precipitancy, but calmly, and deliberately.—We have joined ourselves as nearly as we could to the Apostolic Church, to the Church of ancient and Catholic (or universal) Bishops and Fathers, which to our knowledge was sound and perfect, free from idolatry, or gross error; framing not only the doctrines of our Church, but also her sacraments, and book of Common prayer, according to their doctrines, rites and ceremonies, recovering our religion from neglect and corruption, and bringing it back to its original and first foundation.

In calling your attention to the Society, of which you form a local Committee it is expedient that you be made acquainted with the proceedings of the past year.—This leads me to congratulate the Members of the established Church, on the continued favourable State of the Church Society of this Archdiocese, the funds of which, notwithstanding the severe pecuniary pressure which has for some time existed, are in their usual prosperous state. It appears from the Society's report, that the income for the year 1842—was £2320 15 and the amount set apart for Missionary visits, at the last general Meeting, amounted to £737 2-3.—The appropriations made by the general Committee were as follows.—The Sum of two hundred and fifty pounds, was placed at the disposal of the Society for the propagation of the Gospel in foreign parts, towards the support of additional travelling Missionaries.—Eighty pounds placed at the disposal of the Executive Committee for the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels—and one hundred pounds sterling remitted to the Society for promoting Christian knowledge for a supply of books, suitable for lending libraries, and other purposes.—The appropriations of the executive Committee, in proportion to the means at its disposal, have been judicious and liberal, and there can exist no doubt of the future prudent and beneficial distribution of such funds as may be placed from time to time in the hands of the Society, of the wisdom of its formation, and the general utility of its designs.

When we look, not only at the flourishing state of our branch of Christ's holy Catholic, (or universal) Church, in the United Kingdom; the increased affection of the people for her, and the growing veneration for her formularies, for her doctrines, and for her Apostolic government, the great exertions making throughout the length and breadth of the land, in extending Church accommodation, and making provision for a vast increase of labourers in the vineyard;—when we regard the daily encreasing zeal & liberality exhibited, in sending forth devoted Servants of the Lord, to proclaim "good tidings of great joy," to all people, nations, and languages.—When we hear of the unusually great sums contributed towards the support of Bishops in the several provinces and dependencies of the British empire, and the liberal, and munificent endowment set apart for the future Bishop of our own Province, our hearts must rejoice and overflow with gratitude, to that God, "whose mercy endureth forever," for thus influencing the heart of man, and inclining him thus to contribute to a work, so acceptable in his sight. Surely, we must be convinced that our beloved parent state, and Church is under the protection and guidance of God's good providence, and will I pray be so until time shall be no more, when the really devoted Members of his favored Church on earth, will be happy and joyful members of the Church triumphant in heaven—singing praises to him that sitteth upon the throne, and to the lamb, for ever and ever.

These things should not only be an encouragement, but a solemn call to us, all, to be at our posts, and to persevere in the good work which we have so happily begun—to exert our every endeavour, to disseminate throughout the land, the saving truths of the Gospel, and the knowledge of the doctrines and discipline of our Apostolic Church—that, we may be all led to worship God in unity, and with our heart, and our voice, to praise his holy name—that we may all, laying aside every root of bitterness, "take sweet counsel together and walk in the house of God, as friends"—in that maternal Church, I say, in whose bosom we have been trained as children from first to last, and taught to live together in peace and love.—If any would it be for the Christian world, were we all to grow up, even as one family, under the fostering care of our Spiritual Mother, attending, and venerating her precepts, and in strict obedience to her commands.

The widely increased, and increasing field of action over which the venerable Society for the propagation of the Gospel has to extend her labours, and her care, imperatively calls upon us for a correspondent exertion of our own, that like warmth on our part, or indifference in a cause, which so intimately concerns us, both in time, and in eternity I may not discourage her—no—my friends—I hope better things—I hope to see all aroused—and to see the venerable founder of our Churches, and of our Missions, stimulated by our own labours in the cause of God and his Church—Happy am I, at our uniting in this Church Society, and thus extending to our brethren the hand of fellowship, and thus proving our seriousness and ardour, in the cause, in which, they have hitherto, so zealously and charitably laboured on our behalf.

