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

Boys and girls in these early times were taught in separate rooms and not mixed as to-day. The schools at this time were semi private-parents having to pay a certain sum per nonth or quarter per pupil while the Government supplemented the income of the teacher a little by paying them for the pupils unable to pay the

monthly charges. Often parents were unable to pay for the whole of their children at the same time and then one child was sent to school for a quarter then kept home and another giving his turn

in the same way. Very early Bridgetown had rival schools as Thomas Crosskill, a son of Capt. Crosskill, opened classes in a small hall near the Baptist Church and shared with Mr. Shipley the honor in training our grandparents. 


