Town and County News.

A Trio of youthful itinerant musicians, consisting of two violinists and a harpist, were playing on Wyndham street today. The boys played well.

INGERSOLL, \$10, was inadvertently omitted from our list of Y. M. C. A. subscriptions to the expenses of the Executive Committee.

HORTICULTURAL SHOW—The fall show of the Guelph Horticultural Society comes off in the Drill Shed to-morrow. A fine display of plants and flowers is expected.

THE TRIP—From what we hear the trip up the W. G. & B. to Southampton and Port Elgin to-morrow will be well patronized. It promises to be a thoroughly successful and enjoyable excursion.

BARNUM—The G. W. R. Co. announce the issue of single fare tickets to Hamilton and back on Wednesday, with the view of enabling persons from this vicinity to visit Barnum's Great Show.

LECTURES—There are two lectures announced for to-night. One is at St. Bartholomew's Church, at 7:30, by the Rev. Father Langcake, S. J., on "The Catholic Church and her Charities"; the other is at the Good Templars' Hall, by Mr. T. V. Casey, upon the Temperance question.

ORIO FORCE—There was a very poor attendance at the Town Hall on Saturday evening. Mr. Adams delivered some remarks, and Mr. Mackenzie made experiments upon a person from the audience, which resembled those made by mesmerist exhibitors. The admission was free.

LARGE POTATOES—Mr. J. L. Dodds, of Caledon, sold a load of potatoes on Friday to Mr. R. J. McNichol, of Orangeville, several of which weighed 1 lb. 8 oz., and one of which brought down the scales at 2 lbs. They were of the Early Rose variety.

We are persuaded that the members will find no fault with Mr. Hoskins in having some slight relaxation from his arduous and responsible duties, which he has so long and so faithfully discharged to the entire satisfaction of all.

SUNDAY TEMPERANCE MEETING—The first of a series of Sabbath afternoon meetings for the purpose of promoting the cause of Temperance was held in the Good Templars' Hall yesterday afternoon, commencing at four o'clock. The hall was nearly filled, many ladies being present. Mr. Ryan acted as chairman. Addresses were delivered by the chairman, Rev. Mr. Howie, Rev. Mr. Manchie, and Rev. Dr. Davidson, all strongly in favour of prohibitory legislation. A similar meeting will be held next Sunday afternoon, at the same time and place.

ACCIDENT—This morning about eight o'clock, a young man in the employ of Messrs. Massie, Paterson & Co., drove a spirited animal, attached to a buggy, down Wyndham street as far as Mr. Metcalf's shop, where he procured a strap for the purpose of preventing the horse from injuring himself by interfering. While in the act of putting on the strap the horse kicked, striking the young man on the right cheek and cutting it slightly, making the blood flow freely. The young man being in such close proximity to the horse's heels no doubt prevented a more serious accident.

A GUELPH MAN FOUND DEAD—The St. Catharines Journal has the following from its Smithville correspondent:—Early on Sunday morning G. Hines, a blacksmith in the employ of Mr. J. Bates, was found dead in bed. For the last ten days of his life he had been, to use a common term "on a spree," a habit which he at times indulged in, a habit, alas, too common with really good workmen, of which class, we believe, he may fairly be classed. The temporary absence of his wife from home, perhaps, left him more freedom to indulge, with a less chance of getting his meals regularly. Neglecting them, and from day to day indulging freely in liquor, it preyed too much on his already enfeebled frame. His wife had returned on Saturday, and in the evening retired to bed. Before daylight on Sunday morning he requested his wife to rise and get him something to eat, which she did, and of which he partook. She did not go to bed again, but on going to his bed-room some two hours later, found him quite dead. His remains were conveyed per rail to Guelph, where he has friends and relatives, and where they were interred.

London, Sept. 8, 6 a.m.—A special from Berlin to the London Hour says the Prussian Government has decided to recognize Bishop Reikenes, and Baden and Bavaria will follow the example.

Madrid, Sept. 7.—The Cortes to-day elected Castelar President by 113 votes against 67 for Pi y Margal.

