### Morning and Evening Stars.

VENUS will be Morning Star until September 25, when it is in superior conjunction with the Sun, being then rendered invisible by the superior light of the Sun; and being also at its maximum distance from the Earth, it will have its minimum apparent diameter, and its disc, if visible, will be a perfect circle. After this date it will soon appear low in the west soon after sunset, being Evening Star, and daily appearing further east of the Sun. At the close of the year 1866 it shows beautifully as a Morning Star, increasing in splendor until January 17, when its illuminated disc is greatest. It rises then about 4h. 23m. mo. On February 24 it reaches its greatest elongation— $46^{\circ} 48'$ —west of the Sun, whence it moves off towards the Sun and superior conjunction, with daily decreasing light. On January 1, it will be north-east of Antares; on February 5, it enters Sagittarius; March 8 it will be  $3^{\circ}$  south of Capricorni; and April 4 it will be  $9^{\circ}$  south of Aquarii, the brightest star in the Urn.

MARS will be Evening Star during the entire year. It will appear largest January 10, being then at its opposition, or  $180^{\circ}$  from the Sun, and rising about sunset. It is then nearest the Earth, and its diameter about four times as large as when at its conjunction. On January 1, it will be south-east of Pollux, and about on a line with Castor and Pollux. It moves backwards or to the west now, and until February 18. On January 7, it will be  $2\frac{1}{2}$  south of Pollux, and on April 7 it will be back again due south of Pollux. After June the planet will be rather inconspicuous.

JUPITER will be Evening Star until February 8, being then in conjunction with the Sun, and lost in its light. Thence Morning Star until May 27, when it reaches its western quadrature. During the rest of the year it will be Evening Star, and rather interesting. August 26, it will be largest and at the opposition, rising about sunset, and will appear three times as large as Mars did on January 10. On December 9 it will be  $10^{\circ}$  due south of the brightest star in the Urn.

SATURN will be Morning Star until February 12, rising after this before midnight, and being Evening Star until November 19, when it becomes Morning Star. It will be in Libra most of the year, north-west of Antares, and at the time of opposition, May 12, it will be brightest.

MERCURY will be brightest, and at the most favorable stations for visibility, March 6, July 3, and October 28, being then in the west, and Evening Star soon after sunset; also April 25, August 24, and December 12, being then in the east as Morning Star, just before sunrise.

CAPERNAUM. — Archaeological searches in Palestine have nearly settled the site of ancient Capernaum upon the present Tel Hum. The "White Synagogue" has been dug out, and there is little doubt that this is the identical edifice built by the Roman centurion, Luke 7, and one of the structures in which Christ prayed and taught—the only one now to be traced. Its plan and ornaments have been made out and copied.

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### A Volcano in the Sandwich Islands.

Mauna Loa, a volcano in Hawaii, was the scene, at the opening of 1866, of a most sublime spectacle. A grand eruption commenced near the top of the mountain, and after pouring out its burning floods for two days, ceased; but thirty-six hours after the eruption again appeared, about midway on the mountain side, sending up a column of lava about 100 feet in diameter, varying from 100 to 1000 feet in height, and continuing for twenty days and nights. The disgorge-ment from the mountain side was often with terrific explosions, which shook the hills and were heard for forty miles. This column of liquid fire was an object of surpassing brilliancy, of intense and awful grandeur. As the jet issued from the awful orifice, it was white heat; as it ascended higher and higher, it reddened like fresh blood, deep-ening its color, until, in its descent, much of it assumed the color of clotted gore.

In a few days it had raised a cone some three hundred feet high around the burning orifice, and as the showers of burning minerals fell in livid torrents upon the cone, it became one vast heap of glowing coals, flashing and quivering with restless action, and sending out the heat of ten thousand furnaces in full blast. The struggles in disgorg-ing the fiery masses, the upward rush of the column, the force which raised it one thousand vertical feet, and the continuous falling back of thousands of tons of mineral fusia into the throat of the crater, and over a cone of glowing minerals one mile in circumference, was a sight to inspire awe and terror, attended with explosive shocks which seemed to rend the mural ribs of the mountain. From this fountain a river of fire went rushing and leaping down the mountain with amazing velocity, filling up basins and ravines, dashing over precipices, and exploding rocks, until it reached the forests at the base of the moun-tain, where it burned its fiery way, consuming the jungle, evaporating the water of the streams and pools, cutting down the trees, and send-ing up clouds of smoke and steam and murky columns of fleecy wreaths to heaven.

