CANADA OVER 7,000,000.

The rush of newcomers to Canada egan with the new century, and was not shown in the census of 1901. Consequently it will all go to swell the population figures in the next census, two years hence. For the year 1900-1 the total immigration was a little over 49,000. The following year it increased to 67,379, and continued to increase annually until 1907-8, when the highest point was reached-262,469. The year following there was a falling off. the figures for eleven months being 130,444, or about 142,000 for the year. Since 1901 nearly 1,200,000 people have settled in Canada, and it is estimated that in the two years before the next census will be taken the number will be increased to about a million and a half. With the addition of the natural increase, the census of 1911 ought to show a population of between seven and eight millions.





General Bell, however, has decided to remain here but a year longer and some time next spring probably will be transferred to Manila, where he will ave command of the troops stationed the Philippine archipelago.

The departure of General Bell from Washington will be unquestionably a serious loss to the military service and to the administration. His work as chief of staff has been of the highest character and has resulted in an increase in the efficiency of the entire

General Bell's Work Effective, General Bell was appointed to his present office when the general staff was in more or less nebulous condition. t had been inaugurated under Lieut.-Gen. S. B. M. Young, but that officer soon retired and the real work of organization and development occurred under General Bell. His display of interest in the war college, his introduction of reforms which eradicated de fects and cured evils have caused the army as a whole to express emphatic appreciation of his worth.

The work of General Bell was han dicapped, however, by the unsatisfac tory status of the general staff and the establishment by Congress of the office of adjutant-general, into which Major-General Fred Ainsworth was egislated. General Ainsworth has kept ais hands upon the paper work of the department, making it necessary for the general staff to run to him for documents, etc. There is no question of course, that the general staff should have precisely the same status as is in effect abroad; that is to say, all the oureaus of the war department should be subject to its control. 

Abdul Hamid Accepts His Fate, Calmly Declaring It the Will of Allah-To Be Kept Prisoner.

reign of Abdul Hamid II. ended today, Mahommedans who became Christians with his deposition, and the accession of his brother. Mehemmed Reschad Effendi, as Mehemmed V., a variation of "Mahomet," it being considered inappropriate to assume the precise name of the prophet.

Mehemmed is the 25th sovereign of Turkey, in male descent, of the house of Osman, the founder of the empire, and the 29th sultan since the conquest of Constantinople.

two houses of parliament, meeting as a national assembly in the forenoon, approved the decree of deposition, which was read by the Sheik-Ul-Islam, chief of the Ulemas, and the supreme judge of ecclesiastical ques-The document recited that Ab dul Hamid's acts were contrary to the sacred law, and set forth a long list of crimes, the whole making a terrible indictment. The assembly chose Mehemmed Reschad as sultan, and appointed committees to notify the dethroned sovereign and his successor of its action. The firing of 101 guns annced to the waiting people that a new sultan had been proclaimed.

New Monarch Cheered.

The ceremonies connected with the transfer of the power were simple. The new chosen ruler came from his palace in Galata through streets lined with troops and cheering thousands, and took the oath at the war office. He then proceeded to the parliament and later went to the Top-Kapou palace to kiss the prophet's robe, returning to the Dolmabagtsche as head of the em pire, where for so many years he had

been practically a prisoner. Martial law was relaxed tonight, and the people gave themselves over to celebrating the victory of the Young Turks party and the end of Abdul Hamid's reign. Many buildings were illuminated, and thousands of rounds of ammunition were fired by the soldiers everywhere

Flour Prices Going Down

Chicago, April 27.-Flour prices are going down rapidly, now that the bottom appears to have been knocked out of the so-called "Patten wheat corner," and millers today predicted that they would be back close to normal before many days. Several local millers announced today that they had cut the price to \$6 60, which is 20 cents under the prevailing price last Saturday, and 60 cents below the top figure, which prevailed when wheat was fluctuating about \$1 29. It is reported here that Minneapolis millers have not cut the price keeping it at \$7, but this is not expected to last long, as millers say the public will not pay that price for flour when it can be had from 40 to 50 cents cheaper. Europe is bidding for American flour on the assumption that wheat will soon go down to \$1 a bushel and there is little likelihood that foreign bidders will offer more than this, with the European wheat stocks increasing so rapidly.


