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FIREMAN THOMAS DEACON KILLED ON DUTY. Five Comrades and an Assistant Seriously Hurt.

A \$10,000 Configuration on Davenport-road, Toronto—George H. Hees & Co.'s Factory Completely Destroyed—Several Houses Damaged—Fifty Men Out of Employment—Ald. G. B. Sheppard and Dr. Sheard Visit the Injured Firemen.

THE northern portion of the city yesterday afternoon was visited by a fierce fire which not only destroyed property to the amount of \$40,000 but involved the loss of a brave fireman's life and caused serious injuries to five of his companions.

At 4.30 yesterday afternoon a fierce fire broke out in the factory of George H. Hees, Sons & Co. at 276 Davenport-road, owing to the strong west wind the flames rapidly spread to a row of brick houses adjoining the building, doing damage to the amount of \$40,000, which is only partly covered by insurance.

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JAMES TUTTLE, the Manager of the Wesley Tattle Company, struck William D. Emerson in a Dispute over Wages and Was Shot and Instantly Killed—Emerson Claims Self-Defence and Gave Himself Up.

LONDON, Ont., April 1.—(Special.)—James Tuttle, manager of the Wesley Tattle Company, was shot and instantly killed by William D. Emerson, his leading man, on the stairs of the Auditorium here to-night.

Emerson became suspicious of losing his salary, and to-night demanded that he be paid. Tuttle refused to do so, and Emerson, who is an ex-officer in the United States Navy, accompanied by his wife, whose stage name is Laura Wilson, joined the Wesley Company, a company which reports to be popular among some two weeks ago, as leading man and woman.

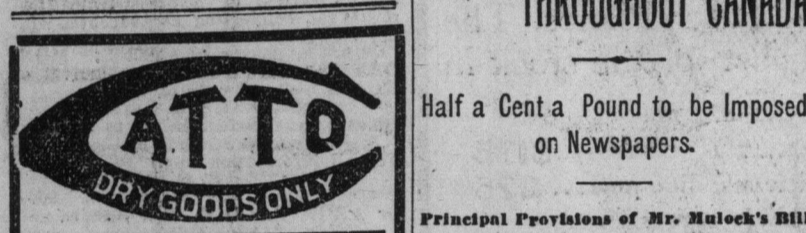

**THE INSOLVENCY BILL**

Sir Charles Tupper Called up Mr. Fortin's  
Measure and Told Something About  
Feeling in England.

Sir Charles Tupper said he desired to  
call the attention of the Government to  
a very important matter, viz. the Insol-  
vency Bill, introduced by Mr. Fortin. The  
question involved great diversity of opin-  
ion on both sides, but he had had occa-  
sion during a somewhat lengthened residence  
in England to learn how very important  
it was to the commercial interests of Can-  
ada that there should be some measure of  
insolvency adopted by Parliament that  
would relieve the commercial men of Great  
Britain and other countries from the im-  
pression as to the great insecurity of  
trade with this country, for  
fear of being subjected to unjustifiable  
and improper loss. A few years ago he  
had attended in London a meeting of the  
British Empire League, at which Mr. Fortin  
had been and he had perfected a resolution  
pledging themselves to endeavor to secure  
the adoption of an insolvency law by the  
Parliament of Canada. He wished to take  
this opportunity to express his pledge  
by pressing on the Government what he  
measures, which had been introduced  
by Mr. Fortin. It was perfectly impos-  
sible to hope that that measure could pass  
this session in the hands of a private mem-  
ber.

Mr. Campbell interjected a remark about  
the work of the judges, whereupon Mr. Fortin  
was asked, had Mr. Campbell any com-  
plaint to make? Mr. Campbell declared that Judge Woods,

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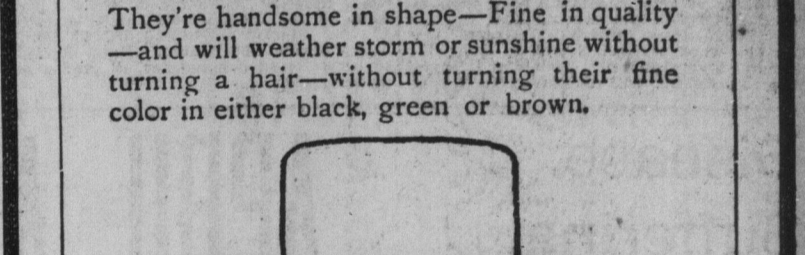
