To the Representatives of the Order in Grand Division assembled: Officers and Brothers—

Accept of our cordial fraternal greeting—and I beseech you to unite with me in invoking the Blessing of the Most High to rest upon our Session, so that our united labors may result in the furtherance of the principles of our Order and the best interests of our country.

The Report of the Most Worthy Scribe to the National Division has reached me since our Semi-Annual Session, and gives the most gratifying assurance of the sound and progressive state of the Order in North America; and it may justly afford us sincere pleasure to learn that the Grand Division of Canada West stands in point of numbers and influence second to none other in the world. As to the indications of progress amongst ourselves, they are various. The Annual Reports of the Order of Good Templars exhibit unprecedented success in that organization. Several movements of importance have taken place amongst the friends of Temperance, unconnected with either that Order or the Order of the Sons.

The true and reliable criterion of the state of our own Order must be found in the Statistical Return of your Grand Scribe, which will be laid before you.

Reports of Deputy Grand Worthy Patriarchs bear the same features as in times past: some cheering and chronicling decided advancement; some contending with opposition, and yet with manly determination holding their own; some reporting decline of Divisions under their jurisdiction.

The experience of former years has proved that the summer season is not the most propitious one for sustaining the workings of our Subordinate Divisions, although affording favorable opportunities for public demonstrations, and thus operating for good on the public mind; and we believe in no season has this feature in the Temperance movement been more successfully maintained than in the one now past. I embrace in this statement the result of the labors and active co-operation of all the existing organizations.

We have, however, indications of the progress of Temperance principles upon the public mind, independently of these direct and ostensible efforts, which we deem to be of a very important character, and which if properly estimated must cheer and encourage all to increased perseverance.

It is very true that the efforts of the Hon. M. Cameron to obtain the enactment of even a stringent License Law at the last Session of the Legislature did not succeed; and it is also undoubtedly true that a majority of the Representatives of the present House, including the Ministry (with perhaps one exception), appeared both in their personal conduct and in their Legislative actions to be hostile to everything that would favor legal or prohibitive legislation, and yet their proceedings bear evidence that the efforts of the friends of Temperance have not been in vain; but that they are unostentatiously yet effectively beginning to bring forth fruits.

The first evidence of this we have in our new Municipal Act, wherein by section Seventy-Three it is declared that "No Inn-keeper or Saloon-keeper shall be qualified to be a Member of the Council of the Corporation."

Can the most earnest Temperance advocate set forth in terms more forcible and impressive the nature and influence of that occupation upon community, when it is declared by the solemn dictum of our Legislators that he that follows it must do so under a serious statutory disqualification.

But we have upon our Statute-book a still more significant "sign of the times," and one which in fact yields to us the essential ground of prohibitive legislation. So irresistible have become the convictions of the evils of whisky and whisky drinking upon the highest interests of our country; so patent the prostitution of one of our dearest privileges, the elective franchise, to their baneful influences, that even the present Ministry, with all its apparent contempt of Temperance Legislation, has given the strongest proof of the force of these convictions.

In the recent "Elective Franchise Act" an effort—we will say an honest effort—appears to have been made to secure the purity of Elections, and as an important and essential provision the thirteenth section enacts as follows:

"Every hotel, tavern and shop in which spirituous or fermented liquors or drinks are ordinarily sold, shall be closed during the two days appointed for polling in the Wards of Municipalities in which the polls are held, in the same manner that it should be on Sunday during Divine Service; and no spirituous or fermented liquors or drinks shall be sold or given during the said period, under a penalty of twenty-five pounds against the keeper thereof if he neglects to close it, and under a like penalty if he sells or gives any spirituous or fermented liquors or drinks as aforesaid."

Here then, my Brothers, we have our cardinal principle yielded—that is, Constitutional Prohibition.

The good of society demands the utmost care—the most essential guard for securing the purity of Elections—demands that the sale of spirituous or fermented liquors—aye, even the giving of them for drinks, shall be prohibited while the elections are in progress. And if it is constitutional for the good of society to prohibit the sale for two days, then it is so to prohibit for a week, for a year, forever.