All Eastern Hawaii was a sheen of light, and night was turned into day. So great was the illumination at night, that one could read without a lamp; and labor, travelling, and recreation might go on as in the daytime. Mariners at sea saw the light at two hundred miles distance. It was a pyrotechnical display more magnificent and mar-vellous than was ever made by any earthly monarch. The point from which the fire-fountain issued is ten thousand feet above the level of the sea, thus making the igneous pillar a distinct object of observation along the whole eastern coast of Hawaii.

During the eruption, Rev. Mr. Coan made an excursion to the source. After three days of hard struggling in the jungle and over fields, ridges, and hills of bristling scoria, he arrived near sunset at the scene of action. All night long he stood as near to the glowing pillar as the vehement heat would allow, listening to the startling explosions and the awful roar of the molten column, as it rushed upward a thou-sand feet, and fell back in a fiery avalanche which made the mountain tremble. It was such a scene as few mortals ever witnessed. There was no sleep for the spectator. The fierce red glare, the subterraneous

mutterings and strugglings, the rapid explosion of gases, the rushes and roarings, the sudden and startling bursts, as of crashing thunder.—all, all were awe-inspiring, and all combined to render the scene one of indescribable brilliancy and of terrible sublimity. The rivers of fire from the fountain flowed about thirty-five miles, and stopped within ten miles of Hilo. Had the fountain played ten days longer, it would probably have reached the shore.

**THE GREAT AFRICAN DESERT.**—Recent explorations have corrected many of the erroneous impressions respecting the great desert of Sahara. Instead of being a nearly level sandy plain, it is only so at its eastern and western extremities, the central portions rising in the form of terraces 900 or 1,200 feet above the valleys of the Atlas and Soudan, while Barth speaks of mountains 4,000 or 5,000 feet high. The opinion of Humboldt is undoubtedly correct, that it is the bed of a former sea elevated by great geological convulsions, mounds of fossil shells and other debris of marine animals being met over its whole extent, besides immense deposits of rock salt. The fact has been revealed by numerous wells, that there are extensive sheets of water a short distance below the surface—a fact known for a long time to the Arabs, who call this watery bed the subterranean sea.

**ANCIENT DATES.**—Astronomers have been enabled to fix the dates of many events in ancient history, by means of the natural phenomena recorded in connection with them by historians. Thus a battle between the Medes and the Lydians is proved to have been fought May 28, B. C. 585; for there was a total eclipse of the sun during its progress, and unerring calculations prove that the only eclipse total in Asia Minor at that era was on the day above named. In a similar manner Hailey ascertained the precise day of the landing of Julius Cæsar in Britain, August 26, B. C. 55, guided by the notices in Cæsar's Commentaries respecting the full moon and the tides. Some of the dates thus determined by modern science are of importance, as they help to fix the time of other memorable events.

**AN EGYPTIAN RELIC.**—A stone has been discovered in Egypt, at ancient Tanis, which promises to be of almost equal value with the famous Rosetta stone. It contains a long inscription in the ancient hieroglyphics, with its counterpart in Greek; the whole in a most excellent state of preservation. It has already been three times photographed, and is ready for the labors of scholars.

**AN AUSTRALIAN MONSTER.**—An extraordinary reptile has arrived in England from Australia, which seems to be more nearly allied to the pre-Adamite Saurians than anything before discovered. It possessed enormous claws and teeth, which enabled it to cause great destruction to the natives, while its almost impenetrable skin shielded it from their rude weapons. The body is perfect with the exception of one claw, torn off in the final contest.

I. An annular eclipse of the Sun, March 6. Invisible in America, but visible in Europe, Africa, and Asia.

II. A partial eclipse of the Moon early in the morning of Wednesday, March 20. Visible in this Island. Eclipse begins 3h. 7m., and ends at 6h. 14m.

III. A total eclipse of the Sun, August 29. Invisible in this Island.

IV. A partial eclipse of the Moon, Friday evening, September 13. Visible in this Island. Eclipse begins at 6h. 50m., and ends at 9h. 49m.

in the workshop, or at the desk, by idle habits or hours misspent. Activity of mind or body is the way to happiness, contentment, and prosperity. A busy man for me. Put a little more work on his shoulders, and he does not flinch. He can bear up under it when a lazy man would falter. Work is no hardship, for it brings along its satisfactions and its conquests.—But what can we do now? Much! Lay out the work for the summer. There are the cattle to be taken care of. They won't come out well in spring if neglected now. There is the wood pile to be looked after. A few hours' smart chopping won't hurt anybody nowadays. There's the poultry-yard. Hens want a little care as well as cows, and sheep, and pigs. Give them a warm, sunny house, a little sand or gravel to roll in, a few potatoes and a few bones to pick, and if they don't begin to lay soon it's their own fault, and not yours. And then there's the newspaper and the farm-book. Get the best, and read it now that you have time. A good, well-selected farmer's library is a treasure at this season.

