A very heavy thunder storm occurred here last (Sunday) night, and for some hours a steady rais, accompanied by loud thunder and vivid flashes of lightning poured down. The water in the Speed this, morning rose to an unprecedented Reight, and swept almost everything before it. Some of the dams on the Speed were swept away, and caused so great a rush that the water very soon after overflowed Allan's bridge, and reached up to Mr. Davidson's house on the north-east bank of the river; and a piggery belonging to Mr. D. Allan was carried down the stream a long distance. The dam of C. & A. Sharpe's bone mill is also much injured—about a third of it being broken down—but this will soon be repaired. The footbridge at Goldie's mill is gone, about half-a-dozen culverts between Erin and Guelph, and a good board fence on Mr. Wells' property. Betweensten and eleven o'clock the immense pressure of water, together with the accumulation of floating timber, ice and roots, bore down on Mr. David Allan's dam, under the railway bridge, and in a moment or two, the apparently impregnable rampart, consisting of crib work, stones and earth, was swept away, and carried down with the flood. THE IRISH CHURCH BILL. The debate in the House of Com-

mons on the Irish Church Bill was resumed on Friday night.

Mr. Disraeli moved to omit the following clause from the Bill:—"On and after the first day of January, 1871, the said union created by Act of Parliament between the Churches of England and Ireland, shall be dissolved, and the said Church of Ireland hereinafter referred to as said Church, shall cease to be established by law." Mr. Disraeli supported his proposition in a speech of considerable length, contending that the above clause destroyed the supremacy of the Crown, and placed the Church at a disadvantage.

Age.

Sir Robert P. Collier and Sir Roundel Palmer, spoke in opposition to the amendment. Mr. Gladstone also made a speech against the amendment. He traversed the statement made by Mr. Disraeli. He thought, notwithstanding this clause, the supremacy of the Crown would continue to exist, but in an altered form. If this amendment were successful it would absolutely destroy the Bill. The union of the Churches would continue, but that union must not be enforced by Parliamentary bonds.

Mr. Disraeli replied. He admitted that his intention was to aim a mortal blow at the Bill; but if the motion were accepted, the Government could still continue their disendowment policy. At length the House divided on Mr. Disraeli's motion as follows—for, 221; against, 344; Government majority, 123. The result was received with tremendous cheers by the Liberals. Sir Robert P. WATERLOO ASSIZES.—At the Waterloo Assizes Hiram Fresch was indicted for an assault with intent to commit rape. There was a second count for common assault. The prosecutrix, a respectable middle aged woman, a widow residing in the village of Hespeler, gave her evidence in a most creditable manner, proved an indecent assault and a most vigorous defence on her part. There was no doubt as to the prisoner having assaulted her, but as he desisted from his attempt upon her strennously objecting to it, the jury seemed to think that he did not intend to commit the crime in case of resistance, seemed to think that he did not intend commit the crime in case of resistance and found him guilty only of a common assault. After a severe rebuke from the Judge, he was sentenced to three month in gaol at hard labor.

How it Works,—The Stratford Beacon illustrates the beautiful working of the amalgamation of the Buffalo & Lake Huron Railway with the Grand Trunk as follows:—Two weeks ago a miller in Stratford sold 500 barrels of flour to a gentleman in Quebec for shipment to St. Johns, New Brunswick, provided the freight rate was the same as the tariff from Brantford. That is \$1.05 per barrel; but the Company declined to carry flour from Stratford at a less figure than \$1.10, although to reach its destination, flour from Brantford had to be conveyed via Stratford, making a difference in favor of this place of nearly forty miles. We thus have to pay five cents more for being forty miles nearer!


