U. S. MINISTER TOO TALKATIVE FOR HIS POSITION

Washington, July 6-Formal announcenent of the resignation of George Fred Williams as minister to Greece and Monnegro was made late today at the state

megro was made late today at the state epartment.
Secretary Bryan issued this statement ithout comment:
"Mr. Williams requests Secretary Bryan to tender to the president his resignation as minister to Greece and Montegro. He says the reason for his resignation is that he cannot comment upon he situation in Albania as he would like inder the restraint imposed by his dipomatic position, and that he does not eel that he can conscientiously keep lient with the knowledge which he has if what is being done.
"He says that he considers the success of the president more important to the world than all of the efforts of other nen, and does not wish to embarras him and wishes to thank him for the confideration which has been shown him." President Wilson is expected to accept the resignation tomorrow and close the brief and extraordinary career of Mr. Williams as a diplomat.
