THE PAN-AMERICAN EXHIBITION.

The Pan-American Exhibition people here had an unusually unfortunate experience in the matter of weather. Six weeks have elapsed since the Exhibition was opened, but it is only during the last week or two days that the weather has been at all favorable.

The attendance has consequently been very light, and a feeling of apprehension and dismay has been one of the subdued features of the City of Buffalo for some time back.

However, the attendance will rapidly pick up, and before long the grounds will be daily visited by great numbers. The Pan-American Exhibition cannot fail to draw immense crowds of people.

It really produced a spectacle of the first magnitude. Nothing has ever been designed in ancient or modern times to equal the view that is presented from a dozen different points within the Exhibition.

The architecture, the coloring of the buildings, the illumination, the water effects, the statuary, easily surpass the efforts of the Chicago people in their great World's Fair of 1893.

The feature of the Pan-American Exhibition is its construction. It covers much less area than the World's Fair. Everything is compact and the eye is satisfied with the combination of beautiful effects that everywhere meets it.