Again—we invite your attention to an extract from the Presentment of the Grand Jury at the late Assize for the City of Toronto, and not so much to the declaration of the Jury affirming the fearful prevalence of the vice of drunkenness as to the admissions made by Chief Justice Draper in his reply to the Grand Jury. Other Juries in the same place have presented like facts, but learned Judges from the same Bench have scouted the idea of correcting such evils by legislation—or as they said, "to make men soher by legislation."

"In common," say the Jury, "with all past Grand Juries, the members of the present one cannot but reiterate their conviction, from painful experience, that the large proportion of crime and misery found in this city (and everywhere throughout the country) must be traced to the facilities furnished by the Municipal authorities for the sale of intoxicating drinks.

"There is no evil in society which more imperatively demands removal than this, yet everything seems here to indicate that it is on the increase, and our city is being famed for the depredations arising from drunkenness and the crimes it generates."

perhaps those of the most material character, can be remedied by your own influence as individual members of the community. You rightfully point out as one of the most fruitful sources of crime, the multiplication of places in which liquors are sold, and in which drunkenness prevails. I think this is certainly a most fruitful source of the crimes we have to investigate in the Courts of Justice; and yet, strange to say, while every public body and the public officers give their testimony, both unitedly and individually, in proof of the assertion, still the evil seems to be on the increase. Whether such a state of things must in the long run result in the taking away of the power, in relation to this matter, from the hands in which it is at present held, and having it placed in the hands of others, is not for me to say."

"This as well as some other points will probably compel the attention of the Legislature, should it not be speedily remedied."

His Lordship, you observe, admits, obscurely, unwillingly it may be, and yet the admission is plainly forced upon him, that the only hopeful remedy for this dreadful evil, is, in our phraseology, "the legal prohibition of the liquor traffic."

Looking then at these indications of the "signs of the times," and others might be enumerated, did we not fear being tedious, are we not warranted in saying that the principles of our good cause are progressing; and shall we not "thank God and take courage."

Let us remember too that upon us, as citizens, devolves the important duty of seeing that such Laws as we have reference to are enforced by the proper officers, lest they become a dead letter and a sign of contempt.

To avoid repetitions, I refer you to the Grand Treasurer's Report for the state of your finances, and to the Report of your efficient and indefatigable Grand Scribe for the Statistics of our Order. I have also requested the latter officer to embrace in his Report in detail the transactions which have taken place since our last Session in reference to the Frontenac Division, and the legal proceedings growing out of the necessity of protecting the interests of the Order from the insubordination of some of the late Officers and Members of said Division.

No progress has been made in the duty referred to your Grand Worthy Patriarch and Grand Scribe "to devise and procure such alterations in our Act of Incorporation as they may find necessary for the interests of our Order," because that until we have a decision from the Court upon the matters now pending, we could not determine what amendments or alterations may be required.

A strong conviction seemed to prevail amongst the Representatives at the last Session of the Grand Division that it was our duty again to petition the Legislature for the enactment of a Prohibitory Law.

I observe that a Committee has been appointed by the Grand Lodge of Good Templars, to confer with the Grand Division on this subject, and I trust such an arrangement will be consummated as will unite every friend, as well as every existing organization, in the vigorous prosecution of this work.

Another subject of said conference is the employment of a "competent Lecturer to labor in Canada West, under the instructions of both bodies."

These matters will require your careful and judicious consideration.

I am sure you will cordially participate in the pleasure of welcoming to a seat in our Council, our Brother, the Rev. H. A. Guild, Grand Worthy

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Patriarch of Eastern New York, and consequently the Representative of the first organized Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance.

Pursuing as we are the same great objects, let us cheerfully and freely

claim to benefit by his counsels.

And now, Brethren, Representatives and Legislators for our Order, let us with one heart and with one mind address ourselves to the business for which we have assembled here. Under a deep sense of our own shortsightedness and frailties, may we look with prayerful confidence for the spirit of wisdom to aid us in all our deliberations, and to determine our conclusions. Let us unitedly resolve that everything shall yield to the one great purpose of doing that which shall be for the best interests of the Order.

