acquire and develop prospects and also to handle stocks in sound companies. I was successful in interesting the leading men of Toronto and vicinity, and we have opened up the offices in that city. I have returned to commence development work on certain properties and to open up a suite of offices here, which will be our base of operations. We will have offices in London, England; Victoria, Montreal, Toronto and elsewhere.

"While in the east I was much impressed with the fact that legitimate mining properties are being investigated and taken care of every day in the mines, and just as soon as they can be assured that mining is to be carried on legitimately they will be prepared to invest considerable sums. At present they are a little skeptical, not as to the country, but as to whether mining is to be carried on or the industry of stock selling made paramount. I find they are willing to assist in the development of a business-like method in pursuing the same policy, which should appeal to intelligent investors.

The capitalization of a mining company practically determines its dividend paying power, and no advantage can be gained in having stock at a discount on a capitalization of from one to two millions. The doubt existing in the best legal minds as to the liability of stockholders to be assessed in a liquidation, and the fact that a discount should induce would-be investors to carefully examine the character of companies selling stock at a discount, and safeguard themselves against a contingency of meeting their calls upon stock supposed to be non-assessable.

The Hawk Bay Mine. Port Arthur, Oct. 9.—Active operations are in progress on the Hawk Bay mine, and three months' supplies are now on the ground. The heavy machinery can be transported. The necessary buildings are erected and work on the shaft is commenced.

Mr. Hammond Goes West. Mr. H. C. Hammond of Oler & Hammond has gone out to British Columbia. He will visit the Cariboo region, where the firm already have large hydraulic mining interests, and also go to Rossland, with a view to securing some properties.

WONDERS OF THE TELEPHONE. Mr. Hobart Hears Cheers for Himself 1000 Miles Away. New York, Oct. 9.—The wonders of the telephone were exhibited in practical manner this afternoon at Republican headquarters. The big sound money parade took place today in Chicago, and by means of a special wire those at the New York headquarters could hear the shouting of the crowd as they passed along in front of the Great Northern Hotel in Chicago.

From the Siccan Country. Mr. J. P. McKinnon, one of the leading prospectors of the Siccan silver country, is in the city, on his way to visit friends in Cape Breton. He is a sample of the energetic young men who have gone from one side of the continent to the other to make their fortunes. Mr. McKinnon owns several rich properties on Siccan Lake, about 10 miles from the famous Siccan Star, the biggest silver mine in the world. One of his claims, Mr. McKinnon told The World, gives up ore which assays 8000 ounces to the ton. The silver is found in its natural state, unmined, with baser metals. Mr. McKinnon's headquarters are at New Denver.

Mr. J. G. Devlin of Rossland tells The World that the next British Columbia gold boom is in the Cariboo region, and that that boom will start next spring. Cariboo Creek is 75 miles north of Rossland, and 22 miles from Nakusp, on the Columbia River.

The district is reached by taking the C. P. R. to Arrowhead and dropping down the Columbia River by steamer to Copper City, which has two hotels and a population of about 200 prospectors and miners. From this point one journey inward covers miles over the Government trails to Mineral City.

Mineral City, Mr. Devlin holds, is to be a second Rossland, for it is situated on the trail to the Cariboo, and is a host of rich claims. Mr. Devlin is half-owner of the town site, which has been duly surveyed and registered with the Government.

This camp is said to have as bright a prospect as Rossland had two years ago. Most of the claims have the same form as those in Trail Creek, and those at all developed make splendid showings. One mine, owned by Ben Rod, F. K. Bourne and one De Mars, is said to have six-foot ledge which never assays less than \$100. The B. C. and the Nellie D. have been each bonded by Rossland men for \$100,000 and \$50,000 respectively. The latter, known as the Hannah and the Early Bird, which produce native gold.

Mr. Devlin adds that the crocks in the vicinity are full of gold, which a moneyed company could work to advantage.

Colonna Strikes It, Too. Just as The Miner goes to press information is received of a rich strike in the Colonna region, which began several days ago, 250 feet up the hill from the old workings. At noon to 12 o'clock the ledge was 12 feet high, which was uncovered with four feet of solid copper ore. Samples of the ore brought to The Miner office showed rich copper, black oxide of copper, chalcopryite, and copper glance. Nothing so rich from this camp has been seen under our observation. The spot where the strike was made is now being worked by both the Silverline and Evening Star—Rossland Miner, Oct. 3, 1896.

The Colonna owns the ground of the Buckeye No. 2. Arrangements have been made with the Monte Christo Company, whose claim adjoins the Colonna, to furnish power for two drills on the Colonna ground from the new Monte Christo compressor plant.

The Juliet Mine. Rossland, B. C., Oct. 7.—(Special to The World, via Spokane, Wash.)—An assay made to-day gives \$28 in gold to the ton, while assays of the dirt from the bottom of the shaft give \$8 to the ton, which must be regarded as extremely favorable for the slight depth gained, only 6 feet. The shaft is to be sunk until the dip or inclination of the vein is established, where a tunnel will be driven into the side of the mountain following the vein as deep as will be found.
