Wanted—Results, GRASS

It does not take very long for one possessing considerable experience in the ways of Colonial life, a quiet appreciation of character, and an enquiring turn of mind, to take in the real position of a colony like this; and we are apt to think that the Governor is already settling down to earnest work.

The Colonist will expect partial results. They have been fed too long upon the dry husk of fair but empty promises. Those who have had fiber enough to hold their own in spite of misgovernment are not of the stuff to be content with mere promises much longer.

Indeed, if they err at all it is in being too uncomplaining, too submissive. But a series of years of the most selfish and effete administration and gradual decline of prosperity have taught them to believe that a more decided hand must grasp the helm of affairs if the breakers would be cleared.

It would be mere affectation to deny that there exists a very general impression, not only in this community, but throughout the entire Colony, that the right man has grasped the helm not a moment too soon. His Excellency will readily understand, therefore, that much will be expected of him.

It is much to have gained the confidence of the people in the outset. It would be a fatal mistake to allow that confidence to be materially shaken. There can be no doubt that Governor Mulgrave has a difficult task to perform.

As the Governor will be expected to take it to call to the Executive Council two of the popular members of the Legislative Council. In this he will only fulfil a promise made several years ago by his predecessor.

Stockbridge in 1820. His first efforts in addressing the House were very successful, and he soon displayed talents which gave promise of a distinguished political career. Distinguished for the purity and fire of his style, he earned the title of the "Rupert of debate."

During earlier years he inclined to the liberal side, and it was not long before the chief Secretaryship of Ireland was placed at his disposal. Under Lord Grey's administration he became Colonial Minister in 1830; which appointment he held for four years.

Lord Stanley took an active part in the discussion on the Reform Bill of that period, defending its provisions with great warmth and talent; and he succeeded in carrying through the same session the bill establishing the national system of education in Ireland.

The great measure for the emancipation of the West India slaves found also in him a zealous and able supporter. About this period arose the crisis which separated him from the Liberal party, with whom he never again acted.

A project to reduce still further the Irish Church establishment met with his able and uncompromising opposition, and caused him to resign office. Once more Colonial Minister under Sir Robert Peel, he took his seat in the House of Lords in 1844.

Lord Stanley placed himself at the head of the protectionist opposition, and from that time until very recently continued to be the recognized leader of the Conservative party. In 1851, his father dying, he succeeded to the earldom of Derby, and in the following year was enabled to form an administration to succeed Lord John Russell.

But he had only a very brief tenure of power. In the year 1858, on the fall of the Palmerston administration, he again had the formation of a Ministry assigned to him; and although somewhat more enduring than the former, yet, in 1859, it died in an attempt to carry a so-called Reform Bill.

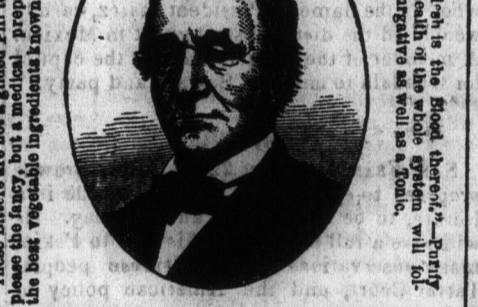
