With this knowledge he affects to dictate to the balance of the council the terms upon which they shal weet and transact their business. In bis own estimation he is greater than the people of the territory, and greater than the council of which be is a member. He has suddenly become a little Caesar, too consequential for the small orbit in which he has heretofore moved, a man marked by destiny for greater things, called for a mission, so to speak -that mission being to teach the pre sumptuous people of this territory tha to their rulers.
To our way of thinking this new autocrat should be summarily removed from every position of responsibility he hoids under the govennent to dea with such small affairs as those which with such small afiairs as those which transplanted to a broader sphere of ac thon, and the earlier this is done th better it will be for all concerned.
