OF THE
CHARITABLE IRISH SOCIETY

WHEN the helpless state of man, if left in his natural condition, is considered, he, of all the animal creation, will be found most in want of society. Introduction; By means of well regulated society the weakness of man is protected, his wants are relieved, his misfortunes alleviated, and his moral nature improved.

Society at large is highly benefitted by every institution which has a tendency to promote private friendship; the just observance of which gradually enlarges the mind and humanizes the heart. Friendship at first is confined within a very narrow compass; extending its care and attention to a few individuals. The sentiments of benevolence produced by such intercourse, soon beget a strong inclination in the human mind to extend the bounds of friendship; Societies of particular ranks and descriptions of men are formed; new sources of benevolence are discovered, the understanding is improved, and at length generous sentiments of friendship to all mankind arise amongst those who at first associated only to extend their friendship to the natives of some particular spot of the earth. A mind thus prepared, considers

the human race but as one society, and the wants and misfortunes of every individual equally intitled to compassion and relief.

On the 17th day of January, in the year 1786, a number of Natives of the Kingdom of Ireland, inhabitants of the Town of Halifax, in the Province of Nova-Scotia, (sensibly feeling the obligations which they owed to society, and zealously wishing to promote and encourage friendship and good will amongst men), held a meeting at the house of Mr. John O'Brien, in Halifax, and signed Articles of Association, for the purpose of relieving the wants and misfortunes of their Countrymen; which Association was stiled **The CHARITABLE IRISH SOCIETY.**

Experience proving the utility of such Society, its funds and numbers have rapidly encreased, and the Society finding that the original Articles of Association were in many respects insufficient to govern the Society in its improved and enlarged state, **CHARLES HILL** and **RICHARD JOHN UNIACKE**, Esquires, were, on the 17th day of May, in the year 1794, appointed a Committee to review and examine the former Articles, and to report a new set of Constitutions for the future regulation of the Society.

On the 17th day of February, in the year 1795, at the Anniversary meeting of the Society, at Mr. Gallagher's, in the town of Halifax, the Committee made its report, and a special meeting of the Society was ordered to be held on the 25th of March following, for the consideration thereof; on which day the Society having met and considered the report of the Committee, the

the following Constitutions for the future regulation of the CHARITABLE IRISH SOCIETY, were adopted and agreed to be observed by all its Members.

SECTION I.

The Title of the Society.

THE Style and Title of the Society and its Seal to remain as established by the original Articles of Association.

Title of the Society.

SECTION II.

Qualifications of Members.

NATIVES of Ireland; descendants of Irishmen or women; persons born in the province of Nova-Scotia; natives of any other country, who are inhabitants of this province, and who are not members of any national society established therein; and descendants of any present or future Member of this Society; are qualified to be chosen Members.

Qualification of Members.

SECTION III.

Mode of Election.

A person, desiring to become a Member of this Society, must be proposed by a Member thereof, at a general or special meeting of the Society.

Mode of choosing new Members.

The Member who proposes another for admission, must deliver to the Secretary of the Society, in writing, the name and age of the person proposed, the place of his nativity,

nativity, together with the place of his present residence, which description the Secretary must enter in a Book to be kept for that purpose, with the time and proceeding relative to the election of such person.

The election of a new Member must be by Ballot, but previous thereto the Committee for examining the characters and qualifications of new Members, must sign a Certificate in the Secretary's Book, as follows :

Certificate of the Qualification of a new Member.

“ WE do certify that we have diligently inquired into the character and qualification of
 “ proposed to be a Member of this Society and from the
 “ best information we can procure, we believe him to
 “ be an honest man, possessed of a disposition that will
 “ not disturb the friendly harmony of the Society, and
 “ in every other respect qualified to become a Member
 “ of it, agreeably to the second section of the Constitu-
 “ tion.”—

No new Member to be admitted but with the consent of two thirds of the Members present, at the time of the Ballot going round.

Contribution to be paid by a new Member.

