

Reports From New Brunswick Points to the Department of Agriculture Are Favorable

Fredericton, N. B., July 14—The department of agriculture of New Brunswick has reports from its representatives in different sections of the province constant of the provi in different sections of the province con-

cerning crop conditions. In general the crop report as given by W. R. Reek, secretary of agriculture, is encouraging. Hay and potatoes are particularly good, and garden vegetables also, in spite of the wet spring and early summer. Mr. Reek's report is as follows:

The season of 1917 has been peculiar and while some crops give evidence of enormous yield others are late and as yet it is rather difficult to form an estimate because early fall frosts have to be reckoned with.

### Russian Drive Continues

Gaining momentum as it moves westward the great Russian drive along the Dutester in Galicia continues successfully. The fighting is progressing on a fifty mile front from Hallos to the foothills of the Carpathians and all along the line the Russians are advancing.

Northwest of Halics on Thursday the Russians enlarged their gains north of the Dniester, capturing important heights between the river and Bukazowice, and occupied two villages. This advance is in the direction of Lemberg. In the centre and on the southern end of the line the Russians have been

victorious in heavy battles for the possession of the crossings of the river Lomnites. They have made progress on the road to Dolina and have captured the crossings of the Lomnica at Perehinsko, about fifteen miles south of Kalusz, and four miles west of Bohorodozany. A probable resumption of heavy fighting on the western front north of the Pripet marshes and in Roumania is indicated. On the Dvina and Shara rivers

and near Smorgon, north of Pinsk, there has been more active infantry fighting. No determined attack, however, has yet developed. The Russian advance west of Stanislau besides endangering the Austro-German line immediately north in Galicia, also is a threat against the line in Roumania. The Russian and Roumanian artillery has been hammering the Teutonic positions there in the past few days and already advance parties have been thrown forward to test the enemy's strength. No attack in force has been







Will Provide Comforts for and Attend to Welfare of Flying

Convalescent Home Will be Arranged For-Duties and Privil-ges of Membership - Gift of Aerodrome

The last few weeks have seen the in auguration of a new war activity on the part of women which promises speedily to become a very valuable auxiliary to the air service in Canada, This originated with a few ladies, all relatives of officers in the Royal Naval Air Service or the Royal Flying Corps, whose idea was that there was a distinct need of some organization that would provide comforts for, and attend to the welfare of, the many hundreds of cadets and men of the Royal Flying Corps, or who will be stationed at the various barracks, schools of instruction, and aerodromes, that already are, or will be established in Canada, with headquarters of the Royal Flying Corps at Toronto. The organization is called the Canadian Aviation Aid Club, or "C. A. A. C.," as it is already known among

its members.

At one of the inaugural meetings last month, Col. W. Hamilton Merritt emphasized the need of a club such as this. He laid stress on the fact that the Royal Flying Corps, being an imperial army unit, has not the advantages of a grant unit, has not the advantages of a grant either from the dominion government or from the city, as most Canadian units have, and that it is therefore necessary that anything (apart from their pay) to be done for the comfort and welfare of the cadets and men in Canada shall be the cadets and men in Canada shall be undertaken by some such organization as this, or by individual enterprise.

The C. A. A. C., having organized itself, will now apply itself—in view of a generous gift by Mr. Robins of the use of a large tract of land in North Toronto for the establishment of an aero-drome—to the speedy acquisition of a suitable building, to be used as a combined convalescent home and aviation club house.





### Colossal War Activity Of United States

The progress of the United States' preparations to wage offensive warfare is not being reported in a detailed way. Some information on that point, says the Toronto Star, may not be amiss. A preliminary war budget of three billion dollars has been approved. A two-billion dollar bond issue has been over-subscribed by fifty per cent. One billion dollars in cash has been advanced to the other allied nations. A few days after the delevation of year allowed. dollars in cash has been advanced to the other allied nations. A few days after the declaration of war a large flotilla of American destroyers with parent or supply vessels left for British waters. Temporarily the American Admiral Sims now is in charge of operations off the Irish coast. The allies also put Admiral Caperton with a squadron of Pacific coast cruisers in command of anti-submarine operations in the South Atlantic, the Franch and British warships there have been undergoing training with a view to officering the American expeditionary forces. At least 20,000 American troops have been landed in France. Ten million men have registered for military service. By the end of July the selective process will be completed, and 500,000 active troops and 126,000 reserve troops will be put into training. In addition to this the regular army has been increased from 100,000 to 150,000. The Marine Corps has been increased from 17,000 to nearly 80,000. The navy has been recruited from 60,000 up to 126,000. Nine regiments composed entirely of experienced railway men have been spent on orders for cannon, machine guns, and other war material. Hundreds of fast submarine non, machine guns, and other war ma-terial. Hundreds of fast submarine chasers are under construction, and a colossal merchant ship-building programme already is far advanced. Work is being rushed on the largest fleet of aircraft contemplated by any belligerent. The United States intends to render the allies in Europe invaluable help this year and to bring its military strength into play next year with overpowering effect. The biggest blunder Germany has made since she risked a conflict with Britain was her courting of the hostility of the United States.

