This has resulted from hot weather following rain during a few days. The weather has been well adapted to the promotion of growth, but, owing to rain, grain has been slow in maturing.

The month of August to date has had a rain fall in excess of six inches at the Dominion Experimental Station in this city. This is far in excess of the average.

Cook and Herbert Smith believe that this threat of destruction is the only weapon they have left with which to fight the owners who are now reconciled to a finish light and are confident of a victory which will enable them to settle the dispute on a district basis instead of a national basis which would break the oower of the Miners' Federation.





COMMANDER JOHN RODGERS, WHO TRIED PACIFIC FLIGHT, K

NOTED AIRMAN PLANE CRASHES

Machine Falls in Delaware River; Mechanic is Injured.

Canadian Press Despatch PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 30—Commander John Rodgers is dead.

The hero of the attempted nonstop flight across the Pacific from San Francisco to Honolulu and of the subsequent 9-day drift of the PN-9 in the treacherous waters, died in the Philadelphia Navy Yard base hospital Friday, 39 minutes after a type V-7 landplane he was piloting fell into the Lelaware near the naval flying field, it was announced here today.

Commander Rodgers left Anacosts

commander Rodgers left Anacosta flying field, near Washington to fly here for the purpose of conferring with aviation officials regarding proposed flights in California prior to another attempt to cross the Pacific. Although his plane was of the land type, he followed the river in coming from the south. He had circled the field to pick his landing and make sure that other planes were not to take off or land, as is customary.

tomary.

Officers and men at the navy yard, had been watching the plane as it cirled and descended, ready for its final gliding swoop to the ground. The plane was over the river heading for the field, and descending rapidly, when it sideslipped about 70 feet from the shore, and at a height of 30 feet.

Rodgers worked frantically to take the plane out of the slip, but apparthe plane out of the slip, but apparently his low altitude and speed harassed him and the machine dived into the water on the right wing, burying its nose in the soft mud of the river bottom, and leaving only a portion of the left wing exposed.

Commander Rodgers and his aviation mechanic mate, Samuel Schultz, were strapped to their seats. There was no opportunity for them to release their belts, so that they might attempt to save themselves.

Schultz was badiy bruised and did not regain consciousness for several hours. Because of his condition, he was not questioned concerning the accident.