Tenard has arrived in Madrid. The leaders of the insurrection at Carthage have sent a communication to Admiral Velverton, protesting against the sending Spanish frigates to Gibraltar.

A demonstration in favor of the rights of laboring men was made in South London on Sunday. Large procession. Six thousand present.

The Spanish correspondent of the Standard states that five men, said to have been sent from Madrid to assassinate Don Carlos, have been executed at Evalla. The Republicans are casting guns for the defence of San Sebastian.

New York, Sept. 8.—Morris Perpl was arrested in London for setting fire to Fashion Stud Farm Stables. He has made a full confession.

The transatlantic balloon exhibited last night. It is ready to start on Wednesday.

Madrid, Sept. 6.—In the session of the Cortes to-day Senor Castelar further demanded, as conditions upon which he would accept office, that he be empowered to increase the army, purchase 500,000 rifles, organize militia, and impose a forced loan, or be furnished means by which he can obtain five hundred million to meet the expense of the war against the Carlist and Intransigent Insurgents; he also demanded authority to suspend the constitutional guarantees, and deprive the Ayuntamiento of the powers they now exercise when, in his judgment, such measures become necessary. The Cortes unanimously voted to confer all the powers demanded.

Louisville, Ky., Sept. 7.—A correspondent of the Courier Journal states that he, assisted by several citizens of Owen County, on Saturday captured two men charged with being concerned in the murder of Geo. Wilson, on Brown's plantation. One of the parties arrested today that ten more were arrested in Owen and Henry Counties, charged with belonging to the Ku Klux organization.

St. Louis, Sept. 7.—Governor Woodson has written a letter to the Sheriff of Calhoun County, in which he accuses the people of that County as not having done their duty in failing to bring to justice the Lynchers of Keller and the murderers of Sheriff Law and William H. Dunden. He threatens if those implicated in the crimes, and also those who are known to have participated in the mob, are not speedily arrested and brought to trial, he will carry out the law, which authorizes him to send militia into the County to make arrests, and quarter them upon the people.

Boston, Sept. 7.—The Springfield Republican estimates Washburn's majority in Convention at from 150 to 200.

Chicago, Sept. 7.—The Fulton Elevator in this city was burned this morning. It was owned by Jesse Hoyt & Co., New York. Loss, \$75,000; insurance, \$20,000. It contained \$50,000 worth of grain, which was fully insured.

The messenger of the American Express Company was arrested at Davenport, Iowa, with about \$50,000, entrusted to him, which he had appropriated.

Baltimore, Sept. 7.—George Chase and Elijah Miller, colored, while intoxicated on Saturday, quarreled about seven miles from the city. Chase stabbed Miller, who died in half an hour.

POLICE COURT.

(Before the Police Magistrate.)
DRUNK.
John Murray, labourer, was found drunk by Constable Turner on Freshfield-street on Sunday. Fined \$1 and costs. Committed for ten days in default of payment.

COMPLAINT is made by the Orangeville Advertiser that after the Mono Agricultural Society had fixed the day for their show, the Cardwell Society changed their day, which had been previously fixed, and arranged for their show to be on the same day as the Mono one.

The monthly bank returns for July have not yet made their appearance, and the Monetary Times of Friday complains loudly at the delay of Mr. Auditor-General Langton in this matter.

MEDICAL ASSOCIATION—The medical practitioners of Orangeville and surrounding country held a meeting in the Paisley House on Tuesday last, for the purpose of forming a society for the promotion of medical science and the interchange of views on professional subjects. The meeting was duly organized, and Dr. Henry, sr., was appointed president, Dr. Henry, jr., secretary, and Dr. Riddell, treasurer, for the present year. A tariff of fees was also drawn up, which the doctors present signed and pledged themselves to adhere to.

Several farmers in Saugeen township have had their sheep killed by some wild animal—a wolf, it is supposed. All attempts to catch it have failed.

McMullen and his Evidence.