The choice of our Grand Officers for the coming year falls upon this Session, and it becomes us to approach that duty with the liveliest sense of its importance. In our choice let us, irrespective of personal or local preferences, seek to "put the right men in the right places," and then give them our

unqualified support in the discharge of their duties.

In resigning to other hands the trust which at two different periods you have honored me with, allow me to say that if in any case I may have given offence to any Brother, I sincerely regret it; if I have failed to discharge all the important and trying duties devolving upon me, be assured it has not been from want of will, but from lack of ability; and I beseech you accept of my most sincere thanks for the generous confidence and support you have always afforded me.

I have very great pleasure in bearing my unqualified testimony to the ardent and efficient labors, and unwearied devotion to our cause and interests, constantly manifested by your Grand Scribe; and I have deeply sympathized with him in the persecutions which he has been called to contend with, directed against him by inveterate enemies, as well as in the painful experience "which maketh the heart sick," caused by the desertion of some

who have proved to be false friends to him and to our cause.

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sion, and to report that with few exceptions the Order in this jurisdiction is in a peaceful and harmonious condition, and that our noble Order still maintains its proud position. It is true that apathy exists in some localities to a great extent, and it should be our aim, Brothers, to arouse such localities from their enervating lethargy, and to encourage our brethren to renewed and more brilliant exertions for the full fruition of our hopes and labors, the attainment of Legal Prohibition of the infernal traffic in intoxicating drinks.

The Permissive Bill which is being so ably advocated in Great Britain by its champions of Prohibition, is worthy of our notice. The Bill enunciates three great principles, and contends for "Prohibition upon physiological, economic, and moral grounds."

The continental governments in Europe are also giving some attention to this all-engrossing subject, whether viewed religiously, morally, economically or politically; everywhere the past year has been one of the most eventful ever witnessed for Temperance agitation and progression. The complete triumph of the principle of Prohibition in the State of Maine is of no small importance.

I trust that this Session of the Grand Division, of Representatives assembled from the extreme limits of your jurisdiction, will be the means of having our cause prosecuted still more vigorously, earnestly and efficiently than heretofore, and will give each of us more faith and increased impulse in the prosecution of the total suppression of the liquor traffic in this Province.

To make our efforts successful in the right direction, to remove this most fearful incubus, the liquor traffic, that presses out the very life of the body politic, this curse of curses that was ever permitted to afflict suffering humanity, we must go forth together, united, determined to toil in this great cause till the abominable traffic is annihilated. We must study how best to build up our Divisions as a base for future operations, to make our meetings more interesting and engaging, to enlist the sympathies of the youth of our country. Already we find that our ranks are being filled up with this interesting class who will soon fill our vacant places. And permit me to draw your attention to those veterans remaining within our pale and now thoroughly imbued with the great principles of Total Abstinence, who when the propitious time arrives, as arrive it must, are ready to make no little sacrifice for the cause they so ardently love.

It is also particularly cheering to find that our fair countrywomen are also coming in to assist our efforts and grace our meetings with their counsel and presence; in many instances the benign influence of our fair visitors is being felt and an increased interest manifested in a larger attendance at Division meetings.

Although we regret to find that we have not made great progress numerically during the past year, still we have maintained our ground, and have a band "faithful ever," "more than ten thousand men who will never bow the knee to Baal," and the efforts of these men of strong heads and pure hearts will, if properly directed, carry on the work successfully to a glorious consummation.

The important changes made in the Constitution of Subordinate Divisions, whereby each Division has been permitted to regulate its own "Initiation fees" and "Weekly dues," and also the privilege of suspending "Benefits"

altogether, and admitting "Youths of fourteen years of age," have been attended with marked benefit to many Divisions.

At the late Session of the National Division, Rules 21 and 23 of the Constitution of Grand Divisions were repealed. (All Committees can be either appointed by the Grand Worthy Patriarch or Grand Division, and all Grand Division Officers can be re-elected if desirable.)