WEEDS.—The microscope reveals the fact that every stem and twig as large as a quill contains some ten thousand little tubes, through which the water or sap is constantly passing upward during growth, to the leaves above, which spread it out by means of their fine net-work, and give it in the form of vapor to the air. With ten weeds upon a square foot, it is fairly estimated that the careless farmer has forty-four million pumps at work on every acre, dissipating the moisture and drying up the soil, at the expense of the crops. Farmers, are the weeds pumping your fields at this rate?

CHICKENS may be made a source of considerable profit on a farm if they are properly selected and bred, and well taken care of. Give us the Dorkings for table birds. They lay well, and attain good size early in the spring. They are useful as well as ornamental. But the Black Spanish are the everlasting layers. Never saw anything

like them. They may not lay so well in winter as the Brahmapootras, or some of the other Asiatic breeds, but they are fine eating birds for the table, lay large eggs and plenty of them; and though they may be a little disposed to wander and show their independence, they generally pay about as well, taking the year through, as any other fowl. Between the Dorkings and the Black Spanish it would be a little difficult to choose. They are both excellent, thrifty, and desirable breeds. As to the pure dunghill fowls that they talk so much about, it is difficult to find them now. They have got mixed up so with other breeds that nobody knows what they are. Like our "native" cows, they are made up of everything under the sun. Mind you, we don't go in for fancy stock, but we might as well look to profit, and keep an eye on the results, and you'll find it pays better in the end to keep the best, if you can tell what that is. Feed them well, at any rate.

CANADA THISTLES.—A writer in the *Western Rural* tells how he killed acres of Canada thistles, thus:—"Plow early in the spring, as soon as they are all out of the ground. As soon as they are up the second time, plow or cultivate with a wheeled cultivator, and so continue as often as they come in sight, which will be about three or four times during the summer. If the season is wet it is all the more favorable for killing—others don't agree with me—because they sprout and make their appearance much more certainly than in a dry season. In a dry season the roots lie in the ground without coming up; in a warm, wet season they come up three or four times, and that is their end if they are as often plowed."

MANY farmers in P. E. Island idle away a great part of this month. During the short and cold days of January and February, they have probably made little or no provision for the coming summer. If their grain is all threshed when the March sun first shines upon them, they will be prepared to complete their supply of firewood for the summer, and to pro-

vide such fencing material as may be needed. Cultivators of our soil, you should never neglect these two important requisites. In this climate the season for tillage is short; it will, therefore, never do for you to be running to the woods for fence-poles when your grain is up, and you should be employed at sowing your turnips; nor for you to be gathering old sticks to cook your breakfast, when you should be mowing hay. Before the vernal equinox overtakes you, see that all your hauling is done, and everything procured from the forest which can save a moment's time in the busy season. Then turn your attention to cutting up and splitting your firewood for use, and getting your carts, plows, and small farming implements in order, so that when spring does really come you may be ready to dash into field work. An idle March frequently causes a scanty harvest.

**CALVES "BROUGHT UP BY HAND."**  
A member of the Cirencester Farmers' Club makes a speciality of rearing calves, and has read a paper before that association describing his experience. He has been in the habit of procuring the calves dropped on the farm of a neighbor, and, with only four cows of his own, raised fifty calves in 1864, fifty-five in 1865, and, in 1866, fifty-five were weaned, but three have been lost by mismanagement. He takes the calves from about the first of March, when ten days old, paying sixty shillings each for them.

**REMEDY FOR THE STING OF A BEE.**  
The following is a Prussian recipe: Beat an onion on a hard body to extract the juice, to which add a pinch of salt. Apply the mixture to the sting, and the pain and inflammation will cease.