We append a further extract from the report of McMullen's interview with the Chicago reporter, a summary of which we gave on Saturday:

Reporter.—Can you prove that Sir John A. Macdonald knew of this bargain between Sir Hugh Allan and Sir Geo. E. Cartier?

McM.—I can. I will even show his telegrams, one admonishing Allan to "shell out," because he had a big thing; another declaring in the most positive manner that he indorsed the arrangement made by Cartier with Sir Hugh, and would hold himself bound by it. He confirmed the bargain unreservedly.

R. Can you prove it?

McM.—I will put witnesses on the stand who saw the telegram: one of them a very prominent man, a friend of Cartier. I will name the man who wrote the record of these transactions.

R. How much did Sir Hugh pay out to set these honest men back to power?

McM.—About \$350,000. For Cartier alone \$20,000 was spent. But Sir Hugh's campaign against him prior to the bargain had so fired the popular heart against Cartier that he could not be beaten. He was beaten by 1,800 votes.

R. For every fresh outlay of money Allan compelled him to sign a new contract, and to give a new receipt?

R. As soon as Allan had Cartier bought and the Government in his power did you quit?

McM.—Yes. He did not see that he needed us then. He thought that he might as well have the charter and its millions of gold and its millions of farms to himself.

R. When did you suspect his defection?

McM.—Throughout the whole summer. He never gave any intimation of it until the 24th of October, but all my letters to him were calculated to draw him out. He is cunning but not deep.

R. What awakened your suspicion?

McM.—Yes. His misrepresentation concerning money. He stated that he had paid \$15,000 of the first \$40,000 to four French newspapers. I found that he had simply put that in his pocket, gave them loans and secured himself against loss.

R. When did he break off with you?

McM.—The first intimation was Oct. 24th.

R. What? Does not this memorial submitted by him and accepted by the Government say he broke off in April, the beginning of the season?

McM.—Yes, but it is all brazen lying. Here are all his letters and telegrams, dated all along from April to November. Here are the paid checks, with his name. Here are his letters to Smith covering the same period, and there are copies of his letters to— in New York, on the same subject. He intended to sell out before he got to get his \$400,000 before we could catch him.

R. What did he do?

McM.—I went to Ottawa, submitted to Sir John A. Macdonald the history of the business in authentic shape. He seemed afraid to move. On the 23rd of January of this year I saw him again accompanied by his friends. I gave him copies of all the documents of the receipts for the amount of \$1,000,000 be furnished, as guarantee for building the road.

R. Did Sir Hugh deposit?

McM.—Oh, the Receiver-General stated that it was not the intention of the Government to receive the money from the banks.

R. Then there is not the guarantee of a cent that the road will ever be built?

McM.—That a cent.

R. Have you any further proof that the Government were aware of Sir Hugh Allan's bargain with Cartier?

McM.—I do not feel at liberty to submit it all for publication. I will give you a single item that will probably be sufficient. Shortly after the elections were over and while Allan was pressing for a fulfilment of his bargain, he began to think that the Government intended to stop Billy's pitching. Sunley took his old position, and with Tommy Smith on it, and Charley out on left, we were treated to some of the old style of delivery, which it was thought at one time the Londoners would take advantage of and run up a score, but the sharp fielding of our boys was too much for them, and they retired in one, two, three order the same as before.

After the conclusion of the game the T. C. MENSERS packed up, and left for home, with the intention, no doubt, of leaving base ball tours alone for another year. No doubt many of our readers, along with ourselves, have wondered very much why the T. C. MENSERS were so badly defeated in Kingston; but the fact that the Sr. LAWRENCE were determined to win the game by means both unfair and ungentlemanly, settles the matter. In the first place we are told by an eye-witness that there was no such thing as putting a Kingston man out on a base—they must all be put out on "flys" so clear that nobody could doubt; and in the next place if the umpire did decide against the Kingston nine on a close point he was hooted and yelled at by the crowd until he reversed his decision. In our opinion those Kingston people ought to give up all claim to playing base ball and study up "rounders."

THE SCORE.

That Letter.

