CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

I.

The Society shall be called the **DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.**

II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-Law, Rules or Regulations of the Society be repealed, annulled, or altered, except at a Meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese; which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said Meeting.

III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Annual Meeting of the General Committee, or at the next previous Anniversary Meeting, of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at such previous Meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote, at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes of the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

V.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds, shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same, a member of the Society. Provided that no member shall

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be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such Meeting.

VI.

Officers.

1. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, two or more Vice Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President; and any Life Member may, at any Anniversary Meeting, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province, of any such Officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent Meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee, for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

VII.

Executive Committee..

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

The Officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and Subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound: to be annually elected, at the meetings of the General Committee, provided that no Annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected, unless he shall, during the year preceding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five Members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January, on the day next following the Annual Meeting, on the first Wednesday in March, on the first Wednesday in June, and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October.

4. Special Meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting; but so far as may be, alternately at Saint John and Fredericton.

5. The Executive Committee shall have all such right and power in and connected with the management, control and disposal of all lands, real estate and property whatsoever, which may now or may hereafter be vested in the Society, and with respect to the use of the Corporate Seal of the Society, as the General Committee or any General Meeting of the Society would have in Session, and shall further be authorized to depute all and any such powers to any sub-committee of such Executive Committee.

VIII.

Board of Home Missions.

There shall also be a Board of Home Missions, to be composed of the following Members, viz. :

1. The President, Treasurer and Secretary or Secretaries of the Society *ex officio*.

2. Three Clerical and five Lay Members of the Society, qualified for election as members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed member by two members of the General Committee.

3. The Board of Home Missions shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule, and carrying the same into operation and effect, and the appropriations or disposition of the funds to the object of the Society, as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any Resolution, Bye-Laws or Regulations of the General Committee.

4. Five members of the Board, three of whom shall be Laymen, shall be a quorum.

5. The Board of Home Missions shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer or Secretary of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

IX.

Objects.

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other, viz. :

I. Missionary Visits to places where there is no settled Clergy-men, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships ; and assistance, when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. The Supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a Fund towards the augmentation of the stipends of Clergymen who are poor ; and towards the education of Children of such Clergymen, and towards the making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

10. The formation of a Fund for receiving Money or Securities as Special Trusts.

11. Aid to Foreign Missions of the Church of England ; with the understanding that subscriptions for this object may be limited to any organization in connection with the Church of England, but if not so limited, will be forwarded to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, for the general purposes of that Society.

X.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

XI.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XII.

Local Committee.

1. The Members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall at the discretion of the Missionary of such Mission, constitute a Local Committee ; and so also the members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence

of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop), may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day, previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to depute two Lay Members of the Society, to be elected at the Annual Meetings of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

5. The Members of the Society, attending the public services at the Cathedral in the city of Fredericton, shall have the right to elect two Lay Delegates annually. The Meeting for the election of the said Delegates, to be held annually at such time and place as the Lord Bishop of the Diocese may direct; and the said Delegates upon being so elected, and their election duly certified by the Lord Bishop or other person presiding at the said meeting, shall be taken to be, and shall be thereby qualified as members of the General Committee.

XIII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special General Committee may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John, respectively.

XIV.

The General Committee.

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following members, viz.: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese,

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who shall be the Chairman, the Vice-Presidents of the Society ; in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman from the Vice-Presidents present, and if none be present, from other members of the Committee ; the Secretary or Secretaries, who shall also serve in that capacity at the meeting of the General Committee ; the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish (provided that in the absence or sickness of the Rector of any Parish, the duly licensed Curate or Assistant Minister shall be considered *Pro hac vice* a member of the General Committee), and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees as before provided ; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee to be the certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex officio* members of the General Committee.

3. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting to make the Annual appropriations of the funds of the Society ; and a report of the proceedings of such meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

4. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows :

Firstly. Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

Secondly. Secretary's report to be read, and also a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly. Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly. Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

5. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meetings for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary Meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present ; and to determine by like vote, the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held, provided that in every such case, a report of such adjournment and the cause therefor, shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

XV.

The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion, for the general purposes of the Society.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

Whereas it is desirable for the better provision for the ministrations of the Church in the Diocese of Fredericton, that there be a systematic and permanent plan for the payment of the stipends of Missionaries ; therefore resolved,—

1. That in order to encourage the established Missions to become gradually self-supporting, all grants made by or through this Society in aid of Missions (not including stipends secured to any of the elder clergy on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life) shall from henceforth be made conditional on the contribution by the Mission itself of a stated sum towards the Missionary's stipend.

2. That all grants made by the General Committee be made subject to these resolutions, and be distributed under the direction of the Board of Home Missions, who shall have at all times all such and like powers and rights with respect to the same, or any of them, as the General Committee of the Society would have if in session.

3. That the Board of Home Missions annually present to the General Committee of the Society on the first day of their meeting, a full and detailed account of all business transacted during the expired year, and also a list of grants recommended for the ensuing year, with the conditions to be annexed to each, and shall also report to the Executive Committee at each quarterly meeting thereof.

4. That on the approval by the General Committee of the grants recommended for the year, the same shall forthwith pass into operation on the basis of the foregoing Resolutions, and subject to the following regulations :

(a.) The Board of Home Missions (acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop), shall forthwith after the annual meeting, communicate with the Wardens or other Lay Members of the Church in each Mission, requiring them to enter into engagements (A) with the Society, to contribute the sum required of the Mission for the year.

(b.) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 15th day of August, then next, they shall communicate with the Missionary, requiring him to give each of his congregations notice (B) of withdrawal of all payments as a Missionary receiving stipend through this Society on 1st October then next, unless the engagement be meantime completed.

(c.) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satis-

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fraction of the Board before the 1st of October then next, all payments to the Missionary's salary, through the Society, shall be withdrawn, and no stipend shall thereafter be payable in respect thereof: Provided, that should the Missionary see fit to resign his cure he shall, if stationed for the remainder of the year by the Lord Bishop in any vacant Mission which may be willing to comply with the terms required of the defaulting Mission, be entitled in respect of the services to be rendered in such new Mission to such stipend as may be agreed upon between such Missionary and the Board, not exceeding that provided for the continuation of his services in his former Mission, and upon the like terms and conditions: Provided also, that any such Missionary, if not so appointed to any new Mission, may nevertheless be permitted by the Board, on special application, to draw on 1st April for a sum in their discretion; but not exceeding his previous quarter's stipend from the Society.

(d.) Where such engagement is entered into, the Board shall forthwith notify the Missionary, who shall thereupon (unless the terms of such engagement shall not be fulfilled as hereinafter provided) be entitled to draw upon the Society for the full amount of his quarterly salary, including therein the sum required for the quarter of the Mission itself.

(e.) The sum required of the Mission shall in such case be remitted by the Wardens quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, and may consist either of money or written receipts of the Missionary, for produce furnished to him at the market rates: Provided that two months' grace (but no more) may be allowed the Mission to make up such sum; that is to say, the sum required for the quarter of the ensuing year, ending 30th October, shall be remitted before the 1st September, and for the following quarter before the 1st December next.

(f.) Should the Missionary give any such written receipt for produce, he shall keep a record thereof, and shall make his next quarter's draft for such sum only as shall be due him, after he shall be debited with such receipts in the Treasurer's books.

(g.) Should the sum required from the parish not be remitted as aforesaid, the Treasurer shall forthwith, on the expiration of the two months' grace, give notice (C) to the Missionary requiring him to give notice (D) of withdrawal of stipend as such Missionary, and all such stipend shall be thereupon withdrawn pursuant to such notice; and unless the sum agreed to be paid for the quarter shall be forthwith remitted, no stipend shall be payable for such expired quarter beyond the amount agreed to be contributed on the part of the Society; and none whatsoever for the

succeeding quarter : and the Board shall appoint a deputation to enquire into the causes of such default, and shall report thereon at the next meeting of the General Committee.

Provided that in any case, on a Mission ceasing to be in default, though after the period for withdrawal of the stipend shall have arrived, such Mission may be reinstated by the Board if they shall see fit so to do, under the regulations and conditions herein contained.

(4.) In case of the Missions where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant, the Board shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary ; and those Missionaries shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed, unless any shall voluntarily come within the general system adopted for other Missions.

(i.) It shall be optional with the Board to permit any Mission to make a quarterly, half-yearly, or yearly payment, at any period in advance, and these regulations, *mutatus mutandis*, shall thereupon apply, generally, to any such Mission.

(k.) The Board shall have full power and authority to make all such further bye-laws, rules, and regulations, as may in their opinion be required for their guidance, and from time to time to alter or amend the same as they shall see fit.

5. That in every case of a Clergyman receiving a stipend through this Society, he shall be required to make to the Secretary of the Society according to such form as the Board of Home Missions may from time to time require, half-yearly, on or before the first days of December and June in each year, a return for the preceding half year, shewing—

- (1.) The general limits of his Mission.
- (2.) The extent thereof in square miles.
- (3.) The estimated number of members of the Church of England living therein.
- (4.) The number of Churches, Chapels of Ease, and Missionary Stations respectively, within the Mission.
- (5.) Whether or not there is therein a parsonage house belonging to the Mission or provided by the people.
- (6.) The extent of Church and Glebe Land connected therewith.
- (7.) The income from such Church or Glebe Land for the year ending 1st April last.
- (8.) The amount contributed therein towards the support of the Missionary, from sources other than the grant through this Society.
- (9.) The number of public services on Sundays and in the week respectively.

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- (10.) The average congregation in each place of worship.
- (11.) The number of Communicants.
- (12.) The number of Baptisms.
 - A. Infants.
 - B. Adults.
 - C. Total.
- (13.) The number of Communicants.
 - A. Added.
 - B. Removed.
 - C. Deceased.
 - D. Present Members.
- (14.) The number Confirmed.
- (15.) Marriages.
- (16.) Burials.
- (17.) Names of Church Wardens.
- (18.) Names of Lay Delegates to Diocesan Church Society and Synod.

(19.) The number of scholars and teachers in Sunday School.

Which returns shall be laid before the Board of Home Missions forthwith, and before the General Committee on the first day of their meeting; and no grant shall from henceforth be payable to any Missionary in default of rendering any such statement or return so long as such default shall continue.

6. That the Board of Home Missions shall, so soon as may be, after the first day of December in each year, make up from such returns, the printed returns and statement required annually by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and forward the same, reporting specially to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel any Missionary who may be in default.

7. That those of the Clergy within the Diocese, not receiving stipends through this Society, be requested to forward to the Secretary in like manner, on or before the first day of June in each year, the returns numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19, in order that a complete return of the Diocese in these particulars, may each year be published with the Society's Report, as hath been heretofore in part only accustomed.

8. That the Board of Home Missions in conjunction with the Lord Bishop shall appoint deputations of Clergymen and Laymen for each Deanery, which each deputation shall visit, for the purpose of holding Missionary Meetings in the several Missions, and taking up collections thereat (not interfering however, with the usual semi-annual collections, and annual canvass of the Mission on behalf of the Society); and further, of making enquiries as to the power of the Mission to contribute towards the Clergyman's

support : such deputations reporting to the Board, and through them to the General Committee of the Society.

9. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, may further appoint special deputations to enquire into the causes of any deficiency of contributions or other pecuniary difficulties in any Mission, and shall have power to call for any returns they may think proper from any of the Parishes receiving aid from or through the Society.

10. That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to transmit a copy of these Resolutions to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, requesting their concurrence therein.

11. The Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, to make any grant that the funds may allow in aid of any Mission not already receiving aid, upon such conditions as they may arrange ; such grant to terminate, in every case, on the 1st July next ensuing.

12. That a certificate be added to the parochial agreements, which shall be signed by the representatives of the Mission, declaring that the amount given by the Mission is a *bona fide* contribution, and that no part is derived from the rent of glebes or the interest of investments—the property of the Mission.

13. That the Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, if there be available funds, to make a grant not exceeding \$100, to aid in the building of any Parsonage House when it shall be certified that such grant will complete the building free of debt.

These forms may be altered by the Board of Home Missions to suit the circumstances of the case.

PROVISION FOR THE WIDOWS AND ORPHANS OF THE CLERGY.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

The following plan for a provision for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy, with the rules and regulations annexed, was adopted by the General Committee. (See 36th Report.)

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Fredericton in the Province of New Brunswick, shall have a special Fund, to be called "THE CLERGY WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND," which shall consist of the present capital held by the Society for this object (subject to its present liabilities) of all subscriptions, donations, legacies, devises, and bequests, and other contributions given and paid to the Society for this special purpose, and of all payments received under these Rules; and this Fund shall be applied to the assistance of the families of deceased Clergymen, in accordance with these Rules, and to no other object.

2. Every Clergyman in this Diocese, duly licensed, whose widow is not already entitled to a pension from the SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, wishing to share in the benefits of this Fund, shall within six months from July 5, 1871, or within one year from receiving Holy Orders, or from his admission into the Diocese, apply to the Secretary of the Fund, for a certificate, and shall thenceforth pay annually the sum set opposite his age in the annexed scale. Any applicant, after such period of time, shall only be permitted to receive a certificate at the option of the Executive Committee of the Church Society, and upon such terms as they shall direct.

3. Every Clergyman, being a member of this Fund, shall make and forward to the Secretary a yearly collection from every congregation in his Parish or Mission. Assistant Curates, serving under a Rector, or other Assistant Clergyman, shall not, however, be required to make a collection, but shall forward only their own annual payment.

4. All payments shall become due on the first day of January, in each year, and must be paid within thirty days: and all congregational collections must be sent in before the first day of May. If this Rule is not complied with, the certificate shall be considered as forfeited, but may be regained at the option of the Committee, and the applicant shall pay for the new certificate at the rate payable at the age when the same is taken out, according to the annexed scale, together with such sum as the Executive Committee may require in lieu of payments and subscriptions in arrear.

5. Upon compliance with the above Rules, the DIOCESAN

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CHURCH SOCIETY undertakes to pay out of "The Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund," a yearly pension of One Hundred Dollars to the widow of each Clergyman holding a certificate, during her widowhood.

6. If the Widow die, or marry again, the pension shall be paid towards the support of such children of the deceased Clergyman as may be under the age of eighteen years. In this case, when the youngest child shall have attained this age, the pension shall cease.

7. The Trustees named in the Will of a Clergyman shall be recognized by the Committee, in the event of the death or marriage of his widow, and shall receive the pension, to be applied by them for the support of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act, or if Trustees should not have been named, then the Bishop of the Diocese shall himself act, or in writing appoint a Trustee to act, in the application of the pension.

8. If the wife die before the husband, his child or children shall at his death receive the pension, under the limitation as to age expressed in Rule 6.

9. No certificate shall be issued to any Clergyman over the age of sixty years, who is not already in the Diocese at the time of the formation of these Rules; but any Clergyman already in the Diocese, over the age of sixty years, and whose widow is not entitled to a pension from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, shall be admitted a member of this Fund, on making the annual payment for the age of sixty years, and otherwise complying with the Rules.

10. If a Clergyman removes, with the Bishop's consent, from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than ten years, he shall be allowed his claim upon the Fund, on continuing his yearly payment, and the amount of the average annual collection from his Parish or Mission, being a sum not exceeding Forty Dollars in all.

11. If a Clergyman is unable to continue his public ministrations through sickness or accident, upon the production of a medical certificate testifying the same, he may continue his connexion with the Fund, upon making his yearly payment.

12. Any Clergyman degraded or suspended from the ministry, or any widow or orphan who shall not be in communion with the Church of England, shall be entitled only to such payments as the Executive Committee shall prescribe.

13. The pension shall be payable half-yearly, on January 1, and July 1, in each year; the first payment to be calculated for the interval from the death of the insured to the day of payment.

14. The Treasurer of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY shall be Treasurer of this Fund, and shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Loan Committee, invest every hundred pounds of surplus money, and add the same to the capital of the Fund. A yearly detailed statement of the income, payments and invested money, shall be published in the Annual Report of the Diocesan Church Society.

15. The Secretary of this Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and it shall be his duty to issue certificates, receive payments, donations and collections, which he shall hand to the Treasurer every quarter, or oftener, if required by him.

16. None of the above Rules shall be altered, except at the Annual Meeting of the General Committee of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, after a full year's notice of the proposed change.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

That in future, no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously.

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized in his discretion, to pay to him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission.

That all grants by this Committee for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made, and shall expire with it.

That all vouchers for the payment of any sum of money whatever, must bear on the face of them the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

That for the future, the Clergy and other collectors of the funds of the Diocesan Church Society, be required, in their list of subscribers handed to the Secretary for publication in the Report, to insert in such lists the names of such persons only as have paid the amounts subscribed.

Whereas, The grants made by the Diocesan Church Society from its annual income (exclusive of the grants received from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel), are made in aid of local contributions for the support of the several Missions:

Therefore Resolved, That in future, grants from this Committee will be made mainly with reference to the ability of the members of the Church in the several Parishes to support their own clergymen—the amount of local contributions for Church objects in such Parishes, and the sums paid in aid of the general objects of the Society.

That all bequests made to the Society, be funded as heretofore, and the interest only applied to the general or special purposes for which they are bequeathed.

Whereas, in consequence of the limited means at the disposal of the Society, and the great necessity for new and extended work, it has become of great consequence that all local glebes and other endowments of Parishes should be fully utilized, *Therefore*

1. *Resolved*, That the Board of Home Missions be authorized to require from the Church Wardens of every Parish or Mission receiving aid from the Society, full details of all such glebes, church lands and other investments, yearly or oftener, as they shall see fit.

2. That if it shall appear that any part of the income from the glebes or investments held for the Rector's use, is taken to make

up the sum required by the Society from the Mission, the Board may forthwith increase the amount required in proportion thereto; and in case of neglect on the part of the Rector or Church Wardens to collect the interests or rents, the Board be authorized to enquire into the matter, and, if there be sufficient cause, suspend the grant to the Mission until the management be made satisfactory to the Board of Home Missions.

That the Secretary of Diocesan Church Society be requested to furnish the Treasurer with a minute of contributions reported from every Parish or Mission, specifying the amounts payable to general and special funds; that the amounts so returned be charged by the Treasurer to each Parish or Mission in a book to be kept for the purpose, and that a detailed statement of all contributions then remaining unpaid, be rendered by the Treasurer to the Executive Committee, for their action in the matter, at the October meeting and each meeting thereafter, so long as any amount shall continue in arrear.

That every Missionary be requested to furnish annually to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society the name of the Secretary of each Local Committee.

That hereafter, one yearly return only be required from each Missionary in place of the two half-yearly returns as at present; this return to embrace all the information required by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel and the Diocesan Church Society.

That all Rules and Regulations made by the General Committee be printed in each Annual Report.

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In a financial point of view, the Society begins its work most unfavourably the present year. Instead of a balance, as heretofore, in the Treasurer's hands, that officer has been obliged to overdraw his account, in order to meet the engagements of the Society. All the appropriations made by the General Committee have been called for during the current year. This was not anticipated; nor has it been usually the case. At the same time, too large an estimate was made of the annual income. It will be noticed, and it should be a matter of deep regret to every member of the Church, that there was a large diminution in the annual contributions for 1875. The general and continued depression in the usual business of the country, afforded the ready excuse for this deficiency. But is this excuse sufficient in the case of the members of the Church of Christ? Ought not that portion which the "Lord hath need of," to be the last item of expenditure to be curtailed? The requirements of this Society for its present objects, only demand a small portion of the means of each of the members of the Church in this Diocese. When, therefore, a contribution is withheld or diminished, is it sufficiently considered, that thereby a Church may be closed—or a Mission withdrawn?

The Board of Home Missions has given the most careful attention to the duties with which they have been entrusted. In order to secure the present limited stipends, the Board has recommended, in most instances, an increase in the amount required from the people. A special appeal in the present emergency has been made by the Lord Bishop in a pastoral letter.

Meanwhile the Missionary work has been going on, often amid much anxiety and discouragement. Nothing else, requiring like exercise of mental and physical power, is ever done at such a trifling cost. It often happens that the stipend is insufficient to cover the actual expenses incurred; under such circumstances, in many instances, the Missionaries have presented their reports for the past year—an abstract of which is here given:—

ANDOVER, &c.—Rev. L. A. Hoyt writes as follows:—

"I must first apologize for not forwarding the list of subscribers with this report. But a press of work has occurred, which has prevented my completing the list. The amount will, however, be about the same as last year.

On Trinity Sunday, the Lord Bishop ordained Mr. Hansen, a Dane, to take

charge of New Denmark. The importance of this step will commend itself to everybody, and I hope you will make a grant of two hundred dollars towards this Mission. On the following Tuesday, the Bishop visited Greenfield, and consecrated St. Barnabas' Church—a building which has been in course of erection for some years; and, as there is not a consecrated Church in the Mission of Wicklow, there remains no obstacle, as far as I can see, to this becoming an independent Mission, so soon as the present faithful deacon is admitted to priest's orders. And I cannot help repeating my conviction of last year, that the establishment of this Mission has been a most profitable investment of the Society's funds.

The success which has attended this Mission, emboldens me to ask for a further grant—say four hundred dollars—for Grand Falls' Mission. This Mission was recognized on the Society's List two years ago. But as I was not able to procure assistance, it was removed. As there is now an experienced priest ready and willing to take charge of the work, I now ask to have Grand Falls reinstated with its former grant.

You must not imagine, that in these appeals for pecuniary assistance, I am striving to avoid work. For after I have cut off, as I hope to do, at no distant day, a much larger Mission than any I have yet formed, I shall have left a territory of about sixty miles long, of most interesting Church work—a field of labour quite large enough, I opine, to satisfy the ambition of the most industrious worker."

BATHURST.—Rev. Richard Mathers reports contributions to the amount of \$24.70; and Mr. Mathers has since reported an additional sum of \$18; making in all, \$32.70.

BURTON AND LINCOLN.—Rev. R. Simonds cannot promise more than \$100, as contributions from this Mission.

