



My Lord,

Your Lordship will undoubtedly have heard from Mr. Secretary Daly, of my having returned the Commission appointing me Adjutant General of Militia: and I have now the honor to explain more fully to Your Excellency, what compelled me to take that step. In the first place it is due to Your Lordship that I should express my best thanks for the honor intended me, and for the kindness and courtesy which I have always experienced at Your Excellency's hands, and I trust you will not attribute my prompt return of the Commission, in any degree, to a want in the high respect that is due, and which I entertain for Your Lordship.

In the various conversations which I have had the honor of holding with Your Lordship on the subject of the Militia, and of my appointment to the Adjutant Generalship, it was my desire and endeavour to impress upon Your Excellency how anxious I was to be well supported in the subordinate officers of the Department. It was because I look upon the task Department. It was because I look upon the task of re-organizing the Militia, and of carrying out with effect the carnest desires and comprehensive views of Your Lordship on this subject, and of permanently and usefully superintending the whole body of the Militia throughout this extensive Province, as a difficult and weighty undertaking, and one to which I did not feel myself adequate, without the aid of able and efficient assistants.

Notwithstanding his want of military experience, I consider Dr. Taché quite eligible to the office of Deputy Adjutant General, more especially with a view to the Lower Canada population, and so expressed myself to Your Excellency: but he being a civilian, and unacquainted with military matters, I deemed it the more desirable that the other Deputy should be conversant with military affairs, and familiar with their details, and I took the liberty of submitting Colonel Comeron's name, as in my estimation possessing these qualifications. Although Colonel Macdonell was also spoken of, as proposed by some gentlemen of the Executive Council, I did not understand Your Excellency to entertain his recommendation in opposition to Colonel Cameron, and left Montreal under the full impression that Your Excellency had finally resolved in favor of the latter. With Your Excellency's sanction, I have communicated with him on the subject, and have done so in the persuasion that he had been selected for the appointment.

After leaving Montreal, I heard nothing more on the subject until the receipt of Mr. Daly's letter of the 3d instant, transmitting the Commission for myself, and intimating that after the fullest consideration with the members of the Council, Your Excellency had come to the conclusion, that it was more expedient to appoint Colonel Macdonell, Deputy Adjutant General, than any other person, and that you had directed the immediate issue of his Commission accordingly. Your Excellency may readily believe my surprise, when I found that he had been substituted for Colonel Cumeron. I felt at once that, under such circumstances, I could not satisfactorily accept the office of Chief of the Department; and to preclude the possibility of any question respecting my seat in the loweth:-

declining the appointment, and returning the Com- aner mission. (This I trust will satisfactorily account for by Mr. what might otherwise have appeared an abrupt proceeding on my part.) I much regret that my name has appeared in the Gazette before he could possibly have received my communication. I of course can have no personal objection to Colonel Macdonell-his claims for the favor of the Government are well known to Your Lordship, and I would in no degree wish to detract from them. So far therefore as respects him individually, I am very glad that he is to receive preferment, though I could have wished his interests had been promoted in some other way; for I must frankly confess that I do not consider him the most eligible selection that might have been made, or possessed of the qualifications which I deemed essential: and distrusting my own ability to manage with advantage to the public, or with satisfaction to the Government, or to myself, so extensive and important a Department, without the aid of those in whose ability and fitness I can confidently rely, I am unwilling to venture upon the arduous duty under existing circumstances.

Mr. Daly's letter informs me that it has been determined to appoint Colonel Macdonell, in accordance with the advice of the Council; still I would respectfully remark that the office is not a political one, and that I do not understand the Council have, nor would I concede to that Honorable Body, the privilege of controlling in appointments of this kind.

That principle was, I believe, settled with the approbation of the Home Government under the Administration of Lord Melculfs, and his steadfast maintenance of the right of the Queen, and of Her Majesty's Representative, to exercise a free discretion in Militia appointments were, I supposed, clearly established. On the present occasion I believed that Your Excellency, in the exercise of an undoubted prerogative right, had approved of Colonel Cameron for one of the Deputy Adjutants General, an appointment to which the Council, I am sure, could urge no objections on political or personal grounds; and while I would strenuously maintain Your Excellency's constitutional right to make it irrespective of the Executive Council, I at the same time freely confess that it was equally in Your Excellency's discretion to defer to their advice, and relinquish the intention which had been formed, and to bestow the patronage of the Cre on upon another, since it seemed to Your Excellency more expedient so to do.

Assuring Your Excellency that I have adopted the course which I feel best becomes me under the altered state of the arrangements, I will only trespass further to repeat my acknowledgments for the honorable and valuable office Your Excellency has been graciously pleased to design for me, and my regret at

being obliged to decline its acceptance.

Examination of Mr. Daly. By the Honorable Mr. Baldwin,

1. Is it your name that is signed to the warrants for new writs for the County of Simcoe, dated 6th July, 1846, and for the Town of Cornwall, dated 30th July, 1846?—It is my name.

2. Have you in your possession, and can you produce any letters, papers, or documents connected with the issue of the Commission of the Adjutant General of Militia, with the offer of the office in question to Sir Allan N. MacNab, or with his acceptance or supposed acceptance thereof by him, other than those already put in?—I have not.

3. Are there to your knowledge any other letters,

papers, or other documents connected with the offer of the office in question to Sir Allan N. Mac Nab, or his real or supposed acceptance thereof, which have not been already delivered in; or have you any reason to believe that there are any such, and if so, in whose hands have you reason to believe they now are?—I know of no other documents.

4. What are the facts upon which you founded the recital contained in the warrants for Simcoe and Cornwall, that Sir Allan N. MacNab had vacated his seat for Hamilton, by his acceptance of an office of profit under the Crown, by means whereof there was no Speaker of this House?—I have no other facts than those contained in the documents now before the House.

5. What are the grounds for your entertaining the impression that Sir Allan N. MacNab had accepted the office in question, upon which you founded the recital referred to?—I have no other grounds or facts than those contained in the papers now before the House, except my belief.

6. Had you any communication with Sir Allan N. MacNab in relation to the office of Adjutant General of Militia, prior to the date of the letter of the 25th June, 1846, produced by you?—I had no communication, except a verbal one; but the tenor of that conversation led me to believe that Sir Allan N. MacNab was prepared to accept the office of Adjutant General.

7. Did Sir Allan N. MacNab tell you in express terms that he had accepted the office of Adjutant General?-He did not.

8. What did, as near as you can recollect, Sir Allan N. MacNab say, which led to the impression you speak of?—Sir Allan N. MacNab, as well as I can recollect, informed me, that at an interview with the Governor General he had expressed his readiness to accept the office. Sir Allan N. MacNab at the came time mentioned Colonel Cameron as being a fit and proper person to be the Deputy Adjutant General, and that that appointment had been the subject of conversation with Lord Catheart.

9. Did Sir Allan N. MacNab say that he had stipulated for such appointment of Colonel Cameron, or words to that effect, as a condition to his acceptance of the Adjutant Generalship?—He did not; but Sir Allan N. MacNab informed me that he had left under the impression that Colonel Cameron was to be appointed.

10. Did Sir Allan N. MacNab state expressly, or to the effect that it was understood, that Colonel Cameron was to be his Deputy ?- He did state that such an understanding had been come to, or words to that effect.

MacNab, or whether a warrant for any such writ had been made by any of the Honorable Members of this House; or had you been informed, or had you then or have you now, any reason to believe that such warrant had been then, or has been since, made by any Members of this House; if so, who were the Members who signed such last mentioned warrant; what was the date of the same, as nearly as you can recollect; in whose hands did you see it; what, as far as you know, or have reason to believe, were the proceedings had upon such warrant; when were such proceedings had, as nearly as you can recollect; and where, to the best of your knowledge and belief, is such warrant at present?-I have no knowledge of any such warrant having issued.

14. Will you inform this House whether the office of Adjutant General of the Militia of this Province was ever offered to you since your last election as a Member of this House, and whether you ever ac-cepted that appointment; and whether you or your agent experienced at any time any difficulty or delay on the ground of the said acceptance, or supposed acceptance, and the consequent vacancy of your seat, or otherwise, in the regular receipt of your salary as Speaker of this House; and will you also inform the House of all the facts and circumstances connected with such offer and acceptance, or supposed acceptance, or in any way relating thereto, and lay before the House all commissions, letters, papers, and other documents in your hands, or within your control, connected with or relating to the same?—It was offered to me by the late Governor General, Earl Catheart, and it was my intention to have accepted On the first offer being made to me, I the office. declined; but at a subsequent conversation with the Governor General, I agreed to accept it, under certain conditions, namely, that I should be permitted to have the most efficient aid in the office. The Governor General was desirous to have a French Deputy Adjutant General for Lower Canada, and I suggested the name of Colonel Taché, the present Deputy Adjutant General for Lower Canada, and his Lordship assented. I then endeavoured to impress on the Governor General my desire to have a Deputy for Upper Canada, who had experience, and was thoroughly conversant with military details. I suggested Colonel Cameron, and His Lordship assented. The thing remained in this unsettled state at the prorogation of the Parliament; after the prorogation, I saw the Governor General, and had several conversations with him. It had been proposed to me that I should be gazetted here. I left the Governor General with the understanding that Colonel Cameron was to be my Deputy. With the approbation of His Excellency, I went directly to Mr. Daly, and told him that I accepted the office of Adjutant General from His Excellency, on the express condition that Colonel Cameron was to be my Deputy, and that I had His Excellency's authority to say so; and that so soon as I could be certain that Colonel Cameron would accept the office of Deputy Adjutant

General, we were both to be gazetted. I had oc- Examination casion then to go to Quebec, and Mr. J. H. Cameron, of Sir Allau N. the present Solicitor General, hoine than in town. the present Solicitor General, being then in town, and in order to expedite business, as I was about to leave for England, and Mr. Cameron then being about to proceed to Upper Canada, I requested him to write to Colonel Cameron, to know if he would accept the office. On my arrival at Toronto, after my return, I called on Mr. Cameron, who informed me that he had written to Colonel Cameron, and had received Colonel Cameron's answer, that he would accept the office. On getting this information, I wrote to Mr. Daly on the twenty-fifth of June. On the third of July, I received an answer. On the receipt of that letter, I declined the office in the letter laid before the House. I should have stated that, after my return from Quebec, and before my departure for Upper Canada, while in Montreal, I called to take leave of the Governor General: His Lordship stated to me that some Members of his Council were anxious that he should appoint Colonel Macdonell, but he said, I told them that I had authorized you to offer the appointment to Colonel Cameron. I told him that I was much obliged to him, and that I felt that the services of Colonel Cameron would be indispensable to me, especially as I had to leave for England for a short time. After leaving the Governor General, I called on the late Receiver General, and he expressed himself in favor of Colonel Macdonell; I said, if there is any difficulty relating to this matter, I will go back to the Governor General; he said that there was no necessity, and that they would endeavour to provide for Colonel Macdonell in some other way. I had no other communication with the Executive Government, or the Governor General, except what is contained in the written documents on the table; nor have I since seen the Governor General.

19. Did you, in any written communication, subscribe your name, adding thereto the title of Adjutant General?-I did not.

20. Did you address any document to any public officer, in connection with your appointment as Adjutant General, in the discharge of the duties of that office?—I never signed any document as Adjutant General, nor did I do any official act in that capacity. Previous to my refusal of the office, I had sent in a plan for the re-organization of the Militia, addressed to Captain Talbot.

21. How long after your letter to Lord Cathcart, did you leave Canada for England?—I think I left by the next steamer for England.

22. Had you made any arrangements with the Government for the discharge of your duties, in the anticipation of your absence ?—I made arrangements that Colonels Taché and Cameron should peform the duties of my office in my absence.

23. Had you the express sanction of Lord Cathcart for your absence?—I understood from Lord Cathcart, that in case of my accepting the office, I should have leave of absence; and I wrote a letter making application for leave of absence, which letter I sent to Captain Talbot, to be delivered when required.

24. Was any specific application made for such leave?-There was no specific application made for leave. After I received Mr. Daly's letter, stating the regret of His Excellency at his inability to carry out the original intention of appointing Colonel Cameron, I had no further communication with the Executive Council, or with any other person, except my letter to Mr. Daly declining the appointment, and my letter to Lord Catheart explaining my reasons.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

It gives me sincere gratification to meet you, that we may deliberate on the important interests committed to our charge.

The representations which have proceeded from this and the neighbouring Provinces on the subject of the Post Office, have engaged the anxious consideration of the Imperial Government. I am enabled to inform you, that Her Majesty's Ministers are prepared to surrender to the Provincial Authorities, the control of that Department, so soon as by concert between the several Legislatures, arrangements shall be matured for securing to British North America the advantages of an efficient and uniform Post Office system.

By a Statute passed during the last Session of the Imperial Parliament, the Colonial Legislatures are empowered to repeal differential duties heretofore imposed in the Colonies in favor of British Produce. It is probable that by exercising this power you may be enabled to benefit the consumer without injury to the Revenue. I commend the subject to your consideration, and I shall lay before you certain communications relating to it, which I have received from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, and from the Lieutenant Governors of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Measures will be submitted to you for more generally extending Warehousing facilities to Inland Ports, and for effecting other improvements in our commercial system, all of which will, I am sure, en-

gage your attention.

I shall submit for your information a Despatch from the Secretary of State, describing the course which Her Majesty's Government propose to take, in order to remedy the inconvenience which the Provinces of British North America appear to have sustained from the operation of the Imperial Statute for

the protection of Copyright.
In view of the large Immigration which may be expected to take place this year, measures have been adopted for providing additional accommodation and medical attendance for the sick, and for increasing the means of forwarding the destitute to places where their labor may be required. An increased grant has been made by the Imperial Parliament in aid of this service. Although it is to be feared that there may be much want and suffering among certain classes of Immigrants who arrive this season, I have reason to believe that they will be accompanied by a greater number than usual of persons possessed of capital, who are likely to prove an acquisition to the Province.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

I have directed the Accounts of the Revenue and Expenditure of the past year, with the Estimates for the current year, to be laid before you.

I observe with satisfaction that there is an increase in the Revenue derived from Public Works.

I rely on your making such provision for the maintenance of the establishments and credit of the Province as may be necessary to support the high character for probity and good faith which Canada has at all times maintained.

Honorable Gentlemen and Gentlemen,

We have reason to bless Providence for our exemption from the calamity of famine with which another part of the Empire has been so sorely afflicted, and I congratulate you on the liberality which the Inhabitants of this Colony of all classes and origins have evinced in contributing to the relief of their suffering fellow subjects.

I cannot refrain from adverting to the fact that among those whose generosity has been so conspicuous on this trying occasion, are our Indian Brethren.

The occurrences of the past year, though in some measure exceptional, indicate that there is a growing demand in Europe for the produce of this Continent, and render it highly important that the inhabitants of Canada should improve to the utmost its natural advantages, and those which attach to it as an integral part of an Empire, abounding in wealth and population.

I feel confident that you will duly appreciate the responsibility which rests on Parliament at this conjuncture, and that you will endeavour by wise Legislation to afford all practical extension and developement to the trade and productive capabilities of the Province, and to give its institutions that hold on the affections of the people which is the foundation of public and private credit, and the best security for -ocial progress.

In all measures calculated to effect these important objects, I am prepared heartily to cooperate with you; and I am authorized to renew the assurance of the warnest desire of our Gracious Queen, to promote the prosperity of Canada and the happiness of its people.

The Order of the Day for taking into consideration the Speech of His Excellency the Governor General, delivered to both Houses of the Provincial Legislature at the opening of the present Session, being read;

The House proceeded accordingly to take the said Speech into consideration.

Mr. Colvile moved to resolve, seconded by Mr. Lyon, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, to thank His Excellency for his gracious Speech from the Throne.

To congratulate His Excellency upon his assumption of the Government of this Province.

To express the gratification of this House that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to nominate as Her Representative in the North American Colonies, a Governor whose previous official career in another Colony of the British Empire, offers the happiest promise, under His Excellency's guidance, of a prosperous administration of the affairs of this great Province.

That we are much gratified to learn that the representations which have proceeded from this and the neighbouring Provinces on the subject of the Post Office have engaged the anxious consideration of the Imperial Government, and that His Excellency is enabled to inform us, that Her Majesty's Ministers are prepared to surrender to the Provincial Authorities, the control of that Department, so soon as, by concert between the several Legislatures, arrangements shall be matured for securing to British North America the advantages of an efficient and uniform Post Office System.

That we assure His Excellency of our great satisfaction that the Colonial Legislatures, by a Statute passed during the last Session of the Imperial Parliament, are empowered to repeal differential duties beretofore imposed in the Colonies in favor of British Produce.

That we will give our most attentive consideration to this important subject, and to the communications relating to it, which His Excellency has received from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, and from the Lieutenant Governors of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

That His Excellency may rely on our attention ising directed to such measures as may be submitted for the purpose of extending more generally Warehousing facilities to Inland Ports, and for effecting other improvements in our Commercial System.

We are gratified to learn that inquiries have been instituted with the view of ascertaining the practicability and probable cost of the construction of a Railway between Quebec and Halifax, and that a Survey of the proposed line has been undertaken by the Imperial Government, and is still in progress.

