"The word 'import' herein shall not be construed

(a) Alcoholic liquors in transit from and to places outside this Colony placed in bond in a Customs warehouse in the Colony.

(b) Alcoholic liquor, part of a ship's stores, ware-housed or sealed up, as provided by Chap-ter 22, Consolidated Statutes (Third Series), and Acts in amendment thereof.

(c) Wines imported for the purpose of being matured and re-exported, or to be sold to the Board, deposited in establishments licensed for that purpose by the Board.

Provided that the Board shall be notified by the importer or master of the ship, as the case may be, respectively, of the importation and exportation of such alcoholic liquor at the time thereof, and the Board shall keep a register of such importations and exportations, open during office hours of the Board for

(d) The Board shall keep an inventory showing the importations and exportations, and stocks on hand, of alcoholic liquor in bond in Customs warehouses, and of wines stored for maturity

(e) Alcoholic liquor on board warships of any nation, for the use of officers and crews, shall not be subject to this Act while on board the