But let me not conclude this address, without reminding you of an additional cause for thankfulness to the Society for the propagation of the Gospel in foreign parts—which has again made us partakers of its liberality in furnishing us with aid towards the support of a Curate for this parish, and now pays the annual sum of seventy five pounds for that purpose.—And also to the Society for promoting Christian knowledge our best thanks are due, for the handsome and liberal donation of three quarto books for divine Service, to Chamcook Chapel of ease—and of prayer books, Bibles, tracts &c.

All this calls upon those "who are strong" amongst us, "to consider the weak"—upon those, who are themselves blessed with a Church and its services, to come manfully and liberally forth, in extending aid, to those who are destitute of the benefit of a Christian Ministry, and those to whose lap a beneficent God has poured bountifully of this world's goods, not to forget that they are called on, "to do good and to distribute," knowing that "with such sacrifices God is well pleased," & that if they have largely reaped spiritual, they should as a rightly disposed temporal things—they are called upon, to unite with all their heart in every work and labour of love, in spreading Gospel truth, and furnishing the means where such are wanted, of public prayer and preaching that the ignorant and the unwary, may not be left to the erring direction of private judgment, least in the want of a regular Ministry they may be led to forsake their nursing Mother, and blown about with every wind of doctrine hew out for themselves broken cisterns.

My friends and brethren—May grace be with you all—that you may abound in every good word and work—and finally, be partakers of heaven's everlasting joys—through Jesus Christ.

Resolved—that while we continue to regard the Church Society, with the most lively interest, as in the highest degree conducive to the advancement of the Church, we deeply lament that the distressing pecuniary pressure which still exists, prevents the payment of subscriptions by many, who would, under other circumstances, be most ready to support it.—And, that consequently the amount to be remitted this year, must be much less, than we could otherwise wish.

Moved by Capt. Smith, and seconded by J. W. Chandler Esq. Resolved—that our best thanks are due to the Venerable Society, for the propagation of the gospel in Foreign parts, for the liberal grant of £75 Sterling annually towards the support of the curate of this Parish.

Moved by the Rev. Thos. McGhee—seconded by Mr. John Parkinson. Resolved—that our sincere thanks are due to the Venerable Society for promoting Christian knowledge for the handsome gift of three quarto books for divine Service, to Chamcook Chapel of ease, and also for a further grant of books and tracts.

Moved by Dr. Gore, and seconded by Thomas T. Wye Esq. Resolved—that J. W. Chandler and Geo. D Street Esqs. be lay Deputies from this Parish, to the General Meeting to be held at Fredericton, on Wednesday and Thursday the 7th and 8th of February next, and that they do recommend that a grant be made towards putting a tower on the Chapel of ease at Chamcook, with the usual grant of books and tracts.

Moved by Wm. Garnett Esq., and seconded by Capt. Smith. Resolved—that the proceedings of this day be published, in the St. Andrews Standard.

Six Days later from Europe!

By the arrival of the packet ship, Burgundy at New York, from Havre, on the evening of the 31st inst. dates to the 9th ult. have been received.

The London papers announce the arrival of the Overland Mail. To the details of the events already known of the Punjab, is added the murder of Saroun Hurrah Gombai Sing. An army of fifty thousand men had assembled on the Satlege. The State of Siam remains in the same condition. The news from China is down to the 25th August, but is unimportant.

The colony of Hong Kong makes little progress. Disease is decimating the European troops—two officers and forty four soldiers of the 55th regt. having died during the months of June and July. The restrictions imposed as to the employment of pilots on the river exist no longer. The captain can take any pilot he pleases, provided the pilot has a license.

The London Standard, speaking of letters from China, received by the India Mail says,—"Exporters to China have acted imprudently in crowding upon the markets such an abundance of articles as to lower the price of all in the market."