We shall be happy to receive from His Excellency the communication of the Despatch from the Secretary of State, describing the course which Her Mapesty's Government propose to take in order to remedy the inconvenience which the Provinces of British North America have sustained from the operation of the Imperial Statute for the protection of Copyrights.

The expectation of a large Emigration has, we are prepared to find, rendered prindent measures for providing additional accommodation and medical attendance for the sick, and for increasing the means of forwarding the destitute to places where their labour may be required, and are gratified to learn that an increased grant has been made by the Imperial Parliament in aid of this service; and while we regret the progreat probability of much want and suffering

among certain classes of Emigrants, we trust that the favorable anticipations of His Excellency of the cy's Speech character of a large portion of the Emigration may be happily realized.

That we will give our best consideration to the Accounts of the past year and Estimates of the current year, which will be laid before us by His Excellency; and we learn with the highest satisfaction that there is an increase in the revenue derived from Public Works.

That His Excellency may fully rely upon our making such provision for the maintenance of the establishments and credit of the Province as may be necessary to support the high character for probity and good faith which *Canada* has won for herself, and, we firmly believe, will ever continue to maintain.

That we acknowledge our gratitude to Providence for our exemption from the calamity of famine, with which another part of the Empire has been so severely afflicted, and we thank His Excellency for his congratulations on the liberality which the inhabitants of this Colony of all classes and origins, including our Indian Brethren, have evinced in contributing to the relief of their suffering fellow subjects.

the relief of their suffering fellow subjects.

That we concur with His Excellency that the occurrences of the past year, though, in some measure, exceptional, indicate that there is a growing demand in Europe for the produce of this Continent, and render it highly important for the inhabitants of Canada to improve to the utmost its natural advantages, and those which attach to it, as an integral part of an Empire abounding in wealth and population.

That we duly appreciate the responsibility which rests on Parliament at this conjuncture, and that we will endeavour, by wise legislation, to afford all practicable extension and developement to the trade and productive capabilities of the Province, and to give its Institutions that hold on the affections of the people, which is the foundation of public and private credit, and the best security for social progress.

That we thank His Excellency for his promises of

That we thank His Excellency for his promises of cordial co-operation in effecting these important objects, and for his renewal of the assurance of the earnest desire of Our Gracious Queen to promote the prosperity of *Canada*, and the happiness of its people.

The House, according to Order, resumed the adjourned Debate upon the amendment which was yesterday proposed to be made to the Motion: That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, to thank His Excellency for his gracious Speech from the Throne.
To congratulate His Excellency upon his assump-

tion of the Government of this Province.

To express the gratification of this House that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to nominate as Her Representative in the North American Colonies, a Governor whose previous official career in another Colony of the British Empire, offers the happiest promise, under His Excellency's guidance, of a prosperous administration of the affairs of this great Province.

That we are much gratified to learn that the re-

presentations which have proceeded from this and the neighbouring Provinces on the subject of the Post Office have engaged the anxious consideration of the Imperial Government, and that His Excellency is enabled to inform us, that Her Majesty's Ministers are prepared to surrender to the Provincial Authorities, the control of that Department, so soon as, by concert between the several Legislatures, arrangements shall be matured for securing to British North America the advantages of an efficient and uniform Post Office System.

That we assure His Excellency of our great satisfaction that the Colonial Legislatures, by a Statute passed during the last Session of the Imperial Parliament, are empowered to repeal differential duties heretofore imposed in the Colonies in favor of British

Produce. That we will give our most attentive consideration to this important subject, and to the communications relating to it, which His Excellency has received from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, and from the Lieutenant Governors of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

That His Excellency may rely on our attention being directed to such measures as may be submitted for the purpose of extending more generally Ware-housing facilities to Inland Ports, and for effecting other improvements in our Commercial System.

We are gratified to learn that inquiries have been instituted with the view of ascertaining the practicability and probable cost of the construction of a Railway between Quebec and Halifax, and that a Survey of the proposed line has been undertaken by the Imperial Government, and is still in progress.

We shall be happy to receive from His Excellency the communication of the Despatch from the Secretary of State, describing the course which Her Majesty's Government propose to take in order to remedy the inconvenience which the Provinces of British North America have sustained from the operation of the Imperial Statute for the protection of Copyrights.

The expectation of a large Emigration has, we are Speech further prepared to find, rendered prudent measures for providing additional accommodation and medical attendance for the sick, and for increasing the means of forwarding the destitute to places where their labour may be required, and are gratified to learn that an increased grant has been made by the Imperial Parliament in aid of this service; and while we regret the too great probability of much want and suffering among certain classes of Emigrants, we trust that the favorable anticipations of His Excellency of the character of a large portion of the Emigration may be happily realized.

That we will give our best consideration to the Accounts of the past year and Estimates of the current year, which will be laid before us by His Excellency; and we learn with the highest satisfaction that there is an increase in the revenue derived from Public Works.

That His Excellency may fully rely upon our making such provision for the maintenance of the establishments and credit of the Province as may be necessary to support the high character for probity and good faith which *Canada* has won for herself, and, we firmly believe, will ever continue to maintain.

That we acknowledge our gratitude to Providence for our exemption from the calamity of famine, with which another part of the Empire has been so severely afflicted, and we thank His Excellency for his congratulations on the liberality which the inhabitants of this Colony of all classes and origins, including our Indian Brethren, have evinced in contributing to the relief of their suffering fellow subjects.

That we concur with His Excellency that the occurrences of the past year, though, in some measure, exceptional, indicate that there is a growing demand in Europe for the produce of this Continent, and render it highly important for the inhabitants of Canada to improve to the utmost its natural advantages, and those which attach to it, as an integral part of an Empire abounding in wealth and population.

That we duly appreciate the responsibility which rests on Parliament at this conjuncture, and that we will endeavour, by wise legislation, to afford all practicable extension and developement to the trade and productive capabilities of the Province, and to give its Institutions that hold on the affections of the people, which is the foundation of public and private credit, and the best security for social progress.

That we thank His Excellency for his promises of cordial co-operation in effecting these important objects, and for his renewal of the assurance of the earnest desire of Our Gracious Queen to promote the prosperity of Canada, and the happiness of its

people.

To express the gratification of this House that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to nominate as Her Representative in the North American Colonies, a Governor whose previous official career in another Colony of the British Empire, offers the happiest promise, under His Excellency's guidance, of a prosponding the control of the British Excellency's guidance, of a prosponding to the control of perous administration of the affairs of this great Pro-

That we are much gratified to learn that the representations which have proceeded from this and the neighbouring Provinces on the subject of the Post Office have engaged the anxious consideration of the Imperial Government, and that His Excellency is enabled to inform us, that Her Majesty's Ministers are prepared to surrender to the Provincial Authorities, the control of that Department, so soon as, by concert between the several Legislatures, arrangements shall be matured for securing to British North America the advantages of an efficient and uniform Post Office System.

That we assure His Excellency of our great satisfaction that the Colonial Legislatures, by a Statute passed during the last Session of the Imperial Parliament, are empowered to repeal differential duties heretofore imposed in the Colonies in favor of British

Produce.

That we will give our most attentive consideration to this important subject, and to the communications relating to it, which His Excellency has received from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, and from the Lieutenant Governors of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

That His Excellency may rely on our attention being directed to such measures as may be submitted for the purpose of extending more generally Warehousing facilities to Inland Ports, and for effecting other improvements in our Commercial System.

We are gratified to learn that inquiries have been instituted with the view of ascertaining the practicability and probable cost of the construction of a Railway between Quebec and Halifax, and that a Survey of the proposed line has been undertaken by the Imperial Government, and is still in progress.

We shall be happy to receive from His Excellency the communication of the Despatch from the Secretary of State, describing the course which Her Majesty's Government propose to take in order to re-medy the inconvenience which the Provinces of British North America have sustained from the operation of the Imperial Statute for the protection of Copy-

rights.

The expectation of a large Emigration has, we are prepared to find, rendered prudent measures for providing additional accommodation and medical attendance for the sick, and for increasing the means of forwarding the destitute to places where their labour may be required, and are gratified to learn that an increased grant has been made by the Imperial Parliament in aid of this service; and while we regret the too great probability of much want and suffering among certain classes of Emigrants, we trust that the favourable anticipations of His Excellency of the character of a large portion of the Emigration may be happily realized.

That we will give our best consideration to the Accounts of the past year and Estimates of the current year, which will be laid before us by His Excellency; and we learn with the highest satisfaction that

there is an increase in the revenue derived from Speech further Public Works.

That His Excellency may fully rely upon our making such provision for the maintenance of the establishments and credit of the Province as may be necessary to support the high character for probity and good faith which Canada has won for herself, and, we firmly believe, will ever continue to maintain.

That we acknowledge our gratitude to Providence for our exemption from the calamity of famine, with which another part of the Empire has been so severely afflicted, and we thank His Excellency for his congratulations on the liberality which the inhabitants of this Colony of all classes and origins, including our Indian Brethren, have evinced in contributing to the relief of their suffering fellow subjects.

That we concur with His Excellency that the occurrences of the past year, though, in some measure exceptional, indicate that there is a growing demand in Europe for the produce of this Continent, and render it highly important for the inhabitants of Canada to improve to the utmost its natural advantages, and those which attach to it, as an integral part of an Empire abounding in wealth and population.

That we duly appreciate the responsibility which rests on Parliament at this conjuncture, and that we will endeavour, by wise legislation, to afford all practicable extension and developement to the trade and productive capabilities of the Province, and to give its Institutions that hold on the affections of people, which is the foundation of public and private

credit, and the best security for social progress.

That we thank His Excellency for his promises of cordial co-operation in effecting these important objects, and for his renewal of the assurance of the carnest desire of our Gracious Queen to promote the

prosperity of Canada, and the happiness of its people.

And which amendment was, that after the words,

"affairs of this great Province," in the second paragraph of the main motion, the following be inserted: -"And to state that this House, on this first oc-"casion of approaching His Excellency, cannot, in "justice either to their own feelings or those of their "constituents, refrain from referring to the gratify"ing circumstance of His Excellency's connexion
"with the family of the late Earl of Durham. To
"that distinguished Statesman we are indebted for "the Imperial recognition of our undoubted right as "British subjects, to have the Government of the Province conducted by the assistance, counsel and "information of a Provincial Administration, under "the Representative of the Sovereign, which, while "appointed by the Crown in the exercise of its un-"doubted prerogative, remains responsible to the "Provincial Parliament, on the same principles which "have been found so perfectly efficacious in the ad-ministration of the Government of the Parent " State. We, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council of Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, most Act 7th Vict., cap. 11, section 7. humbly beg leave to approach Your Majesty with Ordered. That the said Address be presented to newed expressions of devoted and loyal attachments. Excellency the Governor General, by such Your Majesty's Royal Person and Government. humbly beg leave to approach Your Majesty with renewed expressions of devoted and loyal attachment to

We humbly beg leave to submit to Your Majesty that an Act was passed by the Legislature of the late Province of Upper Canada, in the seventh year of the Reign of Your Majesty's Royal Predecessor, King George the Fourth, for the encouragement of Useful Arts within the said Province, and that under the provisions thereof about seventy Patents have been issued.

That in several instances the holders of Patents granted in England in virtue of Your Majesty's undoubted Royal Prerogative, have caused the same to be recorded in this Province under the provisions of the said Act, and claimed that they should be considered operative here in consequence of a clause in their certificates securing to the Patentees the exclusive use and benefit of their respective Inventions in all Your Majesty's Colonies abroad.

The Legislative Council ther beg leave to submit for Your Majesty's Royal consideration, that they have good reasons for believing that Citizens of the United States of America proceed to England and there obtain Patents for inventions and mechanical improvements of various kinds, discovered in their own country; the exclusive benefit of which they are thus enabled to claim in Canada, thereby debarring the inhabitants of this Province from availing themselves of the use of such inventions and improvements except at a great expense, and discouraging the developement of the native ingenuity of Your Majesty's loyal Canadian subjects.

The Legislative Council bly submit the foregoing statement for Your Majesty's Royal consideration, not doubting but Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to make such order thereon as Your Majesty in Your Royal pleasure may think most conducive to the interests of the inhabitants of this Province.

Speech further considered.

The House, according to Order, resumed the adjourned Debate upon the amendment which, on Tuesday last, was proposed to be made to the motion: That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, to thank His Excellency for his Gracious Speech from the Throne.

To congratulate His Excellency upon his assump-

tion of the Government of this Province.

To express the gratification of this House that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to nominate as Her Representative in the North American Colonies, a Governor whose previous official career in another Colony of the British Empire, offers the happiest promise, under His Excellency's guidance, of a prosper-ous administration of the affairs of this great Pro-

That we are much gratified to learn that the representations which have proceeded from this and the neighbouring Provinces on the subject of the Post Office have engaged the anxious consideration of the Imperial Government, and that His Excellency is enabled to inform us, that Her Majesty's Ministers are prepared to surrender to the Provincial Authorities, the control of that Department, so soon as, by concert between the several Legislatures, arrangements shall be matured for securing to British North America the advantages of an efficient and uniform Post Office System.

That we assure His Excellency of our great satisfaction that the Colonial Legislatures, by a Statute passed during the last Session of the Imperial Parliament, are empowered to repeal differential duties heretofore imposed in the Colonies in favor of British

Produce.

That we will give our most attentive consideration to this important subject, and to the communications relating to it, which His Excellency has received from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, and from the Lieutenant Governors of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

That His Excellency may rely on our attention being directed to such measures as may be submitted for the purpose of extending more generally Ware-housing facilities to Inland Ports, and for effecting other improvements in our Commercial System.

We are gratified to learn that inquiries have been instituted with the view of ascertaining the practicability and probable cost of the construction of a Railway between Quebec and Halifax, and that a Survey of the proposed line has been undertaken by the Imperial Government, and is still in progress.

We shall be happy to receive from His Excellency the communication of the Despatch from the Secretary of State, describing the course which Her Majesty's Government propose to take in order to re-medy the inconvenience which the Provinces of British North America have sustained from the operation of the Imperial Statute for the protection of Copy-

The expectation of a large Emigration has, we are prepared to find, rendered prudent measures for providing additional accommodation and medical attendance for the sick, and for increasing the means of forwarding the destitute to places where their labour may be required, and are gratified to learn that an increased grant has been made by the Imperial Parliament in aid of this service; and while we regret the too great probability of much want and suffering among certain classes of Emigrants, we trust that the favorable anticipations of His Excellency of the character of a large portion of the Emigration may be happily realized.

That we will give our best consideration to the Accounts of the past year and Estimaces of the current year, which will be laid before us by His Excellency; and we learn with the highest satisfaction that there is an increase in the Revenue derived from Speech further ublic Works

That His Excellency may fully rely upon our making such provision for the maintenance of the establishments and credit of the Province as may be necessary to support the high character for probity and good faith which Canada has won for herself, and, we firmly believe, will ever continue to maintain.

That we acknowledge our gratitude to Providence for our exemption from the calamity of famine, with which another part of the Empire has been so severely afflicted, and we thank His Excellency for his congratulations on the liberality which the inhabitants of this Colony of all classes and origins, including our Indian Brethren, have evinced in contributing to

the relief of their suffering fellow subjects.

That we concur with His Excellency that the occurrences of the past year, though, in some measure, exceptional, indicate that there is a growing demand in Europe for the produce of this Continent, and render it highly important for the inhabitants of Canada to improve to the utmost its natural advantages, and those which attach to it, as an integral part of an Empire abounding in wealth and population.

That we duly appreciate the responsibility which rests on Parliament at this conjuncture, and that we will endeavour, by wise legislation, to afford all practicable extension and developement to the trade and productive capabilities of the Province, and to give its Institutions that hold on the affections of the people, which is the foundation of public and private credit, and the best security for social progress.

That we thank His Excellency for his promises of cordial co-operation in effecting these important objects, and for his renewal of the assurance of the carnest desire of Our Gracious Queen to promote the prosperity of Canada, and the happiness of its

people.

MR. SPEAKER communicated to the House, a Report received from the Librarian of the pre-sent state of the Library of the House, pursuant to a Standing Order of the 19th June, 1841; which Report is as followeth:

> Library, Legislative Assembly, 2d June, 1847.

The Librarian begs leave to report, for the information of Your Honourable House, that pursuant to the authority of the Honorable the Speaker, the valuable collection of Books recommended to be purchased by the Library Committee of last Session, has They been procured, and deposited in the Library. consist of upwards of a thousand volumes in French and English literature.

The French Works, selected with considerable care by the Committee, will be found, in connection with those purchased last year, to supply numerous deficiencies, in that section of the Library, previously neglected, and to bring down the several classes of French literature to a very recent date.

The English Works comprise standard legal publications, hitherto much required, as well as others, on general subjects of great interest.

Additions have also been made to the important class of works on the History of America, which may be regarded as extremely valuable, in a nationa

point of view, as materials for the present investigator Report of and future historian of American annals.

The charge of procuring the new Books was entrusted, by order of Mr. Speaker, to Messrs. Fabre, and Armour and Ramsay, of Montreal, respectively; and it is pleasing to state that their commissions have been executed with the utmost promptitude, economy and care.

