Interesting Comparisons Which Show Conditions in Several Avenues of Irish Life as Contrasted to Those of Ten Years Age

(Times' Special Correspondence)
Dublin, May 10—Should the plan of the
covernment be realised, the Home Rule Dublin, May 10—Should the plan of the government be realised, the Home Rule bill would find its way to the statute book in May, 1914, and come into operation in January, 1915. The Irish parliament would meet in the May following, and before the end of that year there would have to be a general election for the imperial parliament. The date of the appeal to the country is, of course, much in the discretion of the government, but report credits them with the intention to let the general election precede the elections for the Irish parliament.

If this be done it would be due entirely to tactical considerations, and the object attributed to the government is to secure the Irish vote in British constituencies. In this way they would hope to win twenty-eight additional seats. Another consideration is that if they were beaten, the presence of the home rule bill on the statute book would be a source of embasrassment to the Unionists.
