When the United States gunboat Hudson came up to the government dock at 8 o'clock this morning, the bodies of several men were lying or her after deck. They were the remains of Ensign W. Bagley, and three others of the crew of the torpedo boat Winslow, who were killed in an engagement in Cardenas harbor yesterday afternoon. The bodies were covered by the Stars and Stripes. In the cabin of the Hudson was Lieut. John B. Bernadow, of the Win-

left leg, and several others of the Winslow's crew, who are slightly The engagement took place inside the harbor of Cardenas. The cruiser Wilmington, the torpedo boat Winslow and the gunboat Hudson were the only vessels engaged. They entered the harbor for the purpose of attacking some Spanish gunboats which were known to be there. But the latter were not discovered by the American force until the Spaniards opened fire. The land batteries of Cardenas sup-

ported the fire of the Spanish gunboats. The engagement commenced at 2:04 p.m., and lasted for about one hour. The wounded are R. E. Cox, gunner's mate; D. McKeon, quarter-master; J. The workingman is already paying about twice as much as formerly for bread, and is beginning to get desperate. There you have the explanation of the risings that have been and are still taking place all over the country. They all indicate the spirit of desperation. With the people in this excited state it is a comparatively easy task for the Carlist and Republican political agitators to gain the acceptance of the most absurd theories. But the political aspect of the disturbances is only a minor one. Their real cause is the stern suffering, and the government with a united majority could bring the war to an end and be applauded.

According to one rumor on Monday night, at Naples & regiment flatly refused to obey orders to fire on the people. # The Death of

The Noted Lawyer Suffers Fatal Relapse.

Tributes to His Worth in the House of Commons,

By the Premier, Sir Charles Tupper and Mr. Wallace-Sketch of Mr. McCarthy's Career.

Toronto, Ont., May 12.-Dalton Mc-Carthy, Q.C., M.P., died suddenly shortly after 9 o'clock last night. Mr. McCarthy's death resulted from an accident, which occurred on Sunday evening. When driving in his dog cart to the Union station to take the train to Ottawa to attend his parliamentary duties, his horse became frightened and ran away. The vehicle was dashed against a telegraph pole, and Mr. Mc-Carthy and his coachman, Thomas Taylor, were thrown out with great violence. Mr. McCarthy did not relinguish the reins, and was dragged some distance. He was picked up unconscious, suffering from injuries in his head and side. He remained in a semiconscious condition most of Monday and Tuesday, with intervals of consciousness, when he recognized his family and one or two friends. A turn for the worse came Tuesday night, when acute pneumonia set in, which, with the serious injury to the lungs that had been sustained, threatened to prove fatal. Mr. McCarthy rallied yesterday morning, and the doctors spoke more hopefully of his chances of recovery than at any time since the accident. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon there was a relapse; but even at 8 o'clock the danger of death was not believed to be imminent. At 9 o'clock, however, Mr. McCarthy began to sink rapidly, and died in a few minutes.

in the United States have been constantly coming, and regret will be felt throughout the country at his death. Mr. McCarthy was born at Oakley Park, near Dublin, Ireland, on Oct. 10, 1836. His father was a solicitor of Dublin, and his grandfather was Bucknell Henry McCarthy, also a member of the Irish bar. Deceased came of an ancient Irish family. He was educated at Rev. Mr. Harnman's school at Blackrock; at Rev. Mr. Flynn's school, Dublin, and sons were arrested, 60 killed and 2,000 at the Barrie grammar school. When very young he emigrated to Canada. were killed at the main station of the Having completed his education, he entered upon the study of law. He was called to the bar of Upper Canada at Hilary term in 1859. At once he began to distinguish himself among brother members of the bar. He obtained the repute of being a diligent advocate, and as a consequence he soon found himself in possession of a handsome practice. In December, 1872, he was appointed a Queen's counsel. In the years 1872-74 he made his first attempt to get into parliament, and contested the seat for North Simcoe: but he was unsuccessful. On Dec. 14, 1876, however, his ambition was realized, and he was elected for Cardwell. In 1878 he consented to stand for North Simcoe again in the Conservative interest, and was elected. When he repudiated the Conservative platform his constituents remained faithful to him, and he was returned at every succeeding general election. In 1896 he was elected both for North Simcoe and Brandon, Man. Of late years he had been independent in politics, though always a leading figure in the house. He was a keen sportsman, a patron of the turf, and was president of the Toronto Country and Hunt Club. He was the head of the law firm of McCarthy. Osler, Hoskin & Creelman, of Toronto. Mr. McCarthy married in October, 1867, Emma Catharine, daughter of Edmund G. Lally, of Barrie, Ont. She died. and he married again, in July, 1873, Agnes Elizabeth, relict of Richard B. Bernard. 





The crew of the Winslow, however, never faltered for a second. But at 2:35 p.m. a solid shot crashed into the hull of the Winslow and knocked out her boiler. In an instant she began to roll and drift helplessly. Then there was a moment of awful suspense. ## WARLIKE ITINERANTS.

A Canadian Minister Extends to Them His Best Wishes.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 12.-An oldfashioned testimony meeting began the day at the Itinerants Club's session in Delaware Avenue Methodist Church. It was led by the Rev. George M. Harris, of Le Roy, and was participated in by many of the clergy. The programme proper began at 10 a.m., when President Merrill introduced Prof. George Whelpton, who spoke on "The Physiology of the Vocal Organs." Prof. Whelpton said he did not know of any class of men who abused their throats as much as do ministers. That arises from the great demands upon the men of the cloth. He advised economy in the use of the voice. He said 'clergyman's sore throat" is the result of abuse. A knowledge of the anatomy of the throat is useful to ministers. The structure of the vocal apparatus was described in an interesting way, and a good deal of good advice given to the ministers.

Another Canadian orator was introduced when Rev. J. Henderson, D. D., of Toronto, was announced to speak on 'Who Ought to Support Christian Missions?" "One has just to come over the line these days," said the lecturer "to discover that the all-absorbing topic here is the war. But one has not to cross the line to discover that the Canadians are jubilant over the success of the Stars and Stripes. There are thousands of young Canadians anxious to enlist. There is a solidarity in the Anglo-Saxon race. Across the sea Ingland is praying that the outcome of the war may be that the fair daughter Columbia may take back her er-take back her saucy daughter. All England sympathizes with Ameri avoidable struggle between two distinct civilizations, the one humane, the other inhumane; the one representing democracy, the other proud tyranny. We Canadians hope that this war will wipe out every vestige of Spanish op-

> Mr. Henderson referred to Methodism as a mighty revival sweeping two continents. The spirit of Methodism is the revival spirit. This generation emphasizes reality more than rhetoric. It is an age when, instead of going to our theology to find our Christ, we go back to our Christ to find our theology. Every man who feels he is civilized should help support missions, for Christianity is the prime factor in civilization. At a missionary breakfast a native minister said, "I am glad to be here eating a breakfast with the missionaries instead of making a breakfast of the missionaries as our forefathers did.'




