Milk as Food.

The chief bulk of milk is of course made up of water, and in ordinary unadulterated milk from 90 per cent. to an unusually rich milk, it has all the value of the whole milk for building and repair of tissue.

But, to quote Bishop Spalding: "It is far from my thought to say that the city is wholly evil. It was a most complex and difficult work of civilization man, and progress is felt by all. It is full, and will be full, though all the world should speak of it."

Graduates from the Country.

But while the quart, or two pounds of milk, the twelve ounces of beef and the six ounces of bread all supply the same amount of nutriment, the nutritive values are not exactly the same; in other words, they would not be equal either for food or for fuel.

Milk contains all the ingredients needed for nourishment that is, it furnishes the materials which build up the body and keep it in repair, and also those which supply it with fuel.

"We live not upon what we eat, but upon what we digest," Milk ranks among the most digestible of the animal foods in respect to all its ingredients.

Even after average milk is skimmed it still contains nearly ten per cent. of solids or nutritive ingredients. The value of skim milk as food is not generally appreciated. Taken by itself, it is rather "thin," and has not stimulating power.