Every new Member, on being admitted, shall subscribe his name to the Constitutions entered in the Secretary's Book, and shall pay to the Treasurer a sum not less than Four Dollars, to be applied to the Charitable Fund, and the sum of Two Shillings and Six-pence to the Secretary for his trouble.

Every new Member shall be furnished with a Book of the Constitutions, and his name shall be added to the list of Members by the Secretary.

The President, Vice-President and Assistants for the

time

time being, in case any person who is a Passenger or Sojourner in the province, shall desire to become an Honorary Member, may certify such person's qualifications in the Secretary's Book, and on such Certificate he may be immediately balloted for and chosen an honorary Member of the Society in the manner before-mentioned, such person contributing to the Charitable Fund a sum not less than Six Dollars, together with the Secretary's dues.

If such honorary Member shall afterwards desire to become a standing Member of the Society, he shall be at liberty so to do, on paying to the Fund of Charity, the quarterly dues to be computed from the time of his admission.

SECTION IV.

Officers of the Society; Mode of appointing them, and their Duty.

THE Officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice-President, and two Assistants, a Treasurer, Secretary, and Deputy-Secretary who shall be chosen annually by the majority of the Society on the Seventeenth Day of February, unless the same shall happen to fall on a Sunday, in such case the election of Officers to be made on the day following; the Officers to enter on their functions the 17th day of March each year.

The President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President, or, in his absence, the Assistants, according to seniority of appointment, shall, in cases of necessity, have power to assemble the Society at the usual place appointed for meeting in the town of Halifax, and shall lay before the

Society the cause or causes of such special meeting, the same to be considered according to the usual mode heretofore practised.

One of the foregoing Officers shall preside, according to rank, at all meetings, and the remainder of such Officers shall aid and assist the presiding Officer in such manner as he shall think best according to the usual practice of the Society.

The presiding Officer shall state to the Society all questions which may arise for consideration, and, after debate, shall declare the opinion of the Society according to the will of the majority thereof present at the debate; and in case any doubt shall arise with respect to the judgment of the presiding Officer as to the majority, he shall proceed to ascertain the opinion of the Society on such doubtful question by Ballot, the majority appearing on such Ballot to determine the question, and preclude further debate thereon.

The presiding Officer with the other Officers before named, are invested with full power and authority at every meeting, to preserve silence, order and decorum in the Society, to check all irregularity, and to impose a fine at their discretion on any offending member not exceeding the sum of One Shilling.

The President, or presiding Officer for the time being, to have the custody and use of the Seal; and in case any thing should happen to prevent the Society meeting at the place which the majority shall from time to time appoint, such Officer shall convene the Society at some other place in the Town of Halifax.

The

The Secretary, or his Deputy, shall keep an exact Duty of the Secretary. list of the Members of the Society, both honorary and otherwise; and shall keep an exact account of the times each Member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Society, and of the sums respectively due from each Member to the Society. He shall also summon each Member (except those who shall be excused) to attend not only the regular meetings of the Society, but also such special meetings as the presiding Officer of the Society shall appoint; the summons to be in writing, and left at each Member's place of abode at least three days before the time of meeting, unless in case of special meetings, where the time appointed by the presiding Officer will not admit thereof: In such cases the summonses to be served as expeditiously as the time will admit. He shall also keep a regular entry of all the by-laws and proceedings of the Society in a book to be kept for that purpose, with a proper index thereto. He shall have the custody and care of all the books and papers of the Society. He shall aid and assist the Committee of Charity, in entering all their proceedings in a book to be kept for that purpose; and shall at every annual meeting of the Society, in February, lay such book before the Society, with an abstract of all relief granted by the Society, or its Committee, to persons in distress, during the past year, with the present state and situation of the individuals relieved; which abstract, after the Society have approved of it, shall be entered in its proceedings.

As much will depend on the care and attention of the Secretary and his Deputy, he shall be allowed for sum- Allowance to Secretary. moning each meeting of the Society and his attendance

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thereon,

thereon, the sum of two dollars ; for his attendance on the Committee of Charity, at all their meetings for the year, the sum of eight dollars ; and for every Certificate granted to a Member, the sum of one dollar.

Treasurer.
His Duty.