PREPARE to stick in the plough. There'll be very little more winter at present. The notes of the bluebird, and the robin, and the cheerful song sparrow resound through the trees; the tender grass begins to spring up everywhere. All

things foretell the coming of spring, and with it the work of preparation and seedtime. The stock needs more than ordinary care. Let it have a variety and a plenty of food, and good shelter from chilling winds. A little nursing pays now, and the root cellar must give up its juicy mangolds, and its carrots or its parsnips. Speaking of parsnips, why don't you raise more of them? Nothing is more nutritious or wholesome for in-coming cows and ewes at this season than fresh-dug parsnips. Don't let another spring find you without a good bed of them; and to make sure of it, sow fresh last year's seed now, as soon as you can get the land in order.

DISPLAY OF THE WORLD'S INDUSTRY.—A "Universal Exhibition of the Products of Industry and Art of all Nations" is to be held in Paris during the six months succeeding April 1, 1867. Its aim is to exhibit the progress of art and manufactures, and of all the sciences in supplying the necessities of society, among all the nations of the world. The government of France is to erect a palace for the Exhibition 1600 feet long and 1200 wide, covering an area of 35 acres, to cost \$4,000,000; besides making provision for living products of agriculture and horticulture, animals, and models of villages. Compartments have been allotted to the Christian governments of Europe and America, and to the Mohammedan and Pagan nations of Turkey, Persia, Central and Southern Asia, China, Japan, Africa, and Oceanica. There will be a display of different races of savages at work in their rude industry.

A BUSY month is this. The planting must be hurried up. Every farmer ought to raise roots enough to feed his cattle a peck or two a day each, and have some left for the sheep. Plow deep and manure well for roots, not with common barnyard manure, which is full of weed seed, but with the finest old rotted manure, or with some concentrated fertilizer. You'll have plenty of weeds to contend with without planting any. Parsnips, carrots, and onions ought to be got

in as early as possible. You want a succession of peas, and it is a good plan to sow every two weeks, after soaking in warm water. The Dan O'Rourke and the Champion of England are standard early sorts, though many new ones are thrust upon the market almost every year. The dwarf varieties are hardy. Turnips or buckwheat may follow peas.

THE BUTTER MAKER'S GOLDEN RULES.—The great secret in butter making, it seems, consists in attending to the following points:—

- 1st. Securing rich, clean, healthy milk—milk obtained on rich old pastures, free of weeds.
- 2d. Setting the milk in a moist, untainted atmosphere, and keeping it at an even temperature while the cream is rising.
- 3d. Proper management in churning.
- 4th. Washing out the buttermilk thoroughly, and working so as not to injure the grain.
- 5th. Thorough and even incorporation of the salt, and packing in oaken tubs, tight, clean, and well made.

GROWING POTATOES UNDER STRAW. The editor of *The Rural World* says:—"On a recent trip in St. Clair Co., Ill., we saw hundreds of acres of land covered with straw. The ground had been plowed and harrowed and marked off, and potatoes dropped, and then the whole surface covered about six inches deep with straw. The potatoes have no further attention till digging time, when two or three hundred bushels per acre are obtained. The straw keeps the weeds down, and the soil cool and moist. The straw is raked away in autumn, and there lie the potatoes white and clean. The straw potatoes bring the highest price in the market."

Do all the hoeing you can with the horse. With straight rows both ways in the potato field, and in the root patches, you can do as much with a horse cultivator and the horse hoe as ten men in the same time. Isn't time and cost worth saving? Don't let a weed grow. It won't pay to raise weeds. Keep the hoe ground sharp. A man can do more and better work

in the same time with a good sharp hoe, and so you save in the end by using only the best tools. The best in the market are none too good. Sow a lot of corn in drills for fodder. It is worth a good deal to cut up green, when the pastures get dry in August. Cut clover early, and handle it carefully, so as to save all the blossoms and the leaves. You can't turn, and stir, and rake it like hay, without great loss. You will have a few hours, now and then, to brush off the caterpillars' nests. The orchards will suffer, without careful looking after.

HIGH CULTIVATION.—The *Maine Farmer*, alluding to the subject of "high cultivation" so much talked of and written about, says that there is much more talk than improvement. A man looks over his farm, of many acres, and finds the whole needs aid, but not being able, at once, to render it to all portions, makes no particular effort to improve any part. The right way—right because alone practicable—is to commence with a few acres at a time. Get these in good heart the first year and the increased product from them will aid in experimenting on another section the succeeding year. In this way the farm will soon become renovated, and properly cared for, will not run down again as "long as grass grows and water runs."

No man should think so highly of himself as to imagine he could receive no lights from books, nor so meanly, as to believe that he can discover nothing but what is to be learned from them.

Can't I persuade you to leave off that check rein on your working horses? Try it and see.