CAMPBELL.—Rev. Charles M. Sills has enclosed the following report:—

"It is not without regret that I make my final report of the work of the Mission in which I have served since my ordination to the Diaconate. During the two years of my ministry, 52 children have been baptized, and 28 persons confirmed. On Easter Sunday last, there were 41 communicants, and the offertory amounted to \$18.80 U. S. cy. These figures speak of increased interest in the Church, and are a few, among many signs, of Church life in the Mission.

The St. Anne's Missionary Society, at present working for Algoma, have upon the year ending January last, contributed nearly \$50 and a large bundle of clothing, towards the funds of that necessitous Diocese.

The Women's Sewing Society, always energetic, gave last autumn—a handsome Coal Stove, valued at \$75, to the Church at Port Owen, a station to which I go every Sunday. I note increased attention and reverence, on the part of a very fair congregation. By establishing, with the hearty co-operation of a lady of the Parish, a Friday afternoon School there, I was enabled to give instruction to some 35 children. By these means, a feeling of interest in the Church has been created, which, I trust, may entitle this station, to be considered as part of the regular work of the Missionary.

A Deanery Meeting, held in the Mission in September, and lasting for three days, was most successful, and "without any controversy," the speeches delivered by the visiting Clergy were most effective.

Towards myself, personally, I have to acknowledge many acts of kindness. Among others, a Christmas Box of \$30; and what is more valuable to me than

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all—the universal expression of the goodwill and affection, as I bade my people good-bye. I may lengthen my report, only to assure my successor of the hearty support of a kind and affectionate people, from whom, during the two years I worked among them, I received not a single unkind word.”

Contributions amount to \$101.64.

CANTERBURY.—Rev. T. Hartin writes thus :—

“Owing to the indisposition of the Bishop of Fredericton, the new Church at Canterbury was consecrated on the 13th September last, by the Bishop of Maine, and 27 persons were confirmed at the same time. The address of the Bishop to the candidates, and on the subject of the consecration, was most earnest and impressive; and the large congregation, assembled on the occasion, was very attentive and devout. The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop, assisted by the resident Clergyman, to a number who remained to participate in this Holy Rite. “The entire service,” Mr. Hartin adds, “was of a most interesting and impressive character.”

Contributions amount to \$40.

CARLETON, ST. GEORGE, AND FAIRVILLE.—Rev. T. E. Dowling reports contributions exactly the same as last year, viz.: Carleton, \$41.97; Fairville Mission, \$50.74; Grand Bay, \$7.12; South Bay, \$5.75. Total, 105.59.

CHATHAM.—Rev. D. Forsyth has enclosed the following report :—

“With much thankfulness for an abundant share of divine blessings, I beg to submit my annual report with the accompanying substantial token of the increasing interest of the Parish of Chatham, in the work of the Diocesan Church Society. Although we have been visited with some difficulties and trials during the year past, yet, it is a cause for gratitude, that they have been surmounted, and that I can now present to the Society the unmistakable evidence, that neither a financial depression, which has affected Chatham with unusual severity, nor any falling away from those sacred principles of our religion, which it is the purpose of the Society to advance and maintain, have caused the Parish of Chatham to come behind in gifts to be devoted to the general purposes of the Society. On the contrary; I am able to report the *largest annual increase in contributions that has ever taken place in this Parish*. This is particularly gratifying, inasmuch as notwithstanding the dull times, the new Sunday School House at St. Mary's Chapel, costing \$1,500, has been completed, and almost paid for since my last annual report. In addition to this, we have had in anticipation, the cost of building a Rectory—the foundation of which, is now being laid. I trust that these local expenditures being made at the same time with an increase of contributions to the Society's funds, is a reliable evidence of increasing interest in the prosperity of the Church in our midst, and in the great and noble work of the Society at large. It betokens progress, I would hope, towards the just appreciation of the blessings connected with faithful attachment to our beloved Zion, and hence a desire, at the cost of self-denial, to make the beauty of her material fabrics correspond with the excellence of her spiritual perfections. Our new Sunday School House is an humble step in this direction, and will prove a comfort and blessing to the faithful children of the Church.

I am looking forward to the early visit of the Lord Bishop in August, at which time, I hope to see 40 or 50 added to the confirmed and communicating members of the Body of Christ. Several of the young candidates have become contributors to the Church Society. Thankful for the kind and successful help of those who have aided me in collecting the contributions, I beg herewith to present, including \$17 for S. P. G. Missions, the sum of \$304.63.”

DALHOUSIE.—Rev. F. B. Crozier reports contributions amounting to \$80, which is double the amount of last year.

DERBY, NELSON, &C.—Rev. W. Cruden reports that the contributions will not be less than \$90. He writes as follow :

"Notwithstanding the great depression which at present exists on the Miramichi, I am happy to write that we will be able to contribute upwards of ninety dollars; although not as much as last year, yet the above sum exceeds the amount absolutely required from Derby, Nelson, &c. The work which extends over a field of between 65 and 70 miles, entails, as may be supposed considerable labor. The number of Baptisms for Society's year, 63, and since June 1st of the present year, 6 children and an adult in Ludlow, and 7 children in Blackville and Derby. During last year I baptized upwards of 20 children, administered the Holy Communion twice, and held several week day services, together with occasional Sunday services in Ludlow; all these in addition to my regular work. There are upwards of 800 members of the Church of England on the South West Miramichi. Two churches, and I hope before next meeting to be able to write three—such will be the case if the churchmen of New Brunswick will help the efforts of the Churchmen of Ludlow in erecting such an edifice for the worship of God, according to the rites and ceremonies of the Church of England. We ask you, as a Society of Churchmen, to help us. The work is God's; His will be the reward. There are some eight Stations scattered over sixty-five miles. Here there can be found sufficient work for two energetic men. Supply them, and the Church will again obtain that firm hold which it formerly had in that part."

DOUGLAS AND BRIGHT.—Rev. LeB. McKeil has enclosed the following report:—

"There is little to call for special remark in connection with this Mission. Confirmation was held at St. James' Church, Tay Creek, and at All Saints', Keswick Ridge, by the Bishop of the Diocese. 13 were confirmed, most of whom have become communicants. During the year, 18 were baptized, 11 communicants were added. There were 4 burials and 2 marriages. The interior of All Saints' Church has been improved by a handsome new altar cloth—an Easter offering from Mrs. Medley. A capital organ was bought for the same church from Peiler Bros., for \$175. Of this amount, His Lordship the Bishop gave us \$10, and the greater part of the balance was raised at the Cross Roads, by a Christmas tree in the School House, and by a concert in the same place given just before Lent, by the Cathedral choirs, under the direction of E. Cadwallader, Esq., organist, at the Cathedral. The Bishop has also with his wonted liberality voluntarily, given a stained glass window to St. James' Church, Tay Creek, in memory of Mr. Tomlinson, who was an aged and faithful member of the Church.

The Parsonage is very much out of repair, and must be attended to before winter. A subscription is being circulated through the Mission for that purpose. This together with the amount required for the support of the clergyman will tax the people to the utmost at this time, and yet we shall try to make the amount of contributions to Diocesan Church Society for general purposes as large as that of last year."

FREDERICTON.—Rev. G. G. Roberts reports contributions as follows:—Offer-tory, Cathedral, \$16.80; Offertory, Parish Church, \$19.52; 2nd Offertory at Cathedral, \$133; 2nd Offertory at Parish Church, \$25.64; General Purposes, \$742.61. Total, \$937.57.

For S. P. G. Mission, Cathedral, Annual Meeting (1875), \$60; Parish Church, 14; Missionary Meeting at Fredericton (1875), \$75. Total for Foreign Missions, \$149.

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GAGETOWN.—Rev. J. Neales writes as follows:—

"I have delayed sending this report, in the hope of being able to give it a more favorable turn; but we not only experience our share of the general monetary depression, but our Parish has suffered greatly from more local causes: a heavy fire in our village, and the failure of the most enterprising firm in our neighborhood.

Our Sunday School and services have felt the effect of fever, attended with unusual mortality amongst children.

Two young ladies have been engaged for some time, in collecting for the Diocesan Church Society; but report greater difficulty than ever in gathering subscriptions.

Since the last report sent, seven (7) adults have been gathered into the congregation of Christ's flock by baptism, and with seventeen other candidates, presented to our Bishop for confirmation.

The week day services at Duck Creek were interrupted for some weeks, by scarlet fever in the family of the friend, in whose house they have been usually held; but those at Summerhill, and at the Hamilton School, have been maintained, and well attended.

I fear we are not doing as much as we ought. It was in the primitive Church that an inspired Apostle testified, 'All seek their own, not the things which are Jesus Christ's.' The Lord give us a lively sense of our responsibilities, that we may more diligently act up to them, and so have a better account to render of our year's work, in our next report, and of our life's work 'upon that day.'"

GRAND MANAN.—Rev. W. S. Covert has enclosed the following report:—

"The Rectory, which has remained in a dilapidated condition for nearly two years after my arrival on Grand Manan, was last summer well repaired, and is now a good comfortable house.

A fence was needed around the Stone Church, and this, though not yet finished, is in a forward condition.

We shall send one dollar for Algoma, and twenty for the Home Missions of the Diocesan Church Society now; but I hope to get from five to ten more for the latter object.

Much may be hoped for the progress of the Island from the educational and temperance movements. I hope the Church may largely profit from the good results."

GREENWICH.—Rev. D. W. Pickett writes as follows:

"From my statistical returns forwarded some time since, it will be seen that the usual services at the Churches and stations in this Mission, have been regularly sustained, except at certain seasons when the river has been impassable. The attendance and consequently the collections at the Offertory in St. Paul's Church, Greenwich, have been larger since the seats were made free, than they were under the old system, and the change seems satisfactory to the majority of the Parishioners. This Church has lately had a new roof and other repairs. There is still a debt of nearly \$600 on the Parsonage, and I fear it will not soon be paid, unless some portion of the Glebe Land, now altogether unprofitable, be used for that purpose. This plan has been adopted, I learn from last year's Report, in the case of St. David and St. Patrick, upon certain conditions, and it might very well be repeated in this instance. At Greenwich Hill, a Station 8 miles below Oak Point, the fortnightly service is very well attended, though the larger number are not members of our church.

In Wickham the number of Church families has much decreased, owing to frequent removals; and many young men who were formerly attendants and supporters of the Church, have found a home in other places. The old Church has, so far, fallen into decay, that it can no longer be occupied; but a room sufficiently large, with the necessary accommodations for holding Divine Service, has been furnished by Mr. George Golding, who has also exerted himself in a very praiseworthy manner, to keep a Sunday School open through the summer months.

I regret that I am unable to report the usual amount of contributions to the Society at present. I have spent day after day in soliciting subscriptions, but almost in vain, and I am unwilling to guarantee any amount as heretofore, for the subscriptions of last year have not yet all been collected. The people are willing, but they have no money that I can find. As the harvest is coming on, and their produce will soon find its way to market, it is possible that \$50 might be collected before Christmas. I have just paid into the Treasurer's hands the small sum of \$16.75."

HAMPTON.—Rev. Canon Walker reports contributions amounting to \$97.66.

KINGSLEIGH.—Rev. J. Frederic Carr has forwarded the following report:

"The past year has been for this Parish, the most eventful one of the three I have now spent in it.

The enlargement and restoration of St. Peter's, Spring Hill, has been completed, with the exception of the windows, at a cost of \$1,000.

