It has been decided out of respect of the wishes of the deceased not to drape the Senate Chamber as heavily as war at first intended. Maynard Rogers has been assigned the task with instructions to use more bunting than crape. No eatafalque will be erected, but the very simplest arrangements possible made. The Memory of the Dead Premier is Honored,

And a Public Funeral Unanimously

Ottawa, June 8.—The sessions of the Houses of Parliament this afternoon will remain long in the memories of those who were in the Chambers. The first of the public demonstrations by which his country will pay honor to the dead statesman were made in the utterance of both Houses and the resolutions of regret that were adopted. The scene in the Commons was impressive with a solemn mourning suited to the dignity of that body. The splendid Chamber was sorrowful with black draperies under whose sombre folds the rows of black-coated members sat in unusual quietness. The black covering over the clerk's table fell upon the green carpeted floor on either side, and around the galleries and over the Speaker's chair death's decoration hung. The bars of glorious colors shot by the sun through the stained glass windows crossed the gloomy draperies with strange effect. The chair in which the dead Premier sat and his desk were covered with black cashmere. The deak from behind which he had led the House for almost a quarter of a century bore to-day a shield of white lilies and veil roses, on which The Sit of Sub-Reschald Chris, Machesolad Chris,

the mortal remains of the Right Hon. Sir John Macdonald, G.C.B., should be publicly interred, and that this House will concur in giving to the ceremony a fitting degree of solemnity and importance.

The speech of the Liberal leader was perfect in the nicety with which it expressed the bonor in which the memory of a great political opponent may be regarded. It was full of a generous estimation of the qualities that made the late Premier's greatness in his country. But one understood that under the chivalrous tribute, and delicately, respectfully withdrawn from the present occasion, were the convictions which made the crator the political opponent of him whom he now honored. The speech was delivered with a calinness, a dignity and a sympathy of tone that accorded with the occasion. There were not the intrepid flashes of strong feeling, the bursts of brilliance by which at other times Mr. Laurier's oratory is illuminated, but the strength of the leader was in his manner, the nobility of the statesman and patriot in the appreciation, the honor it paid one who, whatever may be said of means and methods, was a substantial factor in Canada's growth.

Mr. Davin, than whom the Government benches have no one abler to do justice to such an occasion, made a eulogy of his late leader. It spoke the admiration and attachment of the Conservative party, and was a crystallization of the deep regard in which by his followers the chieftain was held. The motion was agreed to.

There followed a short discussion with regard to the formation of a new Cabinet, and after the order of the House for calling Michael Connolly to the bar at 4 o'clock was made for next Tuesday the House adjourned after a session of only three-quarters of an hour.

INLAND NAVIGATION.

If so, how many days must clapse before I should be safe in paying the carpenter for the work? Yours respectfully,

[The lumber merchant has a lien for the price of the lumber, of which he must

price of the lumber, of which he must notify you within 30 days after furnishing it. This lien attaches on the contract price, and subject to priority of liens for wages payment of it can be enforced against you to the extent of such part of the price actually or by law required to be remaining in your hands, and also to the extent of any part of it paid to the carpenter for the purpose of defeating the heir. You are by law bound to retain for the period of 30 days after the completion of the contract 15 per cent. of the price when it does not exceed \$1,000, 12½ per cent. when over \$1,000 and not exceeding \$5,000, and 10 per cent. in other cases.— Editor Advertiser.]

London, Tuesday, June 9.

THE DEAD STATESMAN. As announced by the ADVERTISER bulle tin a few minutes after the melancholy event, Sir John A. Macdonald died at Ottawa on Saturday evening at 10:15, aged 76 years and 4 months. The stirring events in the long public career of the dead leader have already been detailed in these columns. It is perhaps unnecessary to say that with many points in the policy of Sir John Macdenald and with many of the methods which he and his associates choose to carry their ends, we have had no sympathy; but we have had no hesitation in acknowledging his great powers in managing men and moulding them to his way of thinking. No other man in Can-adian public life has had so distinct a personality, and no other man has ever controlled and welded into a compact following elements so diverse. In these respects Sir John Macdonald was a truly wonderful man. Of the effects of his rule, and how far it conserved the best interests of the people, this is not the proper time to speak. We do not loubt that the historian will do the dead statesman full justice, and that is all that sither political friend or political antagonist can desire. At present, the one marked fact that is forced on the country is that a master hand in statecraft-th all-controlling mind in the Conservative party-is gone, and with his departure new era is about to dawn.

