





Economy Hints For Housewives

Meatless Meats and Iceless Icebox Demonstrated in Calvin Hall Yesterday

This week's Friday demonstration in the Calvin hall under the auspices of the Housewives' League was greatly appreciated by an unusually large number of interested members and friends and the talks which were also given were particularly appropriate. Miss Hazel Winter, former superintendent of Women's Institutes for the province showed how to make meatless supper or dinner dishes and explained how properly balanced meals should be planned. One of the new pyrex dishes was used and proved very satisfactory. Mrs. Richard Hooper, convenor of the demonstrations, had on exhibition a very simple form of iccless refrigerator which she had been asked to show. The catalogue of the combined exhibition of the war gardens association and the St. John Housewives' League were distributed and members were specially urged to compete in the exhibition in the canned goods and war bread classes.

Not Ahead of St. John

Mrs. Hooper, in opening the meeting, drew the attention of the members to the fact that Montreal was making special arrangements to have demonstrations by a French chef of the best ways of using good food that was often discarded. Among his chief dishes was the cod's head chowder which Mrs. Raymond had so ably demonstrated at one of the previous meetings. Mrs. Raymond was very highly complimented on the most excellent work which she has done for the league.

In connection with the exhibition of canned goods and breads Mrs. Hooper asked that every member make a special effort to send in at least one exhibit. Announcement was made by her that the next league meeting would be held on Monday evening and would be presided over by Mrs. Lawlor. Its chief subject for consideration would be the sending out of the voluntary rationing

schemes.

Miss Winter is a most capable demonstrator and her method of showing how to make vegetable loaf and mock Hamburg steak was followed with much attention and interest. She added greatly to the value of her demonstration by giving recipes for the dishes made and for others of a similar vegetarian nature. While the dishes were being cooked, the vegetable loaf was baked in one of the new pyrex transparent ware pans. Miss Winter explained the values of foods in the terms of heat producing units or calories and illustrated her points by means of sample menus. She then asked for volunteers to promise to practice at home the making of scientific menus for one week. Several memific menus for one week. Several mem-ers pledged themselves to do so. When the cooking process was completed the mock steak and vegetable loaf were passed round and were unanimously agreed to be very tempting and purchasers were not hard to find.





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

All in all, with the old Noyon salient now virtually blotted out—with all its roads and strategic points in the hands of the French—and with St. Quentin to the north seriously menaced by the British and the Germans in retreat from the Vesle to the Aisne, it seems apparent that the Germans soon must hurriedly reestablish their entire battlefront in the west.





MUNITION MAKING CHILE AROUSED BE GALLED UP FOR Chairman of War Industries Board Says Many Thousands Must Be Prepared—Important Decision

AMERIGAN WOMEN TO

Washington, Sept. 7—Many thousands of women must be prepared to enter munition factories and other war industries as soon as the War Department begins to issue its calls to the colors under the new man-power legislation, according to a statement made today by Bernard M. Baruch, chairman of the war industries board. While large numbers of women already are doing this kind of work, Mr. Baruch indicated that the situation now faced would call for their induction into the industries on a scale which had not been generally anticipated. He expressed the opinion also that the women of the nation were eager and equipped to shoulder the task, and that their particiaption on a large scale would prove "an immense stimulation to production."

It was suggested by Mr. Baruch that the women gould do much of the mu

the regulations may be framed on a basis which will best serve the interests of the nation.

One of the important decisions announced today was that bankers and persons engaged in other occupations and employment not heretofore regarded by district boards as warranting deferred classification on the ground of necessary industries, many now claim deferred classification on the ground that their work is necessary to the nation in the present emmergency.