FRANCE.—We learn that the Duc D'Aumale has embarked for Algiers.

There is much speculation in the French papers upon the forthcoming opening of the Chambers, and also upon the movements of the Duke of Bordeaux, in London. They remark that some of the distinguished aristocracy of England are visitors at his Hotel in Belgrave Square. They even say that the Queen visited Sir Robert Peel, to avoid receiving him officially, and so as not to give him an affront. The Duke was expected to leave London on the 15th December, a few days after which the Queen would return.

The Augsburg Gazette of Dec. 2nd, says, "letters received from Constantinople to night, say that the Pasha of Soudan has been poisoned by order of Mehemet Ali, and also that there have been some disorders in Syria."

A new Ministerial revolution has taken place in Turkey.

SPAIN.—By a telegraphic despatch from Bayonne, news was received from Spain to the 4th of Decr. The most important item of intelligence is a confirmation of the overthrow of Olozaga, the Spanish Prime Minister, who had been in office but two weeks.

In consequence of the opposition evinced by the Cortes towards Olozaga, the latter person attempted to force from the Queen, on 28th Nov. a decree dissolving the Cortes. Her Majesty next day announced to the Cortes the high handed procedure of the Minister, and stated that, after having shut her up in an apartment, he had forced her to give him her hand to sign the decree: she now threw herself upon the protection of the Cortes, and on 29th Nov. a decree was issued announcing the deposition of Olozaga, and the confiscation of his property.

Advices from Madrid of the last named date state that the Queen on that day called the officers of the Courts around her, and consulted with them upon the formation of a new ministry. Don Pedro Pidal and Gen. Serrano were entrusted with the organization of the new ministry.

Olozaga denies that he intends insult to the Queen, and hurls back the charge upon his enemies, asserting it to be the result of conspiracy, intrigue, and hate against him.

A proposition of impeachment against Olozaga was carried by a vote of 79 to 75.

We have this week the melancholy duty to perform of recording the loss of another vessel, the brig *Sterling* and the whole crew, which sailed hence on the 2nd Decr., and regret to learn that among the lives lost is that of Robert Starkey, son of Mr. James Starkey of this town, a young man of much promise. The following particulars are copied from the *Yarmouth Herald*.

MELANCHOLY SHIPWRECK.—Capt. Murphy, of brig *Manfred*, arrived yesterday, re-

ports—on the 25th Decr., lat. 39 49, long. 67 39, fell in with the wreck of the brig *Sterling*, of this port, water logged and dismantled; boarded her, and found every thing gone off deck—boats, hatches, cambouse-house, and most of her bulwarks; and under a shelter erected with boards across the bows, found four dead bodies and part of the carcass of a dog. The bodies appeared to have been in that state for some days. It being near night, and the wind freshening, Capt. M. could make no further discovery.

The *Sterling* was owned by Raeburn Clements, Esq., and sailed hence for the West Indies about five weeks ago. The following are the names of the officers and crew, so far as we have been able to learn—Evelyn Robbins, master; Reuben G. Clements, mate; John McCarthy, John Wilson, (coloured,) Charles Munro (do.) Seamen, and 2 others, whose names we have not ascertained.

ADDRESS TO THE REV. A. MACLEAN, D.D.—The Rev. Dr. MacLean having intimated his intention of visiting his native country for a few months and leaving here on Monday last—Several of the Elders, Trustees and Members of his Congregation waited on the Rev. Doctor on Saturday evening and presented the following Address—which with the reply, we have great pleasure in inserting—

To the Rev. ALEXANDER MACLEAN, D.D. Pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Saint Andrews, New Brunswick.

