I ONDON, Oct. 20 - London awoke today to find emblazoned on the front pages of the newspapers the texts of the momentous decisions reached at Locarno, which virtually make further wars in Europe impossible. Such editorial notice as the agree ments receive in this morning's news-papers is quite favorable, although nowhere are they hailed as absolutely securing the future peace of Europe. They are described as "a promisir attempt to return to the old fami party of Europe and to arrange quarels on the basis of reason."

IMPORTANT STEP. "They offer some assurance of peace," "they are not ideal in several respects, but constitute an important step toward peace," "all depends on the sincerity and continuance of the friendly spirit," "if the Locarno pact should fail, nothing would succeed."

John Gillis Speaks for Cossar Farm in Case of Boys

Says They Left of Own Accord and Would Not Give Assurance of Work.

John Gillis, representing the Cossar Farm, said this morning that the story told by four Scotch lads who arrived in the city yesterday was not correct as applying to treatment received at the Cossar Farm.

Mr. Gillis said: "These boys arrived in Montreal some years ago and have been at the Boys' Hostel there. They were sent by that institution to Cossar Farm, Gagetown. When they arrived at the farm the superintendent had no information whatever about them. The story of the boys that the manager would have nothing to do with them is false. He offered them board and bed until such time as he could get information from Montreal. The boys absolutely refused to work and left the farm of their own free will.

"Cossar Farm had no control and could not demand that they stay. When it was learned at the farm that they were in distress here, I, representing the farm, called at the Salvation Army shelter and offered to pay their expenses while in the city and their fare to Cossar Farm, provided they would work while waiting definite instructions from Montreal. They refused to give the assurance they would work and the farm could not aid them.

"Cossar Farm has received and edu-Mr. Gillis said: "These boys arrived

"Cossar Farm has received and educated some 500 Scotch boys, most of whom have remained in New Brunswick. The farmers throughout this province are continually making applications for boys and Cossar Farm, with the good reputation it has built up, could not afford to recommend boys that refuse to work and where these boys were not prepared to work, Cossar Farm could not assist them."


THE INSANE MURDERER.

ASKED BY MILLION U. S. Secretary of Treasury Would Cut \$250,000,000

From Assessment. WASHINGTON, Oct. 19-A tax re-

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19—A tax reduction of \$250,000,000 to \$300,000,000 was recommended to Congress of the United States today by Secretary of the Treasury Mellon.

Without attempting to lay down definite schedules, he suggested that a reduction in surtaxes to 20 per cent in place of the present 37 per cent, would not cripple the treasury.

This would reduce the maximum tax, surtax and normal, levied on the largest income to 25 per cent. It now is 42 per cent.

Repeal of the estate tax.
Repeal of the gift tax.
Reduction of automobile taxes by repeal of the levies on trucks, tires and taxes, such as that on works of art brought from abroad.