Since the Semi-Annual Session, the usual business and business incidental to the office of Grand Scribe, have received my constant care and attention.

In consequence of increased correspondence, not to mention the financial accounts and other matters, the duties of the office during the past year have been exceedingly onerous.

The Journal of the Grand Division Proceedings was prepared with much care, 1000 copies were printed with neatness and dispatch, and forwarded to the Order. The Journal of the Proceedings of the National Division was also received and forwarded immediately to all Subordinate Divisions.

During the past year 225 sets of the new Ritual have been supplied to Subordinate Divisions, which work I am happy to state has given universal satisfaction; 2000 Ode Cards have been procured to supply the urgent demand for them.

The supply of the old Charters having become exhausted, I was obliged to procure one hundred printed in superior style. The Office is now well supplied with blanks, so that our printing bill will be small for next term.

Soon after the adjournment of the Semi-Annual Session, your Grand Scribe forwarded to the last Recording Scribe of the late Frontenac Division, official notice of the action of this Grand Division, with a copy of the Resolutions; the malcontents however took no heed of the same, and proceeded soon afterwards to the Hall and again broke open the doors.

Purged of these few malcontents who have so basely betrayed the trust, and repudiated their most solemn promises and obligations, the Order in Kingston will soon, under the blessing of God, resume its character, position and usefulness.

The Executive Officers entrusted with the charge of defending the lawsuit will present a Special Report respecting the case.

It is to be regretted that I cannot give a full Statistical Report at this time for the Quarter ending September, owing to the Returns from all the Subordinate Divisions not having been received at this Office; there are however sufficient at hand to show that the present state of the Order is encouraging.

There is one pleasing feature connected with these Returns, particularly significant of the efficient working of the Subordinate Divisions, namely, that within six weeks no less than 228 Divisions forwarded their Quarterly Returns.

My official year of office is now brought to a close. Allow me to present my grateful acknowledgments to my Brethren for their continued kindness and assistance in the discharge of the duties of the office of the Grand Scribe, and I must be permitted to express my deep sense of the many obligations under which I rest to our much beloved and laborious Grand Worthy Patriarch.

The Executive Committee reported progress with regard to the difficulty of the late Frontenac Division No. 2, of Kingston.

To the Officers and Representatives, in Grand Division assembled: Officers and Representatives—

The Executive Officers authorised by the Grand Division to take charge of and to defend a suit at law brought against its Officers in the discharge of official duty, by certain persons suspended by the authority of the Grand Division, of the Order of the Sons of Temperance, Canada West, beg leave respectfully to report:

That in accordance with instructions from the Grand Division, your Executive Officers applied for and procured a new trial, the Court deciding that the Defendants pay costs.

The case was argued at length before the Judge in Chambers, and the learned Judge a few days subsequently gave a decision in writing, granting a new trial.

The Attorneys retained for the Grand Division deemed it advisable for certain reasons to make it a special case to be argued before the Judges of the Court of Queen's Bench, the ensuing term at Toronto, to which the Attorney for the Plaintiffs, styling themselves the Frontenac Division Number Two, assented.

In the faithful discharge of duty in this interesting case, it was found necessary that considerable time and attention should be given to the whole matter. Your Executive Officers have had several interviews with leading gentlemen of the legal profession, and the inferences and probabilities are that this recusant party who have commenced litigation will eventually be defeated.

With regard to amendments contemplated in the Act of Incorporation for the Order under the jurisdiction of the Grand Division of Canada West, your Executive concluded to defer the matter, as nothing reliable could be proposed, and in fact the application for amendment would be altogether premature before a decision from the Court was procured. The following is the special case agreed upon between Mr. Draper, Attorney for the late Frontenac Division, and Mr. Henderson for Defendants:

#### In the Court of Queen's Bench.

#### SPECIAL CASE.

The Plaintiffs were originally constituted under the National Division of the Sons of Temperance of the United States, and became a Subordinate Division under the Grand Division of the Order of the Sons of Temperance of Canada West, and as such Subordinate Division were incorporated on the 8th April A.D. 1852, under the Provincial Statute passed 14 and 15 Victoria, chapter 159, and in accordance with the provisions thereof.