Having learned, that it is your intention during the present season to visit Great Britain, we, the undersigned, Elders, Trustees, and Members of your Congregation, embrace this occasion to express to you the deep interest we feel in every thing connected with your welfare and happiness. We reflect with satisfaction, and gratitude to the Giver of all good, upon the many valuable and important services which for a series of years, you have been instrumental in rendering to the cause of religion generally; but more particularly to that position of Christ's Church, which is situated in this community. By the blessing of God, the piety, orthodoxy, talents, learning, and perseverance, which you have uniformly displayed in the faithful discharge of your ministerial duties, have, we conceive, been efficient in "convincing and converting sinners," and in "building them up in holiness and comfort through faith unto salvation."

While we regret your temporary retirement from the pastoral charge of this Congregation, and the unavoidable blank in our religious society that for a time will consequently be made,—it affords us unfeigned pleasure to know, that under permission of Divine Providence, you will enjoy an opportunity of revisiting your native land, and of again mingling with Relatives and Friends, whom a long absence has rendered doubly dear.

In bidding you for the present farewell, permit us to express our sincere hope and prayer, that your voyage may be favourable,—your visit pleasant,—and that, with a speedy and safe return, God in his mercy may grant you renewed grace and spiritual strength, increased zeal and energy in the cause of Christ, and a continual blessing in your person, family, and public ministrations. To which the Rev. Doctor made the following reply—To the Elders, Trustees, and Members of the Presbyterian Church, in Saint Andrews, New Brunswick.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—On the Eve of an intended visit to my native country,—the first, since I was called from it, many years ago to be your Pastor—it is gratifying beyond my power of expression, to receive the cordial and felicitous address which you are pleased to present to me. The spirit which pervades it, of dependence on, and thankfulness to, God as the giver of all good, encourages me to hope, that "though I was with you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling," yet I have "not laboured in vain" during my ministrations. If I know any thing of my own heart, my prime desire, endeavour, and delight has been, in dependence on Divine aid, to "declare to you all the counsel of God," without adding thereto, or diminishing therefrom; to instruct the ignorant; to comfort the mourner; to reclaim the wicked; to comfort the mourner; and edify and build up the saints in their most holy faith. But O how far short have I come of my duty. Soothing to my soul as is the indulgent expression of your approbation; yet, I am deeply conscious of defects in character and derelictions in practice, which your partiality has induced you kindly to overlook, but the retrospection of which effects me with shame and confusion of face.

While at a distance from you and my family, I shall need—but not need to ask—your prayers. For I feel assured that the lowliest Christian whom I have sought to benefit, or possibly whom I have neglected, will freely accord them to me; and may this be the instrument of averting from me an evil, or procuring for me a good, whose magnitude neither of us can in this world comprehend. "As for me, God forbid that I should sin against the Lord in ceasing to pray for you."

Your good wishes to myself personally I cordially and gratefully reciprocate. And should gracious Providence permit us again to meet, I humbly trust it may be in the continued fellowship and power and hope of Christ's Gospel.

"Now God himself and our Father, and our Lord Jesus Christ direct our way—and the Lord make you to increase and abound in love one toward another and toward all men, even as we do toward you.—To the

end he may establish your hearts unblameable in holiness before God even our Father, at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, with all his saints."

CHARLOTTE COUNTY

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The annual Meeting of the above Society, was held at the Town Hall, on Tuesday the 9th instant, Dr. Frye the President, took the Chair at 12 o'clock. The different Committees reported their decisions to the Chair, and we regret that we can only find room for the Report of the Committee on Grain,—which we give in full, as being of the most importance.

The Committee of the Charlotte County Agricultural Society appointed to examine the specimens of grain exhibited, present the following REPORT:

That they have inspected Six Samples of Wheat, five of Barley, and two of Oats—That the parcels of Wheat marked

No 1 weighs	60 pounds per Bushel
no 2 "	62 do.
no 3 "	61 do.
no 4 "	61 1/2 do.
no 5 "	60 1/2 do.
no 6 "	61 1/2 do.

That the Barley marked

No 1 weighs	51lb. per Bushel
no 2 "	52 do.
no 3 "	50 do.
no 4 "	51 3/4 do.
no 5 "	49 3/4 do.