This work possesses an historical interest, as I find a desire for a Chancel, expressed in a report from the Parish to the Archdeacon in 1845.

Several lesser undertakings have also been brought to a close, at an expense of \$500 or more. The assessment has been duly paid.

The contributions to the Diocesan Church Society are larger than last year; while the Offertory at St. Peter's, has been one third more than heretofore.

I write this, trusting that the Schedule Committee will not be encouraged to increase our burdens at present. I feel confident, that my Parishioners have done what they could. I have *always* found them ready and willing to aid me in every work, even beyond their ability.

With increasing strength, I have ventured to undertake an additional service on every alternate Sunday. My Sunday duty, at present, consists of Sunday School work with two services on one Sunday, and on the following one, three services with twenty-two miles travel.

Col. Maunsell still continues to give his valuable aid as lay reader. I feel more than ever, the usefulness of lay help like this.

I have organized a Church of England Temperance Society, which meets fortnightly. I shall be better able another year, to say whether it is ancillary to Parish work, with the care and labor it involves.

I have to record the death of two brothers, at no great distance from each other—Joseph and Isaac Murray. Both were old and esteemed Parishioners; from both I experienced much kindness personally; and to the latter, the Church is indebted for its site and grounds.

Another loss to us was the death at Christmas of Charles Hilton Green, who had just chosen a home in our midst, and who had become intimately connected with our Church work.

These seem to be the events in the annals of the year most worthy of note.

I append also the following financial statement:—

Church Building, \$400.00; Willing Workers, \$150.00; Assessment, \$200.00; Offertory, \$150.00; For Diocesan Church Society, \$97.55. Total, \$997.55.

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KINGSTON.—Rev. D. I. Wetmore reports \$93.27 as the contributions from this Parish.

LANCASTER.—Rev. Henry M. Spike reports the sum of \$52.07 as contributions from this Parish. He adds—that the progress of Church work has been gradual, and the contributions for various Church objects has been encouraging.

MAUGERVILLE, &c.—Rev. G. H. Sterling reports for the general purposes of the Society, \$84.74.

MONCTON.—Rev. E. S. W. Pentreath reports that the contributions will exceed those of last year, and that St. Andrews, Point Du Chene, will be represented in the list this year for the first time. He writes as follows:

"I am glad to be able to report to the Society that, notwithstanding our drawbacks, the second year of my rectorship has been much more prosperous than the first. The number of baptisms and marriages is larger than during any year in the history of the Parish. I do not desire to conceal that, owing to the shifting character of the population, and the remains of past difficulties, there is yet hard work before us, but there have been many important encouragements lately in my work. The congregation has outgrown the capacity of our present building, and the attendance of men is a marked feature. This I attribute, in part, to the formation, last fall, of 'St. George's Church Association,' now numbering 60 members, designed for parochial work, instruction, and the promotion of sociability among Church people. It is a regularly equipped Society, having its officers, committees, rules and badges. The rector is President. Its meetings are held fortnightly.

"There is also a total abstinence section of the Church of England Temperance Society, which is doing good service. The Hon. Judge Botsford is Vice-President. A 'Church room,' for the accommodation of these meetings has been built and paid for by the 'Association.' We propose to erect the main building of the Church this summer, as far as our means will allow. I have also much pleasure in reporting that notwithstanding our comparatively small numbers and want of means, a large amount has been raised for necessary expenses. The rectory was scarcely in a habitable condition; obliging us to spend a heavy sum upon it. I have found the people most willing and ready to help me. I append a statement, which I think most creditable to a small congregation of working people.

"I do not include in this, sums contributed for new church, or collection for the Society. The usual fortnightly service has been held in Shediac. In addition to the statistics from Moncton, I have buried two persons in Shediac, two in Dorchester, and one in Cocagne."

From the Parish of St. Andrews, Shediac, a subscription list has been forwarded, amounting to \$20.

NEWCASTLE.—Rev. Aug. Prime has inclosed the following report:

"I have much pleasure in reporting an increase in the contributions to the Diocesan Church Society from the Parish of Newcastle proper; and am sorry that I cannot say the same for Hardwicke.

"There is, however, some reason for the deficiency from the latter Parish; for, although nominally farmers, the people depend principally for subsistence in summer on the fishing, which this year has so far proved a total failure, and in winter on labor in the woods, which last winter literally amounted to nothing. I have been through the Parish twice, trying to collect for this fund. They one and all *promised* to give, but it was quite depressing to see so many farms ploughed and ready for seed which the owners had no means of procuring. Had I had means of my own, I should gladly have given to them, instead of asking for anything. This applies to the majority of the people, though not of course to all. I feel bound to say that more could have been done by some in this Parish than has been done.

"My own stipend is more than 12 months in arrears, and I see no prospect of the deficiency being made up, to say nothing of the future. I am more and more convinced that very little can be done with the Parish of Hardwicke until more frequent services are established than on every fourth Sunday. A Methodist preacher has settled there, and although the people still, with few exceptions, *profess* loyalty to the Church, yet I fear that on the Sundays when there is no service, many of them attend these schismatical gatherings, the result of which must eventually be a weakening of their attachment to the Church.

During last summer, the Rev. W. Wright, a Priest of the Diocese of Montreal, rendered us much valuable assistance, for which I feel deeply grateful, by keeping the Church open, not only on Sundays, but twice daily, for over three months. The number of people who crowded the Church on Sundays, and the large proportion that attended the daily services, shewed what this Parish might be brought to if a clergyman was settled among them, and the Church system properly carried out.

"We have partially restored the Church, which was in a state of dilapidation, and are now awaiting more funds to complete it. I should like to take this opportunity of thanking his Lordship the Bishop for his great kindness in defraying all the expense connected with the re-casting of one of our chime of three bells, which is now on its way back from England.

"With regard to the Parish of Newcastle, though it cannot boast of many Church families, our congregations are large, and offerings fair, and our communion-roll is slowly increasing. Our Lenten services were largely attended, in spite of pressure brought to bear outside. At our last Vestry meeting we abolished the subscription list (*Deo gratia*), and established instead the Scriptural mode of giving, viz.: the Offertory system, which has so far quite realized our expectations. I consider that Newcastle has contributed more to the Diocesan Church Society this year than it ever did before, though a less amount of money has been sent than other years except last. It should be borne in mind that when large amounts were sent from this place, a large proportion was given by the officials of the Intercolonial Railway, who were settled here for several years, and whose loss, now that they are removed, we feel very greatly. Many of our people have this year doubled their subscriptions, notwithstanding the depression in trade."

Contributions amount to \$156.01.

NEW MARYLAND.—The Rev. F. Alexander reports contributions to amount of \$30.70, of which \$5.00 are limited to Widow and Orphan Fund. The annual collection in aid of this latter fund amounted to \$1.12.

NORTON.—Rev. E. A. Warneford writes:

"I wish from my heart I could report a larger sum than \$86.70. I believe that my parishioners, with one or two exceptions, have done their best, taking into

consideration the great scarcity of money, but I hope when this hard pressure has passed away we may do better, for the Society has the good wishes of all."

PETERSVILLE.—Rev. Joseph Smith reports contributions to the amount of \$15.70.

PETITCODIAC.—Rev. Cuthbert Willis reports offertory contributions: for General Purposes, \$74.47; Widows and Orphans Fund, \$4.51; and for the Mission of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, \$6.22; total, \$85.20.

"In August last," Mr. Willis writes, "we commenced to build a Parsonage this, with the outbuildings, are now almost completed. The debt of \$280 I have assumed, and have good hopes that in due time by the assistance of friends it will, if not all, in large measure be made up. Our congregations are improving, and the people willing to co-operate with me in all my undertakings."

PRINCE WILLIAM, DUMFRIES, &c.—Rev. E. A. W. Hanington has inclosed the following report:

"I write my report this year with more than ordinary satisfaction, because I think it contains proof of the Church's growing strength in this Mission.

"During the year, beside continuing the regular services, I have opened two small stations—one at Acton, where I find nine Church families, and a strong desire for the Church's offices; the other at Allen Dale. Being blessed with excellent health, I have been able to hold three services on every Sunday, and four upon the greater festivals, with an average attendance of 195 in four Churches.

"During the summer the Lord Bishop administered the rite of confirmation to thirty-three (33) persons, and by an increase of twenty-seven (27) the number of communicants in the Mission is now considerably larger than ever before, notwithstanding the constant emigration from the Parishes.

"There have been forty (40) infant and seven (7) adult baptisms during the year, one of which, following the rule of the Prayer-book, was by immersion.

"In collecting for the Church Society I have met with but one refusal, and although the scarcity of money is universally felt, the amount subscribed is about ten (\$10) dollars more than last year.

"Of this, one-half has been paid in to the Treasurer, the balance remains unpaid for a short time, not, I am confident, from any unwillingness to pay on the part of subscribers, but on account of their absolutely empty purses. There has been no difficulty in making up the amount requested from the Mission by the Board of Home Missions, and I am glad to report that many of the young men, who depend upon their daily labor, subscribe liberally towards this fund. We have also contributed \$11.40 to Foreign Missions, making in all:—Diocesan Church Society, \$99.01; Foreign Missions, \$11.40; Board of Home Missions, \$240.00; total, \$350.41."

"I beg to thank the Committee for the grant made for the McAdam Junction Mission. Through the great kindness of many brother clergymen we have been able to hold fortnightly service at McAdam, and I have also baptized several children there. I have drawn but \$40 of the grant made, and trust the Committee will allow the balance (\$60) to stand to the credit of the Mission, to be used to pay expenses of service during the present year.

QUEENSBURY.—Rev. A. H. Weeks reports contributions to the amount of \$89.00.

Mr. Weeks writes:—"I am sorry to be obliged to send a somewhat smaller sum than last year to the general fund of Diocesan Church Society. The dull-

ness of business is most sensibly felt here, not a few are very much distressed. We are laying out quite a sum on the Parsonage, in which we are most generously assisted by a handsome gift from the Lord Bishop. We are also doing something to put the Church in a decent state of repair.

"Since my last report we have been very much gratified, and I trust truly edified, by a visit of the Lord Bishop, when 13 candidates were presented for confirmation."

RICHMOND.—Rev. N. A. Coster writes as follows:

"With some satisfaction I report a larger sum from this Parish than was sent last year to the Diocesan Church Society.

"The Society may need to be reminded that Kingston, which is in my Parish, has lately been connected with Weldford; and I have recommended the people there to send their contributions distinct from mine.

"Enclosed is a list of the collections here, amounting to \$65.75, which will be paid to the Treasurer before this reaches you.

"I see the collection for Foreign Missions so often appended to the lists, that I feel bound to state that I have Mr. Frith's receipt for \$11.75 on December 22d, being the offertory on St. Andrews Day.

"I may here state that we are sending to-day to Mrs. Dowling, for Algoma Missions, \$16.64, partly raised by an offertory, and partly by needle-work."

Mr. Coster has since reported from Kingston, which is now attached to the Parish of Weldford, the sum of \$10.

RICHMOND.—Rev. W. H. Street reports \$65.00 as the amount of contributions from this Parish.

