The Problem of Labor.

The question of securing sufficient labor is still under consideration. Representatives of organized labor will again meet in Ottawa this week. The provincial agricultural representatives have, it is stated, already laid before, the government tentative proposals. These, it is understood, are pretty well along the lines advocated at the conference held in Regina some time past, and partly included in the resolutions of the Manitoba Grain Growers at Brandon a fortnight ago. Mobilization of man, woman and boy power is advocated, it is believed, though whether this involves a degree of conscription is not known. On this question there appears to be a wide divergence of opinion among the agricultural and the labor men, the latter being entirely opposed to any compulsion of labor for work. The system of labor exchanges will, it is expected, go far toward the mobilization of labor on a voluntary basis.

London, Feb. 4—The text of the official statement on the Versailles conference follows:—

"Meetings of the third session of the supreme war council held at Versailles, January 30 and 31, February 1 and 2.

"In addition to the members of the supreme war council, namely, Monsieurs Ciemenceau and Pichon, for France; Mr. Lloyd George and Lord Milner, for Great Britain; Prof. Orlando and Baron Sonnino for Italy, and the military with the views of democracy in Great Britain. The council may declare these for Great Britain; Prof. Orlando and Baron Sonnino for Italy, and the military representatives of the supreme war council, Generals Waygend, Wilson, Cadorna and Bliss, there were also present, tor the greater part of the purely military discussions, the French and British chiefs of general staffs, Generals Foch and Robertson; the Italian minister of war, General Alsieri(and the commanders in chief on the western front. secretary of the United States embassy at Paris, was present during the political discussions.

"The decisions taken by the supreme war council in pursuance of this contingent embrace not only a general military policy to be carried out by the Allies in all the principal theatres of the war, but more particularly, a closer and more effective co-ordination under the council of all the efforts of the powers engaged in the struggle against the Centeal Employment further political cutive functions and it expects enlightenment through parliament. The Times calls the Versailles statement eminently satisfactory, and says it tends to dispel the deceptive fog of peace which has been gathering and has been artificially thickened in many allied capitals during the dreary months of winter. powers engaged in the struggle against the Central Empires.

COUNCIL'S FUNCTIONS ENLARGED. "The functions of the council itself were enlarged, and the principles of unity of policy and action initiated at Rapello in November last, received still further concrete and practical development. On all these questions a complete agreement was arrived at, after the fullest discussion, with regard both to the policy

to be pursued and to the measures for its execution. "Under the circumstances the supreme war council decided that the only immediate task before them lay in the prosecution of the war with the utmost vigor and the closest and most effective co-operation of the military effort of the Allies until such time as the pressure of that effort shall have brought about in the enemy governments and peoples a change of temper which would justify the hope of the conclusion of peace on terms which would not involve the abandonment, in the face of an aggressive and unrepentant militarism, of all the principles of freedom, justice and respect for the law of nations which the Allies are resolved to vindicate.



Ottawa, Feb. 3-The main result of the conference of the representatives of organized labor with the government during the past week has been the securing of labor's consent to the principle of compulsory national registration of the man and woman power of Canada. To this measure of basic compulsory comade by the withdrawal of men for military service, organized labor has consented. To any suggestion for the actual conscription of labor for agricultural work, for transportation, for munition, manufacture, etc., the labor leaders are unequivocally opposed and they are further emphatically opposed to the bringing in of Chinese or other oriental labor for farm work, although they raise no objection to the scheme of securing additional farm help from the United States.

One further tangible result of the conference is the agreement of the labor men to the government's proposals for a system of government labor bureau, replacing the individual employment agencies and insuring an adequate basis for co-ordination, supervision and direction of the labor supply to the nation-wide demand. 