In consequence of the extensive additions to the Library during the past recess, it has been deemed advisable to compile a supplementary catalogue for the use of Members; printed copies of which will be placed in their hands without delay.

Lists of the Books received since last Session, under the provisions of the Copyright Act, and of a few procured subsequent to the printing of the supplementary catalogue, are appended to this Report.

The total number of Books now in the Library,

exclusive of the American class above referred to, is 9450,—that class contains 1170 volumes, making a total of 10,620.

Report of the Compiler of General Indi-

To the Honorable the Legislative Assembly, in Provincial Parliament assembled.

The undersigned, to whom were respectively entrusted the charge of compiling General Indices to the Journals of the Houses of Assembly of the late Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, beg leave to report :-

That the Index to the Journals of the Upper Canada Assembly is now finished; the Compiler having brought the same to completion shortly before the commencement of the present Session. series of Journals indexed, begins at the year 1825, and continues from thence to the end of the last Session of the Upper Canada Legislature, in 1840. Of those prior to 1825, no regular series exists in Canada, the Legislative records of Upper Canada having been, on two occasions, destroyed by fire, once on the taking of Fork by the Americans in 1812, and again at a subsequent period from an accidental cause. four or five exceptions no copies of these volumes are known to exist, save in the office of the Secretary of the Colonies at London, where they may be found in manuscript, the printed series not having been com-menced until 1825. With regard to the missing volumes, the Compiler would respectfully suggest the expediency of making immediate application to the Colonial Secretary for copies of the same, with a view to the completion of the series in the possession of Your Honorable House.

The Index to the Journals of the Lower Canada Assembly, though not entirely completed, lacks only the insertion of "cross-references," throughout, to finish it. To ascertain these, and add them in their proper places, is essential to facilitate reference to the work, to those unaccustomed to the use of it; but the want of them will not prevent the Index from being, meanwhile, of great use to all who may be seeking information from the Journals referred to.

The Lower Canada series of Journals is complete from the time of the first meeting of the Provincial Assembly in 1792, until the last convocation in 1837; the Index volume is consequently of considerably greater extent than that relating to Upper Canada.

In conclusion, the Compilers would respectfully beg that the House would be pleased to refer the result of their labours to the examination of a Select Committee, by whom it might be determined whether their undertakings have been accomplished in such a manner as to merit the approbation of Your Honorable House; and from whom a deliberate opinion could be obtained upon the most expedient and desirable plan for the future preservation of the General Indices,—whether by the transcription of a fair manuscript copy of each, to be preserved for reference in the Library, or by printing a limited number of copies for the use of Members. The latter course is the one, which, in the opinion of the Compilers, would for several reasons be found to be the most advantageous. Without adverting to the risk, where but one copy of a work exists, of its being lost, destroyed, or injured so as to impair its usefulness,—the Compilers would rely mainly on the nature of the work itself, in support of their views concerning it. In the compilation of the Indices, pursuant to the directions of Your Honorable House, they chose for their model the General Index to the Journals of the House of Commons, from 1820 to 1837, the plan of which, adopted after mature deliberation, and with the advantage of the experience attained by the successive labours of previous Compilers, has been found of the greatest practical value. Its chief merit consists in the combination of simple reference to Journal entries, with an abstract or digest of all proceedings bearing on the same subject, or connected together, by which, at a glance, an historical summary of every legislative proceeding on any given question can be Leon Goodall, readily ascertained. My Lord,

I have received Your Lordship's Despatch, No. 22, of the 9th of March, upon the subject of the claims of Mr. Ryland to redress for the non-fulfilment of certain expectations held out to him by the Executive Government of Canada, in 1841.

I have attentively examined all the documents relating to this case, and I can perceive no ground to doubt that the proper course for Your Lordship to pursue, is to acquaint the House of Assembly, and Mr. Ryland, that on behalf of the British Treasury, Her Majesty's Executive Government have invariably repudiated and denied all liability to make good the engagement formed by Lord Sydenham-that engagement being one which Her Majesty's Government had never authorized beforehand-which had never been reported to them by His Lordship, and which, when brought to their knowledge, they had disapproved, and declined to sanction. Such is the view which I confess myself to entertain of the case, but if the House of Assembly shall think fit to regard the claim as one which ought to be met from the Colonial Funds, I can have no objection to authorize Your Lordship to apply towards Mr. Ryland's indemnity, out of any Canadian Funds at the disposal of the Canadian Government, any sum which the House of Assembly may be of opinion ought to be applied to that gentleman's relief.
Your Lordship will be pleased to communicate the

Her Majesty has been pleased to receive this Address with the fullest confidence in the loyalty and intelligence of Her faithful Commons of Canada, but it is with sincere concern that Her Majesty has learned the existence, in such a quarter, of anticipa-

tions of such a character.

Her Majesty's Government conceive that the protection principle cannot, with justice, be described as the universal basis either of the general connection between the United Kingdom and its Colonies, or even of their commercial connection. There is a large and important group of the Colonies of this Country having a very extended commerce, and one of a peculiarly British character, in relation to which the protection system has at no time exercised a powerful influence, and in relation to which at present it has little more than a nominal existence. I speak of the Australian Colonies; and it cannot fail to be remarked that while these are the most distant, and, therefore, according to the suppositions of many, the most in need of commercial preference, they have also made the most rapid progress, and have thus most effectually belied that accessity. It is true, indeed, that a part of their r acrial prosperity may be ascriba-ble to the supply of penal labour: but this is far from affording an explanation of the case, since, perhaps the most remarkable instances of vigorous and rapid growth among the Australian Possessions of Her Majesty, have been instances in which penal labour has been altogether unknown. The energy of the Colonists has, without doubt, under Divine Providence, been the main cause of their singular advancement, stimulated but not overborne by distance, and aided, not repressed, by the enjoyment of commercial freedom. The same energies, with less disadvantage of distance to contend against, will, it may be confidently predicted, have a similar effect in developing the resources of British North America, and not with less but rather with the more signal success, when capital, industry, and skill shall be left to take their own spontaneous direction, and to turn to account, as individual prudence shall suggest, the abundant materials and instruments of wealth which the bounty of Heaven has bestowed.

Her Majesty's Government have been glad to find that the Assembly has viewed with an unmingled satisfation the prosperity of Canada under the moderate system of protection which has hitherto prevailed: but the Assembly cannot fail to recollect that all the progressive relaxations of that system which, for a series of years past, have been introduced into the Law, have been met and resisted by predictions of the ruin that it was honestly but erroneously con-ceived would follow them, and that those predictions have with a remarkable uniformity been disappointed. Experience cannot but suggest that a similar insecurity attaches to the renewal of the same expectations

founded on the same arguments.

It is not for the sake of controversial or purely argumentative advantage that Her Majesty's Government refer to former apprehensions, and to the man-ner in which they have been dissipated by the event. A retrospect of this kind is calculated to throw clear and abundant light upon the real merits of the ques-The fears which are now entertained have reference to the circumstance that it is proposed to remove all differential duty between Canadian and Far otherwise; the Law of 1828 diminished the dif-ference in favour of Canada. The Law of 1842 farther and greatly diminished the difference in favor of Canada. The Law of 1843, which reduced the duty on Canadian Wheat to one shilling per quarter, still left a much smaller difference in its favor as against Foreign Wheat, than existed under either of the former Corn Laws. And yet the Corn to Your Lordship the following observations in regard to the matter of the Address, which have been extension has doubtless contributed in no small degree

to the happiness and prosperity of the people of the Colony which the Assembly, sharing in the unmingled satisfaction of Her Majesty and the British Parliament, has seen advancing in steady and successful progression. But this extension has taken place not under protection seemed from change, nor under protection fortified by successive increments, but contemporaneously with a series of changes involving its great diminution.

It appears to be the impression of the Assembly that some great revolution of prices is likely to occur, as the consequence of the pending changes in the Law, which will deprive the Canadian Farmer of all hope of remuneration for his surplus produce. But the Canadian Farmer is advancing from year to year in capital and in science; and, to say nothing of the great advantages he cannot fail to derive from improved communications, it would surely be rash to assert, nor probably do the Assembly in their Address intend to imply, that his industry must be paralysed unless he shall continue to receive the precise amount of average payment for his grain that he has hitherto received for it. Doubtless the alarm which has been excited has reference to the idea of some sudden great and permanent reduction of price to follow the repeal of the British Corn Law. Without pretending to estimate too nicely the momentary or the occasional effects of that measure, Her Majesty's Government cannot but admit that they could better appreciate, at least, certain presumptive, though far from demonstrative grounds for the alarm of the Canadian Agriculgrounds for the alarm of the Camarana, turist in regard to the future fortunes of the Cosome reduction of average and usual price from the removal of artificial restraints they are disposed to look forward; but when they consider the steady and rapid growth of population in the Corn-producing countries of the globe, they cannot but be persuaded that it would be unwise, whether in the friends or the opponents of commercial relaxation, to recom-mend or dissuade it on the ground of any great revolution in permanent prices to be operated by it: and their expectations of advantage, sanguine as these expectations are, have reference in a greater degree to the increased steadiness of the market, and to the vigor which general trade will derive from the removal of restraints upon the exchange of commodities, and agriculture from the cessation of all artificial influence disturbing the balance of its several pursuits, and from the wholesome stimulus that competition, which in farming pursuits can scarcely become overwrought, rarely fails to impart to industry.

I am unwilling to repeat at length the arguments which I have addressed to Your Lordship in my Despatch No. 66, of the 18th of May, with respect to the other great subject of the alarm of the Assembly, namely, the trade in Lumber. however, we revert to the year 1842, it cannot but be acknowledged that this was the case of a trade peculiarly artificial as it stood under the former law. The reduction, though graduated, was decisive; perhaps in no case has it been more so, and certainly in no case have more uniform confident or sincere prophecies of ruin been hazarded by the opponents of the change. The result is, that the export of Timber from British North America to this Country attained during the last year to a height which it had never reached under the more protective law. I do not mean that the withdrawal of protection was either the exclusive, or even the principal direct cause of this prosperity; although there cannot be a doubt that many trades have to refer their vigor to the fact that the absence of artificial support has in their case given free operation to the stimulus necessary for the developement of natural and permanent resources. Increased demand in the United Kingdom has without subject on the notice of that Government, and it will

doubt been the main and the immediate cause of the Foreign Wheat increased export of Wood from British North America; but it is the conviction of Her Majesty's Government that such increased demand was itself referable in no small degree to the relaxations of our Commercial Law, and therefore in its due proportion the growth of the Timber trade is truly and justly, even if circuitously, to be ascribed to that very diminution of protection from which its ruin had been anticipated. We are now to look forward with hope to a further increase of the consuming power of this country; a further encouragement to the use of Timber as compared with competing articles capable of being applied to the same purposes: a further encouragement to the use of Canadian Timber in combination with the wood of the Baltic, for those objects in regard to which the consumption of the one directly stimulates the consumption of the other; is it too much to hope that causes so similar may produce like effects, and that the caution with which Parliament has proceeded in the gradual reduction of the Timber Ducies to a moderate standard, may be again rewarded by the satisfaction with which it will witness a further growth in the Wood trade of Canada.

Her Majesty', Government therefore, cannot, on the part of the Imperial Exchequer, share in the fear that increased Freedom of Trade will have the effect of crippling the resources of those important Public Works which are designed to facilitate the transit of the Produce of Canada by the St. Lawrence to the Sea. They can by no means subscribe to the opinion that the comparative dearness of this route is an established fact; and they likewise feel that if they did subscribe to that opinion, although it might corroborate the propriety of the course they have pursued in suggesting to Parliament—the interposition of an interval before entire freedom shall be given to the Corn Trade, it could do no more: it could not induce them to ask, nor Parliament to grant, -nor, they are certain, could it induce the people of Canada to desire that the market of their Farm produce should be maintained by means of a perpetual tax upon the people of England.

In referring to the unchecked competition which, so far as British Law is concerned, will be established between Colonial and Foreign Corn by the repeal of the Corn Law, it perhaps may not have occurred to the Assembly, that British Law alone cannot suffice to establish this competition. The price which the Colonial and Foreign Exporters of Corn respectively will obtain for their Grain in Great Britain, must always be materially affected by the comparative degrees of facility which may be afforded in the country of the one and of the other, for the introduction of those British Goods by which payment for the Corn must substantially be made. British Goods Corn must substantially be made. are admitted into Canada at very low,—into the American Union, at very high Import Duties. effect of this is not merely to give the British Exporter a better position in the Canadian Market than in that of the United States, but to enable him to give a better price for the commodity he purchases in return, and therefore to give to the Corn Trade of Canada a corresponding advantage, so long as the present Tariffs continue over that of the United

With respect to that portion of the Address which prays Her Majesty to invite the Government of the United States to establish an equality of Trade between the Dominions of the Republic and the British North American Colonies, I am commanded to instruct Your Lord-hip to assure the Assembly that Her Majesty will readily cause directions to be given to Her Minister at Washington to avail himself of the earliest suitable opportunity to press this important

afford Her Majesty the most sincere satisfaction if Majesty to pass by the Address of the Canadian Foreign Wheat any communication which may hereafter be held for Assembly with a brief or merely formal answer, althis purpose, shall have the effect which is desired by Her fuithful Commons of Canada.

Her Majesty's Government have, as may be known to the Assembly, on several occasions endeavoured to make arrangements with Foreign Powers for the mutual relaxation of Tariffs; and similar attempts have taken place among Foreign powers, one with the other; but almost uniformly with ill success. Whatever arguments may be used to show the great increase of benefit that would accrue on both sides, if the United States could have been induced to act simultaneously for the purpose, experience has suffi-ciently shewn the difficulty of effecting these combined operations upon matters which are properly of domestic concern; and has suggested the wisdom of securing the incomplete advantage which depends upon our own free agency alone, rather than of fore-going it in the vain endeavour to realize benefits, larger indeed, but not within our reach.
Should the Government of the United States con-

tinue to maintain the scale of import duties now in force upon its frontier, Her Majesty's Government will view with regret a policy injurious to Canada: but they will reflect with satisfaction on the prevalence of laws more favourable to commerce on the Canadian side, and will anticipate from those laws both a direct benefit to the People and Trade of the Province, and the further advantage which a consistent example, given by this country and by its colonies, will, as they believe, not fail to realize, in disposing Foreign States towards the removal of restrictions on

With respect to that part of the Address which relates to the duty of one shilling per quarter, which it is proposed to charge on all Wheat imported into England after the repeal of the Corn Law, I am to refer Your Lordship to my Despatch No. 56, of the 18th of April, on the same subject. From the purport of that Despatch it would, of course, be even more difficult to recede at a period when the Bill introduced into the House of Commons by the Advisers of the Crown has passed through all its stages in that House, and has been affirmed as to its principle on the second reading in the House of Lords.

It is necessary for me here to offer an explanation with regard to an expression of mine which appears to have given rise to misapprehension. I have stated to Your Lordship in a previous Despatch that Her Majesty's Government desire that the Trade of Canada should in all respects approach as near to perfect freedom as the dispositions of its inhabitants and the exigencies of the Public Revenue there may permit; and from this it is inferred that the amount of 1s. per quarter, which has been adopted for a long period in this country as the standard of a nominal duty upon Corn, ought to be removed. But the language which I employed had reference to the Trade of Canada as affected by laws applicable in her own markets and on her own waters. Indeed, if the allusion had been to a rigid and perfect equality of trade in the ports and markets of this country, its first and most important bearing would, I apprehend, have been, not upon the nominal duty of a shilling which it is proposed to retain upon Colonial in common with Foreign Corn, but rather upon the very considerable duties of fifteen and eighteen shillings respectively, which, as against nominal duties of one or two shillings on Canadian Timber and Deals, it is proposed to continue to charge on the corresponding foreign articles.

Her Majesty's Government in the discharge of their duty to the Crown and to the people of this country, and likewise to the Empire at large, have

though the advanced stage at which the deliberations of Parliament have now arrived might have afforded at least a technical justification for such a course. They have thought a more frank and full exposition of their views of this great question in its bearings upon Canada, was due to the important body from which the Address proceeds, and from which they are well assured may be anticipated the most candid consideration even of arguments opposed to their own. It is due especially on account of the importance of that body and of the Province of Canada; but even in the case of the smallest portion of Her subjects, I have it in command to say that it would equally have been the desire of Her Majesty that such a frank exposition of the policy of Her Government should be made. Her Majesty does not recognize the distinction between Her nearer and Her more remote subjects with reference to a matter so nearly touching Her relation towards them, and the duties and the sentiments of consideration and affection which it involves. Nor can She recognize in this view any distinction between the more and the less powerful, particularly at a time when Her Parliament is engaged in the discussion of measures which are recommended to its notice, especially upon the ground that they tend to improve the condition of the most numerous and the least opulent classes of Her people. It would indeed be a source of the greatest pain to Her Majesty's Government, if they could share in the impression that the connection between this country and Canada derived its vitality from no other source than from the exchange of commercial preferences. If it were so it might appear to be a relation consisting in the exchange, not of benefits, but of burthens; if it were so, it would suggest the idea that the connection itself had reached or was about to reach the legitimate term of its existence. But Her Majesty's Government still augur for it a long duration, founded upon a larger and firmer basis,—upon protection rendered from the one side, and allegiance freely and loyally returned from the other,—upon common traditions of the past and hopes of the future,-upon resemblances in origin, in laws and in manners, in what invariably binds men and communities of men together, as well as in the close association of these material interests which, as Her Majesty's Government are convinced, are destined not to recede but to advance, not to be severed but to be more closely and healthfully combined under the quickening influences of increased commercial freedom.

