VALERIA, SPAIN, JULY 2.—Very serious disturbances are in progress here. Under the orders of the Captain-General of Valencia, Gen. Mola, the troops occupied the streets yesterday morning (Saturday) and now hold all the strategic points.

At the beginning of the riots, the mob placed obstacles on the street railway tracks and stopped the cars, stoning the gendarmes when they tried to remove the barriers. Finally the troops charged, and the first shots were fired. Several persons were wounded. In one case a Marseilles bullet went through a shop door and killed a shop assistant within. As the day advanced, the disorders increased. The troops were stationed at many points, and the artillery was held in readiness, and the cavalry captured only after fierce fighting, in which many were wounded.

About 8 o'clock last evening the mob attacked a monastery and the brother who defended himself with a revolver. They then moved upon a Jesuit house, which had a narrow escape from being burned. To prevent the mob from setting it on fire, an enormous quantity of fireworks have been made. It is not known how many have been killed. At a late hour last evening the generals held a conference and decided to continue the military occupation of all points of vantage. The Mayor of Valencia issued a proclamation calling upon the people to cease resisting the law. The riots were received to-day and the gendarmes were ordered to disperse. It is reported that a captain of gendarmes was severely injured by a flying bullet.

All Quiet on Sunday.
 Madrid, July 2.—A quiet day from Seville and Saragossa report all quiet there to-day, but the precautionary measures are continued. There has been a slight disturbance in Constantina, in the Province of Badajoz, about six miles from the northeast of Barcelona, more than 30 were injured during rioting yesterday, some of them seriously. A large meeting was held to-day in favor of the revision of the trial of the alleged anarchists, now imprisoned at Montjuich, for complicity in the bomb during the Corpus Christi procession, a formidable demonstration was made against the Jesuit convent. The gendarmes who were summoned were received with showers of stones. They charged the rioters, injuring many.

NEGRO USED A "BILLY."
John E. Jenkins is Charged With Assaulting a Young Man With-out Provocation.

Lying on a shelf at Police Headquarters last night was a dangerous looking weapon which had been taken from a busy negro named John Jenkins by Constable Sandell after a hard fight at York and King streets late on Saturday night. Jenkins was arrested on the complaint of a young man named Donald Morrison, who claimed that the negro used a "billy" to assault him. It appears that Morrison was sitting on the back of a west-bound car being driven through the streets. One of the men making insulting remarks to Jenkins and his companions leaped from their wheels and followed him to the sidewalk. When they evaded him, he drew from his pocket the "billy" and struck it around his wrist made a savage attack on Morrison. The latter shouted for the police and Constable Sandell placed Jenkins under arrest. He is charged with assault and carrying concealed weapons. As Morrison was taken to the station, the corner the frequenters of York-street tried to induce the prisoner to put up a fight and they would help him to escape. The timely arrival of Constables Sackett and Dan Robinson prevented further trouble. Jenkins' companions took no part in the assault.

THE GOOD EMPLOYERS

The proposal to grant a special charter for a Scandinavian Grand Lodge in the State of Illinois, was again taken up, but at the time of adjournment it was still unsettled. Officers of the Supreme Lodge will resume business this morning.

A public meeting was held in the Pavilion at 7 o'clock yesterday evening, which was presided over by R.W.G. Templar Joseph Malins. Speeches were made by Bro. Malins, Florence D. Richards, P.G.V.T., Ohio; Rev. S. F. Pearson, Maine; Thomas J. P. Schmitt, California. The meeting was closed with the speeches were solos by Miss Neta Brimstin.

YELLOW JACK STILL THERE.
Ten New Cases of the Dread Malady in Santiago Saturday.

Santiago de Cuba, July 2.—Ten new cases of yellow fever were reported yesterday, and five have been reported to-day. The total number of cases is now 74. No deaths have been reported to-day. The patients have all been removed from the infected camp, but the doctors seem unable to check the progress of the disease among them. TREASURE FROM KLONDIKE.

Three Steamers From Skagway Have Reached Seattle With Dust and Nuggets.

BIG STRIKES IN NEW DIGGINGS.

A German Who Robbed and Murdered a Miner Was Caught and Hanged to a Tree.

Seattle, Wa., July 1.—The steamers Beattie, Parrallon and Oriaba have arrived from Skagway, bringing one third of a million in treasure. Seven steamers, carrying a large amount of gold dust sailed from Dawson on June 14 bound for St. Michael. The value of the gold dust has been estimated as high as \$5,000,000. The largest clean-up on any one claim was \$900,000 on No. 16 Eldorado; the second largest was \$900,000 on Stanley's claim. Healy's claim took out half a million. No. 36 above on Bonanza cleaned up a half million. Swain's claim on Colorado returned out \$200,000.

From the New Diggings.

On June 23 the first miners reached Dawson from Cape Nome, confirming the news of big gold strikes in the new diggings. They tell of some being taken out ranging in value from \$20 to \$30. Four men on 25th Creek took out \$2200 in four days. On Snow Creek \$1500 was taken out in four days. On California Creek one man took out a nugget worth \$12.

A Murderer Lynched.

On March 2 Charley Barrow's cabin on the steamer was entered and it is said \$3000 in gold stolen. Barrow was found with a knife thrust into his back. The miners who found the body organized a search party to hunt the murderer, whom they found on the way to Nome. The murderer was a German who went to the district from Kotzebue Sound. He confessed that he murdered Barrow for his gold dust and the miners without further ceremony hanged him to a tree.

DISASTROUS FLOOD IN TEXAS.

A Number of Lives Have Been Lost and the Destruction to Property is Great.

Calvert, Texas, July 1.—The most disastrous storm for several years in this district occurred last night. The streams and river have overflowed their banks and much property has been destroyed by the flood. A number of lives were lost. No far only five bodies have been recovered. A number of houses were destroyed. The lower part of the city are flooded. The railroad bridges at both ends of the town have been destroyed.
