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



I have this from the Captain of the St. Paul, who told it to Captain Merconi and me just to Guglielmo Marconi, and me jus before we got off the boat in Liver

I do not think it was known to any of the other passengers, but the Cap tain told Mr. Marconi and me after we were all safe in Liverpool, because it was known that there was likely to be an attempt made by the sub-marine to stop the ship and take Mr Marconi off.

Mr. Marconi received a warning from the Italian Consul before leav-ing New York, and for this reason his name was kept off the passenger list and every endeavour made to prevent his presence on board becoming known.

His name was not on either the regular list or the pursur's books, and there was a general tacit agreement among the passengers that if the St. Paul was stopped by the submarine we all would "lie like gentlemen."

Borden Puts Head Tax on Nildrs.

Lowest Scum in Europe-Indignation in Newfoundland-Serious Reprisal May Result-Piece of Follyand Injustice.

There is a law or order-in-council There is a law or order-in-council requiring immigrants to Canada to have \$50 each in the winter and \$25 in the summer. This regulation can be enforced or not, at the option of the government. It has not been generally enforced in the past, except to keep out undesirable immigrants, since Canada's immense area of uncounted land and progress in comccupied land and progress in com-nerce and industry gives room for an ever increasing number of people, and often the best sort of immigrant has only enough money to bring him to the shore of the Dominion or to the place in Canada where he intends to make his home. This regulation has never heretofore been enforced against Newfoundlanders, but only, as has been said, as a rule against the most undesirable class of foreigners.

Newfoundlanders "Foreigners."

Last week, however, the Borden government at Ottawa ordered its immigration officers to enforce this regulation against Newfoundlanders, and yesterday a party of 36 who arrived at North Sydney, coming to work at the coal mines or steel works.

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
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