My Lord,
I have to acknowledge the receipt of Your Lordship's Despatch of the 5th June, No. 69, transmitting an Address to Her Majesty from the Legislative Assembly of Canada, which relates to the exemption from Duty of Live Stock and other Provisions imported from the United States for the use of the Royal Troops serving there.

It is the opinion of Her Majesty's Advisers that the principles which appear to be recognized in the Address are just; namely, that Supplies required for the use of Her Majesty's Forces ought not to be enhanced in price by means of imposts placed upon them for the advantage of the Provincial Treasury; but that, on the other hand, as it has been found by experience that a direct exemption, by anticipation, from Customs Duty has led to fraud, and threatens, in certain cases, to neutralize the effect of laws which have been passed by the Provincial Assembly and the Legislative Council, and have received the assent of the Crown, such elemption ought not to be continued.

In the Despatch to which reference has been made, Her Majesty's Government and no other purpose, so far as this particular subject is concerned, than to make provision for giving effect to the first of these principles. As to the question whether the end is to be attained by an express enactment of exemption

But I need scarcely observe that the principle which has been laid down, and of which I have now endeavoured to guard the application, extends alike to all articles imported into Canada, and charged with Customs Duty, and not merely to such as may

be imported from the United States.

I am therefore to desire that you will in due time apprise the Legislative Assembly that Her Majesty entirely participates in their desire that, while the Supplies required for the use of Her Majesty's Forces, are relieved from the burden of any direct impost, this rule should not inconveniently interfere with the general structure or operation of the Law: and any arrangement which secures such relief and avoids such interference, will be satisfactory to Her Majesty.

I forbear from addressing you further in respect to the Act itself, until I shall have been definitively informed of the amendments which have been made in it, and of the form in which it stands for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure; in the mean time I have, I hope, sufficiently conveyed to you the general view by which Her Majesty will be guided so far as the particular subject of the exemption of Sup-

plies from Duty is concerned.

My Lord,

I have to acknowledge the receipt of Your Lord- Indian Preship's Despatch No. 58, of the 16th May, in which sents. you transmit an Address to the Queen from the Legislative Assembly of Canada, representing the objections which they entertain to the discontinuance of the usual Presents to the descendants of the Indians in that Province, who should be born after the 1st of last May.

I have laid this Petition before the Queen, and Her Majesty has been pleased to receive the same very graciously. I have, however, not felt myself at liberty to advise Her Majesty to adopt the conclusions of the House of Assembly on this subject. It is with much regret that I have been compelled to differ from the views of that House, supported as they are by your own recommendation; but on a full consideration of the subject, I cannot regard the request now preferred as one which would justify me in departing from the conclusion formed by Lord Stanley.

There appears to be no ground for regarding the continuance of the Presents as guaranteed on the honor of the British Crown. In the Report of the Committee of the Assembly, references are made to a "pledge." But of the existence of any direct pledge of the nature alluded to, no evidence is adduced; and the Report seems to rely rather on the general conduct of the local Executive as implying a pledge, which I do not find from the records of this Office has ever received the deliberate sanction of Her Majesty's Government. I can therefore only look upon this as a question of policy, and as such I am con-strained to state that neither, on the ground of securing the defence of the Province against external enemies, nor on the ground of the interests of the Indians from duty beforehand, or by a repayment or allowance themselves, can I regard it as desirable to depart

from the intention of effecting a gradual reduction of these Presents.

Mr. Ermatinger, from the Select Committee to which was referred the Petition of M. M'Kenzie and others, of Aldborough and other Townships, in the District of London, and other references, with power to report by Bill or otherwise, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee; which was again read at the Clerk's table, and agreed to by the House; and is as followeth:-

Your Committee have examined the contents of the Petition praying that the Townships of Aldborough, Dunwich, Southwold, Yarmouth, Malahide, Bayham, and south half of South Dorchester, may be set off and formed into a new District, to be called the District of Elgin. The said Petition is signed by 2260 inhabitants of the Townships desirous for the division of the London District.

Your Committee have also examined the statements contained in the said Petition, namely, that the said Townships contain a population of about 20,000 inhabitants; with 80,000 acres cultivated, and 400,000 acres uncultivated Land, the assessed value of property therein being about £250,000, and yielding a revenue of £3000 per annum.

Your Committee have compared these statements with the latest official returns, and have reason to believe, allowing for the difference of time at which the said returns were made, that they cannot be far from correct.

Your Committee have also examined the situation of the said Townships, and find that they occupy a frontage on the shores of Lake Eric, of between 50 and 60 miles, by 12 to 15 miles in depth; and although the position of the said Townships is not such as to afford a spot as central as could be desired in the formation of a new District, for a District Town, Your Committee are nevertheless of opinion, that St. Thomas, the place named by the Petitioners, from the circumstance of the main Road between Brantford and Anderstburgh east and west, and Port Stanley to London north and south, passing through it, is the best place that could be chosen for the new District Town.

Your Committee have also examined the Petition of W. F. Wallace and others, signed by 63 inhabitants of the London District, praying that the said District may not be divided, as desired by 2260 other inhabitants, as already shewn, but giving no sufficient reasons why the division prayed for should not take place.

Your Committee have accordingly prepared a Bill for the erection of a new District, which they have the honor to submit to Your Honorable House.

Your Committee also examined the Petition of Charles M. Nixon and others, inhabitants of the Township of Bosanquet, praying that the said Township may be annexed to the District of London; and from the reasons stated by the Petitioners, namely, the great distance at which Bosanquet is situated from the County Town of the Western District, to which it is at present attached, subjecting the Petitioners to great inconvenience in attending to public business, and precluding them from taking part in the Municipal concerns of the Western District,—are of opinion that the prayer of the Petitioners ought to be granted.

We feel bound to declare to Your Majesty, that while we believe that this House and the people of. the Province are most desirous to welcome to the nada, being read; Colony all those of their fellow subjects who may think proper to emigrate from the parent country to settle among them, we are convinced that a continued emigration of a similar character to that which is now taking place, is calculated to produce a most injurious effect upon our prosperity, unless conducted upon some more systematic principle.

We beseech the interference of Your Majesty under the infliction with which this land has been visited, and is still further threatened, not to permit the helpless, the starving, the sick and diseased, unequal and unfit as they are to face the hardships of a settler's life, to embark for these shores, which, if they reach, they reach in too many instances only to find a grave.

We humbly pray Your Majesty that measures may be adopted by Your Majesty's Government, that the Emigrant Ships may be large and airy; that ample space may be allotted to the Emigrants, and that a larger allowance of better food than is now furnished, with sufficient Medical attendance, shall be always provided on board.

We hearbly inform Your Majesty that, in the opinion of this House, an unusually large expenditure must be made in this Province, in the present season, to meet such unexampled destitution and distress and we assure Your Majesty of our confident belief that the justice, as well as the liberality of the Imperial Government, will provide for this expenditure from the Imperial Funds.

That from documents in possession of this House, it is evident that every effort is being made by the neighbouring State of New York, not only to secure to itself the trade of the West, but to attract the transit trade of the British Provinces to the City of New York, and that a consitutional provision has been made for establishing a Sinking Fund, derivable from the Tolls of the Erie Canal, to pay off the existing Public Debt
- 2. That the present rate of Tolls levied on a ton of Merchandize from Buffalo to Albany, a distance of 366 miles, is \$4,80, or 24s. currency, and on a barrel of Flour 31 cents, which, in the year 1846, yielded a revenue of \$2,800,000.
- That the Provincial Government has created a Public Debt of nearly £4,000,000, principally in the construction of Canals connecting Lake Ene with the Ocean, which Canals yet remain unfinished.
- That the entire revenue from Public Works in this Province amounts to £44,335 3s., a sum susceptible of a ten-fold increase, by the adoption of measures calculated to counteract the efforts of the State of New York, by opening out the natural channel for the transmission of the products of the Wheat growing States of the Union, and the products of this Province, to Britain, at a lesser cost than the same can be shipped via New York.
- 5. That, in the opinion of this House, the greatest exertion should be made to finish the Public Works the present season—that the resources to be derived therefrom be made available to secure a revenue, in default of which, the Provincial Debt cannot be provided for, while Taxes will continue to increase, and the inhabitants of the Province will not be in a position to compete successfully for this trade.
- That the comparative distances and dimensions of the two routes from the great Lakes to the Ocean, via the St. Lawrence, and through the Eric Canal, clearly prove the advantages the former possesses—the one having only 66 miles of artificial navigation, while the other has 366 —the one, on the completion of the Works, being capable of conveying Vessels carrying 4,000 barrels, while the other admits of craft not over 800 barrels, and that, too, with the actual

necessity of transhipment.

7. That in 1845-6 the average price of freight on Merchandize from Albany to Buffalo, was 40e. per ton-of which the State received 24s., and the Forwarder 16s.

That the above statement bears evidence that when the large Canals are finished, Tolls may be imposed, both up and down, for the purposes of Revenue; that prices of freight may be reduced one half from those heretofore paid on the St. Lawrence, and still keep under the prices paid on the Erie Canal.

That, therefore, notwithstanding the difficulties of the Navigation of the St. Lawrence, this House feels every confidence that, with ordinary good management, and the removal of restrictions, this route would be cheaper, more rapid, and more generally beneficial than that via New York; and that finally it would attract the greater portion of the products of the Western States this way for shipment to Europe.

12. That, therefore, it is, in the opinion of this House, highly desirable that the Navigation of the River St. Lawrence should be thrown open to the World, and all restrictions to the export and import trade of the Province removed,thereby the energy of the inhabitants of this Colony would be brought into immediate action; its unbounded resources developed; its natural advantages and extensive water communications rendered available; and the productions of Canada would be thrown into the Markets of Great Britain upon equitable terms, while so long as restriction is maintained cannot be, from the advantage given to the Foreigner over the Colonist.

In the House of Assembly, 29th March, 1847.

1. Resolved, That it is the opinion of this House, that the extravagant charges for Postage within this Colony, and throughout the Provinces of Canada, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island, operate injuriously to the social and commercial interests of the people.

2. Resolved, That in the opinion of this House, the interests of this Province, in common with those of the other Colonies above mentioned, would be materially advanced by the introduction of one uniform rate of Colonial and inter-Colonial Postage, reduced in amount below the lowest rate in the existing scale.

3. Resolved, That the substitution of such reduced and uniform rate for the scale of rates which are now established—when once its practical operation were fairly tested by experience, and the immediate repression which might be its first result, were succeeded by the elasticity that would be the effect of improved and cheaper means of communication by Mail,-would, in the opinion of this House, sustain, if indeed it would not increase, the revenue derived from the Department in question.

4. Resolved, That this House deeply impressed with a sense of the advantage which might be anticipated for this Province, from the greater facilities of intercourse, moral, intellectual, commercial, and social, that one uniform low rate of Postage charges would confer, even if for some years those advantages should be counter-balanced by a deficiency of revenue, and a consequent increased charge upon the general funds of the Province, for maintenance of the Provincial Post Office, is of opinion that a uniform rate of three pence, Currency, should be established for Postage throughout this Province, and that the House will be prepared to provide, by grant, for any deficiency of Post Office Revenue, to meet the necessary expenditure for internal communications, should such happen to exist.

5. Resolved, That in the opinion of this House, it is desirable to have the concurrence of the Legislatures of Canada, New Brunswich, and Prince Edward Island, with that of this Province, in views and measures, directed to the attainment of an improved system of management of the Post Office Department as far as respects these Colonies, and to the accomplishment of the proposed uniform rate of Postage founded on the recognition of common principles, and of the necessity of an independent authority placed in some one of the Colonies

of Assembly of that Province, relative to the Post referred to, and constituted for purposes of central Department organization and direction of the Department under consideration, within certain limits to be prescribed and defined with the concurrent sanction of the Legislatures of Canada, and of the Lower Colonics.

> 6. Resolved, That it is the opinion of this House, that such consentaneous views and measures would result in the establishment of an uniform and harmonious system of management of inter-Colonial Post Office Affairs, that would not present the possibility of any collision of the Colonial or inter-Colonial authorities with the Imperial Functionaries charged with the management of the General Post Office, nor interfere with the interests of the Empire in connection with that Department, whilst it would leave the net Post Office Revenue of each Colony, if such should exist, after deducting the expenses of management and communication within its limits, under the control of that particular Pro-

After such an examination of the nature of the work as they have been enabled to give, they are decidedly of opinion that their utility, as a work of reference, would in a great measure be lost were they to continue in manuscript form; and as they find upon an examination that there is only one complete set of the Journals for each Province, remaining in the possession of Your Honorable House, and as these Indices are in point of fact a complete digest of the Journals to which they relate, it would appear most desirable that they should be printed, without delay, under the direction of the Compilers.

Emigration.

My Lord,

I have had the honor of receiving Your Lordship's Despatch, No. 7, of February 25th, with its enclosures on the subject of Emigration. The papers furnished to you by Mr. Draper and by Mr. Buchanan certainly place in a strong light the difficulties of any plan for the systematic settlement of Emigrants which has yet been proposed; difficulties which are greatly increased, or more properly speakwhich are greatly increased, or more properly speaking, are mainly to be traced to the manner in which so large a portion of the Public Lands of Canada have already been alienated, and to the fact that by long usage men's minds are become habituated to the irregular and unsystematic methods of occupying the territory which have hitherto prevailed.

I cannot hope that, under these circumstances, it will be practicable during the present season, to carry into effect any scheme of colonization in the proper sense of the word, and I am compelled to come to the conclusion, that all that can be done for the present in the property in the present of the present in the present of the present is to persevere in the use of the same means which have for some years been employed, in order to afford to the very large number of Emigrants who are now flocking to the Ports of embarkation the assistance they will require when they reach the Colonies.

But though more than this may for the present be impracticable, I confess that even the able papers of Mr. Draper and of Mr. Buchanan, supported, as I must admit them to be, by the testimony of all the gentlemen of practical experience upon this subject, whom I have had the means of consulting, have not been able to satisfy me that with the co-operation of the Provincial Legislature, it would be impossible to establish some system for the future, by which colonization might be carried forward upon a more regular plan, and upon a larger scale than has yet been attempted. The persuasion that this might be accomplished is very generally entertained in this country; and I have the honor of enclosing a memorial, addressed to the First Lord of the Treasury (just published as a pamphlet,) which advocates the adoption of such a measure, and which has been so strongly pressed upon the consideration of Her Ma-jesty's Government, that I am anxious to learn what may be the opinion which, with the extensive means enabled, in the course of a few years to realize pro-

of obtaining accurate information upon the subject Emigration. within your reach, Your Lordship may form upon it. You will observe that although the pamphlet is written with talent, and there is much that is striking in all the preliminary observations, in the practical part of the plan which it is intended to advocate, there is considerable vagueness and obscurity, and an absence of those details, in the arrangement of which so much of the difficulty of every scheme of Emigration has been found to consist. So far, however, as details are given, the suggested measure seems to be open to serious objections. I greatly doubt whether the District Councils, upon the co-operation of which so much reliance is placed, are bodies which would be found either able or willing to afford the aid expected from them in carrying on Public Works, with the view of affording employment to Emigrants. I also greatly doubt whether any advantage, at all proportioned to the cost, would arise from the proposal to pay to a great Company the sum of five pounds for every Emigrant settled upon the land. I find from the information collected by the Emigrant Commissioners, and published in their last circular, that in the last twenty years, 1,337,000 persons have emigrated to different parts of North America, of whom, by far, the majority were of the laboring class. These Emigrants have, for the most part, ultimately established themselves as settlers, or as permanent residents in the Towns, without any cost to the public, beyond the trifling sums annually expended under the system now in force; but had the plan of the authors of this pamphlet been in operation, the gratuitous assistance offered would have attracted to the British Provinces a large proportion of those who have actually gone to the *United States*; and it is a very moderate estimate to suppose that bounty would have been claimed for the settlement of 400,000 of these Emigrants, so that the sum of £2,000,000 would have been thus expended. To this must be added the proposed contribution of one third of the cost of the paragraphs. sage to America, of the whole body of Emigrants, which calculated at only £1 for each Emigrant, would have amounted to £1,337,000. Thus, without accomplishing more than has now been accomplished, at scarcely any expense to the public, a total expenditure would have been incurred of no less than £3,337,000, and it would only have been the money in excess of this amount so laid out which would have really contributed to increase the stream of Emigration from this country.

But assuming that Parliament were prepared to grant such a very large sum of money for this purpose, I cannot but believe that more would really be accomplished towards encouraging Emigration by applying it to the construction of great Public Works such for instance as Railways—by which employment would be provided for a large number of Emigrants in the first instance, and a great extent of land would be rendered far more accessible, and therefore available for settlement, than it now is. The demand for labor thus created would, I am inclined to think, create a spontaneous Emigration to a larger extent, and of a more healthy character, than the adoption of such a scheme as has been suggested.

