TWO GRAND TRUNK FREIGHTS COLLIDE NEAR PORT HOPE.

PORT HOPE, July 6 .- A terrific collision occurred just east of the Port Hope viaduct Cobourg, to which he pushed through the heavy fog. As he reached the heaviest part of the down grade, he saw the locomotive of the other train just turning the curve south of the toll-gate, and he whistled for brakes, but the grade and the loaded cars were too much to make any possible difference in the speed of his train. At the same moment the engineer from the east observed the train shead. possible difference in the speed of his train. At the same moment the engineer from the east observed the train ahead, but he had just got on the fullest head of steam so as to ascend the grade. As a collision was unavoidable the engineers a collision was unavoidable the engineers prepared to save themselves by jumping or running back over the cars; those who jumped escaped without injury. Fireman Clay ran to the third car and jumped, spraining his shoulder. The locomotives came together with a fearful crash, were thrown up in the air and then tumbled to the south side of the track. The locomotives were destroyed completely. The track is torn up for about a dozen car lengths, ties being broken into splinters and rails twisted out of shape. The damage cannot be covered with less than \$200,000, and will probably exceed that sum.

The Free library board met yesterday afternoon, the members present being Chairman Hallam, Messrs. Scully, Boswell, Boulton, Taylor, Mills and Knowlton. Mr. Bain and Mr. Davy thanked the board for their appointments as librarian and secretary respectively. The librarian reported that there were 10,600 volumes in

We took occasion recently to point out that, while there has been a great fall in the wholesale prices of most articles of food which comes from the farm, retail prices of the same still keep up to the old figures. We have now to add that the fall then spoken of is still going on, in both grain and provisions. In England, at latest advices, harvest prospects were highly favorable, heavy arrivals of wheat from abroad were coming in, beyond present needs of the hiarket, and prices were falling. The stocks of wheat in Liverpool on the 1st instant w re 4,500,000 centile, or more than foor times the quantity on the same date last year. The stocks of flour were 340,000 sicks, being more than double those of s ar ago. The following exhibits the stocks breadstuffs at Liverpool at the periods

Those who want to make a "boom" in wheat will scarcely find a basis for it in England, we fancy. Nor are boom prospects any better on this vile the water. The Montreal Gezette, a paper that keeps track of the situation pretty carefully in its commercial columns, says that accounts received tell of spleudid weather recently for the crops throughout the Northwest, with an improvement of fully fifty per cent. in harvest prospects. Further, it is now an ascertained fact, and beyond all question, that there is a very large amount of last year's grain still in farmers' hands in the States, and in Canada too, in proportion, it may safely be added. All this, however, does not seem to make the loaf of bread a cent cheaper.

The downward tendency of wholesale prices is seen also in meat and provisions. Last week witnessed the greatest tumble in beef known in England for some time. Values went down 11 cent to 2 cents per pound, or from \$15 to \$20 on the one beast. As to the prospects for pork and lard, let us quote again from the Gazette :

us quote again from the Gazette:

It is pretty certain there will be no dearth of hog products in Canada for some time, as we learn upon good authority that more than one firm in Chicago have been selling large quantities of pork and lard, not only in our principal cities but at some of the interior points. It is safe to say that the deliveries of western pork in Canada will be liberal from this oit. We were informed yesterday of a round lot of lard shipped by a Chicago house to a party here, against which a draft has been drawn, although it is said to be purely optional on his part whether or not he takes it up when the goods arrive. It is also stated that in all probability the lard wil 1 go in o store and be held here for account of the Chicago shipper. It would appear by this that some of our western friends find it convenient to do a little financiering at times by pushing the product into

According to the best accounts from New York, Montreal and other important shipping points, stocks of butter are rapidly accumulating in the hands of farmers, dairymen, jobbers and speculators' with the certainty that some day soon the pressure force the old and too long kept stuff down | the matter, and now that the affair is closed to the price of grease. at all events.

It may be said that something like this was talked of last year, but did not come. There is a roply to this. The year 1881 was a very poor year for grain and grass and consequently for beef cattle, hogs and butter, especially in the western states, but much of its abundance was taken merely to fill up the gap caused by the deficiency of 1881. But now that the old gap has been filled up, present abundance and the prospects of a second good year begin to tell powerfully upon the markets. Another circumstance—the collapse of the Chicago lard corner and the failure of all recent at tempts to "boom" either wheat or port, show that there is no ring of speculators strong enough to keep up prices in the face of actual abundance, both in Europe and America. The great failure of McGeoch in Chicago, and the lesser one of, Hodgins in Montreal, are having an effect on the provision market which is almost incalculable.

Now, our word to retailers is this. It may be that they are really selling as cheaply as they can afford to do, on the basis of the prices they have to pay to commission dealers and jobbers. If so, it's time for them to "brace up," and firmly to intimate to "brace up," and It may be said that something like this

The facts are most unquestionably as we have above stated; nobody in the trade will venture to deny them. Just to obviate denial, we have quoted from good authority. We hope to see Toronto retailers have the nerve to insist upon getting their supplies at the low wholesale prices of the present time instead of the high prices which have passed away. And it may strengthen their backbone in this respect if their customers make a little more pressing and particular inquiry as to the very considerable fall in the wholesale prices of most necessaries of life which has recently taken place.

AN IMPURTANT JUDGMENT. The liability of solicitors has recently received a new illustration. A Toronto solicitor, Mr. Caston, advised a client, Mr. Shaw, to register a declaration of his intention, on the death of his father, a lunatio, to claim certain property in Toronto, and proceed to attempt to make his title thereto good. An action was brought to compel the removal of the instrument from the register. Vice-Chancellor Proudfoot decided that Shaw had no interest in the property; that the instrument must be removed from the register, and decreed damages against both solicitor and client. Against the registerar, who had been included among the detendants, he dismissed the bill with costs, remarking that that functionary had done a wise thing in registering a doubtful document. There is probably no subject of modern

imes that has caused and is causing greater

attention than the origin of tornacloes.

Scientists have studied it for the benefit of

umanity; men have investigated it for the welfare of their families. It has been a vexed subject long considered, and through all this investigation the cyclone has swept across the land carrying destruction to scientists as well as to the innocent dwellers in its track. One thing, however, is certain ; the cause of the cyclone must be sought far away from the whirling body of wind itself. Its results are powerful; its cause must also be powerful. Let us therefore consider a few facts. First, the appointment in our much talked of free appearance of a cyclone is invariably precaded by dark spots upon the face of the sun. These spots, indicating a disturbed condition of the solar regions, necessarily affect the atmosphere of our earth. An unusual generation of heat in one part of the atmosphere is certain to cause a partial vacuum in another portion. Air must rusl in to fill this vacuum. Hence the disturbin to fill this vacuum. Hence the disturbances—hence the cyclone. This theory finds additional confirmation in the fact that for nadoes come during the day and not at night. The dark spots upon the surface of the sun, whatever they may be, seem to cause great commotion in the atmosphere of the world, and it is almost certain that of the world, and it is almost certain that the extremely wet weather of the present season can be accounted for on precisely this basis. Is it reasonable to suppose that the marvelous effect of the sun upon vegetation and life in general shall be less than upon the atmosphere itself through

which its rays come? The cause is remote, but the effect is here.