That the Oats marked

No 1 weighs	40lb. per Bushel
no 2 "	39 do.

That the Wheat marked number 2 is entitled to the highest price—that numbers four and six being of equal weight, number four being of the best quality is entitled to the second price, and number six to the third. All the specimens of Wheat are excellent.

That the Barley marked number two has the advantage in weight, but number four is of better quality. The Committee therefore recommend that the prices of these two samples should be equalized, and that sample marked number one should draw the third price. All the Barley is of excellent quality, and the sample marked number five would have weighed one and a half pounds more per Bushel had it been properly cleaned.

That the Oats marked number one are entitled to the first price, but the specimen marked number two, weighing only 39 pounds per Bushel, is too light for the Society's rules of competition.

In conclusion the Committee beg to remark that the quantity and appearance of the Wheat and Barley are excellent, but the Oats are much inferior to those exhibited last year.

Hon. Col. Wyer handed in the report of the Committee on domestic manufactured cloth, awarding the 1st Premium on Woolen Cloth to Mrs. D. Mowat. Second do. to Israel Peaks of the Parish of St. James. The third do. to Mrs. Thos. Sime. The first Premium on Cotton and Wool Cloth to Mrs. H. O'Neil; the second do. to John Lochary; the third do. to Mrs. Joseph Walton.

Mr. Joseph Walton reported only two premiums on implements of Husbandry both to John Fortune of this town, viz the first for Hay Rakes, and the second only for Sythe Snaeths, the best being of an inferior description, not being considered entitled to the first. After those reports had been disposed of, and several new members proposed, the Secretary read the following Report:—

TWENTY FOURTH REPORT OF THE

C. C. AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The natural tendency of science is to advance; but in its onward course, it is ever liable to have its periods of activity and repose. Probably, no branch of science has experienced these fluctuations, within the last few years, in a greater degree, than Agriculture.

At the time of the formation of this Society, attention to the importance of Agricultural improvement had been elicited, in Nova Scotia, by the writings of *Agricola*; and, certainly, an impulse was thereby given to the cause, which was not confined to that Province; and it may, here, be remarked, that not only the meritorious of that writer, but the benefits derived from his writings, have been greatly overlooked, and, in some instances, undervalued.

It may be observed, that the objects of the individuals, who originated this institution, were to diffuse a knowledge of the state of Agricultural Science; to encourage practical improvement; to stimulate cultivators of the soil, to aim at a professional standing, more honorable to themselves, and useful to the country; and, in the meantime, to follow in the rear, by diligent and successive moves, till they could attain the elevation, on which their brethren of other countries, then stood.

However short of this desirable goal we may have attained, and however defective we may still be, in our farming manipulations, compared with those, whom, it was our ambition to emulate; we find, on a sudden, that a revolution, in the whole science, has intervened; and that a light is shining, which dissipates much of that, for which we were labouring, and, at once, points the way, to a

sure equality of competition, with the cultivators of all countries.

In order, however, to profit by this great revolution, it becomes imperative to be up and doing; to read, and circulate the best scientific and periodical works; and to urge agriculturists, to put their hands to this new power; to look forward, and, unhesitatingly, to persevere, in the course before them.

Fortunately, the too common declamation against our climate, as unfit for the production of grain; and that this part of the continent can never become a bread-country; has been met by facts, shewing, that the prejudice is without foundation. This year, a gain, has nearly 50 bushels of wheat been produced, on one acre of land, in the immediate vicinity of the Town—proving that where the soil is properly drained, and justice done in the mode of preparation for the crop, that the yield, in two successive years, has been equal to that of the richest districts, in the best wheat growing climates.

The President and Directors have the satisfaction to report, on a review of the past season, that the crops may be rated at a fair average, notwithstanding the injury done to Potatoes, from excessive rains, excepting, however, turnips, which, in several instances, were a partial failure; but, in every probability, arising from causes, that might be guarded against. It is however to be regretted, that the turnip seed, ordered by the Society, did not arrive; as it is of the first importance, that the seed should be of prime quality, as well as, that the land be properly drained, manured, and prepared; and—that the seed be sown judiciously.