\*That the Plaintiffs as such Subordinate Division became and were amenable to the Constitution, Revised Rules, Rules of Order, and By-Laws of the Order, a copy of which are hereunto annexed.

That afterwards certain differences arose between the members of the said Frontenac Division, that some of the members called on the Grand Division to interfere and preferred charges against the Frontenac Division and some members thereof before the said Grand Division, which resulted in the said Grand Division adopting and passing a Resolution 4th December A.D. 1857, expelling two of the members of the Frontenac Division and declaring said Frontenac Division guilty of Insubordination, and calling on the other members of the said Frontenac Division to act in accordance therewith.

That afterwards the said Grand Division on the same day adopted another Resolution as follows:

"That the Grand Worthy Patriarch be delegated from the Grand Division to visit Frontenac Division Number Two, to counsel the members thereof and to encourage them in goodness, and generally to keep a watchful supervision over their proceedings, and that he have power to suspend said Division Number Two, or otherwise deal with it as he may deem expedient and necessary."

That thereupon Dr. Beatty, the Grand Worthy Patriarch of the Grand Division, on the 24th of December A.D. 1857, attended a meeting of the Frontenac Division, and upon their refusal to expel the members already declared expelled by the Grand Division, he announced to the Frontenac Division that they were suspended, and removed their Charter from the Lodge

That afterwards and on the 26th day of December A.D. 1857, the Defendants, two officers of the said Grand Division, came to the Lodge Room of the said Frontenac Division, and by the direction of the said Grand Worthy Patriarch, and as his special deputies, removed in accordance with the By-Laws, certain articles of Regalia and furniture valued at twenty-nine pounds, and kept the same as such deputies.

That the said Defendants were authorized to do this act by instructions from the said Grand Worthy Patriarch, and under the By-Laws.

That sin Defendant and passed acts had forfeited.

Your Committee to whom was referred the following Appeals, beg leave to Report as follows:

Ist. In the matter of George A. Clark's appeal against the decision of Lincoln Division No. 357, "That drinking lemonade in a tavern was a violation of Article II," your Committee think it necessary to state, that this Division, annoyed with the prevalence of the drinking customs in its locality and with the dangerous practice of using what are called Temperance drinks by Temperance men; in its zeal to preserve its members from being led astray by the wary tricks of designing individuals, and to carry out the spirit of our pledge and obligation—passed a Resolution declaring the use of lemonade in a Tavern to be a violation of Article II; said George A. Clarke being a

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party to, consenting in, and even urging the including of lemonade among other dangerous so-called Temperance drinks, the use of which was to be precluded by said Resolution. Your Committee find that this Division exceeded its powers in declaring the use of lemonade a violation of Article II, and therefore there has been no violation of said Article by Brother George A. Clarke. But your Committee cannot forbear declaring the conduct of Brother Clarke glaringly inconsistent with his own vote on said Resolution, and his example under the circumstances very dangerous and discouraging—and would take this opportunity of recommending and reiterating the sentiments expressed by a Committee appointed at last Session, in which it is stated, "we think that all Sons of Temperance ought to be on their guard against using any beverages in Taverns, except tea, coffee, or water."

2nd. In the matter of James Jackson's appeal against the decision of Orillia Division No. 122, "That the pouring out a glass of intoxicating liquor, to be used by another person as a beverage at a Public Dinner, by a Son of Temperance, is not a violation of Article II," your Committee are unanimously of opinion, that the act of Brother William Stormont above stated was a violation of the "true intent and meaning of the Pledge," which is, to prohibit the manufacture, traffic and use of all alcoholic or intoxicating liquors as a beverage. And your Committee consider that a Son of Temperance on public occasions should feel it a privilege and duty to show his colors, raise his Banner, and avow his pledge; and if opportunity offer and need be, defend the holy and self-denying principle which every Son of Temperance is pledged to promote.