The Treasurer shall hold all the funds of the Society in his name, he signing and sealing an instrument in writing, declaring the uses, and giving a receipt to the Secretary for the amount thereof, which instruments and receipts the Secretary shall carefully preserve with the papers of the Society. All receipts and payments shall be made by the Treasurer, and he shall exhibit his books to the Society at each meeting, in which a regular account of all receipts and payments shall be entered ; and at each February meeting he shall exhibit an abstract of the receipts and payments, together with a state of the funds belonging to the Society, which shall be entered by the Secretary in the proceedings of the Society, after the same shall have been examined and past.

Deputy Secretary : his Duty and allowance

The Deputy Secretary shall aid and assist the Secretary in his duty, and shall officiate in his absence, for which service he shall receive one sixth part of all the Secretary's fees and emoluments.

Committees to be chosen.

In addition to the foregoing Officers, there shall be chosen at the February meeting, annually, Three Committees, viz.—A Committee of Charity ; a Committee of Collection and Examination, and a Committee of Review.

Committee of Charity ; its Duty.

The Committee of Charity shall consist of Six Members, to be annually chosen by the majority of the Society. This Committee shall have power to appoint

as

as many times for their meeting as it shall think necessary, and shall be attended by the Secretary, or his Deputy, and shall from time to time distribute the ordinary relief of the Society to such persons as it shall think most deserving, and in such manner as shall be most beneficial to the persons who receive the same, rendering regular accounts quarterly to the Society, of the expenditure of the sums which shall be voted to them at each quarterly meeting. No relief to be granted but with the consent of a majority of the Committee, and in cases of doubt or difficulty, it should consult with the President, Vice-President, Assistants and Treasurer, in which cases one at least of the before named Officers should join in opinion with such majority.

As the community in which we live makes provision every six months for the support of the poor, to which we all contribute, it is the duty of the Committee to interest itself on behalf of the distressed (who by residence are entitled to a share of the public relief) and to put them in the way of obtaining that assistance from the community at large, which by law they are entitled to: By such proceeding the funds which the Society appropriate to the Committee for general relief, will extend further, and the Committee be enabled more effectually to succour the unfortunate who have no claim on the community at large.

The Committee shall also attend carefully to orphans, and the children of parents whose misfortunes or vices have put it out of their power to support their offspring, taking care to have such children bound to good masters or mistresses, who may bring them up to some useful employment, and, in cases of difficulty, to apply to the

Magistrates and Overseers of the Poor, who by law are bound to interpose their authority to relieve distress of this description. Attention to this duty will be the means of rescuing many helpless children from ruin, and save the community the pain of daily seeing hungry and distressed children begging food from door to door.

In a town like this, the sources of vice are numerous, and much of the distress which we are called upon to relieve arises from the temptations into which the inconsiderate and unguarded fall; it will therefore be the peculiar duty of the Committee to point out to the Society at every quarterly meeting such measures as shall appear necessary for the Society to adopt to discourage as far as in its power the growth of vice and immorality.

In all cases where the poor suffer oppression, it will be the duty of the Committee to interpose its interest in their behalf; and if occasion shall require it, to call for the aid of the Society, which, as far its means will permit, will have recourse to the legal authority of the country for their relief.

In all cases where the misfortunes of individuals shall require assistance beyond the means furnished to the Committee quarterly by the Society, (under the denomination of the fund for the ordinary relief of distressed persons) the Committee shall report to the Society at their next quarterly meeting the case of such individual or individuals, and point out to the Society the means of relief, as the Society will receive no application for its extraordinary interposition until the Committee shall have first reported thereon.

The Committee of Collection and Examination shall consist

consist of Three Members, and shall apply to the Secretary from time to time for an account of all sums due from Members who have been absent for any time from the Society, and shall proceed to collect the same from such absentees, and shall also urge such persons to attend the meetings of the Society more punctually in future, and shall render an account of their proceedings quarterly to the Society, with a report of the causes of such Members absence; which account and report, after it shall have passed the Society, shall be entered in the Secretary's Book with the resolutions of the Society thereon; and the absent members shall be credited by the Secretary with the sums by them paid to such Committee.

its Duty.