ROTHESAY.—Rev. F. Partridge has inclosed the following report:

"By God's blessing I am again able to report this Parish as progressing. While there are the usual discouragements, from which no faithful pastor is, or should wish to be free, there are many signs of good results from the work of the past year. We thank God, and take courage.

"The great event of the year has been the consecration of St. Paul's Church in Rothesay. This Church, which was originally built by the joint efforts and subscriptions of Churchmen and Presbyterians, has, by the gradual decreasing of the Presbyterian population, and the decided increase of the Church people, naturally fallen into our hands, as we are the only persons who are likely to be able for a long time to support a place of Divine worship. The handing over of this building to the Church of England has been mainly accomplished by the Hon. John Robertson, who has been actuated chiefly by the motive that regular ministrations should be supplied in the Church in which he had long maintained a great interest. Some alterations have been made in the interior, to make it more suitable for the celebration of the service of our Church. New choir seats have been put in; a Vestry has been built within the Church, Reading desk, lecturn, holy table, and chancel rail added; and a neat plain screen divides the whole from the body of the Church. The expenses of these alterations have been met by the exertions of the Ladies' Sewing Society, with the exception of the choir seats, the money for which was given by six gentlemen, through Mrs. L. J. Almon.

"The Church was consecrated on May 31st by the Bishop of the Diocese. At the same time 34 candidates were presented for the apostolic rite of laying on of hands, all of whom, with one exception, afterwards partook of the Holy Eucharist, and will, it is hoped, every one become regular and devout communicants.

"There are two Church Total Abstinence Societies in the Parish in good working order. There is a good library and reading room in connection with the Rothesay Society. In addition to their specific work, which is, I am convinced, for good, they are very useful in bringing the young people in contact with the clergyman, and causing them mutually to know each other better.

"A night school was held two nights in each week during the greater part of the winter, at which there was a fair attendance of men. In this work I have been greatly assisted by D. D. Robertson and John I. Woodward, Esqs., without whose aid I should have been quite unable to carry on the school.

"A Bible-class has been held at Gondola Point every Wednesday evening, until the end of the winter. It is now discontinued until the autumn. The Sunday-schools are doing efficient work.

"A Mission was held during Lent, consisting of special services and sermons every night for a week, first at Gondola Point, then at Rothesay, in which an earnest attempt was made to arouse the people to an increased sense of their religious duties, and to deepen the spiritual life. This was followed by an increase in the number of communicants, and other manifestations of the Divine blessing. The effort will be made next year, God willing, on a more extended scale.

"I hope to have a meeting, previous to the meetings of the Society, to set before my parishioners the state of the Society's finances, and hope that our contributions may be proportionably increased. At any rate I can promise that they will not be less than last year."

Contributions amount to \$242.60.

ST. ANDREWS AND CHAMCOOK.—Geo. D. Street, Esq., Secretary of this Committee, reports contributions as follows: St. Andrews, \$152.00; Chamcook, \$31.30; total, \$183.30.

Offertory, in aid of the missionary work in the Diocese of Algoma, \$25.

SACKVILLE AND DORCHESTER.—The Rev. John D. H. Browne has forwarded the following report:

"I beg herewith to supplement my answers to the questions annually propounded by your Society by the following report of the past year's doings in the Parishes of Dorchester and Sackville, and of the present condition of the said Parishes. Owing to the ill-health of the former incumbent, the Rev. D. Nickerson, A. M., he was obliged to resign his position and retire from the work early in July last, and although the present rector accepted an election from the above-named Parishes in the same month, yet owing to circumstances connected with his former work he was unable to leave Pugwash until the first day of October, when he entered actively upon the duties of his new field of labor, thus causing, unfortunately, a vacancy of three months in which there were no services held.

"I found on my arrival a hearty welcome awaiting me, the people seeming anxious to have the services of the Church again conducted in their midst.

"I am glad to be able to say that during the vacancy the people had not been idle.

"In Sackville, by the hard work of the ladies, and with the hearty co-operation of the gentlemen, there had been collected about \$600, with which handsome amount the very pretty Church has been painted within and without, a large full-toned bell provided, and all needful repairs put upon the building, making it now in appearance, as in reality, one of the best repaired and best kept Churches in the Diocese. In Dorchester, likewise, by the outlay of over \$400, the Church has been painted and thoroughly repaired, inside and out, making it for a plain style of building quite attractive.

"Since my arrival I have to report excellent congregations, both on Sundays as well as on week days. The ladies of Dorchester have collected nearly \$200 to be expended for the enlargement of the Sunday School house and other Sunday School purposes, and they are now preparing for a large bazar, by which they hope to raise \$400 or \$500, to go towards building a parsonage house.

"At Westcock, the ladies (largely due to Mrs. Sheriff Botsford) have collected in various ways \$200, wherewith to paint and repair the Westcock Church, and tenders are now asked for the work.

"I am now preparing classes for confirmation, awaiting the Bishop's visitation, and I have strong hopes that quite a number will be prepared for that holy and apostolic rite. And lastly, I have the satisfaction of informing you that at a largely attended meeting of the parishioners of Dorchester, held on Saturday last, it was unanimously decided to build a parsonage house near the Dorchester Church, the old one at Westcock not having been occupied by the present incumbent, it being very far from post and telegraph offices, and some distance from the nearest Church. As this is considered by all in both parishes a necessity to the proper carrying on of the work, and as the movement is warmly advocated by the Hon. E. B. Chandler, the Hon. A. J. Smith, and nearly all the men of means in the place, its success, I feel confident, is already assured."

ST. JAMES, ST. JOHN.—Rev. W. Armstrong reports contributions to the amount of \$150.

ST. DAVID, &c.—Rev. Hastings S. Wainwright reports as follows :

"In forwarding to you my annual returns for the year ending June 1st, 1876, I have to state that in October, 1875, I made arrangements for holding service at Moore's Mills, a settlement on the New Brunswick Railway, nine miles from St. Stephen, and bordering on the Parishes of St. David and St. James. By so doing I had to close the Parish Church of St. David every other Sunday. This during the winter months was no loss, for though missing several services owing to severe storms, I was enabled to hold 115 Sunday services—20 more than in the previous year. On Sunday evening, the 28th of November, I held my last service at St. David's Ridge, which is but two miles from Moore's Mills, and the Church people who attended my services there now come to the Mills. On giving up St. David's Ridge, I held evening service in the school house on Bay Road with, I believe, great encouragement.

"Every Sunday last winter, through storm and drift, I have gone over my stated number of miles—24 when to St. Patrick, and 32 when to Tower Hill and the Mills, and more than once or twice finding the doors closed at Tower Hill. My station at this latter place being for certain reasons changed, giving me three miles further on to drive and three to return.

"Though I cannot claim many Church people at Moore's Mills, I am glad to state that all appear greatly interested in the services of the Church. The chanting and singing by a pains-taking choir being beyond all comparison the best in my Mission. I sincerely trust that much and lasting good will be accomplished here.

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"Taking it all through, the past year has been a more successful one than the previous year, though I have experienced much to sadden and disappoint me. The brief visit of our good and energetic Bishop in June last was indeed a red letter day to us—a day of joy and refreshment to many. Sixteen young men and maidens ratified their baptismal covenant on the occasion. And the goodly number of 45 of the faithful refreshed their souls with the spiritual food of the most blessed body and blood of our Saviour Christ, both God and man.

"I am indeed sorry to say that the financial aspect of this Mission has by no means improved. The times have been and still are very hard. Money scarce, and many very reluctantly and slowly coming up to the work of the Lord in the support of His Church. I hope that the building of the Grand Southern Railroad will tend to put money in circulation. Yet on this head we have *not exactly done nothing*. Though not, I own, what we ought and could do.

"The heavy debt on the parsonage has been lessened by \$170, raised by a strawberry festival in July; insurance of the same for three years, \$16.50; assessment, \$220; Diocesan Church Society, \$49.22: in all, \$455.22.

"The list of subscribers to Diocesan Church Society for last year I will send with this letter. I hope to be able to raise more for this year, though I cannot say for certain.

"In obedience to the request of the Lord Bishop I have read to my several congregations the letter to the clergy, and urged upon them all the great necessity of supporting heartily the Home Mission branch of the Church Society, without whose aid not only this Mission but many others would have to be closed."

ST. GEORGE AND PENNFIELD.—Rev. R. E. Smith writes as follows:

"Both my Churches are in good working order. The *actual* number of communicants *during the past year*, 136, the largest number I have ever returned, may be taken as a fair index of my work. I have held more services during the year, viz., 84; and my Lenten services were very well attended and productive of good effects.

"I have also formed a "Women's Church Work Association," with a membership of 37, and a "Church of England Total Abstinence Society," with a membership of 60; both of which Societies are doing a good work.

"Since my last report an active member of the Church here, Mrs. Samuel Johnson, has entered into her rest, 'in sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life, through our Lord Jesus Christ.'

"Our contributions will be, I hope, from \$160 to \$180. Money, owing to various reasons, is very scarce, and we cannot finish collecting until my return from St. John."

ST. PAUL'S, PORTLAND.—Rev. Canon DeVeber reports the amount of contributions to the general purposes of the Society, \$660; to the Widows and Orphans Fund, \$42.02; to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, \$55; total, \$757.03.

ST. MARY'S AND STANLEY.—Rev. W. Jaffrey reports:

"The missionary at St. Mary's and Stanley writes that his parishioners are now engaged in building a Church, which, together with the hard times, will prevent any increase in the amount of subscriptions towards the funds of the Society. He hopes, however, to report nearly if not quite the amount.

"At a meeting of the parishioners of Stanley it was decided that a grant be applied for towards the support of a resident clergyman, provided one can be found, and the people can make satisfactory arrangements."

SHEDDAC.—Rev. Dr. Jarvis reports contributions for the general purposes of the Society, \$63.47, and a collection for Missions of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, \$5.32.

SPRINGFIELD AND JOHNSTON.—Rev. G. Rogers writes as follows:

"Failing health for several months past compels me to abandon Mission life and seek lighter duty in my native land. I have placed my resignation in the hands of the Bishop, to take effect on or about October 1st.

"It was with great pleasure last July that we received a visit from his Lordship. In Springfield I presented sixteen candidates for confirmation. The following day through a heavy down pour of rain I drove the Bishop to Johnston, a distance of sixteen miles, where thirteen young persons were confirmed. Here we were met by Canon Medley, who drove his Lordship to Sussex.

"With regard to Johnston and the settlement of questions which the delegation, at so much time and labor, so patiently investigated last April, I beg to say that I have no reason to hope that any pecuniary benefit will ever arise to the Missionary. Matters remain as they were. No interest has been collected, and I fear no effort has been made by the Churchwardens to obtain a settlement."

Contributions amount to \$33.88.

SIMONDS.—Rev. G. Schofield writes as follows:

"In July last we had the pleasure of a visit from the Bishop to Black River, accompanied by the Revs. Canon DeVeber and T. E. Dowling, when 27 persons were confirmed in the Church, and afterwards two sisters were confirmed at their own house, one of them being so unwell as to be unable to ride to Church.

"It was a day of sacred gladness to many, and especially so to myself, as among the persons confirmed there were some whom I had baptized in infancy, and whom it was a special pleasure to receive into the full communion of the Church. It was the first time I had experienced this joy.

