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



Analysis of the Returns.

At Mount Pleasant there was an increase of 16 interments compared with August last year. Of the 82 interred 38 were children; 13 were old people. Among the certified causes of death were: Cholera infantum 9, heart disease 7, diarrhea 4, pneumonia 4, phthisis 3, drowning, bronchitis, consumption 2 each, shock, accident and overdose of laudanum 1 each.

At the Necropolis 14 of the 22 interred were children. Only 2 were above 70 years of age. There were four deaths from cholera infantum and 2 from diarrhea.

Twenty-six of the 46 interred in St. Michael's Cemetery were children; 5 were old people. There were 5 deaths from conumption, 4 each from cholera infantum and cancer, two from heart disease.

At St. James' Cemetery the interments showed the largest increase of 30 over a year ago and 15 over July this year. Of the 118 interred 68 were children. There were 17 deaths from cholera infantum, 6 and from heart disease, diarrhea and one of those interred in Prospect Cemetery he record was: Killed by trolley, run over year, found dead!