To facilitate the necessary process of sowing turnip seed, the Board procured several specimens of drill barrows to be made; some of which were in season to be of much service, and are now ready, at a reasonable price, for the coming Spring.

In the present state of our agricultural deficiencies, improved implements of husbandry are amongst the foremost; and, with pure seeds, and approved breeds of stock, are much wanted, and called for; but the Board have been prevented, from carrying into effect these, and other important measures, from the continued disappointment, in not receiving the Provincial grants, for the last two years; the special reasons for which are unknown, as no answer has been received, from Head Quarters, to the two last applications, made on behalf of the Society. The Board was, therefore, unable to do more, beyond the usual importations, than, to continue the bounty on Lime, with a small premium, on a few articles of domestic manufacture; and to secure, by purchase and competition, a few samples of the best grain for seed.

The grass seed, ordered from the usual quarter, arrived in good order, and proved of fair quality, but so late, that many had to procure their seed, from other sources.

A good supply of Plough mountings arrived in due time, and are now on hand at reduced prices.

It was found necessary to dispose of the Durham Bull, although at a great loss; but the Berkshire Boar has been loaned to the farmers, in the upper part of St. David, and St. Patrick, where his services were wanted.

It will be seen, by the Treasurer's account, that the disbursements of the Society are far more circumscribed, than for many years past, and the Board regret, that so few agriculturists join the Society, or contribute, in any manner, to forward its objects; especially, as a general co-operation would so strengthen its hands, as to enable it to do much, that, otherwise, cannot be done; and, at the same time, add a moral force, and influence, to its operations, that would greatly increase its value to the country.

What its seeming disaffection may arise from is difficult to determine, unless it be, from a supposition, that it would be better, to have the Committee located in a rural district, or sub-divided into parochial districts; but whatever may be the reasons, it is highly desirable, that they may be preferred, and the best means taken, to unite all in the great cause, and in such way, as may be deemed most conducive, to the interests of agriculturists, identified, as they undoubtedly are, with those of the community at large.

The same view continues to be entertained, of the importance of a model farm, or farms, as was recommended, in a former Report of this Society; the benefits of which are deemed to be too multifarious, to be entered upon here, and perhaps also, too prominent, to need minute replication.

The Board are gratified to state, in conclusion, that the Agriculture of the County has made considerable advances, in general improvement; that Farmers are becoming, more and more, sensible of the importance of their calling; of the need they have of information; and of the great advantages to be obtained, by the introduction of selected breeds of Stock; of improved implements of husbandry, and modes of cultivation; and the public are much more aware of the paramount importance of agricultural production to the aggregate amount of production from all other sources; and it is not doubted, but that legislators are, also, more impressed with the absolute necessity of fostering, and encouraging, Agriculture, in every way, in which its productions can be extended, and its interests secured; and, should they thus, wisely persevere in the prospect of his view; in developing fundamental resources; it may be assumed, that they will not fail to hasten, both, Agricultural and general prosperity; do honor to themselves, and merit the approbation, and gratitude of their Country.

The Hon. Col. Wyer, moved the acceptance of the report which was seconded by John Wilson Esqr. and carried accordingly.

The Hon. Col. Hatch, John Wilson, Esqr., and several other persons addressed the meeting (which was very numerous), in forcible terms,—expressing their gratification on seeing so many samples of superior grain, competing for a preference and urging every person who felt an interest in the prosperity of the Country, to come forward and lend their aid in promoting its Agricultural interest.

The President having resigned the Chair, David Mowat, Esq. was requested to take the same, when the following officers were elected for the ensuing year; Viz: Dr. Frye, President, the Hon. Col. Hatch and the Hon. Col. Wyer, Vice Presidents, Wellington Hatch, Esq. Treasurer, Mr. D. D. Morrison, Secretary.