"About the same time a bell, generously given by T. W. Daniel, Esq., was hung in the steeple, where I hope it will long serve to summon the people to worship God in the beauty of holiness.

"Last summer I conducted a weekly service in a school-house at Mispec on Saturday afternoons—the only day on which I could have the use of the room. The people showed their gratitude by subscribing \$20. But when the mills are at work the operatives cannot attend this service, and the farmers are often obliged to go to market in St. John. For these reasons the number in attendance was small. A Sunday service would, I think, be much more encouraging.

"On Easter Sunday I commenced a monthly communion service at Moosepath, which I intend to continue. On each occasion we have had nine communicants, and I expect some additions to these.

"I am greatly indebted to my lay reader, J. Herbert Lee, Esq. (son of the late Canon Lee), for useful help at Moosepath, where he is very much and deservedly esteemed.

"If, as I hope, the General Committee will give us a lease of land on which to build a Church at Moosepath, I shall forthwith set about collecting the necessary funds for that purpose. The work has been long delayed. But I am not sorry for this now, as the proposed site is a far better one than that previously thought of, and as both lumber and labor are cheap now, I hope we shall be able to build the Church and pay for it at an early day."

The total contributions from this Parish are \$108.

ST. MARK, ST. JOHN.—Mr. T. B. Hanington reports \$515.86, including \$11 for Widows and Orphans.

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ST. STEPHEN, CHRIST CHURCH.—Rev. J. Rushton reports contributions to the amount of \$20.

SUSSEX.—Rev. Canon Medley writes as follows :

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"It will not be expected, owing to my long and serious illness, that I shall have a very interesting report to make to the Society. In making up my statistical return I am pleased to find that the number of Sunday and week-day services has increased rather than diminished. This is accounted for by the kindness of several of my brethren of the clergy, the assistance of two worthy laymen as lay readers, and the faithfulness of the Rev. J. H. Talbot, who was acting as travelling Missionary, and was sent by the Bishop to take charge of my work. I am thankful to say I am now able to take at least a share of that work, and I trust, if God wills, I shall soon be fit for more. The annual subscription list to Diocesan Church Society is not yet closed, but I hope to make it up this year to \$180."

TRINITY, ST. JOHN.—Mr. Lawrence Sturdee, Secretary of this Committee, reports contributions as follows: Widows and Orphans Fund, \$110.47; General Purposes, \$833.66; total, \$944.13.

UPHAM.—Rev. S. J. Hanford writes as follows :

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"I beg to state that since July last I have taken up as best I could, my former work in Hammond; having services in the Parish Church once in four Sundays. I feel, however, that this is leaving very much undone that the best interests of the people need. At the same time I must add that this part of the Mission is rather going backwards, if anything—at least in numbers—by reason of the people moving away towards the line of railroad, and none coming or likely to come in to take their place.

"In St. Martins I am able to have the services only on *every other Sunday*—alternately morning and evening—and, therefore, the wants of the people must be very inadequately supplied, and the Church is consequently suffering loss. A resident clergyman is wanted at Quaco, and the people very readily responded to a call upon them to raise a sufficient amount to meet a grant from the Diocesan Church Society. The result was so satisfactory that the parties making the move were quite confident that the requisite sum could be secured for a new Mission, to embrace the shore line, &c., from Black River to Salmon River and westward.

"But as this subject has already been before the Board of Missions, I need add nothing more than that I should be heartily glad if some such arrangement can be carried out.

"At the same time I fear Upham and Hammond might be losers. As far as I am concerned I would be content with something less than my present stipend. But the interests of this Mission must be regarded apart from my wishes.

"At all events an active and devoted man at Quaco would find a good field for work, and if we do not fill the place, others will, as they are now doing, occupy the ground.

"While I have great reason to be thankful for that measure of health which has been vouchsafed to me, I have to be careful of myself, not without doubt at times of my being able to continue at actual service, while on every hand one sees work to be done. May God indeed raise up laborers for his harvest.

"I have not yet quite got through with collecting the subscriptions for the Diocesan Church Society, and though we may be a little short, I trust the Mission will not at least be much behind its last year's contributions."

WOODSTOCK.—Rev. T. Neales has inclosed the following report :

"The report from this Mission for the past year need not be a long one. The work has been divided between the Rev. L. W. Fowler and myself, I taking the duty chiefly at and in the neighborhood of the Parish Church and St. Luke's, and Mr. Fowler that chiefly in the outer parts of the Mission, and we both find this ample work. The statistical returns show an increase of work done in almost every part, as, of course, there should be, with two of us to do it, and I can confidently say that the Church has taken a hold in the outlying parts of the Mission which was not known before, and it only requires time and zeal to make it grow stronger. On the 12th of September last, the Right Rev. Bishop Neely, of Maine (for his Lordship, the Bishop of the Diocese, who was at the time seriously ill), administered the holy right of confirmation to 44 candidates, and on the following day dedicated our new Sunday School house to its proper uses.

"It was to us a time of great cheer, though the being denied the long looked for presence of our own Bishop was to us all a matter of great regret. Our new Sunday School, with its new cabinet organ, cost about \$750. In February last the glebe and rectory-house were sold, and the proceeds invested according to law. As there is now no rectory in the Parish, I am in hopes that in course of time one will be provided.

"Death has made sad inroads amongst us, and of the thirty three (33) burials, ten (10) were those of communicants."

Contributions amount to \$277.50

WICKLOW.—Rev. J. E. Flewelling reports contributions to the amount of \$15.28, and he says it is small, owing to the expenditure required in building a Church in this Mission. More may be expected next year. Mr. Flewelling incloses the following report :

"I began my work here on St. Barnabas day, June 11th, 1875. I found the people rather discouraged concerning Church matters, owing to the sudden removal of my predecessor, Rev. W. R. Almon. They encouraged me very much in my work. We have been working earnestly the last year, and God has blessed our efforts.

"On the 13th June of this year our Church at Greenfield was consecrated by the Bishop. A very large number of people were present to witness the interesting ceremony of consecrating a churchyard and Church. Confirmation the same day, when I presented 48 candidates for the holy and apostolic rite, several of whom became communicants. It is a day long to be remembered by both pastor and people. There were present of the clergy, Rev. F. Alexander, Revs. T. Neales, L. A. Hoyt, and W. H. Street.

"The Church is growing here. I have good hopes for its future success. If the clergyman is faithful and zealous, the Church will become a power for good here, as the laymen and laywomen are so willing to work.

"The Church Society is to be congratulated upon this promising field, for without its aid the clergyman would have to leave, as the people are very few in number, and unable to sustain a clergyman themselves.

"I return thanks for the kind assistance I have received from the people, the Bishop, and many of the clergy."

TRAVELLING MISSIONARY.—The following report has been inclosed by the Rev. James H. Talbot :

"In the post of Travelling Missionary I find the printed statistical return of no use, as the questions, all but one or two, apply to parish duty, and these

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few even might require fuller answers than could well be got into that document. Therefore, I must ask you to let this report pass for both a statistical and general account.

"I started on my first travelling missionary journey on July 22d, having spent the early part of that month in preparing a confirmation class and doing other work at my late charge of Hammond. And I held the office until March 1st, 1876. That time was spent as follows: From July 22d to October 3d, in Albert County; from October 3d to November 10th, in Fredericton; from November 10th to November 25th, in Sussex; from November 25th to January 3d, in Albert County; from January 3d to March 1st, in Sussex.

"The work both at Fredericton and Sussex was regular and is otherwise statistically accounted for. Both my stays at the latter place were occasioned by the illness of Rev. Canon Medley. I baptized 28 children; 26 in Albert, 1 at Fredericton, and 1 at Sussex. No adults. Performed 2 marriages—1 in Albert, 1 at Studholm, and no burials. I feel that Albert County and the work there require a further notice and fuller description.

"First of all during the time spent there I performed 43 Sunday services and four on week-days, with an average congregation of 50½. These services were performed at seven different places—three Churches and four mission stations—as follows: Hopewell Church, Harvey Church, New Ireland Church, Hopewell Cape Station (the Court House), Salmon River Station (Baptist building), Mechanics' Settlement Station (Methodist building), Point Wolf Station (school house).

"The Church at Hopewell Hill has stood disuse, neglect, and weather, without being very materially injured. I persuaded the people to assist in painting the outside. And they promised that the roof should be seen to this spring.

"At Harvey the Church, began on too large a scale and never finished, is thoroughly dilapidated: the foundation has settled, the roof leaks, and all the plaster is broken, and I should fear that it is beyond the means or power of the very few Church people living there to restore or save it.

"At New Ireland the small but strongly built Church has stood some 15 years neglect very fairly, and a thorough painting would be of great benefit to it.

"At Mechanics' Settlement, which was before this time served from Waterford, and which I hope still to reach, a Church is in course of erection. At this present time, service is held by permission of the Methodists in their meeting-house. At Salmon River very good congregations attended a fortnightly service in the Baptist meeting-house, which was kindly lent for the purpose, and at Hopewell Cape, on the few occasions upon which I was able to get there for service, a large number assembled at the Court House. At Point Wolf also I held some few services in a school-house, and they were fairly attended.

"There still remain, or at least there were, 9 communicants that I know of, and there are doubtless others, that found no opportunity of attending a celebration.

"The number of baptisms show that the Church has still some sort of hold in some parts of the county, but the proportion of Church people in the congregations is very small, for the few that are still left live for the most part far distant from each other. This fact seems to be the chief difficulty in the way of properly working this Mission, since not only are the distances very great, the drives necessary averaging between 19 and 20 miles, but the hills are also steep, and the roads, some of them, very rough. In less than four months, and not I think driving unnecessarily, I find recorded in my journal 1547 miles.

"As regards money matters—the other great difficulty in the way of working Albert by itself—I am afraid that very little indeed can be expected from the people, at any rate, for some time to come in the way of supporting a clergyman.

But should another travelling missionary be appointed, I feel sure that when not more needed elsewhere he can always find work worth doing, and a hearty welcome from a few, it may be, of good Church people, who have held to the Church of their fathers without encouragement, beyond an occasional service, for 15 years.

"I hope that a man of greater experience and zeal will be found to undertake this important branch of the Church's work."

From the foregoing abstract it appears that with reference to the income of the Society, the contributions have exceeded the amount of last year. This, under all circumstances, affords ground of thankfulness to Almighty God.

It may also now be considered whether a work, such as is thus presented, is worthy of support and extension. This is the whole question now before the Church in this Diocese. Are its present Missions to be maintained and increased? If the answer is given in the affirmative, then the Society must have, year by year, from each member of the Church regularly paid offerings, according to the rule laid down in God's Holy Word.

Our Heavenly Father has lately called away from among us one who for many years was among the most prominent of the clergy, and the Rector of one of the most important country parishes in the Diocese. The Rev. William Elias Scovil, late rector of Kingston, was also one of the early supporters of the Society, and ever warmly interested in its welfare. Fitting, it is then, that in the pages of this Report a notice should be recorded of his death—an event which, at a comparatively early period of life, has deprived the Church of the services of a man of much learning and of sincere, earnest devotion to the service of His Lord and Saviour.