Working oxen ought to have the best of care at this time of year.

THE war on the weeds and cutting grass will take up a good deal

of your time this hot month. Watch the weather. Take the ripest grasses first. One good hay-day in this month is enough for me, if the grass is not too heavy. I try to keep it stirring. It makes very fast if kept well to the air and the sun. I think there is such a thing as drying grass too much. It takes the life out of it. The mowing-machine leaves it better spread than the scythe. The hay-tedder cures it faster than the fork. The horse-rake gathers it faster, and at less cost, than the hand rake. The horse pitchfork stores it away faster than the common fork; and so you get through haying cheaper and quicker than we used to when I was a boy. I like to keep the pig-pen well filled with weeds. It makes a place look more tidy to keep it free of weeds. There is a lot of foul stuff around the walls. How much better it looks in the pig-pen! And then to think of the manure heap! How it grows up from day to day! I tell you there is nothing like having a plenty of compost. It makes things grow. If you have a few swarms of bees, a little piece of buckwheat will help them fill up their store-houses. Round turnips may be sown now, or after the last hoeing of the corn, and in spots where the early peas grew.

To set the mind above the appetites is the end of abstinence; which one of the fathers observed to be, not a virtue, but the ground work of a virtue. By forbearing to do what may innocently be done, we may add hourly new vigor to resolution, and secure the power of resistance when pleasure or interest shall lend their charms to guilt.

I've said so much about weeds that I am sorry to speak of them again. But they'll be going to seed now, and need looking after more carefully than ever. You have some time now, after haying, to make improvements. You can

dig a drain through the swamp and get out a thousand loads of muck for the compost heap next year. You can cut into the bushes in the pasture, and dig out a few rocks. You can clean out round the walls and the fences, and get a lot of loam there for the pig-pen or the cow-yard. You can improve your mowing lots by sinking the stones, and save trouble and delay, and fretting, for years to come. You can build more or less walls, if you need them, or, what is better, remove some of the old ones, and thus save a strip of land that has been lost ever since that division wall was laid. You can clean up about the wood-pile, and give the house and yard a trim and natty look. Here ought to be enough to keep you busy.

LIQUID HONEY.—The following receipt for a beautiful liquid honey is taken from Mr. Langstroth, which he says "the best judges have pronounced one of the most luscious articles they ever tasted.": "Put two pounds of the purest white sugar in as much hot water as will dissolve it; take one pound of strained white clover honey—any honey of good flavor will answer—and add it warm to the syrup, thoroughly stirring together. As refined loaf sugar is a pure and inodorous sweet, one pound of honey will give its flavor to two pounds of sugar, and the compound will be free from that smarting taste that pure honey often has, and will usually agree with those who cannot eat the latter with impunity. Any desired flavor can be added to it. "Although no profit can be realized from inducing bees to store this mixture in boxes or glasses, the amateur may choose, in bad seasons, or in districts where honey is pure, to secure in this way choice specimens for the table."

It costs less to make early pork, and farmers make a mistake to put off fattening their pigs till cold weather sets in. A little green food now and then is very useful. If you had more fodder corn than you wanted for feeding out green,

you can cure it this month, and it will make excellent winter feed. It is hard to cure it well, but it can be done by taking a little pains. Cut all the second crop you can get. Rowen is the feed for ewes and milch cows. Nothing like it. You sowed some late turnips, I suppose. They can now be cultivated, if you sowed in drills, and need attention any way. You will have some spare time for fall plowing. It is a good plan to turn the soil up to the frosts of winter, and let it weather. It's a good plan to keep all the stock you can, even if you have to be at some expense for extra feeding. You may want to buy a little now to consume your crops. It pays best to sell the products of the farm on four legs. You get a good deal of manure, and so good crops.

**TOMATO PICKLES.**—To one peck of green tomatoes, add eight onions and six peppers. Cut them in slices, sprinkle thoroughly with salt, and let them remain over night. In the morning drain off the juice, cover with vinegar, and boil five minutes. Again drain off the liquid, thus preventing fermentation. Then add a cup of sugar, mustard seed and spices. Place in a stone jar, and cover with cold vinegar.

**ARTESIAN WELLS.**—Paris having already two great artesian wells, another is being sunk. It has reached a depth of eighty-two metres, or 269 feet, nearly twenty-three metres below sea level. A good deal of difficulty has been experienced in dealing with a number of subterranean lakes met with.