So far as I can at present judge of this scheme, it does not, therefore, appear to me to be one calculated to succeed; but as I have already observed, I am not yet convinced that with the effective co-operation of the Colonial Legislature, a great extension, and, at the same time, a more regular character might not be given to the present tide of Emigration, without imposing any considerable, perhaps even any permanent, burthen upon the British Treasury. We know that unaided and undirected in their efforts as they now are, numbers of the Emigrants who reach Canada with no resource but their labor to trust to, are

perty, and even to remit considerable sums of money to the friends and relations they have left behind. It is also notorious that in the present mode of conducting the settlement of the territory, there is a great waste of labor, and that far less results are obtained by means of the same amount of exertion than principles on which they rest must be steadily might be looked for, under a system which secured a greater degree of mutual co-operation and assistance amongst those who now trust, in a great measure to their individual and isolated efforts. It is impossible to read any of the numerous and interesting accounts, published during the last few years, of the life of settlers in the backwoods of British America and of the United States, without being struck with the hard-ships and difficulties endured by them, and with the great waste of labor incurred entirely in consequence of the want of some means of giving increased officiency to labor by combination and by the divi-sion of employments. We hear continually of bread being scarce where corn is cheap and abundant, because, from the distance of mills and the badness of the roads, it takes many days of toilsome labor for men and horses to carry a small quantity of corn to be ground, and to bring it back in the shape of flour. We hear of days wasted in, perhaps, the busiest part of the season, in carrying to a distant Forge to be repaired, some necessary implement of agriculture, which in England would be taken to the village shop, and be again ready for use in an hour. I say nothing (important as are such considerations) of the privations which scattered! settlers necessarily undergo from the want of adequate means of religious instruction, of education for their children, and of medical assistance, and of the absence of all the main advantages of civilized society. Looking merely to the pecuniary results of the existing mode of settlement, it seems to me impossible to doubt that it is highly wasteful, and that the same! labor better applied and directed, might produce a far larger amount of comfort and advantage to the early settlers in a new territory, and exempt them from many of the privations and hardships to which they are now exposed. It is difficult to understand what natural obstacle prevents such a territory from being occupied, not by individuals, but by Societies properly organized for mutual support and assistance, carrying with them as they advance, all the means and appliances of civilization. For this purpose what seems to be most required, is to carry further than has yet been done, the principle of making all who obtain land, pay for it such a price as at once to afford the means of effecting those improvements by the construction of Roads and Bridges, and by erecting Schools and other Public Buildings, which are necessary for its regular and systematic occupation. If no public lands were alienated but at a price sufficient to pay for such improvements, and if the money obtained from their sale were so expended, land would only be purchased where the improvements were already in progress, while the settler receiving in return for the enhanced price he paid for land, not only the land but the advantage of those works by which its profitable occupation is facilitated, would not in reality pay more, perhaps well considered and systematic plan of colonization in not so much, for the mere land, as when it is disposed British America, believing that this would be attended of at a very low and almost nominal price. the previous improvident alienation of large quantities of land presents an obstacle to the adoption of the system of selling land in this manner, precisely the same results are attainable by of an ill-matured and impracticable scheme; nor do I the imposition of a moderate tax upon all land think it possible to proceed without the hearty co-whether wild or reclaimed, and applying the pro-poperation of the Provincial Legislatures. It is for ceeds to the same sort of improvements. tax is not felt as any practical burthen upon settled land, but presents a powerful bar to the acquisition, or retention of land which cannot be turned to some account.

Such are the considerations (as it appears to me Emigration the just and important considerations) upon which the policy I have now described has been recommended. I have thought it right thus shortly to recapitulate them to Your Lordship, because the borne in mind in judging of any plan of colonization. Acting upon these principles, I am of opinion that the mode in which colonization may with most prospect of success be promoted, is by the application of any money which may be hereafter granted, or advanced by Parliament for this purpose, in opening land for settlement, by making such improvements as I have described, or by constructing Public Works of a more important character, such as Railways and In this manner immediate employment might be afforded to the Emigrants, while at the same time they would be trained in those descriptions of labor most required in the country in which they are ultimately to settle. I agree with Mr. Draper in thinking it desirable that Emigrants going out as laborers should not permanently continue as such, but should, as speedily as possible, be converted into small landowners; but I am of opinion that the only way in which this object can be effected with safety and advantage, is by affording them, in the first instance, employment at good wages, by which the provident and industrious amongst them will speedily be enabled to purchase land, and by doing so, (supposing the system I have recommended be adopted,) they will repay the sums, originally advanced to them, in wages while employed upon those Works which have opened the land they have acquired for permanent setttlement. The effect, in short, of the measures I have thus sketched, rather than described, would be to effect settlements by means of advances by the State; but with this important qualification, that these advances would be made in such a manner as to avoid constituting the State the creditor of a numerous body of small settlers, thus tempting them to improvidence and discouraging industry; and instead of this the public money would be invested in the improvement of land, the property in which would only be transferred when a price sufficient to cover the expense incurred was paid for it. It was upon these views that the plan of forming Villages detailed in my Despatch of December 31st, was founded; and Mr. Draper has misunderstood me in supposing that I meant the laborers established in the proposed Villages to continue in that rank of life. What I contemplated was, that they should be encouraged to purchase farms in the immediate neighbourhood of the Villages in which they were originally established, and to improve by degrees the log-houses at first provided for them, into comfortable dwellings. I thought, and still think, that living together in Villages would be favorable to civilization and improvement, nor do I see that this would be at all inconsistent with their cultivating the adjoining and

surrounding lands as proprietors.

I have only to add, that Her Majesty's Government share in the strong desire which has been so generally expressed, to promote the adoption of some with great benefit both to the Colonies and to the Mother Country. But great as would be the advantages of such a measure, they would still be less than the evils which might follow from the hasty adoption Such a these reasons that I have so fully explained to you a settled my views upon the subject. I confidently leave it to your judgment, after consulting the Lieutenant Governors of the Lower Provinces, and the members of your Council, to determine in what manner the coEmigration.

operation of the different Legislatures may be best invited; assuring you that if you should be able to arrange with them any plan which may appear calculated to prove successful, Her Majesty's Servants will not be slow to propose, nor, judging from the opinions generally expressed, would Parliament be slow to sanction the employment of the pecuniary resources of this country in furtherance of such an object. Government Emigration Office, Quebec, 3rd July, 1847.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 25th ultimo, transmitting me, by command of His Excellency the Governor General, Copy of an Address of the Legislative Assembly, calling for information as to the manner in which the provisions of the Passengers Act have been observed by Vessels bringing Emigrants to this Province during the present season, particularizing any infractions of the Law.

In reply, I have the honor to state, that the provisions of the Passengers Act appear to have been very generally observed by the Masters of the Emigrant Vessels of the present season. I have had comparatively few complaints on the part of Emigrants, on the subject of their treatment on board of Vessels, or the supplies of provisions or water issued to them; and such as have been preferred have proved, on examination into the circumstances, to be either trivial in character or ill-founded. One exception only is required to be made in the application of this remark. In the case of the Birman, Guthrie Master, from London, there appeared to me, in the statements made by the Passengers, proper grounds for the institution of proceedings against the Master, for having issued an insufficient supply of water on the passage. The parties however relieved me of the duty of prosecuting, by entering into a compromise, under the 33rd clause of the Act, by which the Master paid £10 to the Quebec Fund for distressed Emigrants.

One or two other cases have occurred this season, Passengers Act. which might have called for my interference. The complaints were made to me in Montreal, the parties having been brought up direct from Grosse Isle; but as to have commenced any proceedings against the Vessels would have obliged the complainants to return to Quebec, which they declined to do, I was obliged to forego any legal inquiry into the cases.

I may be further permitted to add, that in consequence of the increased number of Government Emigration Agents in Ireland, and the strict instruc-tion issued by the Emigration Commissioners, through the Board of Customs, the regulations of the Act are more strictly enforced previously to the sailing of the Vessels; and complaints and infractions of the law, which in former years were of frequent occurrence, are now comparatively few.

Relief of the distress in Ireland and Scotland.

My Lord,

I have to acknowledge the receipt of Your Lordship's Despatch, No. 50, of the 28th of May, in which you report that a very large amount had been subscribed in the Province of Canada, for the relief of the distress prevailing in Ireland and Scotland.

I have perused this statement with a deep sense of the benevolent and liberal feeling which has been evinced by the inhabitants of Canada, for their distressed fellow-subjects in the United Kingdom, and it is most gratifying to learn that the Native Tribes have not been backward in taking their part in so laudable a work.

My Lord,

I have to acknowledge the receipt of Your Lord- Emigrants at ship's Despatch, No. 51, of the 28th May, and of its the Quarantine Station. enclosures, reporting the wretched condition of the Emigrants who have arrived at the Quarantine Station in the River St. Lawrence, up to the 26th May.

I am extremely concerned to receive this lamentable account of the state of the Passengers on their arrival in Canada, and I hasten to instruct Your Lordship to adopt all the measures which may appear to you best calculated to mitigate their sufferings, whether by increasing the number of Medical Attendants at the Quarantine Station, or providing a greater extent of accommodation, even if for that purpose it should unfortunately be necessary to exceed the amount of the vote which has been obtained from Parliament for these services.

It is very satisfactory to me to learn from the Board of Ordnance, that on Your Lordship's application to the Commander of the Forces in Canada, the Ord-nance Officers in the Province have already forwarded to the Quarantine Station, tents capable of containing 10,000 persons, and that a detachment of Troops has also been furnished for the purpose of erecting and taking charge of the tents.

This proceeding will have afforded prompt and seasonable relief to the Emigrants, and obtains my complete approval.

Your Committee would further observe, that should it be deemed expedient by Your Honorable House to grant but one privilege for building a Bridge over the River des Prairies, they have no doubt that the Bridge proposed to be built by Mr. Lachapelle would be profitable and advantageous, in the event of Manufactories being established at the Village of Sault au Recollet; but they, nevertheless, are of opinion that the Bridge at present proposed by Mr. Vieau and others, would be far more advantageous to the mass of the travelling community, and would greatly facilitate the transportation of Agricultural products to Mont-

Your Committee have considered the Petition of Louis Guillet, Esquire, Member for the County of Champlain in this present Parliament, referred to them by your Order of the 14th June last, and have taken Evidence touching the matter referred to the said Petition, (which Evidence is hereto appended.)

Your Committee find that, at the time of his election, Mr. Guillet was employed under the Honorable John Stewart, Esquire, late Commissioner for the management of the Jesuits' Estates, in the District of Three Rivers, as an under agent in the administra-tion of those Estates: That he held that employment under an appointment made through Mr. Stewart, as his immediate superior officer, in the same manner that similar subordinate appointments are made through the Commissioner of Crown Lands, in the Crown Lands Department; the security given by him, for the due performance of his duties, having been given directly to the Crown, and not to Mr. Stewart, although in the routine of such duties, the course was for him to account to Mr. Stewart as his immediate superior,—his remuneration consisting of a per centage on the monies he collected.

Committee on Privileges and First Report of Committee on Privileges and Elections.

Your Committee further find that, since his election, by a new Departmental arrangement made by the Government, the office of Commissioner for the management of the Jesuits' Estates has been abolished, and Mr. Guillet has been directed to account henceforth to the Commissioner of Crown Lands; but that no new appointment was deemed necessary to be made in consequence of such new arrangement; and the employment or under agency so held by Mr. Guillet remains, as respects its dependency on the Executive Government of the Province, identically in the same position as before such new arrangement was made.

Your Committee are therefore of opinion, that Mr. Guillet's employment as under agent in the administration of the said Estates, does not, according to the Evidence submitted, bring him within the meaning of the first section of the Act 7 Vict. c. 65; and that Mr. Guillet is, therefore, not disqualified from being elected and returned, and sitting and voting in Parliament under that Act.

And your Committee are also of opinion, that Mr. Guillet continuing to hold such employment or under agency, after the said new arrangement, does not amount to a new acceptance of office from the Crown, within the meaning of the fourth section of the same Act, and that Mr. Guillet has not, therefore, vacated his seat by having so continued in such employment or under agency.

EVIDENCE.

Wednesday, 23rd June, 1847.

Honorable Denis Benjamin Papineau, Commissioner of Crown Lands, called in; and being interrogated, answered :- In consequence of the change in the management of the Jesuits' Estates, which had been transferred from the Commissioner (Mr. Stewart,) to the Crown Lands Department, Mr. Guillet was notified thereof by a circular letter, dated 23rd October, 1846, (annexed, marked A.) Mr. Guillet communicated under date 17th October, a letter to myself, (annexed, marked B.) Mr. Guillet was not continued in his position by any order of the Executive Government, but remained as he was; as I considered that that part of his Department was already efficiently organized; and I informed Mr. Guillet that his Petition to the Executive Council would be useless, as I did not contemplate any change, (as per my letter dated 22d October, 1846, annexed, marked C.) Mr. Guillet was instructed by me to proceed to the sale of a certain portion of land belonging to the Jesuits' Estates, situated in the locality in which he was acting as agent; and, in accordance with those instructions, he subsequently made sale of the same, as stated in his letter to me of 15th May, 1847, (annexed, marked D.) There was no other sale made of Jesuits' lands by Mr. Guillet; but he made some valuations, as the agent, for the purposes of the commutation by tenure. In the Seigniory of Champlain, behind which, and between the Estates of the Jesuits and that Seigniory, there are some lands belonging to the Crown, the management of lands belonging to the Crown, the management of the Country o which was placed under the charge of Mr. Guillet for convenience sake; his instructions to act were given him verbally. I cannot say whether or not Mr. Guillet has made sale of any timber on the Crown Lands above mentioned, the lines not having been established.

Thursday, 1st July, 1847.

Louis Guillet, Esquire, attended before the Committee, and being asked if he had any statement or correspondence to submit to the Committee touching his Petition, he answered that he laid before the Committee several letters and commissions to him-

self touching the situation he held under the Com-missioner for the management of the Jesuits' Es-Privileges and tates; he also stated that the sale of the land re- Elections. ferred to in Mr. Papineau's evidence, was proved by him (Mr. Guillet) as a Notary, in the name of Mr. Papineau, the Crown Lands Commissioner.
Thursday, 8th July, 1847.

The Honorable Dominich Daly, Secretary of the Province, attended by request of the Committee, and made the following statement relative to the Petition of Mr. Guillet:—I have no record in my office of Mr. Guillet, the Member, holding any office under the Government. The Agents for the sale of Crown Lands receive no notification or Commission through my Department; they are appointed by the Governor in Council, and such appointment notified to them through the Crown Lands Department. Since the management of the Jesuits' Estates has been vested in that Department, I consider the appointment of Agents for their management would take place in the same manner as other Crown Lands I am not aware that any appointment of Jesuits' Estates Agents has been made since the change in the management of that Department. The Crown Lands Agents are not removeable at the pleasure of the head of the Department; and I believe the Jesuits' Estates Agents are in the same position. I am quite sure the Commissioner of the Jesuits' Estates could not make any appointment, or remove any Agent, without the consent of the Executive Government; which officers are, at present, as respects their dependency on the Executive Government, identically in the same position as before the late arrangement, except that they are accountable to another superior officer.

Mr. Williams, from the Select Committee to which Lake St. Peter. was referred the Return to an Address laid before this House on the second instant, containing the Report of Captain Bayfield, R.N., and other documents, on the improvement of the navigation of Lake St. Peter, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee, which was again read at the Clerk's table; and is as followeth:-

Your Committee having attentively and considerately examined the voluminous and important Do-cuments submitted to them by Your Honorable House, beg leave to make the following Report, as the result of their investigations on this momentous and hitherto controvertible question.

Your Committee have in evidence, that the cut through the St. Francis bank, to make an artificial Channel through Lake St. Peter, was undertaken and

Lake St. Peter. proceeded with on erroneous data of the contemplated expenditure, and seriously at variance with what might have reasonably been anticipated, and in contravention of the enactment of 4 and 5 Vic. c. 38, sec. 15; and on this subject Captain Bayfield, in his Report of 17th September last, makes the following observations:—" If, in the first instance, when I was "consulted before the commencement of the works, "it had been represented to me that the amount of "exervation required to deepen the new Channel, and consequently the expense, would be nearly double of that required in the old Channel, instead " of its having been inconsiderately stated to me, by "an authority, the competency of which I could not "doubt, that on a comparison of the two Channels, "it was found that the quantity to be removed in the straight Channel was but little more than "what would be necessary in the crooked one,' I " might have doubted whether any advantages pos-" sessed by the new Channel could have afforded a "sufficient compensation for so great a difference of "expense, in the present burdened state of the Colo-"nial Revenue, and been compelled to decide in " favor of the attempt being made on the line of the "old Channel.

> Your Committee are disposed generally to coincide with Captain Bayfield in his last Report, in reference to the following particulars:-

> That if the artificial Channel be completed to the full extent contemplated by the late Board of Works, it will not then be available for the general purposes of trade, that neither steamboats nor vessels can navigate the said Channel at night.