Too much importance cannot be attached by us to the efforts made in Great Britain to relieve themselves from the great incubus of intemperance, by prohibiting the traffic through an Act of a permissory character, as a first instalment of that moral result which must inevitably follow a course of right action in behalf of humanity.

The momentousness of the crisis to which we have been brought, must impress itself on every Brother's mind. With the movement in our Fatherland, led on by many noble and patriotic minds; the great fact that the State of Maine has returned in spite of political partizanship to Prohibition, as its only remedy from the curse of the traffic; the great principle of Prohibition already conceded by the late action of our Legislature; the interest manifested in the cause of Temperance by the action of various religious bodies in their Synods and Conferences; with the public mind turned toward our noble Order to lead in this great warfare -can we do less than intreat the Father of Mercies for the aid necessary to consummate the work which has been committed to our trust.

Your Committee are fully aware of the great benefits that must follow our Order and the Temperance cause in general from a proper and careful training of those who, as your Grand Scribe so happily expressed it, are so soon to take our places on the stage of action, and who, if now judiciously

guided, will be fully prepared to enter with confidence on any station to which the hopes and anticipations of a silent but swiftly approaching, and

Moved by Grand Worthy Associate, seconded by Representative J. G. Elwoop—

That our Grand Worthy Patriarch be instructed to watch the progress of the Bill contemplated, through the House of Assembly. Carried.

Moved by Grand Chaplain, seconded by Representative Rev. J. A. WILLIAMS—

That this Grand Division receives with much pleasure the visit of our Brother the Rev. W. H. Guild, Grand Worthy Patriarch of Eastern New York, and fraternally welcomes him to its Session: glad to have this opportunity of fraternizing with our American Brother in the great work of Temperance and Prohibition. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Representative Rev. Wm. Rowe, seconded by Grand Chaplain—

That the Grand Scribe be instructed to inform the Subordinate Divisions of the privileges of Lady Visitors, as they are generally understood by the Order. Carried.

Moved by Past Grand Worthy Patriarch, Dr. J. Beatty, seconded by Representative A. AIKMAN—

That the Grand Division expresses its utmost confidence in Brothers John Moffat, Past Grand Worthy Associate, and Grand Worthy Associate Rev. W.Wilkinson; and cheerfully recommends the Subordinate Divisions of the Order to employ these Brothers as Lecturers, and to provide for their support while so employed, as the laborer is worthy of his hire. Carried.

In Joint Committee subsequently, Brother Rev. J. McKillican was also recommended as a Lecturer in the same manner.

The Committee on Grand Worthy Patriarch's Report submitted the following Report:—

Grand Division Committee Room, 2nd December, 1858.

To the Grand Worthy Patriarch, Officers and Brethren of the Grand Division of Canada West:

Your Committee to whom was referred the Report of the Grand Worthy Patriarch, beg to present the following:—

They have carefully examined the excellent Report of the Grand Worthy Patriarch; and to them it is, as no doubt it will be to you, most gratifying to mark the evidences of progress presented by our late honored chief officer.

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and Worthy ratifying to hief officer. These are full of hope, and should stir us up to be unweary in well-doing, seeing that in due season we shall reap a rich harvest if we faint not.

It affords your Committee unfeigned pleasure to learn the advancement and progress of the cause in which we are all engaged, in connection with organizations of the friends of Temperance; and that while the various organized bodies hold distinctive views of policy, their motives and aims are identical.

The partial recognition of the principle of Legal Prohibition contained in the new Municipal enactments, your Committee regard as being of more than ordinary importance, which they hail as the precursor of future good. The simple fact that the recent Legislative enactments establish the constitutionality of the principle, is one of great importance, which deserves more than a mere passing notice, as it removes one of the most formidable objections so frequently heretofore urged against the passage of a Prohibitory Law.

Your Committee respectfully but earnestly urge the importance of rightly improving the present advantages contained in the Municipal and Election Laws, if they hope for success in the future.

It is very satisfactory to your Committee to observe the striking testimony conveyed in the Presentments of the Grand Juries in various parts of the country against the vice of intemperance and the evils resulting therefrom; as well as the recognition of the Bench, with all their experience and acquaintance with the causes of crime, of the solemn and painful testimony given by Grand Juries. Such facts must have an important influence upon the public mind, and cannot be lightly regarded by our Legislators.

