



S., May 6-One of Cape Breton's most interesting relics of the early days of Canada's history was destroyed by fire yesterday afterfoon when the Lynk House, situated on the edge of the city, went up in flames while the occupants were in town attending the celebration in honor of John C. Miles, Sydney Mines run-her, who won the Boston Marathon

tace a fortnight ago.

The old house dated back to the time when Cape Breton was a separate province. It was finished in 1797. The fireplaces, foundations and chimneys were constructed of material brought from the fortress at Louisburg, much of it being brought out to Canada by

French governors.

For years the house was the residence of Richard Gibbon, Chief Justice of the province of Cape Breton. Chief Justice and Mrs. Gibbon were captured by a French man-o'-war while making a voyage to England during the war of 1812. Mrs. Gibbon was released but her husband died in a French prison. The house has been occupied by Donald Lynk, who was the owner.
Yesterday afternoon the fire broke out while practically the whole neighborhood was in town for the celebration and when discovered the structure





ANSWER:
Every employer should treat the girls who work for him as he would wish some other man to treat his daughters if they were thrown out into the world to earn their own bread and butter. And to the everlasting honor of American business men, they usually do observe this golden rule.

There are a few lecherous old brutes who take advantage of a girl's necessity to earn her living, and to support those dependent upon her by making her pay for her job by submitting to their loathsome caresses. There are also a few philanderers who are dastards enough to play upon a girl's sympathy by telling her how unhapplly married they are, and who for the mere excitement of a passing filtration will win her heart, only to break it.

But these cases are few and far between, and in the great majority of business houses a ship with her is jsut as impersonal as it is with any male employe. There are a few lecherous old brutes who

When a girl goes into business she should leave sex behind her. She is deliberately coming in competition with men, and she has no right to ask for any favors because she is a woman, or expect to be treated differently from the way a man is treated. expect to be treated differently from the way a man is treated.

Her employer should treat her fairly, and give her fair pay or good work. He should treat her with courtesy and consideration.

It a business office is not a drawing room, and she has no right object to his smoking, or expect him to sharpen her pencils or pick up her notebooks, and she is an idiot if she bursts into tears every time a hard-worked, nerve-racked, worried man is irritable or finds fault with her work.

But it is no part of a stenographer's duty to listen to her employer's domestic troubles, nor to sympathize with him because his wife doesn't really understand him. Neither is it proper for him to take her out to dinners and the theatre and joy-riding when his wife is out of town.

To the boy who is just starting to work, I would make three suggestions: The first is to try to find out what he wants to do in the world.

To study himself, and decide what it is he likes best to do, the thing for which he has an aptitude, the thing that he enjoys doing. For it is only in doing the work that we enjoy doing for its own sake that we ever

Then, having decided upon what he wants to do, to learn how to do it well, go to some school where he can be taught to do his work scientifically.

This is the day of experts. There is no place in it for bunglers. It doesn't make a particle of difference what line of work a boy takes up. He will be successful in it if he does superlatively good work, and be a failure

My final suggestion is not to be afraid of doing more work than

It is the little extra work, the hour or two overtime; the finishing up of a job before you quit, that is the margin between success and failure. The man who gives it arrives at the top of the ladder. The man who throws down his tools on the strike of the clock stays put at the bottom.

Work. Good work. Hard work. Intelligent work. Working with some definite goal in view. Giving to an employer the kind of work that you would like some one to give you. In that is all the law and the prophets about how to succeed.

You can't spank a girl of 18, no matter how much she needs it. If you tried it, the probable result would be to make her run off and marry some good-for-nothing boy.

So you will have to find other means of dealing with her, and the first thing that I would suggest is to take her to a good doctor, and have a thorough physical examination made. If a girl who has a naturally sweet and amiable disposition suddenly gets cross and irritable, the chances are that it is the result of some nervous disorder, and the sooner you find out what the trouble is, the better it will be.

Then, if you can possibly afford it, send her away to a girl's camp this summer. The outdoor air, the exercise, the order and routine, and, above all, the camp spirit works wonders in girls, and I regard girl camps as among the most valuable regenerative agencies, bodily and spiritually, in the world.

When a girl gets discontented and peevish at home, she needs a change. She needs to get away from home and from her family, and to have to shift for herself.

Among strangers, she will have to control herself. She will have to give as well as take. She will have to be polite and courteous, and she will find out that nobody will put up with her ways, or overlook her lapses in good manners. It will do her a world of good, and she will come home appreciating home comforts and mother love as she never did before.

Without doubt, the adolescent girl is hard to deal with. She is in a transition state between womanhood and childhood, when she has all the faults of both and the virtues of neither. She is upset in mind and body, and it takes the patience of Job and the wisdom of Solomon to deal with

Just try to realize that 18 isn't to be taken too seriously. Don't worry over your daughter's little faults. Be as blind as you can, and in a little while she will outgrow her disagreeable traits. We have all been through the time when we knew more than our parents and resented their every word of advice.



The report showed that 25,000 seamen had made use of the Institute; letter written numbered 2,900; visits made to ships, 65; services held, seven; money exchanged, \$3,000; money deposited, \$350; magazines, 3,400; free beds, 715; free meals, 303; ships' concerts,

Several ships' concert parties visited the Institute during the year and en-tertained the sailors. At these concerts the Ladies' Auxiliary served refresh-ments to the seamen. Social activities were cancelled during January owing to the accident which occurred at the Institute early on New Year's morn-

Musical entertainments were provided by parties from the Montrose, Melita, Metagama and Montclare. Moving picture shows had to be cancelled, as a price was now charged for films formerly given free for charitable pur-

poses.

The hospital work was efficiently carried on by Mrs. Finnamore and Mrs. Watt. The men in hospitals were provided with fruit, smokes and writing materials.

The Christmas treat for the sailors

was fairly well patronized. In place of the regular Christmas bag, the Ladies' Guild distributed refreshments, smokes and Testaments to the seamen.

The apperance and convenience of the concert hall had been improved by the erection of a new platform, the installation of footlights and the construction of stage settings. Telephone connections were made between the

office and canteen.



GHANDI MOVEMENT.

The headquarters of Baptist missions in India are Parlakemidi, Sarango, Beobili and Chicacole. They are widely separated stations covering approximately a stretch of nearly 400 miles by 40 miles wide along the coast of the Bay of Bengal, north of the city of Madras and south of Calcutta. Miss Harrison says that India is undoubtedly true to the Union Jack. The Ghandi movement of non-co-operation and inactivity in public affairs, in which Mohammedans and Hindus joined forces a couple of years ago, seemed to have been broken up by internal dissensions between these two native people. This made it easier for English authority, to whom all castes seem to look for peace and justice.

TRUST THE BRITISH.