That steamboats, with vessels in tow, may navigate the same in day time, but sailing vessels, with a large draught of water, cannot proceed in this Channel without being in tow of a steamer, even in the day time; that rafts must not be permitted to pass down the Lake by this Channel, to interrupt the navigation. Captain Bayfield also states, that to render this Channel available for general purposes, the cut through the St. Francis bank must be at least 100 fathoms wider than has been contemplated, and that to accomplish the same, the cost will be at least £80,000 or £90,000 more than has been appropriated.

Your Committee, however, in reference to the estimated cost of such a Channel, are decidedly of opinion that the sum of £400,000 will be inadequate to secure its ultimate completion; an expenditure which your Committee conceive would be unjustifiable, when they take into consideration that, on the completion of the St. Lawrence Canals, vessels will proceed from the Ports on the Upper Lakes with their cargoes direct to Quebec without transhipment; and even if completed to the breadth of 900 feet, and 14 in depth, as recommended by Captain Bayfield, at the cost above enumerated, that portion of the old natural Ship Channel which has a breadth from 1200 to 1500 feet, and a depth of 18 to 20 feet, for a distance of 41 miles down to the lower Light Vessel, would at all times be more advantageous to vessels of all classes both by day and night.

Your Committee agree with Captain Bayfield, that the current in both Channels is nearly the same, and coincide with him in opinion that it is no use to light up the new Channel when completed, for its use by night is not even contemplated; and also that the new Channel should be left open, considering it an additional Channel, although to a very limited extent, for the special purpose of ships of a large draught in the tow of steamers in the day time.

Your Committee, however, cannot agree with Captain Bayfield, that the gradual action of the current in the new Channel will annually improve its capabilities, but are more disposed to acquiesce, Act incorporating the St. Lawrence and Atlantic though with considerable limitation, in the evidence Railroad Company, and to extend the powers of the

given by Captain Bayfield, in reference to the im- Lake St. Peter. provement of the navigation of Lake St. Peter, before a Select Committee of the House of Assembly of Lower Canada on the 16th January, 1836, and reported in Appendix to vol. 45, viz: "it is not im"possible that the end first excavated might be filled "up by sand washing into it, by the time the other cend was reached;" and further, in the same evidence, in reference to the width of the contemplated cut through the bank of the St. Francis, Captain Bay-field purposes to limit the width of the excavation to 200 feet; and it could not well be less, says he, to allow vessels to turn in and pass each other without risk. In his recent Report, however, he appears to have recommended a Channel of 900 feet in width, which Your Committee conceive more adequate in magnitude for the purpose contemplated.

Your Committee are, however, conscious that a Channel of this magnitude would involve an expenditure of at least £400,000, a sum of £70,000 having already been expended in excavating a Channel of 50 yards in width, and there yet remains for excavation, to complete this Channel of 50 yards no less than 374,871 cubic yards, involving an additional expenditure of £28,500.

Your Committee find appended to Capt. Bayfield's Report, a Report of Committee of the Honorable Executive Council, dated 21st September, 1846, approved of by His Excellency the Governor General the same day, ordering that nothing should be undertaken at present that should exceed the cost of the appropriation of last Session. Your Committee trust that this wise determination will be persevered in, inasmuch as the advantages to be attained by a large outlay in this Channel, will not be, as your Committee conceive, commensurate with any increased expenditure.

With reference to the Report of a Committee of Inquiry held at Sorel, in relation to certain charges made against the Superintendent of the Works on Lake St. Peter, your Committee cannot but express their approbation of the promptitude and impartiality evinced in this investigation, and the judicious and satisfactory decision had thereon.

Mr. Ermatinger, from the Standing Committee on Seventh Report Private Bills, presented to the House the Seventh of Committee on Private Report of the said Committee, which was again read Bills. at the Clerk's table; and is as followeth:

Your Committee have examined the Bill to authorize the issuing of Letters Patent to Isaac Beecher for an improved Bark Mill, and having had sufficient evidence before them to prove the matters contained in the preamble, they beg leave to report the same with an amendment.

Address to Her Majesty, respecting the Duties on the Productions of

Mr. Merritt, from the Select Committee appointed to prepare and report the draught of an humble Address to Her Majesty, praying She will be pleased to recommend the removal of existing Duties on the Productions of *Canada*, when admitted into the markets of the Mother Country, presented to the House the Address prepared by the said Committee; which Address was again read at the Clerk's table, and agreed to by the House; and is as followeth:-

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN

We, Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Canada in Provincial Parliament assembled, humbly represent to Your Majesty, that during the last Session of the Provincial Legislature we humbly addressed Your Majesty, praying that the Duries on Coming and Pulsary, praying that the Duties on Grain and Pulse imported into the United Kingdom from Canada, should be reduced to the smallest possible amount.

That in the reply to the said Address received from Your Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, by a Despatch dated the 18th April, 1846, an objection was urged that the same reduction would, under the existing pledge to Parliament, take place on the same articles imported from Foreign countries.

Report on Pe-Bethu

Mr. Boulton, from the Select Committee to which vas referred the Petition of Donald Bethune, Esquire, and others, of the City of Toronto and of the Town of Niagara, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee, which was again read at the Clerk's table; and is as followeth:—

Your Committee have examined the Petition to them referred, the substance of which is as follows: That the Petitioners are the owners of the Royal Mail Line of Steamers on Lake Ontario, as also of several other Steamers plying on that Lake; and which they have acquired at an ontary of more than ninety thousand pounds: That the Petitioners have heard with great surprize that Mr. James Sutherland, who has for several years been in the employ of the Petitioners, in command of the Steamer Sovereign, owned by one of the Petitioners, Donald Bethune, has received assistance from Her Majesty's Government, to the extent of several thousand pounds, for the purpose of building an Iron Steamer to ply upon Lake Ontario: That the said Iron Steamer will be launched in a few days, and will shortly be in opposition to the Steamers of the Petitioners upon Lake Ontario: That the engine of the said Iron Steamer is built upon the same plan as those of the Petitioners, and by the same builders, and is nearly of the same power as that of the Steamer Princess Royal; and is no more calculated for a war Steamer than those of the Petitioners: That the Steamers of

the Petitioners have been examined by an officer of Report on Pe-Her Majesty's Dock Yard at Kingston, who has for-warded a favorable report to the Lords of the Admi-others. ralty of their ability to carry heavy guns: That the Petitioners beg leave to remonstrate against any such interference, on the part of Government, with their rights and interests: That the Petitioners are of opinion, that it was their right in common with all Her Majesty's subjects, to employ their capital and enterprize in the building of Steamers to be used on Lake Ontario; but the Petitioners beg leave to state that, in their humble opinion, it is inconsistent with the duty of Government to enter into competition with private enterprize in the manner complained of; that had there been a lack of enterprize or a want of means in the Colony to enter into the speculation of building Steamers suitable to the commerce or wants of this part of the Province, then it perhaps might have been not only proper, but the duty of Government to offer a bounty or other inducement, to enable private individuals to supply such want; but when it is notorious, in this part of *Canada*, that no such want exists, the Petitioners must take leave to say, that the present interference on the part of Government will, in its effects, be oppressive and injurious in a very great degree to the Petitioners and others who are owners of Steamers upon Lake Ontario, as it must tend to create an opposition between such owners as will seriously affect their interests, and reduce the value of their Steamboat property: That the Petitioners beg leave further to state, that they do not believe such an interference on the part of Government with private interests, as has been alluded to, would be attempted or tolerated between Liverpool and Dublin, or be-tween Liverpool and Glasgow, where there is ample private enterprize and capital to meet the wants of commerce in that respect; and that if it would be unjust to make the attempt there, it must be equally so here, although a distant Colony of Great Britain,—as the rights and interests of Colonists should be as sacred in the eyes of Government as those of inhabitants of Liverpool or Glasgow: That, if the owners of Steamers in this country are not safe in their speculations from the secret and undue connection that Government may form with any of the Commanders of their Vessels to oppose them in their business,—the more reprehensible and injurious because it is secret,—and if the Government can, from time to time, justifiably select, in private, one or more of the Commanders of the Steamers owned by persons of this country, (because it is a mere Colony,) and advance them large sums of money to build up a rival interest, it is impossible that the unaided efforts of persons unconnected with Government, or unaided by favoritism, can stand in opposition to the public resources of the country: That had an oppublic resources of the country: portunity been afforded to the Petitioners by public notice, or otherwise, to build one or more Iron Steamers in connection with Government, and had the Petitioners declined to avail themselves of such offer, they would in that case only have had themselves to blame for neglecting the opportunity afforded to them; but when their interests are opposed secretly and in the dark, and when the first intimation they have of any design on the part of the Government to build up such rival interest, is the resignation of one of their Commanders to commence the work of opposition, that the Petitioners feel that they have been most unjustly and unjustifiably interfered with by Government in the matter; and that such interference, under circumstances so unusual and injurious, (particularly when the remonstrance of one of the Petitioner's has been treated with the most perfeet indifference by Government,) cannot but tend to create a feeling of distrust and dissatisfaction on the

part of Her Majesty's subjects in this Province who are exposed to its injustice: That the Petitioners therefore pray that the House, as the guardians of the rights of the People of Canada, will be pleased to interpose to prevent the infliction of the injury designed (although it may be unintentionally) by Her Majesty's Government; and that should it be impossible to avert such injury, that the interests of the Petitioners may be protected by an adequate grant from Her Majesty's Government, in proportion to the number of Steamers owned by the Petitioners, as they will be yearly affected by the proceeding of Government against which the Petitioners have pro-

Your Committee have examined Thomas Dick, one of the Petitioners, and have become satisfied of the truth of the allegations contained in the said Pctition; and your Committee are of opinion that the Imperial Government in taking an interest in the Steamer of said James Sutherland for which they have required no direct return, amounting almost to an absolute grant, and coupled with this objectionable feature—to which as a free grant of money they could not have directed your attention,—that the said sum of money was granted for the purpose of building a Steamer on Lake Ontario not more fitted for warlike purposes than those of the Petitioners, and expressly intended to enter into competition for the trade of the Lake, is an improper interference with private enterprize and private capital already engaged in that branch of business, and a manifest injury to the Petitioners and others concerned in the steam trade of that Lake.

Your Committee therefore respectfully recommend that an Address of Your Honorable House be presented to Her Majesty the Queen, praying that She will be pleased to indemnify the said James Sutherland for his personal expenditure and loss in building the said Steamer, and that the same may be removed from competition with private interests, and placed in one of Her Majesty's Dock Yards for Her Majesty's service; or that the said Donald Bethune, and the other Petitioners, may be indemnified by Her Majesty's Government, either by the purchase of an interest of similar extent to that taken in the Steamer of said Sutherland in such of their Steamers as shall be found, on inspection by the Officers of Her Majesty's Naval Service to be of strength and capacity to carry heavy guns, or in making good to them the loss they shall sustain from the unjust competition of the said Steamer.

EVIDENCE.

Wednesday, 14th July, 1847.

The Evidence given by Felix Fortier, Esquire, Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, before this House, on the 7th July instant, and referred to the Committee, was read as follows:-

1. On whose warrant was the writ issued during the last Recess of Parliament for the County of Simcoe, made out and issued?—The writ was issued in virtue of a warrant addressed to me by the Honorables Messieurs Daly and Smith, dated the 6th

July, 1846.
2. Had you, at the time you acted upon that warrant, any knowledge of the existence of any other warrant for any such writ?—I had not

3. When did you first learn that there was any such warrant as the Speaker's warrant of the 4th July, 1846?—I cannot state the precise date. I think it was about the latter end of May or the beginning of June, of the present year.
4. Where has the Speaker's warrant of the 4th

July, 1846, been, as far as you are aware, from the date thereof to the present time?—I cannot say.

5. From whom did you receive the Speaker's war-

rant?—From the Honorable Mr. Robinson.

6. Has it been in your hands ever since?—It has

not,—it was laid before this House.
7. Was it in your hands constantly from the time you received it till you delivered it to the Clerk of this House?—It was not.

8. Where was it then?—I returned it to the Honorable Mr. Robinson, either the day I received it, or

the day after.
9. When was it returned to you again, and by whom?—When I received it, I immediately thought I could not enter it in my book of records; I therefore took it back to the Honorable Mr. Robinson, and he put it under cover to the Honorable the Speaker.

10. Did you receive any instructions or advice from any one respecting the said warrant, or the manner of dealing with it?—No.

The Honorable Speaker of the House attended before the Committee, and being examined, made the following statement:—During the last recess of Parliament, I received from the Honorable William B. Robinson a notification or certificate of his acceptance of the office of Chief Commissioner of Public Works, dated 26th June, 1846, (a copy of which is submitted.) On the 4th July following, I issued my warrant to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, dated that day, (which is also submitted,) to make out a new writ for the election of a Member for the County of Simcoe, in room of Mr. Robinson. I then enclosed the warrant to Mr. Robinson, and did not again see it until it was re-enclosed to me by him, and brought by Mr. Fortier, the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, as stated in his evidence. I was subsequently informed that a warrant signed by two Members, purporting to be under the provisions of the Act 7 Vic. c. 65, (and dated the 6th of the same month of July,) was also addressed to that officer, and upon which

Report on Petition of the Honorable G. Crocksbank and others.

The Honorable Mr. Baldwin, from the Select Committee to which was referred the Petition of the Honorable George Crookshank and others, of the City of Toronto, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee, which was again read at the Clerk's table; and is as followeth:

By an Act passed by the Parliament of the Province of Upper Canada, in the sixth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, a Company was incorporated under the name of the City of Toronto and Lake Huron Railroad Company, for the purpose of constructing a Railroad from the City of Toronto to the shores of Lake Huron, within the limits of the Home District.

During three years after the passing of that Act, Directors were elected who allege that, by their authority, some expense was incurred in preparatory measures connected with the contemplated work.

In consequence, however, of only £50,000, out of £500,000, the whole amount of the Capital Stock of the Company, having been taken up, the undertaking lingered, and was by some deemed to have been abandoned.

It appears that for some years prior to 1845, there was no annual election of Directors, but the Directors then last elected continued in possession of the books of the Company.

It does not appear that any Seal had been adopted as the Corporate Seal of the Company prior to the Act of 1845.

In that year, which was before the expiration of the period fixed for the completion of the work, a Petition, purporting to be from the said Company, signed by the Honorable William Allan, as President, and C. Gamble, Esquire, as Secretary, and with a Seal affixed thereto, was presented to Your Honor-

able House, praying for leave to alter, in a very ma- Report on Peterial manner, the proposed route for the Road, and Honorable G. for an extension of the period for completing the Crookshank work.

Although the time limited for the commencement of the work, under the Act of 1836, had long since clapsed, and the authority thereby given to the said Company was at an end, your Committee see nothing in the Petition itself, or in the manner of proceeding upon it, which indicated any intention to mislend Your Honorable House by that Petition; your Committee are persuaded, that had the Petitioners, upon whose Petition they are now reporting, had a copy of the former Petition before them, they would not have imputed any such intention to the parties concerned in preparing and framing that Petition, although under the serious consequences with which they appear to be threatened from the wording of the preamble of the Act passed in 1845, your Committee are not surprised at their having been impressed with a belief that the real facts had not been laid before Parliament when it was called upon to legislate upon the subject in that year.

After the passing of the Act of 1845, new books were opened and new subscriptions made, in which many persons, including some of the old Directors of the Company, as well as two of the present Petitioners, subscribed for Stock upon the faith that the old subscriptions were void, and that in taking Stock in the new books, opened under the Act of 1845, they were to be held liable for the amount of such

renewed subscriptions, and no more.

The other of the present Petitioners alleges that he declined to take any Stock in the books opened under the Act of 1845, for the reason that he did not wish to become a subscriber for the altered purpose

authorized by that Act.

Actions have been lately brought by the Company against the Petitioners to enforce the payment of a call made in 1837 upon the old Stock; and from an intimation given by the Judges in the course of proceeding before them, doubts appear to be entertained by them whether they will not feel themselves compelled to hold that, by reason of the wording of the Act of 1845, the Petitioners who subscribed to both Stocks, and all the subscribers under the Act of 1836 are liable for the whole amount of their subscriptions though made for the purposes of that Act, and not for that of the Act of 1845.

Your Committee are of opinion, that it was not the intention of Parliament, by the Act of 1845, to involve persons in the situation of the Petitioners in

any such liability.

Your Committee therefore most respectfully submit, that an Act should be passed declaratory of such opinion, care being taken in any Bill that may be passed for this purpose, that no parties be relieved from any liability incurred by them in the course of proceedings taken on behalf of the Company under the authority of the Act of 1836; but that in respect of such liabilities, if any, all parties should be left in the same position in which they should be left in the same position in which they stood prior to the passing of the Act of 1845.