PERSECUTIONS OF THE JEWS. The persecutions to which 5,000,000 resident Jews are now being subjected in Russia is the astoundingly brutal climax of the the Christian era down to the present time. A few years after the crucifixion of the Saviour they were persecuted by Caligula and banished from Rome by Claudius. In 1,100,000 Jews perished. At various times they were persecuted and massacred by the Romans, until 655, when Jerusalem was captured by Omar, and a number of European powers joined the army of perseeutors. In 1020 Canute banished them from his realm. In 1204, under King John, Jews of both sexes were imprisoned, and their eyes and teeth plucked out. In 1278 they were accused of olipping coin, and 267 were hanged and quartered. Twelve years later all Jews were banished from England, and were not allowed to return till the days of Cromwell. In 1603 Pope Sixtus launched edicts against them. In 1840 they were persecuted at Damascus In 1852 there was a violent outbreak against them in Stockholm; in 1864 the scene of their persecution was in Rome. and in 1866 it was changed to Bucharest. In 1881 they suffered violent persecution in Southern Russia, and now, despite of Europe's horrified protest, throughout the Russian empire cities and provinces are being forcibly cleared of them. It is difficult to give even an imperfect

idea of the impression these wholesale atrocities is producing through all Europe. Russia is not a remote country from England. It can be reached by 30 hours' trave from London, and the occurance of these me dieval barbarities so near the heart of civil-Ization is bringing English blood to boiling point. Berlin is already overwhelmed by pretched destitute Jews driven on a day's actice from their homes and swarming westward without any idea of what is to be me of them. Most harrowing stories are fold of these unfortunates. For weeks past in Moscow strong police and gendarme patrols have so patrols have scoured the city night after night; here and there a house where Jows live is surrounded, young and old are start ed out of sleep and dragged from their beds, and every corner is searched lest comeone be in hiding. If the birth certifi-sate of father and grandfather be wanting, and a person has only papers granting right of domicile, he must sign a document pledging himself to leave Moscow in three days. In many instances families

have been driven with clubbed muskets from their peaceful homes. What is already known exceeds in its terrors the worst that could be imagined, and if Russia's savage threat is fulfilled that this persecution sha be stretched to cover 500,000 people, the outcome will make as black and awful a mark upon the history of this century a the French revolution did in the last.

Europe stands aghast at what is being brutally wrought before its eyes. That it may be forced to interfere seems probable but how, when, and under what form of pretext it is impossible to foretell.

NOT ENDED YET. The Briggs case in the United States Presbyterian Church has entered on a new and important phase. At the meeting of the General Assembly it was claimed by the fathers and brethren that the Assembly had a right to veto the transfer of Prof. A. Briggs from the chair of Hebrew to the of Biblical theology in the Union Theological 'Seminary in New York. The ground of objection was that Dr. Briggs was a little too much of a free lance in his criticism of the standards of the Church. The directors of Union Theological Seminary have now met and passed a reso lution adhering to Dr. Briggs' transfer, and declaring the interference of the Assembly usurpation. This is a declaration tha

the appointment will stand. The theological battle will thus be resumed at the next meeting of the Assembly.

TRAVEL ABOVE AND BELOW. A movement is on foot to establish underground railways in New York city, and a discussion has been precipitated as to the relative merits and popularity of the underground and elevated railway systems. There can be no doubt that the underground railway system of London affords a popular and expeditious means of travel throughout the city, but it is by no means as pleasant for the traveler as a ride on an elevated line is. Elevated railways are, however, out of the question in the British metropolis. For one reason the streets are not sufficiently wide, and for another the authorities would never allow the thorough fares to be occupied by the unsightly tracks, or the peace of the inhabitants to be disturbed by the rush of the traffic. So careful are the metropolitan authorities of the public interests that they do not even low street car tracks to cut up the smooth payement of the streets in the city of Lonon proper. This is a necessary precaution the vehicular traffic is so great. In New York city, however, the speculative capitalists who look after the convenience of the traveling public have things more their own way. They run street cars even on crowded Broadway, they have elevated railways throughout the length and breadth of the city, and now they are about to provide a system of underground railways cities grow so fast that new agencies for getting around easily are consequently required. In London, the establishment of underground railways does not appear to have at all reduced the 'bus and hackney carriage traffic.

A HINT TO CHEESEMAKERS. The ADVERTISER has not failed from time to time to impress upon patrons of cheese factories the necessity for absolute cleanliness at every step in the production and care of the milk till it is placed on the actory wagon. But all the blame does no lie with the "rascally patrons." Prof. Robertson told the Eastern Association last winter that one great trouble with the industry was that factories were not kept long series of sufferings which they have en- clean enough. Every article in and about dured at the hands of various powers from the factory should be kept clean. Referring to this subject in Eastern Ontario one of th inspectors says: "The filthy condition of a few factories is really surprising. * * Some weighing cans and floors are scrubbed only once or twice a week." This is an excellent likeness of Sir John as he looked last winter before his illness, and the delicate shading and expression which is reproduced in copper medium, and is entirely lost in photography, makes the portrait of Canada's greatest personality very much more valuable than an ordinary photograph.