Committee—Messrs. Joseph Walton, Thos. Sime, C. R. Hatheway, Thos. Turner, David Mowat, Henry O'Neil, J. Lochary, Samuel Getty and John McCurdy.

The President having resumed the Chair, Resolved on motion of A. W. Smith that the thanks of this meeting be given to D. Mowat, Esq. for his gentlemanly conduct in the Chair.

At Six o'clock a numerous and respectable Party sat down to Dinner at Driscoll's Hotel. The President Dr. Frye, presided, ably assisted by the Vice Presidents as cropers. It is sufficient to say, that the Dinner and Wines were good. After the cloth had been removed, the President after congratulating the Society on the present improved state of Agriculture in the Country, observed that the light which Science was shedding abroad, rendered still greater exertions requisite and necessary and which he hoped would be continued, gave the Day we celebrate, being the 24th Anniversary of this Society, Her Majesty the Queen, Prince Albert and the Royal Family, The Army and Navy. The Govr. General of British North America followed in rapid succession. The latter having been prefaced by a few pertinent remarks by the President was received with great applause, drunk standing with three times three and one cheer more. Our worthy Lieutenant-Governor, Sir Wm. Colebrooke, Lord Falkland and our Sister Province of Nova Scotia. The noble Duke of Wellington and the 33d Regt. which he had formerly commanded, was drunk with every sentiment of respect. Lieut. Lacey returned thanks for the last toast, in a neat and appropriate speech. Sir Robert Peel, Lady Colebrooke, and the fair Daughters of New Brunswick. The Integrity of the British Empire were likewise drunk with marked applause. The Legislative Council, and the House of Assembly followed, both the Honorable Members of the former replied, giving a full and concise view of the present posture of affairs. Mr. Brown followed on the part of the House, commenting on the various causes which had led to the embarrassments and Public debt which existed, expressing a hope, that by prudence and economy, the credit of the Province, would be fully restored, the debt paid off, and the affairs of the Country set right, and prosperity prevail over the Land, in concluding he alluded to the recommendation in the Society's Report of "Model Farms," and observed that the Town Plat of St. Andrews and vicinity, was one continued Model Farm which had happily been brought about by the exertions of this Society.

Mr. Turner proposed the health of the Rev. Dr. MacLean, who he observed had filled a very important station in Society, for the last twenty years, and was now about to visit his native Country. The Rev. Gentleman returned thanks for the kind manner in which his health had been proposed, and drank, and observed that he hoped he should be able to remove some misapprehensions which seemed to exist in Scotland, with respect to the capabilities of this Province; particularly with his own friends, some of which were influential. One fact he could state, he had raised the past season, from twelve bushels of seed, planted on less than two thirds of an acre of ground, upwards of three hundred bushels of Potatoes. The Hon. Mr. Hatch proposed the health of the Venerable President, and observed that only a very few of those who originated the Society, remained to realize the objects then contemplated; of those few the President was one, who had continued for twenty five years to exert himself in the good cause, and for sixteen years to preside over its deliberations, and to direct its energies, and who by his great wisdom, moderation, and conciliatory disposition, was not only a blessing to society generally, but of essential service to that Society. The President replied in a very feeling manner, assuring those around him, of his anxiety to do justice to the soil and climate of the country, fully convinced, that it was capable of affording all the substantial comforts of life in abundance. Mr. Joseph Walton proposed the health of the Vice President, observing in his humorous way that he had known them since they were small boys, and he hoped they would long continue to exert themselves for the good of the Country.

Many other sentiments were given which we cannot find space for, among others the Bench of New Brunswick was given and warmly responded to. The land we live in was given, and a Loaf of Bread produced by Col. Hatch, the growth and manufacture of the Province, which would challenge comparison with that from any other Quarter. Several good and appropriate songs were sung, and the company separated, at an early hour—apparently as determined to exert themselves in the cause of Agriculture as on the first formation of the Society. "Speed the Plough."
