Bill Provides Navy Increase. Washington, March 3.-The con erees of the two houses on the naval appropriation bill reached an agreeent at 10 o'clock. The senate sur rendered the principal item of disagreement, the amendment relating to the increase of the navy. The provision as agreed on provides for three battleships of 16,000 tons displace-

nates the provision for cruisers. The matter of naval increase was the chief matter in controversy. The house conferees insisted on the provision in the house bill for three large battleships and one large cruiser, while the senate conferees were equally insistent on the retention of the senate amendment providing for smaller warship. The effect of the agreement is that the house program s accepted, except that two 13,000 ton battleships are substituted for one cruiser. It is provided that the wars that we have a national ships authorized may be built by conenace of even greater importance in tract or at the navy yards and shall be built at the navy yards if it is found that a combination of shipbuilders exists.

The provision for an increase in the personnel of the navy remains as the bill passed the house, including an increase in number of midshipmen, but the increase is to continue until 1913 instead of 1909, as fixed by the senate. Under the agreement members of the Fifty-seventh congress may appoint midshipmen where a vacancy exists and was not filled and where an appointment was made and the appointee failed of admission.