As the matter of petitioning the Legislature for the enactment of a Prohibitory Law engages the attention of another Committee of this Grand Division, it is not necessary for your Committee to offer any observations upon the subject. But your Committee would take the liberty of suggesting the propriety of soliciting Township, County and City Municipal Corporations to petition the Legislature in favor of a Prohibitory enactment. Intemperance is a social evil, and consequently comes within their province. Such Corporations more properly represent the feelings and desires of the people than any others in the land—their solicitations could not be overlooked, even by our don't-like Legislators; and in many instances, your Committee have reason to believe, would most cheerfully give their countenance and lend their support for the obtainment of such a law.

In reference to the legal proceedings had in respect to certain acts of insubordination by members of the late Frontenac Division, your Committee recommend that they be carefully looked after and thoroughly followed up by the officers of this Grand Division to their final issue.

The Report of the late Grand Worthy Patriarch your Committee consider a valuable document, containing much that is suggestive of serious thought and vigorous action by the entire Order. In closing their Report your Committee would offer their humble testimony to the assiduity, zeal and efficiency displayed by the late Grand Worthy Patriarch in the discharge of the important and onerous duties which devolved upon him, alike creditable to himself and beneficial to this Grand Division and to the Order.

That the Grand Division do appoint a Committee to prepare a memorial to the various Ecclesiastic bodies in this Province, inviting their hearty cooperation with this Order to procure Legal Prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating liquors as a beverage: and that the Grand Division thankfully acknowledge the praiseworthy efforts of Ministers of the Gospel in promoting the cause of Temperance, and hope that more general and extensive means be employed, to use the influence of the pulpit, to recommend and enforce the practice of strict Temperance as stated in the Holy Bible, viz: "It is good neither to eat flesh, or drink wine, or anything whereby thy Brother stumbleth, or is offended, or is made weak;" "and do unto all men as ye would they should do unto you."

Resolved,—That a copy of the foregoing Resolution do accompany said memorial, and be also embodied in the Synopsis of our Proceedings to be furnished to the newspapers. Carried.

On motion the above was referred to the following Committee, viz: Representatives Rev. R. D. Wadsworth, Rev. Wm. Rowe, and Rev. J. A. Williams.

Moved by Representative J. G. Bell, seconded by Representative Rev. J. McKillican—

That the Grand Scribe do address a Circular to the head of each Municipal Corporation in Canada West, in accordance with the Report of Committee on the Grand Worthy Patriarch's Report. Carried.

Moved by Representative J. Breakenridge, seconded by Representative J. M. T. Hannum—

That the sum of Ten Dollars be paid to Representative W. J. Dawson, for his assistance as Assistant Grand Scribe during this Session. Carried.

Moved by Representative J. Breakenridge, seconded by Grand Scribe—

That the Messenger receive the sum of Five Dollars, for his services as such during this Session. Carried.

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Moved by Representative W. H. ORR, seconded by Representative A. AIKMAN—

That the Subordinate Divisions be requested to use their influence with the various Municipal County Councils in their vicinities, to the effect, that they send memorials to Parliament for a Prohibitory Law. Carried.

Moved by Past Grand Worthy Patriarch, seconded by Representative J. BREAKENRIDGE—

That the thanks of this Grand Division, and Order, be presented to the Managers of the Grand Trunk, Ottawa and Presscott, and London and Port Stanley Railways, who have again acted so liberally to the Representatives of this Order, in conveying them to this Session of the Grand Division and back, for one fare; and that the Grand Scribe be instructed to communicate this Resolution to said Managers. Carried.

Moved by Past Grand Worthy Patriarch, seconded by Representative J. J. HARGRAVE—

That the salary of the Grand Scribe be One Hundred and Fifty Pounds.

Moved by Past Grand Worthy Patriarch, seconded by Representative A. AIKMAN—

That the Grand Worthy Patriarch be instructed to obtain the Bonds required from the Grand Treasurer and Grand Scribe, by the Constitution of the Grand Division. Carried.

