## CANADIAN GOES IN SEARCH OF FOSSIL

Manitoba University Man Seeks Giganticaurus Africanus, 80,00,000 Years Old.

New York, Feb. 5 .- On the steam ship Cameronia yesterday sailed W. F. Cutter of the University of Manitoba, Winnipeg, who goes to East Africa in search of fossil known to scientists as search of fossil known to scientists as the Gigantisaurus Africanus. The spe-cimen is said to be at least eight mil-lion years old. The scientist will take with him into the jungle more than 100 native carriers. The heat in the section of the fossil bed ranges from 130 to 140 degrees.

New York Reports Worst Storm in Years in Vicinity of Milwaukee.

(By Canadian Press.) New York, Feb. 5-Weather that today ran the gamut from mild temperatures in sections of Lower Michigan to drifted snows farther north and sleeted streets, wires and rails, brought a to of at least three dead, damage that is roughly estimated at upward of a million dollars and demolished traffic and commu-

nication in many places. Telegraph and telephone companies report that the havoc to their wires centred in an area of about forty miles around Chicago but the octopus arms of the storm extended in every direction from that centre. The worst storm in years, according to reports, damaged telephone and transportation lines in the vicinity of Milwaukee to the extent of one million dollars. Several trains in the state were reported stalled in snowdrifts. Banks of snow in some parts of Wisconsin were said to be ten

A tornado accompanied by rain and hail caused damage placed at \$100,000 at Haubstadt, Ind. # A, ROSS CLAIMS **3RD DISCOVERY**

North End Man Reports Finding Method of Soldering Aluminum.

On top of his recent notable discoveries,—processes of hardening copper and aluminum,—Arthur Ross of 40 Main street, said last night that he had found a method of soldering aluminum. This success in his research work was attained on last Saturday. His method under several tests, it was said, showed a perfect joint and solid material. Mr. Ross said that he is daily continuing his experiments with aluminum and has attained surprising results. He says he has already received offers from some of the largest smeltering firms for his secret formula for hardening aluminum, but so far has not accepted any.

He is now formulating plans for starting a plant for the manufacture of his new solder and expects to make a definite announcement in the near future.

It will be recalled that a few weeks go Mr. Ross discovered methods of empering copper and aluminum, each distinctly different from the other. He has been experimenting with these metals for some years and is now satisfied that the results attained can stand every test.

# EARLY BODY BUILDING.

As the twig is bent so is the tree inclined. If babyhood days have been wisely spent in storing up energy and strength, and one has been fortunate enough to have escaped wasting disease, the baby will come into a childhood legacy of a healthy, properly nourished body.

Winter Cut Will Run Over 10,000,000 Feet-Sixteen Inch Deals.

If the average person were asked if there was any lumber left in St. John county the reply would probably be that pulpwood and small stuff for laths was all that was to be found. This answer would be wrong, as there is one operation at Black River where trees are being cut that give four loss and some of them will cut a sixteen inch deal, which is almost as good as ever was cut from spruce in the province. The cut this year in St. John county will run over 10,000,000 feet of lumber, and is furnishing employment to a large number of men.

In the Black River operation the total cut will run to about 6,000,000 of which about 4,000,000 will be sawed into lumber this winter and the remaining 2,000,000 sawed next summer. At the present time two mills are operating there with three mill crews, one of the mills being operated on a twenty hour schedule, with day and night crews. Over 250 men are employed altogether here. Logs not being sawed are being piled on the banks of Emmerson Creek and will be driven in the spring to the Bay Shore and sawed there.
