The Man With the Cough Bounded Over to Keep the Peace.

HAMILTON, Nov. 21. (Special).—Rev. H. Edgar Allan, pastor of the Victoria-avenue Baptist Church, was the complainant in a case of disturbing religious worship preferred against George E. Dunn, 90 North Emerald street, an attendant at the church, but not a member.

It appears that Mr. Dunn was a member of the church until two years ago, when he was expelled. He has a habit of coughing to emphasize any remark that appeals to him in the discourse, and this has been the cause of a great deal of disturbance in the church. The pastor stated that he did not think it was appropriate that a man should cough in the church, and that he was not to be tolerated.

"The Awakening of Helena Richie," a dramatization of the powerful novel by Margaret Deland, which set the country talking a few years ago, is essentially the sort of play in which Katharine Courtonne can do her best work, and under the inspiration of her thoroughly appreciative audience at the Grand last night she rose to her best and gave a splendid portrayal. Vivacious, happy, charming in the first acts, she swept quickly on the wave of events into the emotional work in the last two, and gave a human, lovable, convincing Helena which will be long remembered. The story of Margaret Deland was closely followed by the dramatist, who moulded it into stage form, and it offers Miss Courtonne one of the most effective opportunities of her career. With an art that loses none of its delicacy in the portraying of incidents and impulses that are most often left to the imagination, she has made of a woman, who, cheated out of the happiness that childhood and young womanhood is of right entitled to by the early death of her parents, has her own her own love and happiness when she is found it, and has listened to no law of men that would forbid her. She dresses smartly and uses much sachet powder; she knows nothing of housework but looks lazily about upon cushions the while she reads French novels and demolishes large supplies of confectionery; she is at home to few callers and she makes no calls whatever. Her only link with the outside world, so far as Old Chester sees, is in Lloyd Pryor, her postman brother, who is a frequent caller at the Richie house. Never does Old Chester learn that the relationship is mythical.

At the Majestic

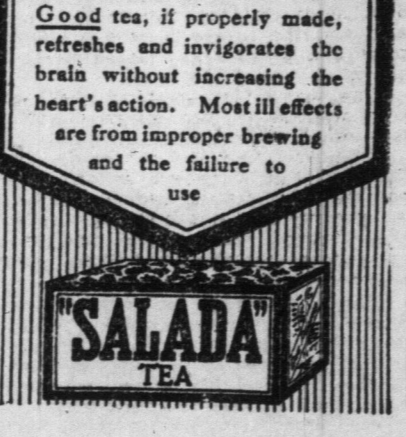
The bill at the Majestic Theatre has some especially good features this week.