That it is expedient that the Second Clause of the Act 4 and 5 Vic. c. 18, passed in 1841, should be carried into effect with the least possible delay; which Clause enacts, that for the establishment, support and maintenance of Common Schools in each and every Township and Parish in this Province, there shall be established a permanent fund which shall consist of all such monies as may accrue from the selling or leasing of any lands which, by the Legislature of this Province, or other competent authority, may hereafter be granted and set apart for the establishment, maintenance and support of Common Schools in this Province, and of such other monies as are hereinafter mentioned; and that all such monies as shall arise from the sale of any such lands or cetates, and certain other monies hereinafter mentioned, shall be invested in safe and profitable securities in this Province; and that the interest of all monies so invested, and the rents, issues and profits arising from such lands or estates as shall be leased or otherwise disposed of without alienation, shall be annually applied in the manner hereinaster provided, to the support and encouragement of Common Schools.

2. That, from information in possession of this House, it appears there were purchased from sundry

That as the Public Lands constitute the only capital in this Province, they could, by judicious management, be made available, and the proceeds thereof in a few years would pay the annuity to the Indians, £6,655, and the grant from the Revenues and Imposts for support of Common Schools, £50,-000; it is therefore expedient that whatever portion

of the Indian Purchase remains ungranted, should Public Lands. be set apart and appropriated for no other purpose than that set forth in the above mentioned Clause of the Act of 1841.

4. That in case the remainder of those Lands have been granted, it is expedient that a like quantity from other Lands be set apart to make up the amount Ten millions of Acres, for the purpose of being sold or rented to create a Fund to be applied for the support of Common Schools and the establishment of District Libraries in the various Townships and Parishes throughout the Province.

5. That as no fund can be more bountiful in its effects, and more universal in its distribution, or more lasting in the advantages it will confer in promoting civilization than that now proposed, it is desirable those Lands should be sold at the least possible ex-

pense, for creating the same.
6. That not exceeding six per cent. be allowed for the sales of the said Lands, whether sold by the Crown Land Office or individual; and that the remaining ninety-four per cent. be invested in Public Securities of this Province, to aid in promoting the Public Works therein,—the interest, in all cases, to be secured for the benefit of this Fund.

7. That such steps as His Excellency may deem advisable, by a Commission or otherwise, to see apart the above Lands, should be adopted as soon as practicable; and that all Land Claims hereafter be paid out of Lands not appropriated for the creation of this

Fund.

I regret to state that the measures which have been adopted by Her Majesty's Representative at Washington, have not hitherto been attended with success, owing to circumstances over which the British Minister could have no control; but no opportunity will be lost of bringing the sab-ject under the renewed consideration of the Government of the United States, with the view of meeting the wishes of the House of Assembly of Canada. By Lord Aberdeen's Despatch No. 27, of 18th June, 1846, I was instructed to bring under the consideration of the United States Government, the question of establishing an equality of Trade between the United States and the British North American Colonies, which question had been pressed on the attention of Her Majesty's Government, by an Address to Her Majesty from the Legislative Assembly of Canada, passed on the 12th of May, 1846.

Lord Aberdeen's Despatch reached Washington on the 8th July, a few days after Mr. Walker's Bill "for "the reduction of the Duties upon Imports" had passed the House of Representatives, and when the debate on that important measure was about to be opened in the Senate, with great uncertainty as to the result. The proceedings in Congress on the subject of the Tariff, I had the honor to report in my Despatches Nos. 86 of 13th July, 91 of the 13th July, and 97 of 29th July; and in my Despatch No. 92 of 13th July, in answer to the Earl of Aberdeen's Despatch No. 27, were explained the reasons why I did not, at that time, think it advisable to bring the subject of an equalization of Duties between this Country and Canada formally under the consideration of the Government. Soon after the opening of last Session of Congress, that is to say, on the 20th December last, I received from Lord Catheart a Despatch, of which I have the honor to enclose a copy, transmitting a memorandum prepared by the Inspector General of Public Accounts, accompanied by a comparative statement of the rates of Duties on the principal articles of Canadian Exports at present levied in the United States and in Canada. These papers I hastened to place in and in Canada. These papers I hastened to place in the hands of Mr. Walker, the Secretary of the Treasury, accompanied by a memorandum, a copy of which I enclose, embodying the substance of Lord Aberdeen's Despatch No. 27, as well as that part of the Legislative Assembly's Address which related to the Trade with this country. Copies of this memorandum and accompanying papers I also placed in the hands of Mr. Dix, one of the Senators for New York, a gentleman of great influence in Congress, particularly on questions of this nature, on whose assistance in carrying through the proposed measure I knew we might rely, if an opportunity could be found to bring it forward.

Mr. Walker professed to be equally in favor of the removal of all restrictions on the interchange of produce between the United States and the British Provinces, and promised, if time allowed, to make such a measure the subject of a special recommendation to Congress. But such was the press of business during the late short Session, occasioned principally by the war with Mexico, and the numerous questions incidental to it, that no opportunity was found to bring

the subject forward with any prospect of success.

It may be hoped that during the next Session, there will be a better chance of accomplishing the wishes of Her Majesty's Government on this subject; meanwhile, I have thought it right to explain to Your Lordship the causes which have hitherto prevented their fulfilment.

The Inspector General has the honor to submit the following memorandum on the Address of the

Equality of Trade between Canada and the United States.

States, for the admission of Colonial products into their Ports on the same terms that theirs are admitted into Great Britain and this Country.

This Address was passed subsequently to the enactment of a Law repealing all Duty on American produce coming through this Province for export, either in the shape of grain, or to be converted into flour for exportation, and also after the House had been made aware of the views of Her Majesty's Government with reference to the admission of Foreign grain into Great Britain at a reduced rate of Duty for a limited period, and then at a nominal Duty of one shilling per quarter, and of other general modifications and reduc-tion in the Custom Duties of Great Britain, and which have subsequently obtained the sanction of the Imperial Parliament.

It may, consequently, be assumed that the House of Assembly sought the adoption by the United States of regulations conceived in a similar spirit of liberality and friendly commercial intercourse, and therefore humbly prayed the gracious interference of Her Majesty to effect these objects.

The extension of the operation of the American Drawback Bill to merchandize imported from the British North American Provinces adjoining the United States, approved the 8th of August in the last Session of Congress, clearly embraces one of the objects contemplated by the House of Assembly, namely, increased facilities for the transmission of Canadian products through the States; but the second point, the admission of those products into the United States for consumption on the same terms as theirs are admitted into Great Britain and this Province, is very insufficiently met by the Tariff of Customs Duties established by Congress in the summer Session of 1846. While in some articles a slight modification has been introduced, the Duties on that description of merchandize, the production of which is common to both countries, preponderate vastly in favor of the United States, and tend materially to check that vigor which general trade would derive from the removal of artificial restraints, and by their onerous character suppress the development of the natural and permanent resources of the country, The consideration of this subject may, with peculiar fitness, be taken up at this period, as the British Possessions Act leaves the Province, to a very great extent, free to pass such enactments with regard to Duties and Trade, as may be found best suited to her wants and position, and enable her to meet on terms of friendly reciprocity any advantages which the neighbouring Republic may be disposed to make for the mutual encouragement of industry and trade, and the development, undisturbed by artificial influences, of the resources peculiar to each Country.

Memorandum for the consideration of the Government of the United States.

Washington, December 1846. On the 12th May last, the Legislative Assembly of Canada voted an Address to the Queen, on the subject of the measures of commercial relaxation which were at that time pending in the British Parliament.

This Address contained the following observations respecting the commercial intercourse between the British North American Provinces and the United States, as at present reciprocally regulated: "We would further remind Your Majesty that, "while in compliance with the recommendation of the Imperial Parliament, we have passed a Law re-"pealing all Duty on American produce coming through our country for exportation, no similar advantage is accorded by the American Government to the people of this Province, but that Duties amounting in most cases to prohibition, are rigorously "maintained by that Government on every article of ours entering into their ports. The disadvantage " we must labour under in this respect is so apparent, "that we respectfully request Your Majesty will be pleased to cause the necessary steps to be taken for "opening a negociation with the Government of the "United States, for the admission of our products "into their ports on the same terms that theirs are "admitted into their same terms that theirs are "admitted into those of Great Britain and this Colony.

To which observations Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonial Department replied in the fol-

lowing words:—

To this important subject Her Majesty's Government carnestly request the attention of the Govern-

ment of the United States.

It seems to Her Majesty's Government that the measures of relaxation desired by Canada, on its own account, would be almost, if not quite, as advantageous to the United States as establishing a free and unrestricted commercial intercurrse between the two countries, and thereby affording a much more extended demand for United States produce, than the Canadas, in their present restricted power of mutual exchange, are enabled to sustain.

Without entering into unnecessary details, Her Majesty's Government would submit that the mutual benefits to be derived from relaxed commercial intercourse between a country of such vast dimensions as Canada, lying on their extended frontiers, are so obvious, and lie so completely on surface, that they scarcely fail to strike every one who duly reflects

upon the subject.

In further elucidation of this important question, is submitted a copy of a memorandum lately prosented to the Governor General of British North America by the Inspector General of Public Accounts of the Province of Canala, with a comparative statement of the rates of Duties on the principle articles of Canadian Exports at present levied in the United States and in Canada.

Report on Frauda against the Revenue Laws.

Mr. M'Connell, from the Select Committee appointed to inquire whether Frauds have not been committed against the Revenue Laws, by the introduction of Cattle into this Province under false pretences, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee, which was again read at the Clerk's table; and is as followeth:-

Your Committee have made an investigation into the matter entrusted to them, and have examined several witnesses upon the subject, (whose evidence is appended to this Report;) and they do not find anything in the evidence before them to shew that Frauds have been committed against the Revenue Laws; they find, however, that a number of head of cattle have been entered at various times by the Government Contractors, avowedly for the use of the Commissariat Department, but which have not afterwards been actually issued for the use of Her Ma-jesty's Troops: but, nevertheless, there is not any evidence to show that the Contractors have received the drawback on a greater quantity than was issued to the Commissariat. Your Committee, however, would respectfully suggest that a change in the present system of drawbacks on cattle imported for the use of the Troops, is desirable, and that instead of the duties being refunded by the Commissariat to the Contractor, as is done at present, the plan suggested by Commissary General Filder (which will be found in his evidence) be adopted for the future, thereby placing out of the power of the Contractors to defraud the Revenue.

2. Are you aware that eattle have been entered at the different ports of entry, in your name, for the use of Her Mnjesty's Troops, that have afterwards been otherwise disposed of?—Cattle have been entered in my name as Commissariat contractor, but without any specific statement that they were intended for the use of the Government,--some of which I afterwards disposed of, but did not claim the return of duties on them.

3. Were you to tender for the Government con-tract for the ensuing year, what difference would you make in the cwt to have the duties refunded or otherwise?-At present I should not make more than two shillings and sixpence per hundred pounds difference; at other times I might make much more, as very much would depend on the prospect of the Southern market at the time of tendering.

Friday, 16th July, 1847.

4. What precautions are taken by the Commissariat to prevent fraud being practised?—The following are the Rules observed by the Commissariat Department:—When the frontier Custom House is at the same place as the Commissariat station, the cattle are branded on the hoof or horn immediately after being passed at the Custom House, and the permits are at the same delivered up to the Commis-But where the Commissariat station is at a distance from the frontier Custom House, the Officer of Customs transmits by post to the Commissariat This might allay the fears which the agricultural Officer a descriptive list of the cattle imported by gentlemen appear to entertain under the present sys-

A careful register is kept by the Commissariat of the number of imported cattle so supplied to the Troops, and the duties are calculated accordingly; but with a view to the further prevention of fraud upon the Revenue, it is stipulated in the contracts at those Posts which are at a distance from the Frontier, that if there should be any difficulty in identifying, to the satisfaction of the Commissariat Officer, the cattle presented at the depôt to be the same as those entered at the Custom House, the duties shall be returned only upon such number of head as the quantity of imported meat issued to the Troops shall be equal to at the rate of 550 or 575 lbs. per head—which would require that an ox should be upwards of 900 lbs. live weight,—on the other hand, if the cattle should weigh more, the duty is returned only upon the number actually imported and slaughtered; by this means the contractor is effectually precluded from changing large cattle for small with the view of obtaining the return of duty upon a greater number of head (permits also being produced) than he imported. It is quite compatible with the system here described, that the contractor should sell for private consumption part of the cattle imported in his name without prejudice accruing thereby to the Revenue, (he generally indeed produces permits for a greater number than are slaughtered for the Troops,) and the instance of this kind mentioned by Mr. Gilbert, before the Committee, proves nothing, unless Mr. Gilbert could also shew that the duties had been returned to the contractor on the occasion to which he alludes; but this he is unable to do, nor can any trace be found in the account of duties refunded by the Commissariat of any transaction at all resembling the one to which he refers. If the Committee would examine also Mr. Longley, the contractor, he would no doubt clear up to their satisfaction other matters of detail adverted to by Mr. Gilbert.

5. Is it possible for the Contractor to obtain a drawback on cattle which is not handed over to the Commissariat?—Under the system explained above, I conceive it to be impracticable; those rules were adopted with the view of guarding against fraud upon the Revenue, but they equally, I am of opinion, protect the agricultural interest by preventing the sale of any portion of the imported meat, upon which the duty has been remitted, for private consumption.

6. In your opinion, are the Contractors in the habit of substituting other cattle to the Commissariat in lieu of those brought over the frontier?—For the reasons already stated, I am of opinion that they are unable to substitute other cattle with the slighest advantage to themselves, the stipulation above mentioned with regard to the weight of the cattle is considered indeed a greater security on this point than marking them.

7. In your opinion, can greater precautions than now exist be taken to prevent imposition?—The only other system which I could suggest, and which perhaps might be more satisfactory to the agricultural interest of the Colony, would be to require parties in future to state in their offers the price at which they would engage to supply the Troops, if permitted to import cattle duty free, and that at which they would undertake the contract without possessing this privilege—the agreements to be made upon the latter principle, and the Colony to pay over to the Impe-rial Treasury the difference between the two rates.

tem, but which I am of opinion are unfounded. am apprehensive, however, that the Contractors finding, year after year, that one of the alternatives (that of importing duty free) was not acted upon, this rule would not long continue to be a safe guide—they would naturally become indifferent to stating with accuracy the price on that condition. If it should be nevertheless the wish of the Colonial Government that this system should be adopted, it is necessary that the same should be intimated to me with the least possible delay, as the contracts now in force are about to expire, and it is indispensable that tenders for the new contracts should be called for imme-

diately.

8. What reduction in price do you obtain from the Contractor in consideration of the drawback? relative price of meat in the United States and Canada has latterly changed very much, and it is difficult, under present circumstances, to estimate the reduction obtained in the terms of the contract in consideration of the drawback. All that is contended for is, that the Contractors should have the power of purchasing meat for the supply of the Troops, wherever they can produre it cheapest without being

required to pay duty if imported.

Mr. H. Gilbert, of the City of Montreal, called in;

and examined:-

9. Have you any knowledge that cattle have been introduced into this Province under false pretences? —I know that mostly all the cattle that are entered at the frontier Custom House, are entered in the name of the different Government Contractors for the use of Her Majesty's Troops, at the same time those cattle are driven directly to market and sold to different butchers, and are not furnished to Her Ma-

jesty's Troops.

10. By what evidence do you arrive at the conclusion of the answer just given?—The different drovers have told me they had entered their cattle in Mr. Longley and other Contractor's names. was a large number, 200 head, bought in St. Lawrence County, State of New York, a great share of which has been sold in this market since to the different butchers, and the person who bought them, Mr. M. Shane, told me himself, that he was about making arrangements with Longley, the Government Contractor, to enter the cattle in his name.

11. Have you any more evidence to offer to the Committee to substantiate the opinion expressed in your answers to the two previous questions?-I believe further information, and very important, could be obtained, if you would procure those permits on which the Commissariat have paid the drawback duties; and also, information could be had from the Collectors of Customs at the different ports of entry.

This capital it is proposed shall be inalienably appropriated for the support of Common Schools and Township Libraries.

It is further proposed to borrow from Great Britain, on the credit of this capital, £2,500,000, at an interest of five per cent. (equal to £125,000 per annum,) to be repaid out of the sales of this land only. To secure the avails, it must be sold to private Companies in blocks; or, if disposed of to individuals, in smaller quantities. The expense of such sales should not exceed 6 per cent. on the purchase money; and, as the proceeds of these sales are realized from time to time, the amount of the loan above alluded to should be paid off.

The money thus borrowed, it is proposed to loan for the purpose of constructing Railroads or other improvements in different parts of the Province, and the employment of Emigrants thereon as they arrive;

 - 4. Montreal to Kingston.

or any other Railroad or other public improvement that may hereafter be chartered or determined upon, upon the following conditions:-

As soon as a Company for constructing any one of these Railroads or other improvements is regularly organized, and an instalment of ten per cent. has been paid in, a sum equal to the amount of such instalment to be loaned from this School Fund; the interest payable half-yearly for the benefit of the Fund.

This method would secure to the Province and the Mother Country the following advantages:-

1st. The only capital a new country possesses is land, which has heretofore, so far as this Province is concerned, been squandered without a single pound having been paid into the Revenue; this property will be converted into Railroads, and the proceeds be made available.

2nd. The proceeds will form a sufficient fund to pay competent Teachers, diffuse education to the remotest part of the Province, place it within the reach of every man, and form an entire different class or race of men in the next generation.