THE NEW YORK school commissioners have decided that female teachers must in future use their proper names, and not sign themselves "Mellie," when they mean Mary, "Teenie," when they really are named Christina, and so on. This is right. The abbreviated, pet name absurdity countenanced by grown persons in public and other positions has gone much too far. Besides, two of the four have taken refuge in the Senate, and are therefore out of touch with the popular element in the constituencies. 111

THE DEAD STATESMAN. As announced by the ADVERTISER bulletin a few minutes after the melancholy event, Sir John A. Macdonald died at Ottawa on Saturday evening at 10:15, aged authorities would never allow the thorough 76 years and 4 months. It is perhaps unnecessary to say that with many points in the policy of Sir allow street car tracks to cut up the smooth John Macdonald and with many of the pavement of the streets in the city of Lonmethods which he and his associates choose to carry their ends, we have had no sympathy; but we have had no hesitation in acknowledging his great powers in managing men and moulding them to his way of thinking. No other man in Can-adian public life has had so distinct a railways throughout the length and breadth personality, and no other man has ever controlled and welded into a compact following elements so diverse. In these respects Sir John Macdonald was a truly wonderful man. Of the effects of his rule, and how far it conserved the best interests of the people, this is not the proper time to speak. We do not loubt that the historian will do the dead statesman full justice, and that is all that sither political friend or political antagonist can desire. At present, the one marked fact that is forced on the country is that a master hand in statecraft—the all-controlling mind in the Conservative party-is gone, and with his departure new era is about to dawn.

PERSECUTIONS OF THE JEWS. The persecutions to which 5,000,000 resi-

dent Jews are now being subjected in Russia is the astoundingly brutal climax of the the Christian era down to the present time. A few years after the crucifixion of the Saviour they were persecuted by Caligula and banished from Rome by Claudius. In 1,100,000 Jews perished. At various times they were persecuted and massacred by the Romans, until 655, when Jerusalem was captured by Omar, and a number of European powers joined the army of perse-eutors. In 1020 Canute banished them from his realm. In 1204, under King John, Jews of both sexes were imprisoned, and their eyes and teeth plucked out. In 1278 they were accused of clipping coin, and 267 were hanged and quartered. Twelve years later all Jews were banished from England, and were not allowed to return till the days of Cromwell. In 1603 Pope Sixtus launched edicts against them. In 1840 they were persecuted at Damascus; in 1852 there was a violent outbreak against them in Stockholm; in 1864 the scene of their persecution was in Rome and in 1866 it was changed to Bucharest. In 1881 they suffered violent persecution in Southern Russia, and now, despite of Europe's horrified protest, throughout the Russian empire cities and provinces are being forcibly cleared of them. It is difficult to give even an imperfect

idea of the impression these wholesale atrocities is producing through all Europe. Russia is not a remote country from England. It can be reached by 30 hours' travel from London, and the occurance of these me-dieval barbarities so near the heart of civiltzation is bringing English blood to boiling Berlin is already overwhelmed by pretched destitute Jews driven on a day's notice from their homes and swarming westward without any idea of what is to be come of them. Most harrowing stories are cold of these unfortunates. For weeks past in Moscow strong police and gendarme patrols have scoured the city night after sight; here and there a house where Jows live is surrounded, young and old are startsed out of sleep and dragged from their beds, and every corner is searched lest comeone be in hiding. If the birth certifisate of father and grandfather be wanting, and a person has only papers granting right of domicile, he must sign a document pledging himself to leave Moscow in three days. In many instances families

have been driven with clubbed muskets from their peaceful homes. What is already known exceeds in its terrors the worst that could be imagined, and if Russia's savage threat is fulfilled that this persecution shall be stretched to cover 500,000 people, the outcome will make as black and awful a mark upon the history of this century a the French revolution did in the last.

Europe stands aghast at what is being brutally wrought before its eyes. That it may be forced to interfere seems probable but how, when, and under what form of present it is impossible to foretell.

H. Tilley, Hon. J. H. Pope, Hon. Mackenzie Bowell, Hon. Alex. Campbell, Hon. J. C. Aikins, Hon. L. H. Langevin, Hon. L. F. G. Baby, Hon. L. F. R. Masson, Hon. R. D. Wilmot. Some of these statesmen are dead, some are on the bench, others have retired to private life. SEISMIC SHOCKS.

A Series of Earthquakes in Italy-

Several Persons Killed.

Rome, June 8.—The cities of Verona and Mantua, Italy, were shaken by an earthquake yesterday. Many houses were damaged. An invalid lady was so badly frightened by the shock that she died. Lombardy, Venetia and part of Tuscany were also visited. The worst shocks occurred about 2 in the morning. Shocks were also felt in Venice and Milan. The center of the disturbance was at Verona. A subterranean noise was heard like the roar of artillery which was followed by three strong shocks. The inhabitants rushed into the streets in terror. At Mardenigo three persons were killed, and at Badia Calavera seventeen persons were badly injured by falling houses and chimneys. At the latter place another shock was feit at 8 o'clock in the morning, and much additional damage was done. The movements were undulating in character, and were more or less over the whole of North Italy.

ROME, June 8.—Advices from Badia, Calavena and Tregnamro, two of the towns in northern Italy visited by earthquake yesterday, show that the inhabitants are terror stricken and that they have taken to the fields for safety. The subterranean rumblings continue, and occasionally slighter shocks than those of yesterday are felt. The damage done at these two please is more treater.