This Committee shall also explain to the benevolent and well-disposed, the nature of the Society and the objects which it has in view, and shall solicit contributions from such persons to support the funds of the Society.

All monies which the Committee shall receive, shall be immediately paid to the Treasurer. This Committee shall also carefully examine into the character and qualifications of every person who shall be proposed as a member of the Society, and shall certify and report thereon in the manner directed in the 3d Section of these Constitutions.

The Committee of Review and Superintendance shall consist of Three Members, who shall receive communications from all members of the Society on subjects which have a tendency to promote its increase, and to forward the benevolent objects which it has in view; it shall report quarterly to the Society such alterations

rations and amendments as shall appear necessary to be made in its Constitutions, and shall also prepare and lay before the Society a plan for establishing a fund to support the widows and children of its members.

Badge of the

On public occasions the Officers of the Society are to wear a Green Sash, with a Harp and Crown thereon, agreeably to the usage of the Society heretofore.

SECTION V.

Duty of the Members.

Members;
their duty.

AS the prosperity of the Society will entirely depend on the good conduct of its members, it is fit that the Constitutions should point out the duties which they undertake to perform on becoming members of it; they are to aid and assist the Officers of the Society in doing the duties of their respective stations; they are to obey the regular summons and all constitutional orders of the Society; they are to be punctual in their attendance at its regular and special meetings, and in every respect to promote its interest; they are in all cases respecting the Society to be governed by the opinion of the majority; they are to do every thing in their power (without injuring themselves or families materially) to aid and assist the poor and distressed of every nation; they are on all occasions to interest themselves in behalf of the oppressed or afflicted, and to comfort and relieve them as far as they are able; they are from time to time to inform the proper Officers of the Society, if any case comes to their knowledge, where the poor or distressed may be assisted by the Society, and are in every respect to act as the friends

friends of those who cannot help themselves ; they are on all occasions to behave as good subjects, and zealously to exert themselves in support of the laws of their country, carefully avoiding in the Society all controversy on religious or political subjects. To their fellow members they are to conduct themselves with kindness and affection, using every means in their power to promote friendship and harmony in the Society, and between the individual members of it. They are to be ready on all occasions, as far as their circumstances and abilities permit, to aid and assist a member when in adversity or trouble. If they know of any difference or disagreement subsisting between any two members of the Society, it is their duty immediately to interfere and to take the most effectual means to reconcile the parties, and to adjust whatever matter may be in difference. If their endeavours should be unsuccessful, it is their duty to call for the aid of any other member or members of the Society, whose interference they may think would have more influence with the parties at variance ; and if they shall be unable to reconcile them, it is their duty to report the parties at variance to the Society at their next meeting, that effectual means may be taken to adjust the matters in dispute between them. When one member sees another injuring or likely to injure himself by any imprudent conduct, it is his duty privately to admonish such member, and if he finds him persist in doing what he conceives to be wrong, he is privately to advise with other members of the Society on the subject, and request their aid ; and if such wrong doer will not profit from their united admonitions, it is their duty to report his case to the Society, that more effectual means may

may be taken to reclaim him. The members are by all honest means to promote each others interest and happiness. They are in cases of sickness or death in any of their families, to tender their services to the afflicted family; and if the situation of the family requires it, they are to attend it in such numbers, and at such times, as the Committee of Charity shall appoint. In case of the death of a member, it is their duty to aid and assist at his funeral, in such manner as the Officers of the Society shall direct, and by all means in their power to comfort and assist the widow and orphans of the deceased. Finally, it is the duty of the members by their punctual attendance at the public service of the several religious Societies to which they respectively belong, and, by the regularity of their lives to set a good example to others, and thereby encourage the well disposed to unite in the support of a Society, which has no other object in view but to comfort the afflicted, and to promote harmony and good will amongst men.

SECTION VI.

Times of Meeting and Celebration of the Annual Festival.

Times of
Meeting.