## **British Labor** And the War

The way in which organized labor in Great Britain has adjusted itself to the inescapable duties imposed upon the country by the war, makes an interestcountry by the war, makes an interestlng story as told by Sidney Webb in
lhe North American Review for June.

It will readily be recalled, says the
Toronto Star, how widespread the fear
was that trades unionism, being as
strong as it was, would make trouble
for the military authorities in taking
those measures which so serious a war made necessary. This fear hung over everything, and even when matters had got going fairly well, there was a recur-rence of the fear when it was found necessary to resort to conscription. But even that did not produce the dreaded

The explanation of it all is, we believe, to be found in the fact that real statesto be found in the fact that real states-manship was applied to the case. Where politicians would have failed, statesmen succeeded. Instead of regarding trades unionism as a force necessarily hostile to the purposes of government, and therefore to be either overborne or cir-cumvented, the strength of trades union-ism was conceded, the importance of the organization it possessed was recogniz-ed, and its co-operation was frankly ed, and its co-operation was frankly sought on terms favorable to both labor and the nation. Not only were the leaders of organized labor called into consulers of organized labor called into consultation in matters of policy in connection with the production of munitions and supplies, but co-operation went much farther than that, and the organizations, as such, were given a recognition which will make their position and public responsibility permanent. Nothing but the crisis of the war could have brought about so sane a relation between organized government. nized labor and organized government in Great Britain.

# Churches Must be Made Over if They Are To

but the words enshrine a principle which is of considerable significance in the domain of religion. Are the boys coming home to the old routine? Is there any adjustment to be made to meet the needs of our fighting men? For anyone to suggest that all this upheaval can pass and leave things as they were would be a dismal proof of how soundly some Christian people can sleep. What then will be the characteristics of the church of tomorrow?

In the first place the church must have a plan of campaign and be enterprising in carrying it out. She must throw herself whole-heartedly into the business of the Kingdom of God. This is the very least that will be expected by the men who have been doing their bit in this bloody business, this most recent phase of the age long conflict between the Kingdom of God and the Kingdom of Satan. While keeping her needle true to the evangel the church will cull out the herole in men by giving them a job worthy of their calibre. Never again can the church attract by bleasant evenings and sociables. She must endue men with the spirit of the Crusaders and send them out to win trophies for the Glory of their Master.

As the long, thrilling months of the war have followed each other there has been in the churches the cumulative conviction that the methods of approach to the man before the war were much too soft and sentimental and not nearly robust and virile enough. The result was that the moral forces which were hidden and unguessed, and which have been kindled into activity by a great national appeal, lay dormant when they should have been kept aroused by the spiritual appeal. The church needs something of that magnificent frenzy which counts life worth having only for the accomplishment of great deeds. ### ITALY'S MUTILATED SOLDIERS

Crippled Heroes Are Taught
Trades by Which They May
Gain a Living — The Work at Villa Mirafiori, Rome

Villa Mirafiori in Rome, the former residence of the American Academy, residence of the American Academy, has generously been placed at the disposition of the government for the use of mutilated soldiers ever since the beginning of the war. The lovely position of Villa Mirafiori, situated outside of Porta Pia on the Via Nomentana in the midst of large shady grounds, makes it a charming place for the soldiers to spend their time of confinement. The Villa has been thoroughly equipped with all modern medical and surgical conveniences, its large halls and rooms beveniences, its large halls and rooms being turned into dormitories, operating

coms, laboratories, etc.

Thanks to modern methods of science and to recent orthopedic improvements, there is the possibility, today, of rendering the mutilated less handicapped than formerly. Their so-called re-education,

enables him to use a scythe, sickle, raise or pair of shears.

When they first enter Villa Mirafori the mutilated soldiers have to undergo a minute medical examination, of which a careful record is kept. They are weighed, measured and put under X-ray examination, massage and heliotherapeutic treatment usually following. Eight voluntary Red Cross nurses aid the doctors in this department.

First the men are given temporary limbs made of felt and hardened plaster, which they sometimes wear two and three months; afterwards, when the physical condition of the injured part allows it, they undergo the application of their fixed limb, made of wood and leather, which permits articulation and free movements. With these they are able to walk so naturally after a while that one scarcely detects the difference between nature's own and science's contrivance.

A jolly group of soldiers was walking to the dining-hall for their dinner when I was visiting the place, and a nurse called my attention to one of them who had lost both feet, but who was walking ever so well with his two new wooden ones. One of his comrades, noticing my look of interest, jollily laughed out and said, with his rich southern accent:—"Well, at least he won't be sensitive about people stepping on his toes any more; mine are always in the way." Another jokingly added: "He won't be bothered with chilbiains either!"

Their cheerful spirit and happy disposition, even when maimed for life, are but a confirmation of the ever-buoyant and optimistic nature of the Italian soldiers.





L. fact that not from soldiers in camp, or fact that not from soldiers in camp, or quarters, or trench, or on blood-drenched battlefields are heard any word or chant of hate against the Hun. 