3rd. Borrowing £2,500,000 from Great Britain, on the security of the capital, will ensure the employment of Emigrants on Public Works without any outlay or cost to the Mother Country, who are secured by this land, from sales of which the interest, and eventually the principal, is to be repaid without any charge on the Provincial Trensury. These works will be under the management of private Companies, thus relieving the Imperial or the Provincial Government from the expense of managing the same.

4th. Loaning the money thus borrowed, to Rail-road or other Companies, will ensure better management of those works than if they were in the hands of Government Agents. Restricting the advance to an amount equal to the sum paid in, will secure the capital, as works will be commenced by individuals who embark their own money, without a prospect of repayment: and those roads, with this encouragement, will be brought into operation at the earliest possible period, without the risk of a total waste of capital by expending it on unproductive works; and the use of this capital will be opened alike to all parts of the Province.

5th. In a word, it would ensure a fund for Education and Libraries, a fund for construction of Railroads or other improvements, and secures employment to Emigrants in the most economical method, without wasting the capital of the Mother Country or the

Colony.

The Toronto and Goderich Railroad Company, to construct a Railroad through a large portion of the Crown Domain lying to the west of the Home District, and to purchase lands for the width of five miles along the line of road. By the appropriation of 400,000 acres of these lands, as estimated in the Report of the Select Committee of 1845, the enhanced value of the residue created by the construction of this road would very materially increase the fund to be derived from these lands, as well as facilitate the settlement of that part of the Province. The Honorable Mr. Daly, one of Her Majesty's Executive Council, laid before the House, by command of His Excellency the Governor General,— Return to an Address from the Legislative Assembly to His Excellency the Governor General, dated the 19th instant, "representing to His Excellency the " alarming extent to which contagious fever unhappily " prevails at the Emigrant Sheds erected at the mouth " of the Lachine Canal, and among the Emigrants " arriving from below and congregating there; that "the situation chosen for said sheds, and more espe-"cially Windmill Point, is, in the opinion of the "House, unsuitable and inconvenient for the recep-"tion and proper treatment of the Emigrants while "the existence of contagious disease in the immedi-" ate vicinity of the principal business thoroughfare of "the City—the daily and unavoidable resort of a large portion of the inhabitants thereof, is attended with "imminent danger to the citizens at large, and is "exciting great uneasiness and apprehension in the community; and praying that His Excellency will " be pleased to cause measures to be promptly taken " in order to provide a Station at some place below "the City, more easy of access, and in other respects " better suited than the locality in question, for the "purposes of a depôt for Emigrants, and thereby allay the existing fear of contagion;" which Return is as followeth:-

The Governor General informs the Legislative Assembly, in answer to their Address of the 19th July, on the subject of the sick Emigrants, that those who have been detained by sickness at the Sheds referred to, will be removed from thence, and instructions have been given to discontinue the occupation of the Sheds at Windmill Point, near the entrance of With regard to the concluding the Lachine Canal. paragraph of the Address, referring to the establishment of another Quarantine station at some place be-

low Montreal, the Governor General transmits the Emigranta. accompanying Reports from the Emigrant Commission and the Medical Board, from which it is apparent that such a course cannot be adopted this season, with advantage to the public welfare.

The Emigrant Commissioners have the honor to

report, as follows:-

This Commission entered upon its duties at a moment of much excitement, when the progress of disease amongst the Emigrant population arriving at the Sheds and through this City had caused general apprehension.

It was also a time of great confusion, owing to the recent death of the Emigrant Agent for this Port, and the sickness of several persons in charge, including the chief Emigrant Physician.

Under these circumstances, the Commissioners were authorized to receive the Reports of the authorities at the sheds, together with that of the visitor appointed at the same time with themselves, and from these Reports, to ascertain what further arrangements it might be necessary to make.

The Commissioners were not authorized to remove the Emigrant depôt from Montreal altogether; on the contrary, that question seemed to them to have been decided by Government, by the act of acquiring some acres of land on Point St. Charles for Hospitals, just before the Commissioners were ap-

Nevertheless, as the removal of the Emigrant de-pôt to an Island below the City, was brought prominently before the Commissioners by a memorial addressed to His Excellency the Governor General, and by him transmitted to the Commissioners, that question was the first that engaged their attention, and had they deemed the adoption of such a plan requisite, or even advisable, they would not have failed to recommend it before taking any other step. After careful investigation, however, and acting under a deep sense of responsibility, that plan was given up as impracticable under the circumstances, and it was decided to endeavor to secure all its advantages, without any of its drawbacks, near the City.

As this decision has given great dissatisfaction, the Commissioners may be permitted briefly to allude to

some of the reasons for adopting it :-

1st. The necessity for new arrangements upon an extensive scale was most pressing, but it appeared to the Commissioners futile to undertake these arrangements in time, on an Island to which all the materials and workmen must be transported as required.

2nd. To land Emigrants on an Island below Montreal would not, after all, have secured the resident population from contact with them--they must still

pass through the City.

If brought up by a Steamboat to be shipped at the Canal, there must be a shipping place with a shed upon it, the same as at present. If barges are to be towed to and from the Island in order to ship Emigrants there, the difficulty and delay would, the Commissioners are convinced, prove most formidable and injurious, without speaking of a very greatly increased expense both to the Emigrants who pay their own way, and to the Government. Indeed, from the difficulties continually occurring in procuring barges on the spot, the Commissioners believe that any plan which should depend upon sending down barges to an Island below the current, would turn out nearly impracticable.

In ordinary years, three-fourths of the Emigrants select and pay for their own conveyances, and purEmigrante.

chase their own provisions; and even this year, more than half the emigration is thus circumstanced.

Should these fellow-subjects, whose coming among us is profitable to all concerned, be detained upon an Island, they would be almost forced to become dependent upon Government, by putting it out of their power to make arrangements for themselves; the only way of avoiding this would be to provide shops on the Island to supply them with requisite stores, or to allow them to land at *Montreal*, to make their own purchases and arrangements. The first alternaown purchases and arrangements. tive would be, in reality, 10 send down a part of the City to them, and the second would be to leave them to scatter among the Citizens as heretofore—in neither way avoiding the risk of contagion.

It may be added, that a considerable number of the Emigrants have legitimate business in Montreal, so that there must, under any circumstances, be a continued intermixing of Emigrants with the Citizens, unless the former are to be treated in the most despotic manner; and even upon an Island, without a strong force and strenuous coercion, Emigrants would always be escaping to the mainland, and straggling through the agricultural population into the City. How far such coercion would be legal is another question.

These, and many other considerations convinced the Commissioners, that complete isolation was impracticable, and they were and continue to be persuaded that partial isolation, such as the nature of the case alone demands or will permit, is attainable near the City by the following simple and economical plan, which was the first resolved upon by the Commissioners, and which they are more and more convinced is the best under the circumstances:

1st. Instead of landing Emigrants on our wharves, the lowest and most confined part of the Town, where they are exposed to contact with the Citizens, and to the snares of evil disposed persons, and whence they have a mile of cartage through the City and Suburbs, in order to reach the Emigrant Sheds, they are now to be landed at the mouth of the Canal, on the side furthest from the City, (Windmill Point,) and there embark in barges for Canada West, without any cartage, and without the necessity of entering the City at all. In order that this place of transhipment may be even more isolated than it is at present, a strong paling is to be put round it, with policemen stationed at the gates to prevent the ingress to the City of baggage, bedding, &c., as well as of Emigrants, except those who are clean and healthy. The point in question is to be merely a landing and shipping place, with a shelter of boards to protect the Emigrants from the weather, for the few hours they may be detained on it.

2nd. The sick will be separated at landing, and sent direct to the spacious and airy Hospitals, now nearly completed, on Point St. Charles, and a Medical man is to be constantly in attendance at the landing place, in case any should become sick, previous to their re-embarkation for Canada West—the said Physician to see that those sent forward are healthy

and not over crowded.

3rd. Such Emigrants as are obliged to wait for their sick relations, are to be sent at once to the best of the Sheds, beyond Wellington Bridge, there to be registered and kept, so long as is absolutely neces-

sary, and no longer. By these means the landing place at Windmill Point will doubtless be clear every day, perfect order will be introduced into the Sheds, where some portion of the Emigration must remain for a time, and the Hospitals will be entirely separated from both places, as well as from all resort of the Citizens.

in scows; but even if this difficulty continue, it Emigrants. would be little compared with the mile of cartage heretofore rendered necessary. The Commissioners submit, however, that as the stream of Emigration is likely to be permanent; a permanent wharf might with great advantage be thrown out from that point into the deep water, to be entirely appropriated to Emigrants.

The Commissioners do not think themselves called upon to discuss the capabilities of the several Islands recommended for the transhipment of Emigrants, inasmuch as they have not the precise description of these Islands before them, and they deem all of them, unless it be St. Helen's Island, unsuitable on account of their partially swampy character and distance from

the City.

The Medical Commissioners, firm in the belief of the correctness of the views under which they entered upon their charge of the sick Emigrants at the Sheds, and supported by the concurrent testimony of the most able and enlightened members of the Medical Profession whose attention has been, like their own, directed to the investigation of the nature of the disease which has recently been introduced into this Continent, in addition to the reasons already expressed by them, beg leave to report:—

1. That they unhesitatingly offer as their opinion, that the lives of a large number out of the sixteen hundred now sick at the Sheds would be jeopardized, if not actually sacrificed, by any attempt to remove them to any distance from their present position: such being the case, even were a second establishment erected upon one of the Islands contemplated, the City of Montreal would still be exposed to all the evils, real or imaginary, by having upwards of one thousand fever cases in its immediate vicinity, in the Sheds at present occupied by them; and where sufficient accommodation, free ventilation, and proper attention to the management of such cases are utterly

2. That the new Hospitals at Point St. Charles are now nearly completed, and that in two or three days, such of the sick as can be removed without danger to themselves, will be carefully transported to The situation and construction of these, are admirably adapted for the treatment of such diseases,

and the perfect isolation of their inmates.

3. That they confidently state that the distance of these Hospitals from the City, the constantly changing currents of air caused by the Rapids in their front, and the prevailing winds, totally preclude the possi-bility of contagion being wafted to the City; in which opinion they are fully borne out by the elaborate Report of the Academy of Medicine of New York, and the universal opinions of all the professional

men who have visited the new Hospitals.
4. That the Medical Commissioners, although most efficiently supported by the Engineer of the Board of Works, with all the mechanics which the City could furnish, have found it impossible to complete the present arrangements on Point St. Charles in a fortnight; and, judging from the difficulties which they have had to contend against even in the immediate vicinity of the City, in providing sufficient accommodation for the sick alone, may safely assume that more than a mouth must elapse before the necessar Hospitals and Sheds for the sick and healthy could be creeted on any Island at a distance.

That they are not aware of any instances in which the disease has originated except from direct The only obstacle to this plan is the present necessity of landing Emigrants at the Windmill Point has fever so contracted been communicated to a third Emigrants.

party, where the position of the patient has been such as to enable attention to be paid to personal cleanliness and ventilation.

6. That from their own experience, and that of many of their professional friends, they have every reason to believe that the disease is on the decline in the City, very few new cases having recently occurred; the fears of the citizens (either real or induced) at present preventing them from imprudently exposing themselves to contagion in the Sheds, as they were too much in the habit of doing a few weeks ago, especially on the Sundays.

7. That with a view to eradicate the disease out of the City, the Commissioners would suggest the propriety of appropriating exclusively for the reception of fever cases from among the citizens, one of the Hospitals now erected upon Point St. Charles.

8. That the Commissioners anticipating the probability of many of the Emigrants being detained until a period of the year when their transportation would be impossible, owing to the severity of their attack, and the tediousness of their convalescence, and feeling that provision must be made for their accommodation and maintenance during the winter, are convinced that the difficulties of accomplishing these objects would be much increased by placing them at a distance from the City, and in an insular situation; whereas the present erections are of such a substantial nature, that with very trifling additional expense, they can be readily converted into comfortable winter residences.

9. In conclusion, the Medical Commissioners beg leave in the strongest terms to deny the correctness of the comparisons attempted to be made in reference to the mortalities of the present and past season; it being an acknowledged fact among the Medical Practitioners of this City, and one of which the Commissioners had reason to be especially cognizant, that the months of June, July, and August, 1846, were extraordinarily healthy months, whereas the same months of the preceding year (1845) were extremely unhealthy; they conceive that the increased mortality of the present season is referable, not to the introduction of this peculiar fever among Emi-grants solely, but to the favouring condition of the atmosphere to the greater prevalence and severity of the infantile diseases usual at this period of the year, and to the influence produced upon the minds of many by the excitement of exaggerated, if not illfounded apprehensions.

Then, the Honorable the Speaker of the Legisla- Speaker's Adtive Assembly addressed His Excellency, as follows: dress to His MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, approach Your Excellency with profound respect, and humbly beg leave to assure Your Excellency that in no period of our history have the Commons of Canada applied themselves more assiduously to the arduous duties which have devolved upon them, as the Representatives of Her Majesty's loyal and affectionate people, than during the present Session, while it has been their carnest endeavour to support the honour and dignity of the Crown, upon which depend the greatness and prosperity of the country.

The Session now about to close has been characterized by the introduction of many important measures well calculated to develope private enterprize, in extending the Railway communications of the Province, and facilitating the Mining operations on the shores of Lake Superior.

Sucaker's Address to Ilis Excellency.

We trust that much benefit will arise from the facilities thus promised to be afforded to our internal trade and commerce, and from the development of the Mineral treasures and resources of the Province, and we have devoted much time and labour to the legislation requisite to promote and encourage these important objects.

To meet the altered state of our Commercial relations with the Mother Country, we have found it indispensable to pass a new Bill materially altering the existing regulation of the Customs in this Province. In making these changes, while due regard has been paid to the protection of the Revenue, our best attention has been given to the adopting such modifications of the Customs' Tariff and Regulations, as we hope will ensure great benefit to the trader and consumer, by the removal of unequal pressure, and a vexatious enforcement of the Law; and to give, where it was possible, fresh stimulus to individual enterprize and industry.

It has been my duty, thus briefly to state to Your Excellency some of the most important measures of We believe them to be well calculated the Session. to increase the prosperity of the Country, and to promote the happiness and welfare of all classes of Her Majesty's subjects in this valuable and important portion of Her vast dominions.

The Bill, which it is now my duty to present to Your Excellency, is intituled, "An Act to appro-" priate the sums therein mentioned to defray certain " Expenses of the Civil Government for the year one " thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, and certain "other Expenses not otherwise provided for," to which, with all humility, we pray Your Excellency to give the Royal Assent.

The Honorable the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly then presented the following money Bill:

An Act to appropriate the sums therein mentioned to defray certain Expenses of the Civil Government for the year one thousand eight hundred and fortyseven, and certain other Expenses not otherwise provided for.

To this Bill the Royal Assent was signified in the

following words :-

"In Her Majesty's name, His Excellency the "Governor General thanks Her loyal Subjects, "accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."

After which, His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses:-

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

In relieving you for the present from attendance in this place, I have to thank you for the zeal and assiduity in the discharge of your important duties which have enabled you, during the course of a Session of comparatively short duration, to consider and perfect many measures which promise to be of and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly, great advantage to the community.

I sincerely trust that the alterations which you have made in the Provincial Tariff, and the additional facilities afforded to Trade by the extension of Bonding and Warehousing Privileges, will be productive Parliament is accordingly prorogued until Monday of benefit to the Colony, and tend to the promotion the sixth day of September next. of its commercial and agricultural interests.

I have observed with satisfaction the attention His Excellen-which you have bestowed on the several projects which have been brought before you for developing the Mineral resources of the Province, and improving its means of internal communication.

I trust that the measures which you have passed for the amendment of certain provisions of the Criminul Code, for the protection of Mercantile interests. for rendering the Common School Act of Upper Canada more effective, and for placing the Municipal Institutions of Lower Canada on an improved footing, will be attended with beneficial results.

The prevalence of disease among the immigrants who have arrived from Europe this season, has occasioned me much concern. I have not failed to bring this subject under the consideration of Her Majesty's Secretary of State, and to represent the necessity of adopting measures to place Emigration to this Colony under more efficient regulation. Meanwhile my warmest acknowledgments are due to you for the liberal provision which you have made for relieving the indigent and preventing disease from spreading in the Province. The charitable exertions of the Clergy-of the Ladies attached to the Religious Communities-and of Benevolent Individuals among the Laity-who have, at the hazard of their lives, ministered to the necessities of the sick, are beyond any praise which it is in my power to offer; but I cannot refrain on this occasion from paying a tribute to their devotedness and Christian zeal.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

I thank you in the name of Her Majesty for the readiness with which you have voted the Supplies necessary for the Public Service and for maintaining the credit of the Province.

Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen,

The several Addresses to the Queen which you have transmitted through me have been duly forwarded to be laid at the foot of the Throne.

By exercising the influence which you possess in your respective Districts to carry out local improvements, and give full effect to the wise and salutary enactments of the Legislature, you may render services to the community hardly less important than those which you discharge while you are assembled here. I am confident that these duties will engage your attention on your return to your homes, and I carnestly pray that our exertions for the advancement of the various interests of this noble Province, and for the benefit of all classes of the Inhabitants, may be attended with the Divine Blessing