FOR conducting the business of the Society, it shall be assembled, at such places in the Town of Halifax, as the majority shall appoint, three times in the year, (besides its anniversary meeting on the 17th day of February, before mentioned) that is to say, on the 17th day of May, 17th day of August and 17th day of November, unless Sunday should intervene, in such case the meeting to be the Monday following. The meetings in the winter season, to be at 6 o'clock in the evening, and in summer

summer, at 7 o'clock, at which hour the presiding Officer is, precisely, to take the chair. Half an hour afterwards, the list of members summoned, is to be called over, and every absent member fined One Shilling, unless a sufficient excuse (to the satisfaction of a majority of the Society) shall be made for such neglect.

Absent Members to be fined.

Honorary Members are excused from being summoned, and in case the situation or business of any other Member should make his attendance inconvenient, the President may, with the approbation of a majority of the Society, excuse such member from being summoned, nevertheless it is expected such excused member will attend as often as he can conveniently.

Members excused from Attendance.

Thoroughly sensible of the blessings of the Christian religion, the Society will celebrate their annual Festival on the 17th day of March, being the day which immemorial custom has set apart for the commemoration of the holy St. PATRICK, who first preached the Christian religion to many of our ancestors. On that day the members of the Society are to wear in their hats and on their breasts, a sprig of the Shamrock, which as tradition informs us, many of the first Christians wore as a symbol of their belief in our holy religion. It having been used by St. PATRICK as a Type to explain to his hearers a part of our religious mystery. If the 17th of March should happen to be Sunday, the Festival is to be celebrated the Monday following. The mode of celebrating this Festival annually, shall be regulated by the Society at the anniversary meeting on the 17th of February.

Annual Festival.

SECTION VII.

Funds of the Society.

Funds of the
Society and
Contributions.

THE Funds of the Society are to consist of the monies now at interest, and in the hands of the Treasurer, the donations of new members, and the contributions of the charitable and well-disposed; in addition to which each member (except honorary ones) is to pay the sum of Two Shillings every quarter. When the money in the Treasurer's hands shall amount to Twenty Pounds, over and above what shall be necessary to defray the current expences of the Society, the same shall be let out to interest, and invested in the public securities of the province by the Treasurer, if to be purchased; and if not, then to be lent in sums not less than Twenty pounds to such person or persons, and on such security as the Society shall appoint.

The Society at every quarterly meeting shall vote such sum (as its circumstances will admit) to the Committee of Charity to be by them applied to the ordinary relief of distressed persons.

Expence of
Meeting.

At every meeting of the Society, each member present shall also pay One Shilling, to defray the expences of the meeting.

SECTION VIII.

Provision in case of the Absence, Removal, or Death of any of the Officers.

Absence or
Death of
Officers.

IF any of the Officers of the Society are by removal, sickness, death, or otherwise prevented from attending the

the duty of their respective stations, the Society shall at their next regular meeting, chuse others to serve in their room for the remainder of the year ; or if the necessity of the case shall require it, a special meeting shall be called for that purpose.

SECTION IX.

Certificates to be granted, and a friendly Intercourse kept up with other Societies.

THE Society will, by every means in their power, cultivate and keep up a friendly intercourse with all Societies which are or shall be formed for the purpose of granting relief to the distressed, and will use their best endeavours to promote the happiness and prosperity of such Societies.

Certificates to Members.

Certificates under the Seal of the Society, and signed by all its Officers, shall be granted to every honorary member on his admission. In case any other member shall desire a Certificate, he shall apply to the Society for the same ; and if a majority of the Society (on a Ballot to be taken for that purpose) shall agree thereto, such Certificate shall be granted to him : The form of the Certificates so to be granted, shall first be approved by the Society, and entered in its proceedings.

SECTION X.

Constitutions to be printed.

THESE Constitutions shall be entered in the Secretary's Book, and printed with a List of the Names of

Constitutions to be printed and distributed.

past Officers, and Members since the first formation of the Society.

When the Constitutions are printed, each member shall be furnished with a copy, and the remainder shall be deposited in the Treasurer's hands, for the use of the members who shall be admitted hereafter.