Mr. G. A. Schofield, from the Board of Home Missions, presented a Report, which he read, and on motion of Mr. B. L. Peters it was resolved, that the same be received and laid on the table and that the proposed Missionary Schedule for the current year be referred to the Board of Home Missions, to be elected this evening.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

The Board of Home Missions beg to submit the following report:—

All the Missions receiving grants from the Society, with one exception only, have duly entered into the required engagements for the past year; and those engagements have, with a single exception, been for the same sums as passed by the General Committee in July, 1875. The exceptional case was that of

PETERSVILLE. The amount required from this Mission was reduced by the Board from \$330 to \$260, and the Society's Grant increased from \$300 to \$230 upon the application of the Rector, Church Warden, and Vestry, stating that there was a diminution of \$120 in the parochial contributions on account of the death or removal of parishioners and other unavoidable causes.

WATERFORD, (Dutch Valley, etc.) The Grant of \$400 upon condition of a parochial contribution of \$300, first made in 1873, and for a time suspended, has been renewed by the Board, to take effect from the 1st March last.

MCADAM. Upon the application of the Rev. E. A. W. Hanington the sum of \$100 was placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop to defray the expenses of any clergyman who might be able to give services at this Station during the year—of this sum \$40 has been paid.

ALBERT. This Mission was supplied for seven months by the Rev. J. H. Talbot, acting in the capacity of Travelling Missionary. The Board regret that no contributions were obtained in this Mission from the people, and are of opinion that, while the grant for a travelling missionary differs from others in not being conditional, collections and subscriptions towards the general purposes of the Society should in every case where such services are given, be asked for and reasonably expected. There was drawn on account of the grant to Travelling Missionary \$583.33; from which must be deducted \$66.06 returned by the Bishop on account of Mr. Talbot's services at the Cathedral. Mr. Talbot having removed to the Mission of Waterford (Dutch Valley), Albert is now vacant, as also are the Missions of Buctouche, Campobello, McAdam, Kingston (King's), St. Andrews, Shediac, and Weldford. No part of the grants made to the two last Missions has been drawn during the year.

PETITCODIAC. Under authority of a Resolution passed by the General Committee in July last, the Board have authorized a payment of \$100 to complete the parsonage house in this mission; it having been certified to them that the conditions of the Resolutions were complied with.

Several applications for grants to New Missions have been before the Board, of which St. Martins and New Denmark are recommended in the schedule for next year. There are other and pressing claims which the Board would gladly meet were funds available for the purpose. It will however be seen, from the estimates of income and proposed expenditure submitted herewith, that the grants now recommended are, after all possible allowance for unfilled Missions, in excess of the probable income of the Society.

The Schedule submitted herewith is proposed by the Board as the most reasonable plan to meet the present heavy deficiency and at the same time provide sufficient income for the coming year. It is the result of a most careful consideration of the resources and history of each mission. Both the direct payments made by the missions and their yearly contributions to the general purposes of the D. C. S. have been taken into account; with the object of ascertaining the actual financial progress or retrogression of each mission during the past five years, and tracing as far as possible, the sources of the present deficiency.

It has been found that during this period the Parishes already self-sustaining have contributed in all some \$1440 to the general purposes of the Society over the amount estimated as probable in 1871. Of the aiding missions, some twenty-four have contributed together in the five years about \$5000 above the same estimate. As however after the third year a progressive increase was anticipated from each Mission, estimated at \$40 for each of the years, 1874 and 1875, it will be seen that even then these Missions have exceeded by some \$3000 the financial progress expected. In several instances also new churches, parsonages, or school-houses have been undertaken and completed. Some other Missions, including several which are new and as yet on trial, have shewn neither much progress, nor any serious retrogression, but are nearly stationary.

Nine Missions only of those aided by the Society appear to have seriously retrograded; but these, as will be seen by the following statement, have fallen short of the estimates of 1871, by an amount equal to the present deficiency in the Society's funds. During the past five years the falling off in the direct payments, or the contributions to the D. C. S., or in both, is as follows :

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If the \$80 increase expected during this time from each Mission is also taken into account \$720 must be added to this deficiency; making for these nine parishes a sum nearly equal to one third of the year's contributions by the whole Diocese to the D. C. S. Had these Missions (some of which have been aided by the S. P. G. for periods varying from a quarter to a half century or even more) made the same financial progress as the majority of the parishes in the Diocese, it is evident that there would now be a considerable surplus available for the purpose of increasing the present small stipends, as well as for new Missions. It is a serious question how far it is right to keep back new mission work and continue to apply the grant from the S. P. G. and the contributions to the D. C. S. from the self-sustaining and progressive Parishes, to Missions which show so little life; especially as, in some cases at least, this is due not so much to a want of means, as to the apathy of parishioners and their unwillingness to contribute in proportion to their ability and the wants of the Church. There is also an evident need of much greater care of glebes and local endowments in some parishes.

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The result of the investigation by the Board shows that the Diocese, in the whole, has made a considerable financial progress, the exceptions standing forth the more prominently when compared with the general growth in amounts contributed.

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It having been found that in several cases the contributions reported to the D. C. S. have not been paid to the Treasurer until a long time after the annual meeting, in some instances nearly or quite twelve months being suffered to elapse—the Board recommended that the Secretary of the D. C. S. be requested to furnish the Treasurer with a minute of contributions reported from every Parish or Mission, specifying the amounts payable to general and special funds; that the amounts so returned be charged by the Treasurer to each Parish or Mission in a book to be kept for the purpose, and that a detailed statement of all contributions then remaining unpaid be rendered by the Treasurer to the Executive Committee, for their action in the matter, at the October meeting, and each meeting thereafter, so long as any amount shall continue in arrear.

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The Board also recommend that all rules and regulations made by the General Committee be printed in each Annual Report, and they desire to direct special attention to the rule "that for the future the clergy and other collectors for the D. C. S. be required in their lists of subscribers handed to the Secretary for publication in the Report to insert the names of such persons only as have paid the amounts subscribed." They also recommend that every Missionary be requested to furnish annually to the Treasurer of the D. C. S. the name of the Secretary of each Local Committee in his Mission. The Board also recommend that hereafter one yearly return only be required from each Missionary in place of the two half-yearly returns as at present; this return to embrace all the information required by the S. P. G. and the D. C. S.

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llows :

The estimate of income and expenditure, with the Schedule recommended for next year and the returns, correspondence and minutes of business transacted by the Board during the past year, accompany this Report.

On motion of the Rev. Canon Scovil, it was resolved to proceed to the election of the Board of Home Missions by nomination and ballot, and Mr. I. Allen Jack and Mr. E. B. Chandler, jr., being

Read by Mr. Weldon, a petition from Mr. Francis B. Hazen, with reference to the estate of the late Miss D. B. Hazen, and it was moved by Mr. Weldon that the petition be referred to the Executive Committee, with power to deal with the subject-matter of the same ;

Whereupon it was moved in amendment by Mr. Schofield, that the words after " Executive Committee " in the resolution be left out, and the following words be added, " to report at the next meeting of the General Committee," which amendment was carried in the affirmative.

On motion of Mr. B. L. Peters, resolutions recommended in the Report of the Board of Home Missions were adopted. (*See page 22.*)

Rev. T. E. Dowling gave notice that he will, at the next annual meeting, move that a change be made in the Constitution of the Society by the omission of Object XI.

The Committee adjourned to meet to-morrow evening at 7 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY EVENING, July 5th, 1876.

The Committee met in St. John's Church School Room, at 7 o'clock.

The Lord Bishop in the Chair.

Prayers.

Read Minutes of the last meeting, which, on motion, were approved.

The Secretary read some further returns and reports from certain Missionaries and Local Committees.

Mr. E. B. Chandler gave notice, that at the next annual meeting he, or some other member of this Committee, will propose an amendment to Article XIII., Section 1, of the Constitution, by cancelling the said Section, and inserting the following : " Section 1. This Society shall hold its anniversary meetings, in rotation, at Fredericton and St. John, and such other places as the Society

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at its next preceding annual meeting may direct, on the first Thursday in July in each year."

Mr. Sturdee gave notice, that at the next meeting of this Committee he, or some other person for him, will move to amend Section 2, Article VIII., Board of Home Missions, by striking out the words, "three clerical and five lay members," and substituting therefor, "five clerical and eight lay members."

Mr. Schofield, from the Board of Home Missions, presented a Report on the recommendations in the Auditors' Report—to the effect that payments to the Treasurer at the present time will enable that officer to recoup the special funds, and to carry on the ordinary engagements of the Society, at least to the 31st December next; which Report was received.

Mr. Schofield also presented the Missionary Schedule, as prepared by the Board of Home Missions. It was considered in detail by the Committee, and certain amendments were adopted, when, on motion, of Mr. G. Sidney Smith, the following was adopted as the Missionary Schedule for the current year, with the payments required from the several Parishes or Missions.

orable Chief Justice Chipman and his liberal benefactions to this Society, and that the Clergy and lay delegates be requested to meet for the above named purpose at St. John's Church School Room, at 2.30 P. M.

On motion of the Secretary, it was resolved—that the cordial thanks of this Committee be tendered to the Rector and Officers of St. John's Church for the use of the school room, and for their courtesy and kindness in providing for the requirements of the late meetings.

The Lord Bishop left the Chair, and, on motion, Mr. Jarvis, V. P., took the same, when it was moved by Rev. G. M. Armstrong, and carried by acclamation, that the best thanks of this meeting be tendered to his Lordship for his kind and patient conduct in the Chair.

ANNIVERSARY MEETING.

ST. JOHN, July 6th, 1876.

The Anniversary Meeting was held in St. John's Church School Room on Thursday, at 4 P. M.

The Rev. Canon Scovil, V. P., in the Chair.

The Secretary submitted the Annual Report.

On motion of Mr. R. T. Clinch, seconded by Mr. C. H. Fairweather, it was resolved, that the same be received and printed, under the direction of the Executive Committee.

Mr. Jarvis gave notice that he will move at the next annual meeting of the General Committee, as follows :

(1.) For alteration in Constitution.

That the words "towards the education of children of such clergymen," be struck out of the 7th Clause of Article IX. of the Society's Constitution, and that, instead thereof, the following Clause be added to such Article as an Object of the Society :

12. The creation of a fund to assist in the education of the Children of the Clergy.

(2a.) For amendment to the Rules of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

That the following be added to Clause 3 of such Rules : Whenever the amount of such collection, or collections, in any Parish or Mission shall exceed in any year, the sum of \$5, such surplus shall be divided equally between (1) the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, (2) the Aged and Incapacitated Clergy Fund, (3) the Children of the Clergy Education Fund, and (4) the Divinity Scholarships' Fund : provided that any such surplus may, at the option of the congregation from whom the same shall be received, expressed through the Rector or Missionary at the time of forwarding the same, be limited to some one, two or three only of such funds.

(2b.) Also, that the words "one hundred dollars," in the 5th Clause of such Rules be altered to "two hundred dollars," and the form of certificate at the end of such rules be altered in like manner ; such alterations to apply also from the year 1877, inclusive, to the case of the claimant (or claimants) on that fund, become such since its establishment on its present basis in 1871.

