Great Britain and France are again on the verge of war over their interests in Africa. A month or so ago and Western Africa was the scene of the trouble. —About 14,000 barrels of Valley apples, as the London City, went forward last week. —About 6000 barrels of Valley apples have been exported to Boston already this season. —Olive Branch Division, Sons of Temperance, will celebrate its 50th anniversary next month.

—Mr. F. W. McLeod will move from Bridgetown to Truro this week. He has sold his famous stallion, named "WILKIE," to the Smith Brothers in South Brookfield, Queens County. Dr. Smith, of Mill Village, was credited last week with the purchase of the horse. —A young man, Fred W. Eddy, of West Newton, Mass., has purchased a site on Margrave Harbor, where he will erect a large saw mill. —O'Brien's section of the Midland Railway, running 20 miles from Windsor, is nearly completed; three weeks' work will end this part of the contract.

—The English champion double sculler, Baber and Bang, have challenged the Lynch brothers, of Halifax, for a race. Their challenge has been accepted for \$500 a boat. —The brigantine Inna was wrecked on the Truro Cape, near Halifax, on Saturday. The crew were taken off by the men from the Devil's Island life saving station. —The local government has decided that the Midland railway must follow the Clifton instead of the Brookfield route, for which the town of Truro voted \$20,000 as a bonus. —Enterprising business men of the town of Glace Bay are forming a company to develop a power of draining Middle Lake, near Sydney, and planning and cultivating cranberries. —Mr. James W. Clendenen, president of the Acadia Club, of Pictou died at Roosevelt Hospital, New York, on Saturday 15th, from injuries received by a runaway trolley. —At the McGill sports at Montreal, last week, Ralph E. Smith, of Windsor, beat Pauchere, winning the ball and bat, and bicycle races and also took second place in the mile. —Lyman Darrt, who shot the Armenian pedlar near Truro and who was subsequently pardoned, is now in the American Army. He is in the thick of the fighting before Santiago. —Dalloune football team won from the United Service team on Saturday—6 to 0. The college has now two wins to her credit and the Vandermere and Service one each. —Rev. Theodorus Freeman, chaplain of the U. S. strainer Baltimore, committed suicide by jumping overboard while in a state of mental depression. He was a native of Milton, Quebec. —Diphtheria of an unusually malignant type has broken out in Kouchibouctou. The patients have been inoculated with antitoxin. Government aid has been asked to prevent its spread. —Two cargoes of smuggled liquor and tobacco, valued at \$8,000, were seized at North Sydney. Both vessels were unloaded, their cargoes warehoused, and their crews arrested. —The Gloucester fishermen report mackerel exceptionally scarce at present along the Cape Breton coast, the fish being all inshore. There are at present fifty sail of American mackerel vessels along the coast. —Captain Herbert Taylor, of Wolfville, N. S., has been appointed valuator for the Beaking Sea sealing schooner, and is now ordered west at once. 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Beyond the Home Market.

Official figures just furnished by the Treasury Department bureau of statistics show the increase in value of American breadstuffs exported during the nine months ending with September to have been \$99,399,210, while the value of provisions, including cattle and hogs, increased \$19,390,975. For the week ending to-day 4,729,909 bushels of wheat have found their way to foreign lands. These figures show but a slight falling off from those of the week before, when exports were 5,397,221 bushels. For the last two months there has rarely been a week when the exports of wheat were not approximately 5,000,000 bushels. Nearly 5,000,000 bushels of corn went out this week, a quantity almost 1,000,000 bushels in excess of the exports during the corresponding week last year.
