### STEEL BOUNTIES CEASE

Ottawa, March 1.-It is not the intention of the Government to renew the iron and steel bounties which finally expire at the end of the coming fiscal year. The bounties have now been in force fourteen years, and the Government believes that the iron and steel industries are now established on a sufficiently firm basis to do without the crutch of an annual subsidy from the Federal treasury. The dividends paid and the increasing output of the large industries that have been built up since 1896 are an evidence of this. The total amount paid in bounties last year was: On pig iron, \$693,423; on steel, \$838,100, and on manufactured steel, \$333,091. Since 1896 the total bounties on iron and steel have amounted to over fourteen million dol-

### WILL MOVE TO **QUASH BYLAW**

Mr. Scatcherd Tells What the Liquor Men Will Do in Strathroy.

Council Will Meet on Monday Next, When the Bylaw Will Be Finally Passed.

There will be a meeting of the Strathroy Town Council on Monday next, on which occasion it is expected the bylaw will be passed bringing into force the local option measure that has been causing such a divergence of

Mr. E. W. Scatcherd, one of the lawyers who have been engaged in fighting the bylaw, is the authority for the statement that as soon as the town passes such a bylaw, he will move to have it quashed.

There were some dozen votes, however, cast by illiterate voters, and the opposers of the measure strongly urged upon Judge Macbeth that these votes should be thrown out. LEADERS CROSS SWORDS

Labor Member Objects to Financial Help for the Salvation Army-The Bread Bill.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, March 1.-Further and final supplementary estimates for 1910 were laid before the Legislature yesterday afternoon. The main estimates for 1911 are being prepared and will be laid before the House before prorogation. This forehandedness is a result of the change made last session, when the close of the financial year was shifted forward two months, the year now ending on Oct. 31 instead of Dec. 31. The supplementaries brought down vesterday totalled \$804,584, the largest single department of expenditure being that of colonization roads, which re-ceive no less than \$464,356, which is divided as follows: Northern division, \$121,907; west division, \$28,050; east division, \$69,146; Temiskaming district, \$57,980. In addition there are liberal provisions for trunk roads in the mining districts, including \$60,000 for a general fund, and specific grants as follows: Sudbury-Soo trunk, \$30. 000; Elk Lake to Gowganda road, \$35,-000, and Charlton to Elk Lake road,