For addition to Constitution.—(3.) That the following addition be made to Article XV. of the Constitution of the Society :

The Clergy are further requested to preach annually one other sermon in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion, for the special funds of the Society, which collection shall, unless otherwise provided, be equally divided between (1) the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, (2) the Aged and Incapacitated Clergy Fund, (3) the Children of the Clergy Education Fund, and (4) the Divinity Scholarships Fund : provided that such special collection may, at the option of the congregation from whom the same shall be received, expressed through the Rector or Missionary at the time of forwarding the same, be limited to some one or more of the special funds or purposes of the Society in such proportions as he may direct : and provided, also, that the yearly collection required by the rules of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund in the case of Clergymen joining such Fund shall, in such cases, be considered as the special collection hereby requested to be made, but shall be applied as such rules shall direct.

(4.) *Resolution.*

That the sum of \$1260, part of the investments belonging to the 7th Object Fund of the Society, be and hereby is specially set apart as a fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy, in accordance with the present 12th Object.

(5.) *Resolution.*—That the following be the Rules and Regulations of the Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy :

1. The Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy shall consist of the amount now specially appropriated thereto, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object ; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely to assist in the education of children of clergymen actually serving in the present Diocese of Fredericton, or of children of those who may have died in such service, or retired therefrom, with the Bishop's approval, on the ground of age or infirmity.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, who, if they shall so think fit, may vest such management in a sub-Committee at their discretion.

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4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$4000, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Applications for grants from such Fund shall be made in writing through the parents or guardians of the applicant to the Secretary of the Fund, and every such application shall be accompanied by a statement of any and all private property, pension, or income of the parent or parents, if living, or directly or indirectly available for the support and education of such applicant, if the parent shall be deceased. The Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, may in any case require further statements, which shall thereupon be furnished for their information.

6. Each case shall be determined on its own merits by the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

7. In the event of any application being favorably considered, the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, shall determine in each case the amount of the grant, which shall be made for a single year only, but may, at the option of the Committee, be continued for one or more years, but not after the recipient shall have reached the age of eighteen years, and every such grant shall be made upon condition only of the education of the applicant at some educational institution within the Dominion of Canada, conducted in accordance with the principles of the Church of England, and recognised or approved by the Synod of the Diocese in which it shall be situate.

8. A Secretary of the Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith as the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, may direct.

9. The above Rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

(6.) *Resolution.*—That the following be the Rules and Regulations of the Fund created in accordance with the Second Object of the Society for the establishment of Divinity Scholarships, and assistance when necessary to those who may be under preparation for the ministry, especially sons of clergymen, to be known generally as "The Divinity Scholarships' Fund."

1. The Divinity Scholarships' Fund shall consist of the amount already appropriated thereto of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions

given to or applied by the Society for this special object ; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely for the purposes of the Second Object of the Society, as hereinafter provided.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund in all other respects shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Board of Home Missions.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$3000, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Every such grant shall be of a sum not exceeding \$200 per annum, and shall be tenable for such period upon such terms or conditions, and at such collegiate institution as the Board of Home Missions shall, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, determine.

6. The choice of divinity scholars shall be made by the Board of Home Missions, subject to the Lord Bishop's approval.

7. The Secretary of the Board of Home Missions shall be the Secretary of this Fund, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Board may direct.

8. The above Rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society after a year's notice of the proposed change.

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REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 1876.

The Committee met at Fredericton on the 2d July, the day after the Anniversary Meeting, and the usual business was transacted, an abstract of which will be found in the last Annual Report, page 62.

At the next meeting of the Committee at St. John, on the 6th October, a resolution was passed authorizing the Treasurer to pay Mr. Copley's bill for printing the Report, on the approval of the Committee on printing.

A letter was read by the Secretary from the Rev. J. Pearson, resigning his office as Secretary of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, and the following resolution was adopted, that in accepting the resignation of the Rev. J. Pearson of his office as Secretary to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, this Committee desire to place on record an expression of their sense of the diligent and careful manner in which Mr. Pearson has performed his duties, and while expressing their regret at the loss of his valuable services, this Committee entertains the sincere hope that the work of Mr. Pearson in another sphere of labor may meet with an abundant blessing.

Mr. H. L. Sturdee was appointed Secretary to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

A statement of the Treasurer's Account was submitted up to 30th September, and an Account of the Secretary for incidental expenses, and of the Treasurer for blank forms and printing accounts, were ordered to be paid.

Permission was given to the Rev. W. S. Neales to continue his connection with the Widows' and Orphans' Association for the current year, on forwarding to the Secretary a medical certificate to the effect that the state of his health will not permit him at present to resume his public ministrations in this Diocese.

Mr. Schofield presented a Report from the Board of Home Missions, which will be included in the annual report of the Board.

Mr. Jarvis, from the Finance Committee, presented a Report, of which the following is an abstract :

1. The property held by the Society on the North Market Wharf has been leased for a term of six years at an annual rental of \$650. The payment of the sum of \$677 for necessary repairs to be deducted from the rent at the rate of \$200 per annum.

2. The Committee recommend that leases issue under the direction of the Finance Committee to parties desirous of leasing any of the property devised by the late Miss Hazen.

3. Investments have been made to the amount of \$1292.

A report of a sub-Committee was also submitted with reference to the property devised by the late Miss Hazen, giving a statement in detail of the same, with Schedule annexed.

It was recommended that a separate account of the proceeds of this property be kept by the Treasurer, that surveys be made, and when thought desirable by the Finance Committee, sales or leases be effected.

The Committee state that the present yearly rental of the property is \$795.50, which may be increased by \$132, making the yearly income, \$927.50.

The estimated value of the property is \$25,900, from which legacies are payable, amounting to the sum of \$1600, leaving \$24,300 belonging to the Society.

This Report was accepted, and cordial thanks were tendered to the sub-Committee for their valuable labors.

The following resolutions were then adopted :

1. That the Finance Committee be authorized to make leases for any term not exceeding 21 years, with usual renewal covenants of any part of the property devised by the late Miss D. B. Hazen, which may seem advisable, and that the Secretary be authorized to affix the Seal of the Society thereto, under the direction of the Finance Committee, which shall report each lease so made to the Executive Committee at their next meeting.

2. That the Secretary be authorized to affix the Seal of the Society to a lease of the property on the North Market Wharf, as recommended by the Finance Committee.

At the time appointed for the meeting of the Committee at Fredericton on the first Wednesday in January, a quorum was not present.

The Committee met at St. John on the 1st March.

A Report of the Board of Home Missions was presented, and also a statement of the Treasurer's Accounts.

An account of Messrs. McMillan's for printing, chiefly for the use of the Board of Home Missions, was ordered to be paid.

A Committee was appointed to make necessary arrangements for the next Anniversary meeting.

At a meeting of this Committee, held at Fredericton on the 7th June, 1876, a Report of the proceedings of the Committee for the

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past year was presented, and it was ordered that with an abstract of the proceedings of this meeting the Report be laid before the General Committee.

A Report was presented from the Book Depository Committee, with a statement of Account annexed, and it was resolved that the same be received and published in the Annual Report.

REPORT OF THE BOOK DEPOSITORY COMMITTEE.

The Committee, to whom has been intrusted the management of the Depository of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge Books, beg to submit herewith their Annual Report and Accounts.

The Depository was opened in October 1874, a grant of \$300 having been made out of the capital funds of the Diocesan Church Society by the General Committee in July of the same year.

From that time until May 1875, books were sold to the value of \$491.84.

During the past year the books purchased amounted to \$608.80, and the sales were \$809.33.

The books and furniture at present on hand—after deduction of amount due the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge—are valued at \$1113.00, at the ordinary retail prices.

From this statement it will be seen that financially the undertaking has been successful.

The present stock is large and has been carefully selected, and the Committee are confident that the sales would be much larger than heretofore if it were more extensively known that any person in this Diocese who subscribes \$2.50 annually, can obtain any of the Society's publications at cost and charges, while persons who are not subscribers can get them at very moderate prices.

One of the objects this Committee have to keep in view is the advancement of the work of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. Any Churchman may become a member of that Society by the payment of one guinea a year, and the Committee will be very glad to forward any contributions that may be offered for the general purposes of the Society.

In view of the many good works of this venerable Society, its liberal grants of books and money to almost every Diocese in the world, and the advantageous terms and low prices at which its publications are sold, the Committee feel that it has strong claims to the hearty support of every Churchman.

The accounts which accompany this Report have been examined by the Auditors of the Diocesan Church Society. In order to bring this Depository more generally before the members of the Church in this Diocese, the Committee would be glad to have the accounts printed with the Treasurer's Accounts submitted to the General Committee, and the Report published in the Annual Report of the Society.

The Depository is now with Messrs. Jones & Morrison, Booksellers, King Street, St. John.

An account of the Secretary for incidental expenses was ordered to be paid.

The Committee met at St. John on the 7th July, the day after the Anniversary meeting, when the following resolutions were adopted.

That copies not exceeding 3,500 of the Annual Report be printed, and the Rev. Canon DeVeber, the Rev. F. Alexander, the Rev. T. E. Dowling, Mr. G. S. Smith, Mr. W. Carman, Mr. G. E. Fenety, and the Secretary, be a Committee to attend to that duty.

That the Rev. Canon Scovil, Messrs. W. M. Jarvis, B. Lester Peters, R. T. Clinch, W. Carman, G. E. Fenety, T. W. Daniel, and the Treasurer, do form the Finance Committee for the ensuing year.

That Mr. H. L. Sturdee be the Secretary of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the ensuing year.

That Messrs. I. Allen Jack, G. A. Schofield, J. R. Ruel, Hurd Peters, C. W. Weldon, G. Sidney Smith, and W. M. Jarvis be the Glebe Land Committee.

It was resolved, that any Glebe Land Committee, now or hereafter to be appointed, shall have all the powers and rights mentioned in a former resolution relating to Glebes, as fully as if such resolution had been passed with relation to such Committee in each case.

Permission was granted to the Rev. Dr. Ketchum and to the Rev. G. H. Sterling to join the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, on the usual conditions.

Mr. I. Allen Jack, from the Glebe Land Committee, presented a Report, which he read. The Report was received and its commendation, regarding the payment of a charge for expenses by the Rev. W. Cruden, was adopted.

It was resolved that the certificates of the Revs. T. Neales and B. Shaw, which, under the rules of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, had lapsed, be revived on their remitting to the Secretary of the Fund within one month the collections from their respective Parishes for the past year.

It was resolved that the cordial thanks of this Committee be tendered to Mr. G. A. Schofield for his invaluable services as Secretary of the Board of Home Missions for the past year.

The Finance Committee were authorized to set off a lot of land for the site of a Church and school house at Moosepath, in the Parish of Simonds, to be granted by the Society to the Church corporation of this Parish.

The petition of Mr. F. B. Hazen was referred to the Finance Committee to report thereon to this Committee.

The Glebe Land Committee were requested to make enquiry with reference to the Glebe Lands in the County of Albert, and to take such steps in the case as they may deem necessary.

The Secretary was requested to prepare a brief abstract of the Annual Report, or an occasional paper, as the Executive Committee may, from time to time, direct, setting forth the objects, principles, claims, and other particulars respecting the Society, for distribution in the Diocese.