It's time now to dig those potatoes. Choose a time when the soil is dry, so as to be able to put them

away clean and nice, if you would shun the danger of rotting. If you are thinking of planting a new orchard, now is the time to get the ground ready. If the soil is not already rich enough, it must be made so by manure applied to other crops, or else by a good top-dressing after the trees are set out, worked under in the spring. It pays to plow deeply, and to drain the land for an orchard. It is a good time to put on paint, because the paint will not all dry up to a powder and come off. The female parent of the canker-worm usually comes out of the ground during this month, and if you use any of the tree-protectors, or tar, put them on by on the middle of the month.

CARE OF TENDER PLANTS.—Many beautiful plants that are safely bedded out in the spring, and prove ornaments to the flower-plot all summer, will be utterly destroyed if left in the open ground during winter. A good plan is to pot them and keep them in the house during frosty weather. In taking them up care should be taken to preserve the roots as much as possible, and they should be either stripped of a portion of their leaves, or shortened in, to compensate for the disturbance to which they are subjected. It is best to use pots just large enough, that after they have commenced to grow they may be shifted into larger ones, and have the stimulus of fresh soil to promote their further growth. After potting they should be put into a shady place, and the earth well soaked with water. Many plants, if well treated, will give quite a profusion of flowers during late winter and early spring, and as the time comes round make splendid objects for summer decoration again.

It is time now to be getting ready for winter. The turnips and ruta-bagas must be harvested early

in the month. Get them in clean and dry, and put them on wooden racks in the cellar, so that the air may have access to them. A good supply of roots is worth having to feed out in connection with the meadow hay and coarse fodder. Feed the English turnips first, then the swedes or ruta-bagas, and last the mangolds, that keep through the winter well, and till late into the spring. It is a good time to top-dress both the winter grains and the grass-lands with that great heap of fine compost that has been thrown over and so carefully prepared. It serves to protect the roots against the cold, and on new seeded lands gives a fine surface for the clover-seed, which you will want to sow on in March or April. Use all the manure you can scrape up in the yard and about the premises. It will be worth about as much again on the grass now as it will if kept till spring. And if you have a piece that you are going to break up in spring for corn, a good top-dressing on the sod now will pay well. Do as much plowing as you can. Plow up and down a slope, instead of across, in order to promote good drainage. Set out your trees now, and be sure they are good.

## STOPPAGES IN THE COW'S TEAT.—

It may be cured by taking the pointed half of a pair of scissors, grind it to an edge on both sides, and whet it until it is as keen as a razor. It will probably be necessary to insert this a quarter to half an inch. Gauge the distance by placing the thumb of the right hand on the spot. Then take the teat in the left hand, holding it firmly and push the instrument gently, but quickly up. The teat must then be pressed several times each day until the milk passes. We have been told that tubes are sometimes inserted at each milking, and answer a good purpose.—*N. E. Farmer.*

THE cold weather is now at hand, and it is time to think how the crops that you have been raising are to be fed out to the greatest profit and economy. It is best, in the long run, to sell the crops in the form of beef, mutton, or pork,

or, in other words, on four legs. You are now to feed the hay, the roots, and perhaps the corn, or other grain, to stock of some kind, and the first requisite on the score of economy is proper shelter. You can't feed animals to a profit if they are exposed to cold, driving winds, or stormy weather. The next in importance is strict regularity in point of time in feeding; so as to avoid any loss from fretting; and the next is to give them their food in a condition to go the farthest. Straw, and cornstalks, and coarse hay, for instance, may be cut short and moistened with hot water, if practicable. Grain should be ground fine for stock,—the finer the better. The loss by feeding out coarse-ground meal to horned cattle and horses, is enormous. You may have good shelter, but bad ventilation. That won't do. Foul air is about as bad as exposure to too much cold. Keep the stalls and stables clean and sweet. Cover up the manure heap, unless you have a barn cellar. Close up the accounts of the year, and see what they all amount to.

A SHEEP WELL WASHED.—Some years ago, when the temperance move was carrying all before it, there resided in Tuftonboro' a hard old toper, who had drank blue-ruin enough, some said, to swim in. It required considerable persuasion to get him to sign the pledge, and it was in this way:—That he should not drink any, except at sheep-washings, when it was customary for strictly temperance men to imbibe a little taste of the "critter" to drive away the "rheumatiz." Well, time wheeled away, and, week after week, he was observed to be just about as far over the seas as usual—and on being reminded of his pledge he remarked, "I wash my old black sheep every week.—*Mirror and Farmer.*"
