





The reduction of letter postage will go into effect only by proclamation of the Governor-General.

The imposition of postage on newspapers will not take place at once, either. The first quarter of a cent will be imposed on Jan. 1, 1899, and the other quarter of a cent on July 1 following.

The bill also provides for the decentral sation of the dead-letter office. Several such offices will be established throughout the Dominion, as is the case in England. Finally the bill provides that the examination of postofice clerks shall be confined to subjects connected with the work of the office.

Mr. Mulock's Explanations.

Mr. Mulock's Explanations.

Mr. Mulock went on to say that he expected the postage on newspapers would almost make up for the loss on the reduction of letter postage, and that very soon. The postoffice would be a self-sustaining service. He thought it would at least be some satisfaction to the newspaper publishers to contribute to this result. He gave some statistics to show the cost of free transmission of newspapers, which he treated as an abuse. In 1889 the mails carried nine million pounds; in 1891 there were 11 million pounds, and last year 164, million pounds, The newspapers alone recently sent in a requisition for 3000 and 2000 bags each, the cost of the last bag being \$1.04, and it did not last very long either. Besides, the postoffice carried for those two newspapers alone last year 318,000 pounds of papers.
One could go down to the Ottawa postoffice any day and see the letter carriers taking out large numbers of newspapers from Montreal and Toronto for local delivery. This was costing the country a large amount of money for equipment, staff, etc., and the "evil" was one which he thought demanded a remedy.

Had they been disposed to do that they would have done it in the first instance. While it was perfectly true that there had been considerable abuses in the past in the administration of the laws regarding insolvency, or the distribution of the assets of insolvent debtors, this was being remedied in certain of the provinces. The deputations which had waited on the government had pointed out that in Quebee especially, and also in Ontario, the local law was, on the whole, fair and reasonable. The province to which most objection had been taken was Nova Scotia, but at the present moment the Legislature of that province was passing a law to remove the abuses that had prevailed there. The Government desired as much as anyone that the laws of the various provinces should be such as to afford full redress to all creditors, whether English, Canadan or foreign, but did not feel it was in their power, particularly at this stage of the Session, to undertake the charge of this bill as a Government measure.




