The Patriotic Fund Campaign Starts Off With a Swing Today. NO RESULT MADE KNOWN Workers Are Keeping Secret Amount Received Until Meeting This Evening.

FACTORIES ARE DOING WELL In One the Employees Have Pledged Average of Three Days' Pay.

Not since the Western Fair has there been so much stir and excitement downtown on a Monday morning as this forenoon. The great patriotic canvass with the object of raising \$300,000 in three days was in full swing shortly after 10 o'clock.

Nelson, secretary of the executive committee, assisted by a veteran of other campaigns, Victor Smith of the Huron and Erie Mortgage Corporation staff, made valiant and successful efforts to bring order out of the chaos, answering a dozen questions and giving a dozen directions in one and the same moment.

Plenty of Work. Large cards were prepared for each team, on which were typewritten the names and addresses of those to be called upon during the day. Considering a team of eleven men, it was not surprising that the cards were scattered in all parts of the city today. Little time will be afforded for looting.

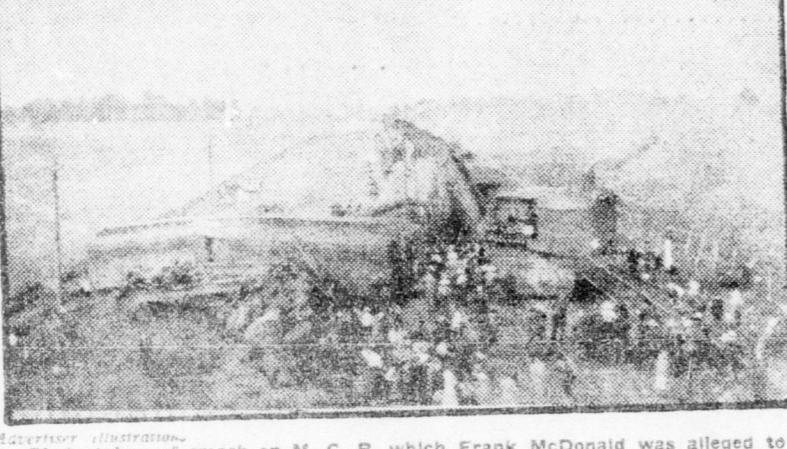

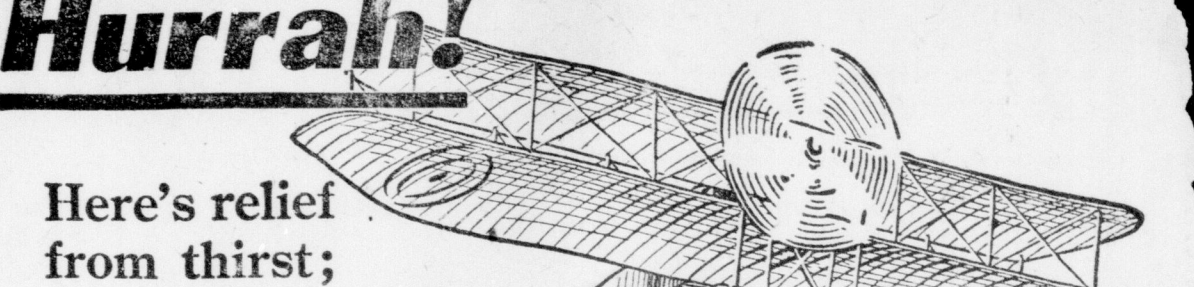

Roosevelt Wants 200,000 Expeditionary Force.

TO IGNORE WAR OFFICE Official American Viewpoint No Concern of Fiery Ex-President.

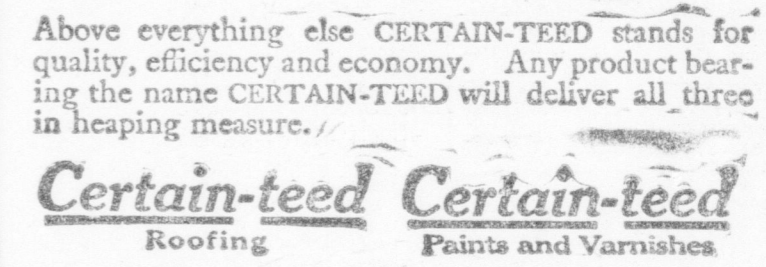

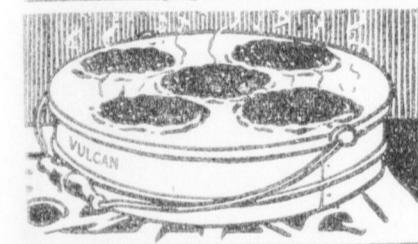

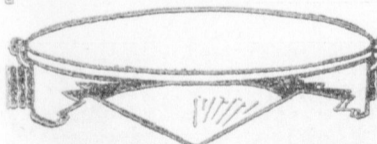

"IT'S A LIE," SAYS REV. NORWOOD OF FLANDERS' CHARGES

Declares Attitude of Local Pastor Is Intolerant. NO TIME TO CRITICIZE

Rector Praises the Splendid Troops Who Have Gone to France. "It's a lie, and I call it a lie from the Cronyn Memorial Church this morning," said Rev. R. W. Norwood, referring to the article written by C. R. Flanders in an English publication, which, it is alleged, cast reflections upon the leaders of the Canadian forces.

The attitude taken by Dr. Flanders, he said, was intolerant, and he lifted his hand to protest against "the vilification of the splendid fellows who have gone out to 'win.'" "The worst disloyalty at the present time is criticism," he said. "We are not in a position to criticize. Let him who has done his duty be the critic. Let not us who are enjoying comfortable homes dare to ensure our lads who are doing their duty. Surely no one at home is in a position to cast stones."

Wers Not Mentioned. "In it there was no mention of Canadian officers. If I felt justified in criticizing the administration of military affairs in England, both in the war office and in the field in mind, if any of you are doing this I shall be pleased to place at the disposal of any member or advertiser a contribution to which I am in herent of this church to which I am in a sense responsible, the information in your judgment from anything but a genuine desire to protect and help our noble soldiers who are prepared to fight and die for us."
