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

## 48,000 THE TOTAL OF PORT ARTHUR GARRISON

Report From G neral Nogi Shows That Stoessel Had Much Larger Force Than was Supposed---Captives Include Eight Generals and Four Admirals.

TOKIO, Jan. 5.—A report from Gen. Nogi's headquarters largely increased the figures of the surrendered garrison and intimates that the force handed over to the Japanese at Port Arthur will be 32,000, exclusive of 15,000 or 16,000 sick and wounded, making a total of 48,000. The report is as follows: "The transfer to the Japanese mentioned in article 2, of the capitulation compact, took place on Jan. 4th, and the transfer of the bat

"The prisoners will be assembled at a place appointed on Jan. 5th, but the investigation relating to these prisoners is so complicated that the result cannot be anticipated at present. Reports received up to date are as follows: Eight generals, four admirals, 57 colonels and majors, 100 captains and commanders, 581 army captains and lieutenants, 200 naval lieutenants, 99 army officials, 109 surgeons, 20 chaplains, of the rank and file of the army 22,484, of the rank and file of the navy 4,500, army noncombatants 3,645, navy non-combatants 500; total 32,207.

"Besides these there are about 15,000 sick and wounded in the hospitals. The volunteers are carefully included in the list of non-combatants. "One hundred saddle horses and 1,870 draft horses were surrendered."

Alarm at Agitation for Free Importation of Canadian

(Special Cable to the Colonist.)

Sealskins Shipped From Alaska In Violation of United States Law.

Eleven Barrels of "Codfish" Sent Here by Sealer Containing Pelts

How the skins were secured is a story that has not been told; probably they were bought from Aleut hunters to whom the generous company which has a monopoly under the laws of the United States in taking seals, pays fifty cents per skin. At all events they were secured by one Parrish, a storekeeper of Ounalaska, and he barrelled them and labelled them "codfish." One of the Victoria sealing schooners was to have brought them to Victoria from Ounalaska, an arrangement having been made with her master to carry eleven barrels of codfish, but the schooner did not get them. When she went in to Ounalaska the skins were at Englishman's bay, having been sent there for shipment on one of several sealing schooners that were anchored at the port near Unlmak after leaving the Behring sea.

There is a fishing station at Englishman's be in which Parrish is interested, and he sent the "codfish" to an agent there. This agent arranged with Captain Delouchrey of the schooner Oscar and Hattle to carry the "codfish" to Victoria, consigned to a Victoria agent. The sealing captain did not know the true contents of the barrels of codfish; all he knew was that eleven barrels stated to be codfish were shipped on his vessel, and freight would be paid at the rate charged by the schooner's owners.