A great amount of virtuous indignation is being pumped up by the Ministerial press about the purloining and publication of Sir John's letter to Mr. Pope regarding the selection of a Tory candidate. What a blessed relief it is to turn for a brief breathing space from the weary task of whitening the political Ethiopian, to hurl a charge of robbing the mails at Opposition leaders and Opposition journalists in general. In their heart of hearts the organs are thankful to Hon. John Young for giving them this opportunity of creating a diversion and of getting up a "counter irritation" to relieve the Pacific Scandal inflammation. No doubt they will make the most of the opportunity.

An investigation as being held at Montreal in order to discover, if possible, who was the daring thief that purloined the letter and placed it in Hon. John Young's box. This is by no means the first irregularity of the kind which has occurred at the Montreal Post Office lately. Frequent complaints were made of missing money-letters, and then came a charge of defalcation against one of the Post Office officials, with a counter-charge of conspiracy. Ugly rumours were abroad about the affair; but the implicated official had powerful friends, and so the report of the investigation was kept secret, the affair was hushed up, and "everything was made lovely." It is not positively known whether the letter was purloined at the Montreal post-office, or before reaching there; but, if the theft did occur in the Montreal office, who is to blame for the demoralization amongst the officials which alone could render such a crime possible? There is but one answer—the Government, who by condoning one offence gave encouragement for the commission of similar ones. It is consoling to reflect, however, that in this case at least "stringent measures to ferret out the guilty parties" will be taken. We don't hear any suggestion that the post-office officials should be allowed to hold a secret meeting, and nominate a Commission amongst themselves to try the case.

The actual stealing of the letter is of course condemned on all hands. But its publication by the Hon. John Young and the Montreal Herald is an entirely different question. We are not inclined to defend this, and we think that it would have been much more honorable to have refrained from publishing the letter, considering the manner in which it came into Mr. Young's possession. There is no doubt, however, that in dealing with knavery and corruption of the kind which has been dragged to light by the Pacific Railway intrigues, it is hard to avoid soiling one's fingers, by fighting one's adversaries with their own weapons. And in Mr. Young's case the temptation was a peculiarly sore one, as the object of writing the letter was to work a piece of gross injustice to himself. It appears that Mr. Young for some time held the office of four inspectors in Montreal. The appointment to this office is and always has been in the hands of the Board of Trade. Recent legislation, simply for the sake of uniformity throughout the Dominion, removed the signing of Inspectors' commissions from the mayors of cities into the hands of the Governor-General; and Mr. Young promoted the measure making this alteration. Even now, the Government neither pays Mr. Young nor actually appoints him, but simply issues his commission after his selection for the office. Sir John A. Macdonald, however, saw only in the new law an opportunity of forcing an Opposition member to resign his seat, and of setting a wealthy Montrealer to bribe his way into Parliament, by dangling before his eyes the promise of a seat in the Senate. Hence the letter to Mr. Pope. The improper way in which this letter has been given to the public must not blind us to the unpardonable corruption it reveals. The Guelph Herald, apparently feeling something congenial in the sentiment of the Macdonald-Pope letter, remarks that it "does the writer no discredit!" That is quite true, but not exactly in the sense the Herald meant it.

The hypocrisy of the howl which is being raised by the Ministerial press about this letter is well illustrated by the fact that only about twelve months since a private letter from Hon. Mr. McKellar to Mr. McIntyre, having reference to the Grey election, was wrongfully taken from the post-office, and published in the Tory papers, who then did not hesitate to exult over the information thus surreptitiously obtained. It is a deplorable fact that as time goes on the game of politics is played with an ever-increasing moral recklessness; but what else can be expected when the head of the Government has set an example of such unbounded corruption and venality that his unscrupulous cunning has almost passed into a proverb?

REPORTS from Halifax continue to bring distressing accounts of loss of life during the recent storm. In one instance thirty schooners are reported wrecks, and all hands on board must have perished. I OOR OLD LADY.—Considerable amusement has been caused by an attempt of the Toronto Leader to represent Sir John's letter to Pope as being a forgery, in view of the fact that the evidence of Sir John's own private secretary proves it to be genuine.