Moved by Representative J. Moffatt, Most Worthy Conductor, seconded by Representative Rev. J. McKillican—

That the motion relating to the Grand Scribe's salary, be re-considered.

Moved in amendment to the original motion, by Representative Rev. J. McKillican, seconded by Representative Rev. Wm.

That the Grand Scribe's salary be One Hundred and Seventy-Five Pounds.

At one o'clock on the morning of the Third of December, the Grand Division adjourned, thus closing this harmonious and interesting Session; and after prayer by the Grand Chaplain, the Representatives retired, with minds reliant on the promise that strength shall be given according to the day.

At the meeting of the Joint Committee of the above-named organizations at London, December 2nd, the following resolutions were unanimously

Resolved—That the Joint Committee from the Grand Division of the Order of the Sons of Temperance, and Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Good Templars, of Canada, do mutually determine upon making a joint effort in circulating Petitions to the Legislative Assembly, and procuring signatures to the same, praying for the enactment of a Prohibitory Liquor Law.

Resolved—That the Committee to carry the arrangement into effect consist of the Grand Worthy Patriarch and Grand Scribe, Sons of Temperance, and Grand Worthy Chief Templar and Grand Worthy Secretary of Good Templars, to prepare the Petitions to the Legislative Assembly, and procure the printing of the same, and distribute jointly, through said organizations, over the Province of Canada West. The Petitions to be accompanied by a joint circular, explaining the movement and exhorting the members to a united effort and diligence in thoroughly canvassing every house in the land.

The Committee feel that any comments from them would be unnecessary, as they are certain the reading of the foregoing resolutions will be sufficient to stimulate every lover of the cause of Temperance to determined effort in swelling the number of signatures to such an untold amount, that the Legislature, however unwilling, will feel compelled to grant a Prohibitory Liquor Law.

We would however recommend that the Divisions and Lodges, unitedly or separately, as the case may be, in the municipality, say village, town, city, or township, appoint a Superintendent and Committee of Petitions.

The business of the Superintendent shall be to see that an efficient Committee be appointed for each ward or school section, to circulate petitions thoroughly in their township, town, or city—that every man, woman, boy and girl, who can comprehend the difference between an intemperate parent and a sober one, may have the opportunity of signing.

That every effort be made to procure numerous signatures to the petitions, and when the whole ground has been gone over and every house canvassed, the petitions should be handed in to the Superintendent.

It has been decided at this time to petition the Honorable the Legislative Assembly only; therefore one signature to one petition will suffice, the signatures to be written on one side of the paper. When the several sheets are collected from the Committee men, the Superintendent should paste them together in one continuous scroll with one printed petition at the top, and six names or more on the sheet on which said petition is printed; and it should be forwarded without delay to the local Member of Parliament, or otherwise, as may be deemed advisable, for presentation to the Legislative Assembly.

Our primary object is to send up huge petitions, and to otherwise agitate for a Prohibitory Liquor Law; to adopt petitions at public meetings; to adopt resolutions at such meetings as to the nature of the law required, for the guidance of our Representatives: in short we must attack our Representatives and Parliament by every means that can be devised, that they may know the whole country is alive and determined on this great object.

In conclusion, Sons of Temperance and Good Templars, the undersigned, in the names of your Grand Bodies, would earnestly and affectionately entreat the members of both organizations, to give the subject of petitions their cheerful and hearty co-operation; and we would urge upon you, in the language of a veteran still in our ranks, "to make use of every agency you can enlist in the cause. Sons, Good Templars, Sisters, Abstainers, work for the good of our country; work for the interests of humanity; work for the honor of our cause; acquit yourselves like true philanthropists, and pour in upon our Legislature an overwhelming tide of public opinion; and may God grant us success."

You will observe that the intention is to have all males over 12 years of age sign on the right-hand column, and all females over 12 sign on the left-hand column. It is also desired that all who can write will please sign their own names; also, be particular and not allow parties to sign only on one side of the petition.