The Royal Commission.
THIRD DAY.

Ottawa, Sep. 6.

The Commission opened at noon. Senator McPherson deposed—I am acquainted with Sir Hugh Allan, and have met McMullen; have no personal knowledge of such an agreement as set forth in Mr. Huntington's motion; Sir H. Allan told me in Feb. 1872, that he had negotiations with Americans, looking to the construction of the Pacific Railway; I have a letter on the subject from him, which has been published.

Mr. McPherson then read his statement as it was published some months ago, also the letters that passed between him and Sir H. Allan, published at the same time.

Mr. McPherson continued—I was informed that Mr. McMullen was acting for American capitalists, who were to have seventeen-twentieths and Canadians three-twentieths of the stock was in anticipation of any legislation; nothing was said at the time of Sir Hugh being at the head of the Company; I understood that the Government was aware of Sir Hugh's negotiations with Americans; I have no knowledge of an arrangement between the Government and Sir Hugh and Mr. Abbott for granting the contract for building, etc., in consideration for money advanced to carry the elections; I am aware of no condition upon which Sir Hugh obtained the charter; I was put down by Sir Hugh for \$100,000 stock, but I never acquiesced in my name being so put down; I was President of the Inter-oceanic Company; it was only after I found Sir H. Allan would not abandon his American associates, that I, in conjunction with others, formed the Inter-oceanic Company, with the view of defeating the American scheme, and being prepared to construct the road; the Inter-oceanic Company looked upon the Canada Company as virtually composed of Sir Hugh, and had reasons to believe that he was determined to act in connection with the Americans; I had a conversation with Mr. Abbott subsequently, wherein he told me that they had dropped their American friends; this was previous to the issue of the Charter; I refused to consent, previous to the proposed amalgamation of the two Companies, to Sir Hugh being made President; I had several conversations with Sir John Macdonald, when I told him the scheme broached by Sir Hugh would involve all in failure and disgrace, therefore the Inter-oceanic refused to amalgamate. (To Sir John): The last conversation I had with you on amalgamation was in November last, when you told me, as Mr. Abbott said, that the Americans had been dropped.

Louis Beaubien was next called. He deposed—I am Vice-President of the N. C. Ry.; I do not hold any position in the present Pacific Railroad Company; I am not aware of any agreement between Sir Hugh and the Government for the advancement of money on the Pacific charter; I was not connected with the scheme till the road was incorporated; I do not know of any American capital being furnished for the road, or any other purpose connected with it; I have no knowledge of an agreement by which Sir Hugh advanced money to the Government for the Pacific Charter; I have reason to believe Sir Hugh advanced certain money to aid the elections of the Ministerial candidates in Quebec; cannot at this moment recall a friend of mine, some time before the elections, wanted to raise some money for elections; Sir Hugh advanced him \$1,000, but I would not like to tell his name, as Government knew nothing of the circumstance; Sir Hugh advanced money to myself without the knowledge of the Government; I gave him the following receipt: "I promise to pay to Sir Hugh Allan the sum of \$7,000 one year from date, provided it shall not be previously paid, with other sums advanced by him;" I cannot say how much was subscribed to Sir Geo. E. Cartier's election; alist was passed around; I went to Sir Hugh for this money, because I was actually connected with him in the Northern Colonization Ry. (To Sir John): If being Sir George's candidate made him the Government candidate, then he was such; I don't think Cartier knew of it till after I got the money.

Mr. Bethune, manager Ottawa branch Montreal Telegraph Company, deposed—I reside in Ottawa; I have not in my possession any telegram that passed between Sir John Macdonald and Mr. Abbott during Aug., 1872.

The books of the office were examined. No entries of such telegrams appeared in them; telegrams are kept one year and destroyed; all telegrams previous to the second of Aug., 1872 have been destroyed.

The Commission adjourned at two o'clock, and met again at four to sign depositions, but none were ready, and they adjourned till to-morrow.

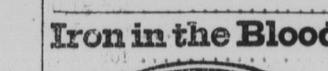
